M., by the following routes: First—Sixty-third street to Eighth avenue; Eighth avenue to Sixty-fifth street; West Sixty-fifth street through the transverse road of Central Park, and East Sixty-fifth street to First avenue; First avenue to slaughter-house. Second—Tenth avenue to Eighty-fifth street; Eighty-fifth street and transverse road through Central Park to First avenue; First avenue to Harlem bridge and Morrisania. Third—Tenth avenue to Old Bloomingdale road to Kingsbridge and Yonkers.

That the Secretary be authorized and directed to notify all persons engaged or interested in the removal beyond the city limits of stable manure of a hearing at this office, to be held on Tuesday, November 16, at 1 o'clock P. M.

### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 23, 1875: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,069, as follows: 1 public building, 843 tenement houses, 1 dangerous building, 143 private dwellings, 26 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and workshops, 14 stores and warehouses, 66 stables, 30 slaughter-houses, 10 manure dumps, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 1 stone yard, 1 coal yard, 59 sunken and vacant lots, 1 swamp, 1 public sewer or drain, 60 yards, courts, and areas, 56 cellars and basements, 102 waste-pipes and drains, 179 privies and water-closets, 95 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 3 cisterns and cesspools, 2 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 19 other nuisances, 1 violation of the Code, together with 43 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 776.

During the past week 68 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

83 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

73 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 30 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 29 houses, 29 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 18 cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending October 23, 1875: Typhus fever, 3; typhoid fever, 16; scarlet fever, 20; cerebro spinal meningitis 3; measles, 2; diphtheria, 16; and small-pox, 26.

### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending October 23, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 457 burial permits for city deaths, 17 for bodies in transitu, and 41 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 457 deaths, 182 marriages, 481 births, 41 still-births, 17 applications for transit permits, and 47 returns from Coroners. There were 22 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 5 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage, and 22 of death were issued from this Bureau. One case of death was referred to Coroners.

HEADQUARTERS FIRE DEPARTMENT,  
CITY OF NEW YORK, October 20, 1875.

The Board of Commissioners met this day.

Present—President Joseph L. Perley, in the chair, and Commissioners Roswell D. Hatch and Vincent C. King.

The minutes of the meetings held respectively on the 13th and 15th instant were read and approved.

The President submitted the affidavit of the Assistant Supervisor of the City Record, relative to the publication of the advertisement inviting proposals for alterations, etc., of building Nos. 191 and 193 Fulton street. Filed.

In absence of the form of contract approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, it was, on motion, resolved to readvertise for proposals for doing the work.

### Trial
