Resolved, That on and after August 1 next, the Branch Workhouse at Hart's Island be abolished, and the services of all the officers and employees be dispensed with, except such as may be transferred to other institutions, and except the necessary officers and men to care for the City Cemetery and to bury the dead, to be under control of the Superintendent of the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island; and it is further  
Resolved, That all the buildings formerly belonging to the Branch Workhouse be transferred to the Hart's Island Insane Asylum, under the control of General Superintendent A. E. Macdonald, and that the Superintendent of Workhouse make an inventory of all the property and live stock in and around said buildings, and such portions as can be utilized by the General Superintendent to be transferred to him by the Superintendent of Workhouse, after approval by this Board. The 917 deaths represent a death-rate of 25.28 against 19.37 for the previous week, and 29.44 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The increase of 215 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 14 in the deaths from cerebro-spinal meningitis, of 97 from diarrhoeal diseases, of 13 from heart disease, of 25 from diseases of the digestive organs, and of 17 from Bright's disease. There was a decrease of 9 in the deaths from bronchitis, and of 10 from pneumonia.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, from measles in the Twelfth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Twenty-third Ward.

act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889),

to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give  
the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the  
Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or  
lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are  
forever released from all obligation under the grant in  
respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in  
front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assess-  
ment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Com-

2. No answer is deemed necessary as to the limit to the term "more or less," page 8, "Instructions to Architects."

3. No part of the building proper is to be outside of the limiting lines given in the diagram. Steps, terraces, approaches and arcways may be outside of that line, but not arcades, pavilions, porticos and such structures. The building may be as far inside of the limiting line as the competitor may fix.

4. No information will be furnished as to details of County Court-house, or other adjacent buildings.

5. The question "will there ever be wings connecting with the County Court-house" is not answered.

6. Questions as to duties of different offices, and their relation to each other are answered in the CITY RECORD of June 17, 1893.
