Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated on Woodward avenue, corner Troutman street, East Williamsburgh, in the Borough of Queens, has become dangerous to life, and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing and drainage thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on Woodward avenue, corner Troutman street, East Williamsburgh, in the Borough of Queens, be required to vacate said building on or before August 5, 1902, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life, and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing and drainage thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

And further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building, and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon Lot No. 37 Second street, New Brighton, in the Borough of Richmond, has become dangerous to life, and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing and draining thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on Lot No. 37 Second street, New Brighton, in the Borough of Richmond, be required to vacate said building on or before August 5, 1902, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life, and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing and drainage thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

Whereas, The premises No. 557 West One Hundred and Fortieth street, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the fill-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom.

That all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, and the ground space cleaned, disinfected, cemented and so graded and drained as to discharge all surface water and liquid matter into the street sewer by and through a properly trapped, extra heavy iron drain; that the floors of the horse stalls be pro-

vided with a valley drain, properly trapped, and connected with the sewer-connected drain.

That the receptacles used for holding manure be cleaned and disinfected, and all manure removed therefrom; that hereafter all manure be kept inside the stable, and removed from the premises daily, unless pressed in bales, barrels or boxes, so as to reduce it to not more than one-third the original bulk.

Second—That the abstract of our said amended estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings, of the Law Department, of The City of New York, in the Borough of Brooklyn, Room 20, Borough Hall, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, there to remain until the 22d day of September, 1902.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Third avenue, distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly side of Seventy-first street; running thence westerly and parallel with Seventy-first street to the westerly side of Second avenue; running thence northerly along the westerly side of Second avenue to the middle line of the block between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets; running thence westerly along the centre line of the block between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets; running thence westerly along the westerly side of First avenue; running thence southerly along the westerly side of First avenue to the centre line of the block between Mackay place and Seventy-first street; running thence westerly along the centre line of the block between Mackay place and Seventy-first street to the easterly side of the Shore road, and running thence southerly along the easterly side of the Shore road to a point where the same will intersect a line drawn parallel to Seventy-first street and distant 100 feet southerly thereto, and running thence easterly and along a line drawn parallel to Seventy-first street and distant 100 feet southerly thereto from the westerly side of Third avenue; running thence northerly along the westerly side of Third avenue to the point of beginning.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House, in The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, on the 4th day of September, 1902, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested in him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person, making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to The City.

The contracts must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of The City so to do.
