## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT

MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 5, 1904.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President, Borough of Manhattan; Martin W. Littleton, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President, Borough of The Bronx; Joseph Cassidy, President, Borough of Queens; George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond.

On the question of the approval of the Minutes as printed, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn moved that that portion of the Minutes of January 22, 1904, which reads as follows:

"The President of the Borough of Brooklyn moved that the Secretary notify the different heads of departments and offices of the City Government that hereafter copies of all communications requiring action of the Board be sent to each member of the Board,"

—be corrected to read as follows:

Resolved, That the Secretary notify the different heads of departments and offices of the City Government that hereafter copies of all communications requesting action by the Board be sent to each member of the Board.

Which motion was adopted by the following vote:

The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn—13.

The minutes of meetings held December 18, 22, 29, 1903, and January 8, 15, 22, 29, 1904, were approved as printed, with the correction made as above noted.

A hearing was had on the application of the Prison Ship Martyrs' Association of the United States for an appropriation of \$50,000, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 617, Laws of 1900.

Mr. S. V. White appeared in support of the application.

Referred to the Corporation Counsel to draft a bill to provide for the payment of the appropriation out of Corporate Stock.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Police Department in regard to a site for a police station at Nos. 220-228 East Twenty-ninth street, and requesting the Board to discontinue all proceedings for the acquisition of the same, together with a report of the Appraiser of Real Estate, Department of Finance, relative thereto:

Ordered, That the Comptroller be respectfully informed that the application for the issue of such stock for the acquisition of such site was made with the view of

establishing a new precinct from portions of two other precincts, and that the Commissioner has no intention at this time to establish such new precinct.

Ordered, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to discontinue all proceedings for acquisition of such site for such purpose.

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held on the 11th day of December, 1903, adopted a resolution authorizing the acquisition of certain property known as Nos. 220 to 228 East Twenty-ninth street, on the south side, between Second and Third avenues, Borough of Manhattan, being 100 feet front by 98 feet 9 inches in depth, for the purpose of erecting thereon a precinct station house and stable, under a plan adopted by the Hon. Francis V. Greene, late Police Commissioner, for a subdivision of certain police precincts in the Borough of Manhattan.

At a meeting held the 15th day of January, 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing the issue of \$70,000 of Corporate Stock for the purpose of providing means for the acquisition of the site, including architect's survey, examination of title and preparation of plans and specifications for a precinct station house, prison and stable.

In a communication under date of January 20, 1904, the Chief Clerk of the Police Department transmits a communication of the Police Commissioner in which it is

"Ordered, That the Comptroller be respectfully informed that the application for the issue of such stock for the acquisition of such site was made with the view of establishing a new precinct from portions of two other precincts, and that the Commissioner has no intention at this time to establish such new precinct.

"Ordered, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to discontinue all proceedings for the acquisition of such site for such purpose."

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution rescinding their resolution adopted at a meeting held December 11, 1903, in relation to the approval of the acquisition of the site for the Police Department, and rescinding their resolution adopted at a meeting held January 15, 1904, for the issue of \$70,000 of Corporate Stock for the purpose named in said resolution.

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the selection of a site for a precinct station house, prison and stable for the Police Department, located at Nos. 220, 222, 224, 226 and 228 East Twenty-ninth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, and bounded and described as follows:

"Beginning at a point on the southerly side of East Twenty-ninth street distant 200 feet westerly from the southwesterly corner of East Twenty-ninth street and Second avenue; running thence southerly and parallel with Second avenue 98 feet 9 inches; thence westerly and parallel with East Twenty-ninth street 100 feet; thence northerly and again parallel with Second avenue 98 feet 9 inches, to the southerly side of East Twenty-ninth street; thence easterly along the southerly side of East Twenty-ninth street 100 feet to the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the street in front thereof to the centre thereof—and hereby authorizes the Comptroller to enter into contracts for the purchase of the said premises at a price not exceeding sixty-seven thousand dollars (\$67,000), said contracts to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval."

—be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Appended hereto is a statement, marked "Schedule A," and authenticated by the signatures of the President and Secretary of the said Board, showing the purposes to which it is intended to apply the appropriation for which requisition is now made.

This requisition is made pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners by the concurrent vote of four members thereof, at a regular meeting held on January 28, 1904.

SIR—The Executive Committee of the Board of Education at a meeting held May 21, 1902, adopted a resolution for the acquisition of a piece of property on Albany avenue, Maple street and East New York avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, being 17 feet 6 inches in width front and rear, with a depth of 200 feet, as part of a site for a public school, and requested that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises selected and determined by the Board of Education as sites for school purposes.

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held July 8, 1902 (see Minutes, Board of Estimate, page 1374), a resolution was adopted authorizing the Comptroller to enter into an agreement for the purchase of the property at a price not exceeding \$800. Said agreement was duly entered into, and at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held November 28, 1902 (see minutes, Board of Estimate, page 2519), a resolution was adopted approving of the resolution of the Board of Education for the appropriation of \$800 from the proceeds of Corporate Stock of The City of New York for the purpose of providing means for the purchase of the above-mentioned lot.

On January 14, 1903, the Corporation Counsel reported that two of the owners of the property were infants, and it would be necessary to institute proceedings for the appointment of a special guardian to execute deed conveying the infants' interest in said property.

On September 17, 1903, the Secretary of the Board of Education communicated with the office of the Corporation Counsel, requesting information in the matter, and received a reply thereto under date of September 28, 1903, in which the Corporation Counsel stated that he had communicated with the attorney for the owners and requested that such proceedings be instituted and brought to a conclusion in order that the City might take title by deed to said premises, but inasmuch as the consideration in the contract for the purchase of the property was \$800, and as the proceedings to sell infants' interest in real estate is an expensive one, he thought that the owner would prefer that the title be acquired by condemnation proceedings.

In an agreement granted by the owners of the property dated February 11, 1903, the Board of Education entered into possession of the strip of land, and a school building is now being erected thereon.

At a meeting of the Board of Education held on December 23, 1903, it was recommended that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to authorize the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of title to said property, and in furtherance thereof the following resolution was adopted by the Board and was transmitted to this office:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of title to the plot of land, 17 feet 5 inches by 200 feet, on Albany and East New York avenues and Maple street, adjoining Public School 91, Borough of Brooklyn, selected as a site for school purposes by the Board of Education on April 23, 1902 (see journal, pages 831 and 886), in lieu of acquiring the same by purchase, as authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 8, 1902."

I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the resolution of the Board of Education, and adopt a resolution authorizing the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the property described in said resolution for school purposes.

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 23d inst., relative to my request that the Board of Apportionment authorize the Police Commissioner to pay additional compensation for certain positions in the Police Department:

1. Stenographer to Police Commissioner from \$1,200 to \$1,400 per annum, and you ask for statement of reasons for such proposed increase. I beg to state that the work of the Stenographer to the Police Commissioner is very onerous, and his position is in the nature of assistant to the Secretary to the Commissioner. The hours are very long, extending often as late as 7 o'clock in the evening to complete the necessary work of the office.

2. Chief Engineer of steamer "Patrol," from \$1,140 to \$1,500, and Assistant Engineer of steamer "Patrol" from \$900 to \$1,320 per annum. You ask for comparative statement of salaries paid employees in similar positions. Investigation shows that the United States Quartermaster's Department, United States Army, and Fall River Line pay Chief Engineer \$1,500 per annum, including food and quarters; the Department of Docks and Ferries, \$1,500, no food or quarters; Department of Charities, \$1,600, food and quarters supplied. The Fire Department of The City of New York has a detailed foreman receiving full salary, \$1,400, which, of course, cannot be compared to prevailing rate of wages. The Chief Engineer of the steamer "Patrol" has no food or quarters supplied.

For Assistant Engineer the United States Quartermaster's Department and Fall River Line pay \$900 per annum, with food and quarters supplied; the Department of Charities, \$1,250, with food and quarters supplied. The Assistant Engineer of the steamer "Patrol" has no food or quarters supplied.

From this it will appear that the increase for salaries of Chief Engineer from \$1,140 to \$1,500, and of Assistant Engineer from \$900 to \$1,320, will yet bring them within the prevailing rate of wages for such positions, and it is urgently requested that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will give this matter favorable consideration.

GENTLEMEN—I hereby request the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment to fix the salary of the County Court Stenographer for Queens County. Heretofore the compensation has been fixed at \$15 per day, and Daniel C. McEwen of No. 160 Sterling place, Brooklyn, has supplied the Court with stenographers. He has now resigned, and I have appointed C. Herbert Burns of Richmond Hill, Queens County, whose name was at the head of the eligible list, furnished me by the State Civil Service Commission.

I would quote from the communication sent by my predecessor in office, Hon. Harrison S. Moore, County Judge of this County, to your honorable body at the time estimates were being made for expenses for the year 1904:

"The increase in the sum of money required to pay Stenographer's compensation arises out of the contemplated change from a per diem compensation of Stenographers to a salary compensation (\$2,500 per annum instead of \$15 per day). Heretofore a sum has been appropriated to pay a Stenographer for attendance at the trial terms of the County Court.

"Stenographers employed at motion terms in trial of special proceedings in the County Court have been paid out of the Court fund on order of the County Judge. There will be little, if any, difference in the amount of money actually paid for Stenographers whether the compensation is by salary or by per diem compensation."

I would also call your attention to resolution of your Board of January 8, 1904, transferring to the Court Fund of the County Court the sum of \$1,000.20 from the Surrogate's Court of Queens County. This will add to the fund allowed by you for expenses of the County Court. My reason for asking that an annual salary be fixed for the County Stenographer of the County Court is: That it insures the same Stenographer in attendance in Court at all times, while under the former system, Mr. McEwen sent to the Court any Stenographer whom he might have available at the particular day. The amount drawn for stenographic services in the County Court from both funds has, I am advised, been about \$2,500 per annum. That amount, it would seem to me, would be proper for his annual salary.

GENTLEMEN—I would respectfully submit for your consideration, in addition to the matters stated by me in my recent communication asking that the compensation of the Stenographer of the County Court be fixed at an annual salary instead of on a per diem basis, the following:

The business of the County Court has been increasing rapidly and, in addition to the regular trial terms, a motion term is held by me on each Saturday of the year except during the month of August. At this motion term equity cases are tried, and it has been the practice at those terms for counsel to furnish a stenographer of their own and pay him themselves. This is unsatisfactory for the reason that such stenographers may or may not be competent, and I have determined that it is necessary, for my own protection, to have my official Stenographer present at each of those terms. On the per diem basis this will add \$690 to the Stenographer's compensation each year.

This sum, added to the amount paid last year for per diem services and disbursements, would exceed the sum of \$2,200 per year.

From the present condition of my trial term calendar it seems probable that an additional trial term will have to be held this year. This would bring the sum paid for that service up to the salary I have asked to be fixed.

The appointment I have made was taken from the State Civil Service list of Stenographers eligible to appointment in the Supreme Court, and the appointee stood at the head of the list in the Second Judicial Department. An appointment to that Court would carry with it an annual salary of \$3,000.

I might, with propriety, add that the salaries of each of the Stenographers in the County Court of Kings is fixed at \$3,000, and the salaries of the Stenographers of the City Court of New York at the same amount.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Education held on the 22d day of March, 1899, Mr. Robertson presented and asked for and obtained unanimous consent for immediate consideration of a number of sites for school purposes in the Borough of

Brooklyn, selected by the Committee on Sites, among which was an interior lot, Lafayette avenue, Emerson place, DeKalb avenue and Classon avenue, and at that meeting a resolution was unanimously adopted approving the report attached to the resolution from the Committee on Sites.

No further action was taken in the matter by the Board of Education until some time last summer, when Mr. Harkness of the Board presented to this office an option for the acquisition of the property for the consideration of \$5,000. Nothing was done in this matter up to the present time, for the reason that the price was considered by me excessive.

It seems that the owner owned other property on Classon avenue adjoining this interior plot, and in front thereof, and states that under the representation of Mr. Robertson of the Board of Education that the City would purchase his interior plot, he sold the buildings on Classon avenue, leaving a plot 67 feet 9 inches by 150 feet by 67 feet 8 inches by 150 feet, which adjoins the northerly line of the land of the Board of Education, and the southerly line of property which is also owned by The City of New York, but which is vacant, on DeKalb avenue. While it is true that the owner of the premises now has no way of getting at his property, it is also true that he might repurchase a piece of real estate on either street, and thus be enabled to make use of the interior piece.

The Board of Education, at a meeting held January 14, 1904, adopted the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines, as a site for school purposes, the following-described interior lot, adjoining Public School 45, in the block bounded by Lafayette, Classon and DeKalb avenues and Emerson place, in Local School Board District No. 29, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$2,500.

"Beginning at the northeasterly corner of the present site of Public School 45 and running thence westerly along the northerly line of the lands of Public School 45 sixty-seven (67) feet nine (9) inches; thence northerly and parallel with Emerson place one hundred and fifty (150) feet; thence easterly and parallel with DeKalb avenue sixty-seven feet eight inches (67 feet 8 inches); thence southerly and parallel with Classon avenue one hundred and fifty (150) feet to the northwesterly corner of the lands of said Public School 45, the point or place of beginning.

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described."

The property is assessed for the year 1903 at \$2,500, and I have an option from the owner to purchase the same at \$3,500. While I believe this to be full value, I think the City may properly acquire the property at that price, for the reason that it would enable the Board of Education to use the new property for a school yard, and to build a wing upon their present property upon the part now used for school yard purposes, and I would therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the acquisition of this plot of ground at a price not exceeding \$3,500.

Whereas, By subdivision 1 of section 242 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has the power to appropriate from time to time, for the maintenance, improvement and extension of the system of water supply of the Borough of Brooklyn, the moneys received from water rents in the said borough, subject, however, to the charges now imposed by law upon said revenues; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has submitted an estimate of one million, three hundred and forty-eight thousand, five hundred and thirty-nine dollars and seventy-one cents (\$1,348,539.71) as the amount required for the proper maintenance and distribution of the water supply of said borough; and

Whereas, The sum of five hundred and eighteen thousand, two hundred and forty-four dollars and seventy-four cents (\$518,244.74) will be required for the year 1904 to meet the interest on outstanding bonds issued for the construction and extension of the water works of said borough, and the revenues to be received during the year 1904, based upon the revenues actually received during prior years, can safely be estimated at an amount in excess of two million, five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000); therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) be and hereby is set aside and appropriated from the water revenues received during the year 1904, if such revenues be sufficient, and, if not, from the balance remaining in the water revenue account on December 31, 1903, for the maintenance and distribution of said water supply in the Borough of Brooklyn during 1904.

GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to the provision of chapter 621, Laws of 1903, I have commenced the work of discharging mortgages, certifying to conveyances and other papers of record filed for record during my term of office.

I am unable to say how long a time will be required for the work, and can only judge by the experience of my predecessors. Mr. Howe did not finish his work in this office until about the middle of March, and I am advised that Mr. Haggerty required an even longer time than this.

In face of the fact that they had the advantage of fees and the opportunity to add to the force and work overtime, payment for which was made from the fees retained under the old system, the business of the office during the past year has been far in excess of any previous year, with the additional handicap of extensive alterations being made to the rooms in which we were conducting business. We have discharged all mortgages and signed all conveyances and other instruments that were ready for us up to the close of our term. This aggregated some 80,000 instruments, and there still remain some 16,000 instruments. The work involves the assortment and arrangement in regular order of various instruments recorded in this office, the removal from the racks of several thousand libers, placing them upon the desks, opening to the pages where instruments are recorded, comparing the instruments with the record, signing the same and returning them to their proper places.

The manual labor alone requiring the assistance of possibly two men, I would be pleased to learn what in your judgment is the best course to pursue—i. e., go on with the work and present a charge at its completion, or to have some understanding regarding the compensation in advance.

discharge all mortgages and certify to all conveyances and other papers of record filed during his term, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall determine the compensation for such services, and make provision for the payment thereof. Said act took effect May 15, 1903.

Concerning Mr. Neal's inquiry whether compensation for the work should be determined upon in advance, it would seem to me that the Board of Estimate, after inquiring into the facts, should make provision for the employment of a number of assistants, to be determined upon for a period to be fixed, at rates of compensation to be limited in its resolution.

Hon. JAMES W. STEVENSON, Deputy Comptroller, New York City:

DEAR SIR—Replying to your communication of the 23d instant, regarding the work to be done by me under the provisions of chapter 621, Laws of 1903, I beg to say that I have been steadily employed at this work since January 1, 1904, and from present indications it will not be earlier than April 1 before I can finish. There were on January 1 13,349 mortgages, deeds and conveyances in process of work, and 2,780 satisfactions, making a total of 16,129 instruments requiring my certification.

There is a steady demand for the deeds and conveyances from the people who filed them and paid to have them recorded, and I am disposing of the papers as rapidly as they reach me, which is at the rate of about 1,200 per week, my experience in this being the same as my predecessors', they having the advantage of the fee system, which enabled them to add to the force and have the men work overtime toward the close of their term.

The method of doing the work in this office is, briefly, as follows: Papers are filed in the office at the rate of 1,500 to 2,000 per week. They are first handed to the Deputy, who determines the cost and collects the fee. They then pass to the Entry Clerk, then to the Tickler Clerk; at the end of the day the Entry and Tickler Clerks' sheets are made to agree with the amount received. The following morning they are sent to the Block Index Department, where they are numbered according to block and section, and abstracts made from them. They then reach the Expert Clerk, who examines them closely for errors of description and location.

They are then sent to the Chief of Copyists, who divides them up into the several sections, and they are given to the copyists to enter into the libers. After this is done they are sent to the Comparing Department, and from there to the Current Indexing Department. They are then ready to receive the seal of the office and be signed by the Register.

I have two men assisting me in the work, one of whom arranges the satisfactions in the various sections, selects the libers from the cases, places them upon the desk, opens to the pages upon which are the mortgages to be satisfied. The other reads from the documents enough to satisfy me that it is the proper instrument, before I sign it. The satisfactions are then bundled up and filed away, and the libers restored to their proper places. This work is done in the early part of the day, the latter part being taken up in signing deeds, conveyances, etc.

The work practically engages the whole of my time. I estimate the cost of completing this work at two thousand five hundred dollars—two thousand dollars for my own services and five hundred for my help.

DEAR SIR—I beg to report in relation to the repairs necessary at the City Hall Building that I have carefully examined the various rooms and the roof, leaders, etc., in this building, and would recommend that the following work be performed:

Roof and leaders should be repaired and the leaders properly connected. Connect the leaders with sewer. These leaders at present drain into cesspools. There are eight all told. This defective drainage is the cause of the dampness in the basement of the building. The cesspools often fill and the stagnant water is forced back through the pipes and causes continual damage to the leaders, walls, etc., and makes constant repairing necessary.

Governor's Room.

There are several changes to be made in this room. The plastering is in need of repair. There is also a great deal of carpentering to be done in changing windows, woodwork, etc. The room should be painted and decorated throughout.

Aldermanic Committee Room.

This room is in need of cleaning and painting throughout, and repairs should be made to the plastering.

Office of the City Record.

Plastering should be repaired, the offices painted throughout, and all necessary carpentering done to finish and complete the office of the City Record.

Incidental repairs will be necessary throughout the building, all of which will cost approximately from \$12,000 to \$15,000.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of four hundred and fifteen thousand dollars (\$415,000) to provide means for the acquisition of a site and erection of building for use as quarters of Engine Company 7 and Hook and Ladder Company 1, and also for a fuel depot.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following preambles and resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 15, 1904, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, 1903, adopted a resolution, subject to the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen, authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding four hundred and fifteen thousand dollars (\$415,000) to provide means for the acquisition of a site and erection of building for use as quarters of Engine Company 7 and Hook and Ladder Company 1, and also for a fuel depot, and

"Whereas, The Board of Aldermen failed to take action thereon before the expiration of the term of office of the old Board of Aldermen; therefore be it



##### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or service for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
