Carlin & Company, for the erection and completion of an extension to the Female Prison, City Prison, to be used as a Matron's office and living quarters, for the sum of two thousand four hundred and sixty-five dollars (\$2,465), the said amount to be charged to and paid out of the proceeds of an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of one hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars, authorized for work to be done on said City Prison by ordinance approved by his Honor the Mayor, December 4, 1901.

"Unanimously adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 21, 1905, a majority of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Conley that his name be transferred from the eligible list for Court Attendant, Borough of Manhattan, to the list for Court Attendant, Borough of The Bronx, recommending that as the candidate is residing in the latter borough and has been residing in said borough for many years, his request be granted. It appearing that the candidate gave a Manhattan address merely for the purpose of having his correspondence sent there and did not wish to make application for an appointment in that borough, the request was granted.

A report was presented from Examiner Byrne on the appeal of John H. Meyers, No. 213 East Fifteenth street, that the rating given him on "record" in the examination for promotion to Roundsman, Police Department, be corrected. It appearing that he was, through an error, rated on the record of another candidate of the same name, instead of on his own record, the appeal was granted.

A report was presented from Examiner Byrne, dated February 15, on the appeal of Pascal Bresha, candidate for promotion to Section Foreman, that he be given credit for the time he served as an Assistant to Section Foreman in his rating on said examination. It appearing from the report of Examiner Byrne that the rating for seniority in said examination was not based upon time spent by a candidate as an Assistant to Section Foreman, as the same is not a grade, but merely a departmental designation, the appeal was denied.

A report was presented by the Assistant Secretary, with reference to the appeals of a number of candidates for the position of Axeman that their papers on experience be rerated. The report of the Assistant Secretary stated that the said candidates received a passing mark of 75 or over on their technical paper and also passed on arithmetic, and that their low average mark was caused by the severity with which the remaining paper—experience—was rated, some of the candidates having received but 25 per cent. on that paper. He recommended that the experience paper of the candidates who received a passing mark on the technical work be rerated, and stated that such action would result in placing the names of three of the candidates on the eligible list, and materially advance the standing of the others. After carefully considering the matter, in view of the fact that the position of Axeman is the lowest position in the engineering service, for which, as a rule, only young men fresh from the colleges and technical schools, who could not possibly have any extensive experience, are admitted, the recommendation of the Assistant Secretary was adopted, and he was directed to refer the said papers to Examiner Hildreth for rerating.

The appeal of Emile A. Hart, No. 171 Alexander avenue, that the papers submitted by him in the examination for Librarian in Charge be rated was denied, it appearing that the candidate revealed his identity in the experience paper handed in by him.

The Secretary presented the appeal of Patrick McGloin, No. 531 Bergen street, Brooklyn, candidate for Patrolman, that he be permitted to change the date of birth on his application, the same being incorrect as set forth. It appearing from the birth certificate furnished by the candidate that he was born on August 25, 1876, instead of September 25, 1874. On motion, the appeal was granted.

A letter was presented from the Supervisor of the City Record, dated February 28, transmitting copy of a letter received by him from Messrs. Levy & Unger, attorneys and counsellors at law, with reference to the publication in the City Record of the name, residence and occupation of each applicant for appointment or reappointment to any position in the Police Department, and calling the attention of the Commission to the writ of mandamus issued by the Supreme Court in May, 1903, requiring the then Civil Service Commission to make such publication. The matter was referred to Commissioner Talley for a recommendation.

A letter was presented from the Commissioners of Accounts, dated February 21, in response to the letter of the Commission under date of February 18, requesting to be informed why no candidates appeared on the day set for the examination for promotion to the position of fifth grade Accountant. The letter stated that one of the persons notified to appear for examination died shortly after receiving such notice; that just prior to the date of the examination, action was taken under a court decision restoring four of the other eligibles to a salary equivalent to that attached to the fifth grade, which accounts for their non-appearance, and that the Department had received no explanation of the non-appearance of the other persons who were notified. The letter asked, in conclusion, that the examination be canceled. The request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Assistant Secretary to the Mayor, dated February 20, transmitting for the information of the Commission an anonymous letter relative to the recent examination for the position of Alienist. The same was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Superintendent of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Borough of Brooklyn, dated February 21, requesting approval of a leave of absence, without pay, from February 1 to June 1, granted Hugh A. Carey, Attendant. It appearing from the physician's certificate attached that the leave of absence was granted because of illness, on motion, the same was approved.

The appointment of Henry J. Naylor as Machinist (Automobile Repairist) in the Department of Street Cleaning, for five days from February 22, was approved.

A letter was presented from the Civil Service Reform Association, dated February 27, protesting against the employment of Examiners Weller, Moore and Byrne as experts. The letter was referred to the President for answer.

The request of Thomas E. Langan, No. 392 Hicks street, Brooklyn, that he be restored to eligibility for appointment as Janitor, at a salary of \$754 per annum, was denied, it appearing from the records of the office that he declined appointment at that salary in the Department of Education.

A letter was presented from Sylvester D. Baldwin, Esq., Captain, Forty-eighth Precinct, Police Department, asking that when the new eligible list for Inspector of Police is promulgated his name be placed thereon, by virtue of Rule XV., paragraph 12. The request was denied for lack of power.

The action of the Chief Examiner in rejecting the applications of John Dunn and Lawrence Quinn for the position of Examiner of Sewer Claims, under Regulation V., was sustained, it appearing to the satisfaction of the Commission that the same was justified.

The request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to proceed with the examination.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
