Minutes of meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, held in Room 16, City Hall, Thursday, December 23, 1909.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

After disposing of the Franchise and Financial Calendar, the following Public Imrovement matters were considered:

ACQUIRING TITLE TO THE LANDS AND PREMISES REQUIRED FOR A DRAINAGE DITCH OR CANAL, LOCATED BETWEEN CANAL AVENUE NORTH AND CANAL AVENUE SOUTH AND EXTENDING FROM GRAVESEND BAY TO SHEEPSHEAD BAY, AND BETWEEN WEST TENTH STREET AND WEST ELEVENTH STREET, EXTENDING FROM CANAL AVENUE NORTH TO AVENUE V, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of fixing an area of assessment for the proposed acquisition of title to the lands and premises required for a drainage ditch or canal, located between Canal Avenue North and Canal Avenue South and extending from Gravesend Bay to Sheepshead Bay, and between West Tenth street and West Eleventh street, extending from Canal Avenue North to Avenue V, Borough of Brooklyn, affidavits of publication were presented showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

A communication from Mr. Joseph F. Keany, attorney for the Long Island Railroad Company, objecting to the inclusion of the lands of that company in the proposed area of assessment was received and placed on file.

After hearing a representative of the Climax Coal Company, who appeared in opposition to the proposed improvement only in so far as it affects the water-front rights of that company, the President of the Board of Aldermen moved that further consideration of the matter be postponed until the first public improvements meeting of the Board in 1910.

LAYING OUT A STREET SYSTEM FOR THE TERRITORY BOUNDED BY THE NEW YORK, NEW HAVEN AND HARTFORD RAILROAD, BRONXDALE AVENUE, WHITE PLAINS ROAD, BRONX AND PELHAM PARKWAY AND WILLIAMSBRIDGE ROAD, THE BRONX.

The following report of the Committee to which this matter was referred on December 17, 1909, was presented:

> BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER. December 20, 1909.

Hon, GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apport tionment:

SIR-At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on December 17 last, a hearing was given in the matter of changing the City plan by laying out a street system for the territory bounded by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, Bronxdale avenue, White Plains road, Bronx and Pelham Parkway and Williamsbridge road. Borough of The Bronx.

At this hearing an objection was raised to the treatment of Sackett avenue through the two blocks between Haight avenue and Williamsbridge road and a question was raised as to whether the street as here planned followed the lines shown upon the tentative plan for the district, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Appoortionment on June 19, 1908, and the matter was referred to a committee consisting of the Chief Engineer of the Board and the President of the Borough of The Bronx for investigation

Your committee begs to report that the objections raised are not well founded and that in the vicinity affected the map appears to agree with the tentative plan of 1908. The later plan provided a slight modification in the lines of Sackett avenue as shown upon a tentative map adopted in 1905, but the latter plan contemplated a street layout which, we believe, would not have been more advantageous to the objector.

made at an early date in order to permit of advancing the construction of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway, as well as of the immediate development of a large portion of the property affected, we would recommend the approval of the map under consideration, with the understanding that a further study will be made of the treatment of Sackett avenue and that any modifications which can advantageously be made in its lines will be shown upon an amended plan to be submitted at an early date.

SIR-You will remember that on April 23 last, a resolution was adopted by the Poard of Estimate and Apportionment revoking all permits in regard to encroachments In view of the fact that both of the tentative maps were adopted after public heretofore granted. The Title Companies objected strongly to this, as they said it hearings and that the determination of the layout of the territory affected should be would affect titles to existing buildings, and make a great many difficulties in transfer and sales thereof, and at their suggestion a resolution was passed declaring the resolution in question inoperative and appointing a Committee to revise the same. This in-operation period expires on December 23 next.

The Committee has prepared a report and enclosed forms of resolutions repealing the old resolutions and substituting new ones in their place, which the Committee

thinks obviates all the questions raised by the Title Companies.

I write this to call your attention to the matter in order that you may understand it, and the necessity of adopting the resolutions on December 23, as the Title Companies feel that if the resolution of April 23 goes into effect again, it will seriously affect large interests.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

SIRS-The question of modifying the resolutions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted April 23, 1909, governing the width of roadways and sidewalks and encroachments upon streets, having been by resolution of said Board, adopted May 14, 1909, referred to a committee consisting of the Corporation Counsel, the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Consulting Architect of the said Board, and the said Committee having duly considered and examined the subject, submit the following report:
The resolutions adopted on April 23, 1909, were very far reaching in their pro-

visions, and met with the opposition and criticism of representatives of real estate interests in the City, who felt that, as they stood, the titles of property might be affected or left uncertain. As a result of this protest, resolutions have been adopted from time to time providing that the operation of such resolutions of April 23, 1909, should be suspended for given periods, which expire on December 23, 1909.

Your Committee have had before them representatives of numerous interests, and a large number of suggestions have been made as to exactly what permits for encroachments should be prohibited. Such numerous and divergent views have been expressed that your Committee feels it would not be proper to formulate detailed provisions on this matter without an opportunity to the various interests to examine the exact terms of any proposed provision, and to be heard in regard thereto at a

Your Committee are of opinion that this whole question as to permits for encroachments should receive careful investigation by your Board, with a view of adopting proper resolutions governing the entire matter for the whole City. In the meantime, in order that there may be no prejudicial effects engendered by the uncertainties in connection with the effect of the resolutions adopted by your Board on the 23d day of April, 1909, and which have been since from time to time declared inoperative, your Committee recommends that so much of said resolutions as relate to this question of encroachments should be repealed and rescinded, and for the purpose of accomplishing this result, your Committee recommends the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York on April 23, 1909, governing the width of roadways and sidewalks, and canceling and revoking certain ordinances, resolutions, permits and licenses allowing encroachments upon the public streets previously granted, and intended to prevent the erection of buildings which would encroach upon streets laid out upon the City map, be and the same are, and each of them is, in all respects, hereby rescinded and repealed and declared to be of no force and effect.

Resolved, That unless otherwise provided by special resolution of this Board adopted on or after March 12, 1909, the following rules shall apply to all streets which may hereafter be improved by regulating, grading or paving within the limits of The City of New York:

1. The roadway width of streets shall be such as to give a clear space between curb lines as follows:

(a) For streets less than 20 feet wide and used for vehicular traffic, the roadway shall occupy the entire street width, less the space occupied by the curb.

(b) For streets having a width ranging from 20 feet to 50 feet, and not occupied by a railroad, the width of the roadway shall be 60 per cent. of the total width of the

(c) For streets having a width not less than 50 feet nor more than 60 feet, and not occupied by a double-track railroad, the roadway shall have a width of 30 feet.

(d) For streets having a width of more than 60 feet and not more than 66 feet 8 inches, and not occupied by a double-track railroad, the width of the roadway shall be one-half of the total of the street.

(e) For all streets having a width of over 66 feet 8 inches, except those portions of Fifth avenue and of Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, concerning the treatment of which a resolution was adopted by this Board on December 18, 1908, the roadway width shall be 80 per cent. of the street width, less 20 feet, subject, however, if the street is occupied by a railroad, to the provision as to the minimum roadway width herein provided for streets occupied by a railroad.

(f) For streets in which there is a single-track railroad the minimum roadway width is to be 30 feet.

(g) For streets in which there is a double-track railroad the minimum roadway

width is to be 40 feet. 2. The curb corners of street intersections where the interior angle is 30 degrees

or more shall be turned with a curb having a radius of 5, 6, 8, 10 or 12 feet, this being determined for each case as the nearest of these dimensions which would represent 10 per cent. of the width of the wider street, provided, however, that in case the interior angle is less than 80 degrees the radius shall not be less than 20 per cent. of the distance between the building line corner and the point of intersection of the curb

For intersections where the interior angle is less than 30 degrees a tangent shall be inserted in the curb line at the corner at right angles to the line bisecting the said interior angle, and at a distance from the building line corner equivalent to the width of the wider sidewalk of the intersecting streets, the said distance being measured along the bisecting line. The curves to connect this tangent with the curb lines otherwise provided for shall each have a radius of 6 feet.

3. The roadways shall be centrally located between the street lines, and for streets having a width of 20 feet or more the remaining space on each side of the roadway shall be designated as the sidewalk.

The following resolutions were then adopted:

Resolved, That the resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York on April 23, 1909, governing the width of roadways and sidewalks, and canceling and revoking certain ordinances, resolutions, permits and licenses allowing encroachments upon the public streets previously granted, and intended to prevent the erection of buildings which would encroach upon streets laid out upon the City map, be and the same are, and each of them is, in all respects, hereby rescinded and repealed and declared to be of no force and effect.

Resolved, That unless otherwise provided by special resolution of this Board adopted on or after March 12, 1909, the following rules shall apply to all streets which may hereafter be improved by regulating, grading or paving within the limits of The City of New York:

- 1. The roadway width of streets shall be such as to give a clear space between curb lines as follows:
- (a) For streets less than 20 feet wide and used for vehicular traffic the roadway shall occupy the entire street width, less the space occupied by the curb.

- (b) For streets having a width ranging from 20 feet to 50 feet, and not occupied by a railroad, the width of the roadway shall be 60 per cent. of the total width of the
- (c) For streets having a width not less than 50 feet nor more than 60 feet, and not occupied by a double-track railroad, the roadway shall have a width of 30 feet.
- (d) For streets having a width of more than 60 feet and not more than 66 feet 8 inches, and not occupied by a double-track railroad, the width of the roadway shall be one-half of the total of the street.
- (e) For all streets having a width of over 66 feet 8 inches, except those portions of Fifth avenue and of Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, concerning the treatment of which a resolution was adopted by this Board on December 18, 1908, the roadway width shall be 80 per cent. of the street width, less 20 feet, subject, however, if the street is occupied by a railroad, to the provision as to the minimum roadway width herein provided for streets occupied by a railroad.
- (f) For streets in which there is a single-track railroad the minimum roadway width is to be 30 feet.
- (g) For streets in which there is a double-track railroad the minimum roadway width is to be 40 feet.
- 2. The curb corners of street intersections where the interior angle is 30 degrees or more shall be turned with a curve having a radius of 5, 6, 8, 10 or 12 feet, this being determined for each case as the nearest of these dimensions which would represent 10 per cent. of the width of the wider street, provided, however, that in case the interior angle is less than 80 degrees the radius shall not be less than 20 per cent. of the distance between the building line corner and the point of intersection of the curb

3. The roadways shall be centrally located between the street lines, and for streets having a width of 20 feet or more the remaining space on each side of the roadway shall be designated as the sidewalk.

Affirmative-The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond and the Acting President of the Borough of Manhattan-16.

On motion, the matter of projections and encroachments beyond the house line was laid over for consideration by the incoming Board.

Relief from Assessment in the Proceeding for Acquiring Title to Washington AVENUE, BETWEEN THE EAST RIVER AND JACKSON AVENUE. QUEENS.

The following report of the Chief Engineer and opinion of the Corporation Counsel, to whom the matter was referred on December 3, 1909, were presented:

REPORT No. 7385.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER. December 20, 1909.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR-At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on December 3, 1909, a petition was presented by Charles E. Lydecker requesting the adoption of a resolution providing for relieving property assessed in the proceeding for acquiring title to Washington avenue between the East River and Jackson avenue, in the Borough of Queens, from so much of the assessment as was due to the inclusion in the proceeding of land under water.

In the report which was presented upon this application it was shown that the area under water had been properly included within the street system and that the Board was prohibited under the provisions of section 980 of the Charter from reconsidering its original determination to place the entire expense upon the abutting property. For the purpose of removing any question as to this interpretation of the law the matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion.

In the accompanying communication, bearing date of December 17, the Corporation Counsel advises that under the provisions of chapter 536 of the Laws of 1889 all of the streets and avenues of Long Island City had been extended to the bulkhead line and that the opening proceeding, as carried out, is in accordance with the plan thus established. He also states that the inclusion of land between the high water line and the bulkhead line could not have materially increased the awards, as the courts have held that the acquisition of title to the former line carries with it the right of access to the channel. He is of the opinion that the Charter does not permit of extending any relief in this proceeding.

I would therefore recommend that the application be denied.

DEAR SIR-I am in receipt of your communication of December 4, 1909, by which you transmit a copy of a communication dated October 15, 1909, from Charles E. Lydecker, Esq., a petition of the Wotherspoon Plaster Mills Company, dated September 21, 1909, and the copy of the report of the Chief Engineer of your Board in the matter of said Wotherspoon Plaster Mills Company, from relief from assessment in the proceeding to acquire title to Washington avenue, from the East River to Jackson avenue, in the Borough of Queens. You say that at a meeting of your Board held December 3, 1909, this matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel.

I wish to say also that I am in receipt of a letter from Charles E. Lydecker, dated December 3, 1909, in relation to the same matter. I have had an investigation of the facts in the case made and I find them to be as follows:

Washington avenue from the East River to Jackson avenue, Borough of Queens, in relation to which my advice is requested, was first laid out on a map prepared by the Commissioners appointed pursuant to chapter 765 of the Laws of 1871, entitled 'Commissioners' Map of Long Island City, in Queens County, State of New York," which map was filed in the City Clerk's office, Long Island City April 25 1873. That act was entitled "An Act to provide for the laying out of streets, avenues, roads and parks in Long Island City."

On April 25 1873, a tentative map was filed as aforesaid upon which no grades, block distances or angles were shown.

Upon the map aforesaid Washington avenue was shown as a street extending to a proposed bulkhead line of the East River. Subsequently on a map prepared by the same Commissioners under amendments made by the Legislature to the foregoing act, a map was made which was filed in the City Clerk's office of Long Island City on December 31, 1875, and entitled "Map of grades, monuments and sewers, Long Island City, Queens County, New York," dated December 28, 1875. On this map Washington avenue was shown as laid out and extended to the high water line of the East River.

By chapter 536 of the Laws of 1889, entitled "An Act to Establish and Settle the Bulkhead and Pier Line along the East River at Long Island City and Ravenswood, in the Port of New York," it was provided by section 3 that the streets and avenues of Long Island City or Ravenswood should be deemed to be extended to the bulkhead and pier lines established by that act.

In the notice of application for the appointment of the Commissioners herein, in the petition for the appointment of Commissioners as well as upon the rule map attached to said petition, Washington avenue was shown as extending to the pier and bulkhead line of the East River, and reference was made in both the petition and notice of application that Washington avenue was shown on the Commissioners' map of Long Island City, filed in the office of the County Clerk of Queens County, Jamaica, April 25, 1873. The term "East River" as a boundary was taken to mean the bulkhead line, or the line beyond which the solid filling could not extend; and accordingly the proceedings for the acquisition of title to Washington avenue have always included the acquisition of the land under water out to the pier and bulkhead line.

The proceedings were first authorized by a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted on July 18, 1902, directing the Corporation Counsel to "make application for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to acquire title wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired for the use of the public to the lands, tenements and hereditaments required for the purpose of opening and extending Washington avenue, from the East River to Jackson avenue, in the First Ward of the Borough of Queens, City of New York."

"Resolved, That the entire cost and expense of said proceeding shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

By the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, section 970, the map or plan of Long Island City as then constituted became a part of the map or plan of The City

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 29, 1909, the map or plan of The City of New York was changed by extending Washington avenue from the mean high water line of the East River to the United States pier and bulkhead line, Borough of Queens; and the action of the Board in reference thereto was approved by the Mayor on February 26, 1909. It was at that meeting

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he is hereby authorized and requested to apply to the Supreme Court for the amendment of the proceeding authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 18, 1902, for the acquisition of title to Washington avenue, from the East River to Jackson avenue, in the Borough of Queens, so as to have the same conform to a change in the map or plan of The City of New York, by extending Washington avenue from the mean high water line of the East River to the United States pier and bulkhead line, authorized by resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 29, 1939, and approved by the Mayor on February 2, 1909.

No proceedings were ever taken to amend the proceeding herein, as, under the notice of application for the appointment of Commissioners, the petition therefor and the rule map attached to said petition, it was deemed that no formal amendment was

The awards which have been made for the parcels extending to the pier and bulkhead line in the Commissioners' report include the value of the land under water out to the bulkhead line, and no increase in said awards was rendered necessary by the foregoing change in the map or plan of The City of New York.

Under section 980 of the Greater New York Charter, revised, it is provided that The determination or decision of said board as to the proportion of cost and expense to be borne and paid by the city of New York, and as to the proportion to be borne by the property benefited, after it shall have been made and announced, shall be final, and such determination or decision shall not be reopened or reconsidered by said board. In all proceedings instituted before December thirty-first, nineteen hundred and one, and now pending, in which no portion of the cost of such proceedings has been assumed by or placed upon the city of New York, the board of estimate and apportionment may by resolution direct that such proportion of the cost thereof as it in its discretion shall deem just and equitable shall be borne by the city of New York.

The foregoing language is extremely positive; and the question now arises under the petition of the Wotherspoon Plaster Mills (Inc.), to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the communication to the Corporation Counsel of its counsel Charles E. Lydecker, whether or not the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of July 18, 1902, placing all the cost and expense of this proceeding upon the property owners benefited, was adopted, in view of the fact that the proceedings included land under water available for dock purposes. It is suggested that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment did not have before it in 1902 when it adopted its resolution placing the entire cost and expense upon the property benefited, a true picture of the situation, as shown by its subsequent action of the same Board in extending Washington avenue, from mean high water line out to the bulkhead line, when such street had already been laid out according to law. It must be assumed that the Board intended to open the street to where the water-front legally was. namely, to the bulkhead line or line of solid filling, or channel line.

The acquisition of title to a street down to the high-water line would carry with it the condemnation of access out to the channel.

Matter of City of Brooklyn, 73 N. Y.

Matter of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, 127 App. Div., 672.

The award for the land taken would necessarily include the use of such land for access, and it would not be material, so far as cost was concerned, whether the street was condemned to the high-water line or to the bulkhead line, as there could not be any material increase in the cost of the land taken, between condemning it to the high-water line and the bulkhead line of the Harlem River. And as in my opinion the resolution placing the entire cost and expense on the property owners benefited, stands good as to all of the proceeding as far as the high-water line, I think under the language of the section 980 aforesaid, and all the circumstances of the case, that your Board cannot now amend the resolution placing the entire cost and expense upon the property owners.

FIXING THE ROADWAY AND SIDEWALK WIDTH OF THE SERVICE STREET ON THE EASTERLY SIDE OF RIVERSIDE DRIVE, EXTENDING FROM WEST ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-EIGHTH STREET TO WEST ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-FIFTH STREET, MANHATTAN

The following communication from the Chief Engineer was presented:

REPORT No. 7380.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT. OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER. December 18, 1909.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Appor

SIR-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on Decem ber 17 a resolution was adopted authorizing the regulating and grading of the service roadway on the easterly side of Riverside drive between West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street and West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street.

This street has a width of 40 feet and is intended to serve as an outlet for the abutting property on its easterly side. Under the general resolution adopted by the

Board on April 23, 1909, governing the treatment of roadways and sidewalks, the street would have a roadway width of 24 feet with 8-foot sidewalks on each side. It is understood that the plans which have been prepared for this improvement contemplate the omission of the westerly sidewalk and provide a sidewalk width of 13 feet on the easterly side with a 27-foot roadway.

In my judgment this treatment is a desirable one and I would recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolution which provides authority for carrying out the improvement along these lines.

The roadway width of the service street on the easterly side of Riverside drive, between West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street and West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, Borough of Manhattan, is to be 27 feet, with a sidewalk on the easterly side thereof, to be 13 feet wide.

Affirmative-The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond and the Acting President of the Borough of Manhattan-16.

PROVIDING SOUTHERLY OUTLETS FOR SIXTH AND SEVENTH AVENUES, MANHATTAN.

The following report of the Select Committee, consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller and the President of the Borough of Manhattan. to which this matter was referred on November 22, 1907, was presented:

December 21, 1909.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Appor-

SIR-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on November 22, 1907, a public hearing was given upon three different plans for providing outlets at the southerly end of Sixth and Seventh avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, and the matter was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller and the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

The Committee begs to report that it has considered the various plans which have been presented, and has concluded that the greatest measure of relief will be secured for the same expenditure by extending Seventh avenue from its present terminus at Greenwich street to the intersection of Carmine street and Varick street at a width of 100 feet; by the widening of Varick street from 60 to 100 feet between Carmine and Canal streets; and by the widening of Carmine street from 60 to 100 feet between Sixth avenue and the proposed extension of Seventh avenue. This will provide an outlet for Sixth avenue, while if Sixth avenue were extended as suggested on one of the plans, it would result in very great expense through the creation of two new thoroughfares each 100 feet wide with a very short distance between them. The plan known as Project D covers the changes above suggested, and in addition thereto provides for a widening of Christopher street to 100 feet between Greenwich street and Greenwich avenue, and for a widening of Vestry street to 100 feet between Canal and West streets. These two widenings would establish outlets to the waterfront; and. while they are very desirable, we believe that they should not be undertaken at the

Your Committee would therefore suggest what is known as Project D for adoption by the Board except as to the widening of Christopher street and of Vestry

The question of meeting any portion of the expense of this change by an assessment for benefit need not be considered at this time, but will be determined when proceedings are instituted to acquire title.

40, North River, which was referred by the Board at a meeting held December 3, 1909, to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, to the Board of Assessors and to myself, with a request that the Board be advised as to the expense involved for carrying out the improvement if an assessment is levied for it, and information be given as to how much of the expense could not be included in the assessment, I desire to say that the practice of this office has been not to include in the assessment the cost of the services performed in this Department in connection with an improvement.

For the information of the Board, I desire to say that the contract for the abovementioned improvement was filed in this Department on December 3, 1909, and is certified against the Street Improvement Fund. Acquiring Title to Union Street, Between New York Avenue and Rochester Avenue, and Between Buffalo Avenue and East New York Avenue, Brooklyn.

The following report of the President of the Board of Aldermen, to whom this matter was referred on December 3, 1909, was presented:

THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT, BOARD OF ALDERMEN,
NEW YORK, December 27, 1909.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on December 3, 1909, a hearing was given on the area of assessment in connection with proceedings to acquire title to Union street, between New York and Rochester avenues and between Buffalo and East New York avenues, Borough of Brooklyn. Some of the property owners in interest recommended that the title to be taken on the block between Brooklyn and Kingston avenues should be an easement instead of a fee title owing to the fact that a steam heating plant serving a number of private residences on both sides of Union street had pipes across the street, and that a serious question would be raised as to the right to maintain these pipes if the title were taken in fee, and the matter was referred to the President of the Board of Aldermen as a Special Committee of one.

I understand that it is very desirable that proceedings should be instituted to acquire title to this street at its increased width, and that this should be done as promptly as possible in order that the improvement of private property now contemplated may be carried out. I am also given to understand that the property owners who appeared before the Board have expressed their willingness that a fee should be taken rather than that there should be any delay in the proceedings, and inasmuch as the policy of the City has lately been to acquire a fee title in all opening proceedings, I would recommend that the proceedings be authorized and that the title to the entire street be taken in fee.

I cannot but believe that if it becomes necessary for the owners of this steam heating plant to secure a franchise in order to maintain their pipes across the street, such franchise would be granted for a nominal consideration, and I so recommend.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and of one Commissioner of Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title as herein determined, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public for the same purpose, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Union street, between New York avenue and Rochester avenue and between Buffalo avenue and East New York avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon the receipt by him of a rule map, damage map and profile, certified as having been approved by this Board.

Resolved, That no portion of the cost and expense of said proceedings, incurred by reason of the provisions of title 4, chapter 17 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense, including the expense of the Bureau of Street Openings, the cost and expense incurred by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn in the preparation of rule, damage, benefit and profile maps, for the use thereof; and of the awards, if any, for damages caused by intended regulation and all other expenses and disbursements authorized by section 997 of said title as amended, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of the City Record and the publishers of the corporation newspapers that due notice was given therein that at the time of the adoption of the resolution directing the institution of proceedings herein to acquire title to the lands required for this improvement that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would consider a proposed area of assessment as therein described and would give a public hearing thereon upon the 19th day of November, 1909; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed area of assessment who appeared, and such proposed area of assessment was duly considered by this Board.

Resolved, That the area of assessment for benefit in these proceedings be and is hereby fixed and determined to be as follows:

1. Bounded on the north by a line always midway between Union street and Eastern parkway, and the prolongation of the said line; on the east by a line distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of Rochester avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Rochester avenue; on the south by a line always midway between Union street and President street and by the prolongation of the said line; and on the west by the easterly line of New York avenue.

2. Beginning at a point on the prolongation of a line midway between Union street and Eastern parkway as these streets are laid out between Buffalo avenue and Ralph avenue, distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Buffalo avenue, and running thence eastwardly along the said line midway between Union street and Eastern parkway, and along the prolongations of the said line to the intersection with the northwesterly line of East New York avenue; thence southwardly and parallel with Tapscott street to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southeasterly from and parallel with the southeasterly line of East New York avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to East New York avenue; thence southwestwardly along the said line parallel with East New York avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Union street and President street as these streets are laid out easterly from and where they adjoin Buffalo avenue; thence westwardly along the said line midway between Union street and President street, and along the prolongations of the said line to the intersection with a line parallel with Buffalo avenue and passing through the point of beginning; thence northwardly along the said line parallel with Buffalo avenue to the point or place of beginning.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative-The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Queens-13. Negative-The President of the Borough of Brooklyn-2.

ACQUIRING TITLE TO SUYDAM STREET AND TO WILLOUGHBY AVENUE, FROM IRVING AVENUE TO THE LINE BETWEEN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN AND THE BOROUGH OF QUEENS

The following opinion of the Corporation Counsel, to whom this matter was referred on March 12, 1909, and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

> CITY OF NEW YORK, LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL, NEW YORK, December 3, 1909.

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR-I am in receipt of your communication of March 27, 1909, addressed to the Corporation Counsel, transmitting copies of papers in the matter of acquiring title to Suydam street, from Irving avenue to the line between the Borough of Brooklyn and the Borough of Queens; to Willoughby avenue, from Irving avenue to the line between the Borough of Brooklyn and the Borough of Queens, and to Starr street, between Irving avenue and Wyckoff avenue, where not already acquired, Borough of

You inform me that at the meeting of the Board held on the 12th day of March 1909, the Comptroller presented a memorandum of which the following is a copy:

"The City of New York, as successor to the City of Brooklyn, owns title to a strip of land 100 by 200 between DeKalb avenue and Hart street through which this road runs. This land was turned over to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn as a corporation yard. The title was acquired under chapter 114 of the Laws of 1883, which law has been held constitutional by the Court of Appeals, and title made thereunder in accordance with the law good. Case of Wheeler vs. White. The railroad company has, I have been told, requested a release from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the strip of land and offered a sum of money for such release. Under these circumstances, I would recommend that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for the purpose of informing this Board, after he has verified the facts, whether the City should not take some action in the premises."

-and that on motion the memorandum was referred to the Corporation Counsel for the purpose of informing the Board whether the Board could not take some action in

The memorandum in question refers to a plot of land, 100 feet in depth, extending from DeKalb avenue to Hart street, through which the Evergreen Branch of the Long Island Railroad runs.

The proceedings which were under consideration by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the time the foregoing memorandum was presented were proceedings for the acquiring title to Suydam street, Willoughby avenue and Starr street, which cross the lands of the Evergreen Branch of the Long Island Railroad.

The plot referred to in the memorandum of the Comptroller is situated one block south of the most southerly of the three streets then under consideration by the Board, and, if owned by the City, it seems to have been thought that such ownership might affect the right to operate a railroad across the streets to the north.

Even assuming that the City is the owner of the plot in question, I do not think such ownership would affect the right of the railroad to acquire title to the same, either by purchase or by condemnation proceedings, if such lands are required for its roadbed, provided the line of the railroad has been located in the manner required by law and the City had consented to such location, and the railroad had been constructed within the time required by the statute, facts which I do not understand are now in dispute, since it appears to be a fact that the railroad has been in operation for years across the

The sale to the City of the lands in question would affect the title of the railroad to this plot, but if the railroad company's title is defective, or has been lost by reason of the sale to the City, the Railroad Law authorizes the acquisition of the same for the purpose of perfecting its title to the lands required for its roadbed.

I am also of the opinion that, even assuming the City owns the land in question, such ownership does not essentially change the situation in Suydam street, Willoughby avenue or Starr street, where such streets cross the roadbed of the railroad; and the situation there is such that we must assume that such streets cross the roadbed of a railroad, and to cross the same in the manner proposed by the map of the City it will be necessary to submit the question to the Public Service Commission.

While it appears to me that the memorandum with reference to the plot of land between DeKalb avenue and Hart street was submitted for the purpose of determining whether it would be necessary to treat the situation in Suydam street, Starr street and Willoughby avenue as streets crossing the roadbed of a railroad, and therefore the foregoing may be a sufficient reply thereto, it may not be amiss to consider the objection of the railroad company to the claim that the City has become the owner of the plot in question,

From the information furnished to me by the Comptroller's office it appears that the plot in question was sold for unpaid taxes and assessments at a tax sale held under and by virtue of chapter 114 of the Laws of 1883; that the sale took place on June 2. 1886, and that the City of Brooklyn was the purchaser at that sale of the plot in question; that thereafter notices of the sale were served on William N. Butler, as one of the owners of the plot in question; on Edward Johnson, Secretary of the People's Trust Company, and on Austin Corbin, as President of the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railway Company, and that proofs of such service were filed on February 5, 1895, in the office of the then Register of Arrears of the City of Brooklyn, and that on October 30, 1897, the City of Brooklyn received a deed under such sale from the Register of Arrears of the City of Brooklyn.

Thereafter, on October 22, 1902, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted

the following resolution: 'Resolved, That the vacant property owned by the City, situated on the south side of Hart street, 400 feet east of Irving avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and being 100 feet in width, front and rear, by a depth of 200 feet on each side, to DeKalb avenue, be and the same is hereby set apart and assigned to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, for use as a storage yard by the Bureau of Highways; use and occupation of same to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund

'The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted." Thereafter the City authorities commenced to use the land for storage yard purposes, and some clash resulted between them and the representatives of the Long Island

Railroad Company with reference to this land. On June 29, 1903, William J. Kelly, General Solicitor for the Long Island Railroad Company, wrote the Comptroller with reference to this matter, stating there had been some interruption to their trains and some clash had occurred between the track super- by the Corporation Counsel relative to the application to the Public Service Com-

the land for yard purposes; that the railroad thought there must have been some mistake on the part of the City with reference to the matter, as the company did not understand that the City owned the property, and he asked that the matter be reterred to some one who could take the matter up and straighten out the difficulty.

Several communications appear to have passed between the Comptroller and the Long Island Railroad Company with reference to this plot.

On July 13, 1903, the same Solicitor again wrote to the Comptroller, and among

other matters said: \*\* \* I find that your information is correct and that this property was sold by the old City of Brooklyn and purchased by the City.

"Notwithstanding the sale, the company has been paying taxes annually on this property for years past. Since 1899 the property has been included on the corporation's assessment list of the New York, Brooklyn and Manhattan Beach Railway Company. The company's tracks are located on the line and the railroad is operated over it.

\* \* I state the facts to you, feeling assured that as the City is the owner of the property, and as we have paid taxes faithfully up to date, if there is any way in which we can reclaim it our application will find favor with the City authorities."

On November 16, 1903, the Long Island Railroad Company, in an application signed by its Secretary, asked the City to reconvey to them by quit-claim the plot of

land in question, and said:

\*\* We therefore respectfully ask that the City may dispose of whatever interests it has obtained under this sale in the premises mentioned, and we offer to bid or pay for the premises the full amount of the arrears for which the property was sold, with interest and all lawful charges to date. This offer is made with a view to adjusting the matter on a fair, equitable basis with the City; we make it without prejudice to our right to claim that the sale in question was void and that no notice of sale was given as required by law or opportunity afforded us to redeem."

The real basis of the claim of the Long Island Railroad Company that the sale is void seems to rest on the fact that notice of the sale had been served on the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company instead of on the New York and Manhattan Beach Railway Company or on the Long Island Railroad Company.

The Long Island Railroad Company claimed that the legal title to the lands in question was in the New York, Brooklyn and Manhattan Beach Railway Company, a corporation which had leased the railroad and property belonging to it to the Long Island Railroad in perpetuity, on its agreement to maintain and operate it and to pay taxes and assessments.

An examination of the record title of these premises will disclose that at the time of the service of notice of sale the record title was not in the New York, Brooklyn and Manhattan Beach Railway Company, but, if in any railway company, was in the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railway Company, as the premises were conveyed to the latter company in February and March, 1877, by Cornelia G. Ten Eyck and Bladina S. C. Ten Eyck, respectively, and service on such company of the notice was good service, as the act of 1883 contemplated that such service should be made on the owners of record.

do not think, therefore, that the objection based on the non-service of the notice of sale on the Manhattan Beach or Long Island Railroad Company is a valid objection to the title of the City to the premises in question.

Unless some agreement can be entered into between the Sinking Fund Commissioners and the railroad company with reference to the price at which the property may be exposed at public auction, I think proceedings should be taken to eject the railroad company from the lands in question.

REPORT No. 7391.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER, December 27, 1909.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 29, 1909, a public hearing was given concerning the district of assessment proposed in a proceeding for acquiring title to the following streets in the Borough of Brooklyn:

Suydam street and Willoughby avenue from Irving avenue to the line between the Borough of Brooklyn and the Borough of Queens.

Starr street from Irving avenue to Wyckoff avenue where not already acquired. At this time it was shown that the Starr street proceeding was intended to relate only to the land within the limits of the right of way of the Evergreen Branch of the Long Island Railroad, title to the remaining length of the block having already been acquired under formal proceedings; it was also shown that both Willoughby avenue and Suydam street crossed the same branch of the railroad. At this hearing an objection to the proceeding was raised by the attorney for the Long Island Railroad unless it was understood that all of the expense involved in adjusting the grade of the railroad to conform with that proposed for the streets would be assumed by the City. As a result of this objection, and to permit of obtaining the opinion of the Corporation Counsel relative to the form of resolution to be used in making application to the Public Service Commission for a determination as to the method in which the streets were to be carried across the railroad, action was postponed to February 26, and again to March 12.

The desired opinion was presented at the meeting held on the latter date and the Board was then advised that since the only land to be acquired in Starr street related to the railroad right of way, this street should be omitted from the proposed proceeding and with the understanding that the desired result could be obtained by the adoption of a resolution petitioning the Public Service Commission to determine the character of the railroad crossing required at this point. A resolution providing for this treatment was then submitted, while the character of the crossings required at Suydam street and Willoughby avenue were made the subject of another resolution, intended to be acted upon in connection with the opening proceeding. On this date the Comptroller called the attention of the Board to the fact that certain lands used by the railroad company as a right of way were the property of The City of New York, and at his suggestion the Board requested the Corporation Counsel to advise as to whether this ownership would have any bearing upon the proposed proceeding.

In the accompanying communication from the Corporation Counsel, bearing date of December 3, 1909, the Board is informed that the land in question is located one block east of the streets to which the proposed proceeding would relate and that this ownership should not in any way affect the procedure. He suggests, however, that unless an agreement can be entered into between the Sinking Fund Commissioners and the railroad company providing for the sale of the property, proceedings should be taken to eject the railroad company from its occupancy.

From another opinion of the Corporation Counsel submitted to the Board at this time in connection with a request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx. relative to advancing a proceeding for acquiring title to White Plains road, it would appear that since a public hearing has been given concerning the district of assessment proposed in the matter of acquiring title to Suydam street, Willoughby avenue and Starr street, it would not be necessary to give a new hearing on the amended district to conform with the conditions resulting from the omission of Starr street, to which he holds the proceeding should not relate, providing the boundary of the new district does not include any area outside of that originally proposed.

Under these conditions I would recommend that a proceeding be instituted for acquiring title to Suydam street and Willoughby avenue between Irving avenue and the Borough line; that title to these streets be acquired in fee; that all of the cost and expense of the proceeding, including damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited; and that a district of assssment be laid out to comprise the following area:

Bounded on the east by the Borough line; on the southeast by a line midway between Suydam street and Hart street; on the southwest by a line distant 100 feet southwesterly from and parallel with the southwesterly line of Irving avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Irving avenue; and on the northwest by a line midway between Willoughby avenue and Starr street.

I believe that there are no buildings upon the land to be acquired.

I would also recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolutions prepared visor at that point and the parties representing the City who had taken possession of mission for a determination as to the method by which Starr street, and Willoughby

avenue and Suydam street should be carried across the tracks of the Evergreen branch of the Long Island Railroad.

I would also recommend that a copy of the Corporation Counsel's opinion relative to the ownership of land within the limits of the right of way of this railroad company be forwarded to the Comptroller.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York by a resolution adopted on the 30th day of December, 1909, has directed that proceedings be initiated in the name of The City of New York to acquire title, wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired, for the use of the public to the lands, tenements and hereditaments required for the purpose of opening and extending Suydam street, from Irving avenue to the Borough line, and Willoughby avenue, from Irving avenue to the Borough line, in the Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, The said street and avenue extend across the tracks of the Evergreen branch of the Long Island Railroad; and

Whereas, A notice has been served on the said railroad company that a hearing

of carrying the said street and avenue across the railroad tracks and right of way, and a hearing on the aforesaid date was had thereon; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby declares that it is necessary that the aforesaid street and avenue be carried across the said railroad tracks and right of way; and

Whereas, The grade of the railroad within the lines of Suydam street is 2.72 feet below the established grade of the said street, and within the lines of Willoughby avenue is 2.85 feet below the established grade of the street.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York petition the Public Service Commission of the First District to determine the manner in which the said Suydam street and the said Willoughby avenue be carried across the said railroad; and be it further

Resolved, That this Board recommend that the said street and the said avenue be carried across the railroad at their established grades respectively, and that the grade of the said railroad be changed to correspond therewith; and it is further

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be directed to present this petition to the Public Service Commission of the First District.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Queens—15.

On motion, the Secretary was then instructed to forward the Comptroller a copy of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel relative to the City's ownership of the railroad land.

ACQUIRING TITLE TO WHITE PLAINS ROAD, BETWEEN A POINT NEAR THE OLD UNION-PORT ROAD AND A POINT NEAR THWAITES PLACE, THE BRONX.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR-I am forwarding herewith copy of a communication received from the Corporation Counsel in connection with the above proceeding. He states that "as it was legal for your Board to modify the proposed improvement by disapproving of one proceeding, and to adopt or decrease the area of assessment, it seems to me that no injury is done to any property owner by your action in adopting the proposed area of assessment, without a further re-advertisement and re-hearing. The cases in which you have been advised that a re-hearing and re-advertisement should be had were cases like that of Pitken avenue, where the lines of the street were altered or where property which should have been included in the area of assessment was not included, or cases where under the amendment to the proceedings other property was included in the proceeding, which was then included in the area of assessment and should be stricken out."

As this proceeding should be expedited, I would request that it be submitted to the Board for action.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER, December 27, 1909.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Appor-

SIR-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on April 10, 1908, a hearing was given concerning the area of assessment proposed in the proceeding for acquiring title to the following streets in the Borough of The Bronx:

Bronx Park East, as widened, between White Plains road and Bronx and Pelham

White Plains road, between a point near the old Unionport road and a point near Thwaites place. An objection was at this time raised to the boundary planned for the assessment

district, and at the close of the hearing the matter was referred back to the Borough President for further consideration.

The proceeding was again considered by the Board at its meeting of September 24, 1909, on which date a communication was presented from the Borough President urging a modification in the boundary of the assessment district. At this time the Board adopted a resolution disapproving the Local Board resolution relating to the acquisition of title to the widening of Bronx Park East, and the Borough President was requested to submit a map showing changes which he would recommend in the lines of this street and in those of White Plains road, provided that it was found to be necessary to reduce the width of either or both of the streets in order to keep the assessment within limits which might properly be imposed upon the property deemed benefited. Since this date the Borough President has called the attention of the Board to the fact that it would not be advisable to reduce the width of White Plains road, which as now mapped has a width of 100 feet, as the street has been selected by the Rapid Transit Commission as a portion of the proposed Subway Route No. 18.

With the accompanying communication, bearing date of December 27, the Borough President submits a copy of an opinion rendered to him by the Corporation Counsel, under date of December 17, in which he is advised that the proposed opening proceeding, in so far as it relates to White Plaine road, could be authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment without giving a new public hearing concerning the assessment district, provided no territory were included within it which was outside of the limit originally planned, concerning which a hearing was given on April 10, 1908. The Borough President states that this proceeding should be expedited, and he requests that it now be authorized by the Board.

Under the conditions named, I see no reason why the desired action should not be taken, and I would recommend the adoption of the resolution, and that the assessment district be fixed to correspond with the boundary as proposed for both streets.

Resolved, That the title to be so acquired is hereby determined to be a title in fee in such premises.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court, for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and of one Commissioner of Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title as herein determined, would be given to it on the 29th day of January, 1909, on the question of the necessity whrever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public for the

same purpose, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending White Plains road, between a point near the old Unionport road and a point near Thwaites place, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, upon the receipt by him of a rule map, damage map and profile, certified as having been approved by this Board.

Resolved, That no portion of the cost and expense of said proceedings, incurred by reason of the provisions of title 4, chapter 17, of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense, including the expense of the Bureau of Street Openings, the cost and expense incurred by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, in the preparation of rule, damage, benefit and profile maps, for the use thereof; and of the awards, if any, for damages caused by intended regulation and all other expenses and disbursements authorized by section 997 of said title, as amended, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that due notice was given therein that at the time of the adoption of the resolution directing the institution of proceedings herein to acquire title to the lands required for this improvement that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would consider a proposed area of assessment as therein described and would give a public hearing thereon upon the 10th day of April, 1908; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed area of assessment who appeared, and such proposed area of assessment was duly considered by this Board;

Resolved. That the area of assessment for benefit in these proceedings be and is hereby fixed and determined to be as follows:

Beginning at a point on the prolongation of a line which is 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Astor avenue as laid out immediately east of Boston road, and as shown on Section 31 of the Final Maps of the Borough of The Bronx, distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Bronx Park East, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Bronx Park East, and running thence eastwardly along the said line parallel with Astor avenue and the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line distant 880 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of White Plains road as laid out between Bear Swamp road and Bronx and Pelham parkway, the said distance being measured at righ angles to the line of White Plains road; thence southwardly along the said line parallel with White Plains road to the intersection with a line at right angles to the line of White Plains road, and passing through a point on its easterly line distant 300 feet southerly from the angle point south of Bear Swamp road; thence westwardly along the said line at right angles to White Plains road to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 466 feet westerly from and parallel with the easterly line of Bronx Park East as laid out between White Plains road and Boston road, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Bronx Park East: thence along the said line parallel with Bronx Park East and the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line parallel with Bronx Park East as laid out northerly from Pelham Parkway North, and passing through the point of beginning; thence northwardly and parallel with Bronx Park East to the point or place of beginning.

Affirmative-The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond-16.

Acquiring Title to the Extension of University Park, The Bronx

The following communications from the President of the Borough of The Bronx and Mr. Henry M. MacCracken, Chancellor of New York University, were presented:

> THE CITY OF NEW YORK, Office of the President, Borough of The Bronx, November 26, 1909.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR-I have just received a letter from Chancellor MacCracken, of the New York University, bringing to my attention the proceeding for laying out an extension to University Park.

I understand this extension is on the northerly side of the present University Park and has a park approach extending westerly between Cedar avenue and Harlem River terrace, which will provide direct communication between the University Heights station and the University buildings. From the information I have, the Board appointed a committee and the report of the committee was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting of February 15, 1907, and was to the following effect:

"Laying Out an 'Extension to University Park'—We would respectfully recommend that the entire expense of the acquisition should be borne and paid by The City of New York.'

It appears to me that this improvement is in every respect a desirable one and largely for the benefit of the University, and in view of the fact that the committee has recommended as above, I wish to urge that the proceeding be progressed in accordance with the recommendation in said report and that a date be fixed for vesting of title in the City at as early a day as possible.

Under date of December 24, 1907, the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitted to the President of the Borough of The Bronx copies of the papers in the matter of vesting title to the extension of University Park, Borough of The Bronx, in accordance with resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted December 20, 1907, which Board referred this matter back to the President of the Borough of The Bronx for the purpose of having a Local Board resolution adopted initiating proceedings for acquiring title. As there has been no petition presented to the Local Board regarding this title matter, no action has been taken by the Local Board, and, as I understand the situation, the Local Board is not called upon to take any action in view of the fact that no petition is before

Therefore, this particular matter in connection with University Park is also referred back to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the reasons above stated.

NEW YORK UNIVERSITY, WASHINGTON SQUARE EAST, University Heights, November 24, 1909.

Hon. John F. Murray, President, Borough of The Bronx:

DEAR PRESIDENT—I called upon you this week, but finding you had just left your office, I placed in Chief Engineer Briggs' hands certain papers in regard to the present Board of Estimate, before it goes out of office, passing a resolution that the City take title to the land shown on the City map as an extension to University Park.

I now enclose a copy of a letter and of a statement of "reasons" which I have sent to the Mayor and have also sent to Comptroller Metz and to President McGowan, in regard to this subject. The whole subject is explained by pages 642-643 of the

minutes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of February 15, 1907.

According to routine, the President of The Bronx should perhaps bring up the matter at the next meeting of the Board of Estimate, because on December 20, 1907, Chief Engineer Lewis, after signing the report, along with Messrs. Metz, McGowan and Haffen, of February 15, 1907, that the City bear the cost, without assigning any

would cause the University to be assessed for nearly all the expense. This recommendation of his, of December 20, 1907, was referred back with the whole matter to the President of the Borough of The Bronx. Hence technically it may be considered to be in your hands.

The University is claiming this improvement as a substitute for what was taken away from it at the time that the Hudson River Railway was obliged to abolish our old station, which we had had twelve years at our own expense. The University declines to pay for having common justice rendered it by the great City of New York.

We ask, therefore, that the President of The Bronx report back recommending that the Board of Estimate take up the matter where it was left on February 15, 1907, at which date the Board accepted the report of Messrs. Metz, McGowan, Lewis and Haffen, which recommended two items, first, that this park extension be put on the map; second, that the entire expense be paid by the City. The first item was adopted, namely, the putting on the map. Under the circumstances, does this not morally bind the City to act upon the second item, namely, the acquisition of the land by the City at its own cost?

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at meeting held January 15, 1909, pursuant to the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest, changed the map or plan of The City of New York by closing Barretto street, between Garrison avenue and Lafayette avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, in accordance with the map signed by the President of the Borough of The Bronx and dated December 18, 1908, with instructions to the Secretary of the Board not to forward the resolution to the Mayor for his signature until a deed of the land within the proposed lines had been prepared in form satisfactory to the Corporation Counsel and to the Sinking Fund Commission;

Whereas, Said deed having been prepared in form satisfactory to the Corporation Counsel, it is

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the form of said deed.

DISCONTINUING THE PROCEEDING FOR ACQUIRING TITLE TO ST. NICHOLAS AVENUE, BF-TWEEN MYRTLE AVENUE AND COOPER STREET, QUEENS.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Queens and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

> THE CITY OF NEW YORK, OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT, BOROUGH OF QUEENS,

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Appor-

SIR-In the matter of the proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York, by discontinuing St. Nicholas avenue, from Jefferson avenue to Cooper street, Second Ward, of the Borough of Queens, which, at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on October 8, 1909, was referred back to me for further consideration, I desire to report as follows:

After a public hearing held of all parties concerned, and after very careful consideration, I learn that it is the wish of those persons living within the area of assessment that the proceedings to legally open St. Nicholas avenue, from Myrtle avenue to Cooper street, be rescinded. This matter was first presented to the Local Board for consideration in the early part of 1903. The Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, however, were not appointed until January, 1909. In the meantime, a great number of buildings have been erected, and the expense which would be involved by their condemnation, in connection with assessments for other improvements, would result in confiscation of the property. This street is not required at this time. and will not be at any time in the future; Wyckoff avenue is now being widened and will afford ample facilities for all traffic.

In view of these facts, I would recommend to your Honorable Board that the map or plan of The City of New York be changed by discontinuing St. Nicholas avenue, from Myrtle avenue to Cooper street, and, that, therefore, the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, authorizing the proceedings to legally open St. Nicholas avenue, from Myrtle avenue to Cooper street, be rescinded.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER, December 24, 1909.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Appor-

SIR-At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on April 23, 1909, a resolution was presented by the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, requesting the amendment of the proceeding for acquiring title to St. Nicholas avenue, between Myrtle avenue and Cooper street, by excluding the section between the latter terminal and Jefferson avenue. At this time the attention of the Board was called to the fact that a large number of buildings encroached upon the street between Jefferson avenue and Cooper street and that the application was evidently based on the desire of the owners of the abutting property to escape what would unquestionably be a very large assessment if the proceeding were carried out. Attention was also called to the fact that if the proceeding were to be postponed to a later date the expense would probably be increased, and that for this reason the discontinuance of the proceeding should be construed as carrying with it a determination to remove this portion of the street from the City map. At this meeting, and on the recommendation of your Engineer, the proposed amendment of the proceeding was disapproved.

On June 10 following another resolution was adopted by the Local Board, requesting the discontinuance of the St. Nicholas avenue proceeding. No argument was offered in support of this request, but for the purpose of ascertaining the desires of the property owners in the locality the Board gave a public hearing on October 8, 1909, concerning a proposed change in the map of this street by discontinuing that portion of it east of Jefferson avenue and with the understanding that if the map change were made it would be followed by an amendment of the proceeding to correspond. On the latter date the matter was referred back to the Borough President for further consideration.

In the accompanying communication, bearing date of December 21, 1909, the Borough President states that he has given a public hearing to all of the parties concerned reasons except his own belief, recommended a diametrically opposite action which in the proceeding and he learns that all of them who live within the district of assessment are desirous of having the proceeding discontinued. He therefore recommends the approval of the resolution adopted by the Local Board on June 10, 1909, providing for the discontinuance of the opening proceeding which was authorized by the Board on December 14, 1906, and he also asks that the street be eliminated from the City

On inquiry at the office of the Corporation Counsel in charge of the Bureau of Street Openings I find that the expenses which have already been incurred amount to about \$1,000. In case the proceeding is discontinued it will not be possible to reimburse the treasury for the expenditure, but in view of the facts as stated by the Borough President I believe that the proceeding might properly be discontinued and would recomemnd such action. I would also suggest that the attention of the Borough President be called to the necessity of submitting a map showing the modifications required in the City map to provide for the removal from it of St. Nicholas avenue through that portion of its length east of Myrtle avenue.

DEAR SIR-In response to your request, I submit herewith further information regarding the lands to be acquired for a driven well station at Flatlands, Borough of Brooklyn. You will recall that this matter came up before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on Friday, December 17, and was referred to the Chief Engineer.

The alternative site suggested by the New York-Pennsylvania Real Estate Associates, owners of the original site, is on land, also belonging to them, which averages about two feet higher than that proposed by the Department on the northerly side of Avenue M. The surface of the ground on the alternative site is, therefore, two feet higher above the ground water and the additional cost of construction wou'd be about \$2,000 over that originally estimated on the site selected by the Department.

Much of the land on the site shown on the map presented by this Department is below street grade and it was assumed that such land was less valuable than other lands belonging to the New York-Pennsylvania Real Estate Associates on which it would not be necessary to make a fill to bring the property up to grade. Furthermore, the alternative site proposed does not front on Kings highway, and an easement would recessarily have to be secured to obtain access to this site.

RECONSTRUCTING THE SEWER UNDER PIER 40, AT THE FOOT OF CLARKSON STREET, NORTH RIVER, MANHATTAN.

DEAR SIR-Replying to your letter of the 8th inst., relative to the matter of proposed assessment for sewer improvement at Pier 40, Borough of Manhattan, and

of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment thereon, I beg to say that we cannot definitely state the cost of laying the proposed assessment in this office. It would probably require the services of two men, with necessary supervision, for at least a month, to make the calculations; but, as the expenses of this office are provided for by an annual Budget appropriation, it would be impossible to segregate that particular item. No part of the cost of our work is included in assessments laid by us. Owing to the recent activity of the Borough Presidents in certifying assessment lists to this office, our work at the present time is very heavy, and the laying of this proposed assessment would simply operate to increase it.

We do not believe that there should be any general practice of providing for assessable improvements by general tax levy, but in this particular case, where the area affected is so large and the total amount so small, an exception might properly

DFAR SIR-I duly received your letter of December 8, requesting that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be advised as to the expense involved for carrying out the reconstruction of the sewer under Pier 40. North River, if an assessment is levied for it, also asking for information as to how much of the expense could not be included in the assessment.

In reply, I would say that the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways reports that the preparation of the assessment list will cost about \$1,650, and it is estimated that the supervision of the work in the matter of engineering and inspection will cost about \$350, making a total of about \$2,000. None of the above items could be excluded from the assessment.

SIR-Under date of December 27, 1909, the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company, through its Chief Engineer, Mr. J. L. Crider, has, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 10 of section 2 of the agreement of June 24, 1904, between the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and The City of New York, transmitted for the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a general drawing showing the railroad bridge which it is proposed to build over Berrian street, in the Borough of The Bronx.

This street crosses the tracks of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad at a point a little west of Morris Park avenue. The drawing indicates that a clearance of nineteen feet and three inches will be provided over the roadway, and that the elevation conforms with the street grades heretofore established. The bridge will be of the deck plate girder type and will possess the following characteristics:

Berrian street has been laid out to have a width of eighty feet and at this point is on a curve having a 600-foot radius at the centre line. The railroad, which will be four-tracked, crosses at an angle of about forty-eight degrees and will be carried on eight girders. These will be supported on abutments built on each street line and on intermediate columns placed one foot and six inches inside of the curb line. The maximum length of span will be about fifty-five feet and the depth of the girders back to back of angles will be about six feet.

The design appears to be in accordance with the best modern practice, and it is recommended that the plan be approved.

SIR-At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on June 18 1909, a resolution was adopted authorizing the President of the Borough of Queens to do the preliminary work required prior to the construction of a sewer in Elm avenue, between Myrtle avenue and Fresh Pond road, proceedings for which had been initiated by the Local Board of the Newtown District. The work was estimated to cost \$27,700.

With the accompanying communication from the Secretary of the Borough, bearing date of December 21, 1909, there is presented information showing that the sewer has been built under private contract in the block between Fresh Pond road and Buchman avenue and the final authorization of the improvement is requested in so far as it affects the remaining length. This treatment would involve an amendment of the resolution as presented by the Local Board, a procedure which appears to be somewhat questionable. The Board has requested the Corporation Counsel to give an opinion concerning a similar improvement where it is proposed to depart from the Local Board recommendation, but the desired advice has not yet been received.

It appears that no expense has been incurred in carrying out the preliminary work, and for the purpose of removing any question as to the legality of the authorization which might invalidate the assessment to be levied I would recommend that the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of June 18, 1909, be rescinded, and that the attention of the Borough President be called to the desirability of submitting a new resolution of the Local Board properly describing the improvement.

Mr. Robbins and Mr. O'Keeffe of the Harlem Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of the following to the Out Patient Department, and, on motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointments were approved, viz.: Dr. H. B. Pettingill, general medicine; Dr. R. J. Wren, general surgery; Dr. J. J. Steinfelder, general medicine; Dr. Ira Brewster Terry, general surgery. The appointment of Dr. F. M. Hanes as Pathologist to Harlem Hospital and the Out Patient Department was also approved upon the recommendation of the Medical Board and the Conference

Mr. Farley, Chairman of the Building Committee, submitted a written report as follows:

In regard to the extension of the balconies at Fordham Hospital, the Building Committee recommends that in view of the estimated cost of the proposed work, \$2,500, Mr. Almirall be requested to prepare plans and specifications and that the work be advertised and not split up in items under \$1,000 each and made open market orders as recommended by Mr. Almirall.

Steps have been taken by the Supervising Engineer to satisfactorily and permanently provide gas and water for the boat "Westfield" in accordance with Mrs. Mandel's suggestion, and it is recommended that Mrs. Mandel be so informed.

Subject to the approval of the Department of Finance, the Building Committee recommends that the sum of \$475 be awarded to the contractors for the extra labor involved as a result of having to move the derrick and piles of which complaint was made by the Bureau of Sewers.

In regard to the alterations to the fence on Twenty-sixth street, a bid was received from Cooper & Evans amounting to \$880, but as this was considered excessive for the work involved, and they refused to quote a lower figure, the architects have been instructed to obtain estimates from other firms for the construction of the foundations and these have not as yet been received.

The Building Committee recommends that competitive bids be secured for the repairs and alterations to the dumbwaiter at Gouverneur Hospital suggested by Miss

Relative to the temporary sewer, the Building Committee reports that no further action is necessary inasmuch as Mr. Carlin has removed the derrick and the piles complained of.

The Building Committee reports that the architects have been requested to change the counter of the proposed gate house and to include a toilet as suggested by Mi

In regard to a court on the roof of pavilions A and B for the use of the members of the house staff, the Committee reports progress.

It is recommended that a door be cut in the infirmary of the new training school as requested by Miss Goodrich.

Each recommendation in the report was considered separately, and, upon motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, each and every recommendation contained therein was adopted.

The Committee on Supplies reported progress in the preparation of the specifications for supplies required for the year 1910.

In regard to the question of the supply of milk, the Committee reported that a conference had been held with a Committee of the Medical Board and that as a result the whole correspondence was considered at a full meeting of the Medical Board, and a special resolution of the Medical Board on the subject was submitted as follows:

Reference was also made to the communications received from the Bureau of Municipal Research dated October 28 and November 1, copies of which had been sent to each member of the Board of Trustees. Upon motion of Mr. Hebberd, duly seconded and carried, it was thereupon

Resolved, That, in compliance with the recommendation of the Medical Board, this Board adopt for its milk specifications, covering the contract to be executed during 1910, the modified specifications as proposed by the Board of Health, which are identical with the recommendations of the Medical Board.

Resolved, further, That in special cases where necessary the cream contents shall be increased through the addition of cream to be purchased separately for that purpose; and

Resolved, That owing to the fact that an appropriation is only made to cover the year from January 1 to December 31, and no money has been given to extend the purchase into 1911, the trustees do not at present see their way clear to comply with the suggestion to let the contract from April to April.

The rules for the General Medical Superintendent, which had been made a special order for consideration at this meeting, were then considered, and, upon motion, duly seconded and carried, these were adopted as submitted by the Committee on rules, as

1. The General Medical Superintendent is the executive officer of the Board of Trustees, and as such shall, unless excused by resolution of the Board, attend all meetings of the Board and be subject to the directions of the Board of Trustees.

2. The General Medical Superintendent shall, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees, have general supervision and control of all hospitals of the Department, of all bureaus or departments thereof, of all officers and employees of the Department. He shall have control over the grounds, buildings and all appurtenances, and, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees, shall make regulations for the government thereof.

3. With the approval of the Board of Trustees, the General Medical Superintendent shall have the power to employ and dismiss all employees in the unclassified service, and to suspend any officer or employee in the classified service, pending action by the Board of Trustees. Unless otherwise ordered by resolution of the 29, was approved. Board, all vacancies shall be filled by the Board of Trustees, upon the nomination by the General Medical Superintendent. He shall assign the duties of all officers and employees and shall see that such duties are properly discharged. He may grant leaves intendent, of absence for officers and employees in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Trustees. All applications for increases in salary shall be submitted to the Medical Superintendent for his recommendation before formal action is taken in Class 2. Bellevue, because of the inadequate accommodations for the tuberculosis by the Board of Trustees. All bills shall be accompanied by a copy of the order and clinic, and Gouverneur, because of the inadequate accommodations for all services shall be certified by the person receiving the goods and by his superiors in order, including the General Medical Superintendent. They then shall be referred to the clinic at Bellevue, outside of the dispensary building, and in regard to the clinic at Auditing Committee of the Board for consideration. Payments on contracts or expenditures of money in any form shall be certified by the General Medical Superintendent and then also referred to the Auditing Committee for consideration.

4. He shall have control over and be responsible for the administration of the work of the Department, and the orders of the Board of Trustees shall be given through the General Medical Superintendent.

All correspondence of the Department, except that of the Board of Trustees, shall be conducted in his name and by his direction.

He shall direct the purchase of all furniture, stores, provisions, fuel, or other supplies for the Department, in accordance with the contracts and provisions of law, and shall be held responsible for their proper and economical use.

6. He shall, in his discretion, discharge or transfer all patients recommended for such action by the visiting Physicians and Surgeons, and he may discharge any patient for misconduct and report the same to the Board of Trustees.

7. The General Medical Superintendent shall report to the Board of Trustees any dereliction of duty on the part of any member of the Medical Board, scrutinize the use of supplies by any visiting Physician or Surgeon or member of the house staff, and I ring to his notice any unusual outlay. The members of the house staff

account of all property for which the Department is responsible, of all stores purchased and issued, of all expenditures under the several appropriations, of all officers and employees, of all patients admitted and discharged, and also such other records as may be deemed advisable or as the Board of Trustees may direct.

When the Board of Trustees at any meeting adopts any resolution involving the expenditure of money, it shall be the duty of the General Medical Superintendent immediately to have recorded in proper record books every detail of such resolution. It shall further be his duty immediately to prepare letters or notification from the Trustees to the party or parties to whom any contract has been awarded by the Board, stating the amount, date, time and other details involved, and to submit such letter to the Secretary of the Board for his examination and signature and transmission.

On motion of Mr. Hebberd, duly seconded and carried, it was Resolved, To exempt the Secretary to the President from the above rules and regulations.

Mr. O'Keeffe, on behalf of the Harlem Conference Committee, moved that the approval of the minutes of the meeting of the Harlem Hospital Medical Board, held on July 6, reading: "Moved, That it be recommended that a fourth position as Adjunct Visiting Physician be created," be reconsidered and that the Harlem Medical Board be so notified.

Mr. Paulding, on behalf of the Bellevue Conference Committee, recommended the appointment of Dr. Ernest Sachs to fill the place of Adjunct Assistant Attending Surgeon on the Fourth Division, recently created, Dr. Sachs' appointment having been recommended by the Medical Board. Upon motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was adopted, and Dr. Ernest Sachs was appointed Adjunct Assistant Attending Surgeon to the Fourth Division and Surgeon to Out Patients.

#### Communications.

A communication dated October 26, was received from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, enclosing letter received from the P. J. Carlin Construction Company, relative to the correspondence of the Department of Docks and Ferries and the Bureau of Sewers in regard to incumbrances left by the Carlin Company. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file on the report of the Building Committee that these incumbrances were being removed.

A communication dated October 23, was received from Mr. R. F. Almirall, relative to his request for a supplementary contract in connection with Gouverneur Hospital, and, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

The minutes of the Harlem Hospital Medical Board for the meeting held on October 26, were received from the Secretary, Dr. Van Santvoord. The resignation of Dr. W. H. Stratford was accepted. The request for the resignation of Dr. Campbell and Dr. Rosenberg was referred to the Conference Committee. The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to take action to change the flooring of the delivery room and to provide protection for the windows of the two small rooms attached to the maternity service. Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as fel'ows: From October 31 to November 13, inclusive, the following operations were performed, at all of which the attending Surgeons or their assistants were present: Gouverneur Hospital .....

In accordance with the rules a fire drill was held at Bellevue Hospital on November 3 and November 9; at Gouverneur Hospital on November 4 and 12; at Harlem Hospital on November 2, November 10 and 15, and at Fordham Hospital on Novem-

her 2 and 10. Special Nurses have been requested by visiting Physicians and Surgeons, and these have been authorized, inasmuch as it appeared that the services of special Nurses

were needed. Your approval is asked for. Martin Havier, admitted to Ward 40 on November 11, suffering from hernia, to be operated on this day, committed suicide about 2 o'clock this morning by cutting his throat with a knife used in the ward for cutting bandages. A full investigation has been made and it is believed that the Nurses in attendance were in no way at fault.

A letter has been received from the Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital again asking that a police officer be detailed at the Out Patient Department. On November 6, 706 patients were treated, and an officer is urgently needed in order to control the large number of patients now attending the Gouverneur Dispensary.

In attempting to make some satisfactory arrangement whereby the Physicians and Surgeons may be furnished transportation to Gouverneur Hospital on night calls, it is found that there is only one livery stable in that neighborhood, and whenever that stable has been patronized for this purpose the prices charged have been outrageously high. The Supervising Nurse reports that Dr. Erdmann in taking night cills has been met by the ambulance at the elevated station and that the above procedure has been most satisfactory. Is it desired to continue this custom?

It is recommended that the awnings at Gouverneur Hospital be taken down and stored for the winter by Mr. George Vause, the maker of the awnings. The storage room at Gouverneur Hospital is insufficient. Mr. Vause will take them down and store them for 15 cents per awning.

A. Redfern bids \$20 per month for the garbage of Bellevue Hospital.

Dr. J. H. Huddleston asks that two patients, Luka Varillo and William Jaraslow, on the boat "Westfield," be appointed as Hospital Helpers, temporarily, at \$20 a month, for the purpose of painting the boat. It is recommended that this be allowed.

It is reported by Miss Stowers that considerable difficuity has arisen in handling the several barbers that have been allowed the privilege of coming to the hospital to shave the patients. Owing to a recent quarrel which they had within the hospital she has forbidden them the privilege, and asks that a barber be appointed for that institution. It is suggested that a barber be appointed who does not live in the immediate vicinity, and who shall visit the hospital on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, his salary to be paid out of Contingencies.

It is recommended that a telephone office of sufficient size be built in the main office on the first floor, and that the telephone switchboard be moved to that office. On request a bid has been received from the American Water Supply Company for installation of an apparatus which furnishes drinking cups. This arrangement is very satisfactory and is very much needed in all the dispensaries of this Department. Patients coming to the Dispensary now use a common cup. It is recommended that

five of these be installed, one in each of the dispensaries and one in the admitting office in Bellevue, at a sum of \$10 each, and that cups be purchased at \$6 per thousand.

A requisition has been received from Dr. Darling, X-Ray Photographer, for a photographic equipment at a cost of \$227.90. This calls for a first-class equipment.

The Department owns no photographic equipment.

A request for a transfer of \$10,000 from Salaries and Wages to Repairs and Replacements appropriation has been before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for several months. Since the last meeting it is found upon investigation that this will not be allowed. A substitute request or a transfer of \$10,000 from General Supplies to Repairs and Replacements appropriation has been sent in. Your approval is

At the last meeting it was voted to ask for a transfer of \$10,500 within the Salaries and Wages schedules. It is recommended that a substitute request be submitted at once, as follows: Schedule 315, Salaries and Wages, Central Office, \$1,500, to 313, Salaries and Wages, Office General Medical Superintendent.

Specifications for the installation of a new fire alarm system at Bellevue and Harlem Hospitals have been returned by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, with the criticism that the wiring should be installed in a pipe conduit system. This criticism was submitted to Mr. Ross, our fire expert, and he has submitted in turn a letter explaining why in his opinion it is unnecessary to install such a system. In brief, the letter is as follows: That the current of these wires is so weak that there is no danger from fire; that the Board of Fire Underwriters does not require such a system; that it would be needlessly expensive in view of the fact that this alarm system will be torn out within the next few years to be reinstalled in the new Bellevue Hospital, in which the conduit system will be employed. It is recommended that the explanation given by Mr. Ross be submitted to the Department of Water Supply, Gas

and Electricity, with the request that the written specifications be allowed to stand.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the General Medical Superintendent in supplying special temporary Nurses at the request of Visiting Physicians and Surgeons for urgent cases was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To renew the request to the Police Department that an officer be

detailed to the Out Patient Department at Gouverneur Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the suggestion of the General Medical Superintendent to continue the custom of sending an ambulance at night to meet Visiting Physicians and Surgeons of Gouverneur Hospital was approved, and it was decided to abrogate the rule permitting the hire of taxicabs.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to secure an estimate from Mr. Vause for replacing the awnings at Gouverneur Hospital in addition to taking them down and storing them.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was requested to secure competitive bids for the removal of garbage from Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of two patients as Hospital Helpers temporarily, at \$20 a month, on the boat "Westfield," for the purpose of painting the boat, was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To appoint a Barber at Gouverneur Hospital, in accordance with the suggestion of the General Medical Superintendent.

In accordance with the resolution adopted at last meeting, Dr. W. K. The Bellevue Hospital Conference Committee, on the recommendation of the Medical Board, recommended the appointment of Dr. Gordon Lindsay, as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, children's service, first division, and Dr. George W. Partridge as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, third division. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was adopted.

The Fordham Conference Committee recommended that Dr. A. McDonald Bell, Pathologist, be granted one year's leave of absence on account of illness, and also that the following physicians and surgeons be appointed Clinical Assistants to Out Patients at Fordham Hospital: Dr. A. C. Butts, gynecology; Dr. V. Manarino, orthopedics; Dr. Charles Ginsberg, nose and throat; Dr. A. Roberts, surgery; Dr. C. P. Hansell, medicine; Dr. J. Lordi, surgery; Dr. C. E. O'Grady, children, and Dr. LeRoy Vail, medicine. Upon motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the Conference Committee was adopted.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: From November 14 to November 27, inclusive, the following operations were performed, at all of which the attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present: Bellevue Hospital, 48; Gouverneur Hospital, 19; Harlem Hospital, 28; Fordham Hos-

pital, 18. In accordance with the rules a fire drill was held in Bellevue Hospital on November 18 and 30; at Fordham Hospital on November 15 and 24; at Gouverneur Hospital on November 19 and 20, and at Harlem Hospital on November 24.

In the matter of the establishment of a dental clinic in the Gouverneur Hospital district, as recommended to the Board, it has to be reported that although a dental clinic in that district is undoubtedly much needed, it is not believed policy for this Department to assume this work at the present time. The dental work should be carried on in the various hospitals, as it is in Bellevue, for the benefit of patients only. It is not possible to establish such a clinic at Gouverneur Hospital at the present time on account of lack of room,

In the matter of the request of the tuberculosis clinic at Gouverneur Hospital for an additional room, it has to be reported that additional room is certainly most necessary for the use of this clinic, but to grant the rooms asked for would rob the surgical clinic of much needed space. It would satisfy the demands of one clinic by robbing another. It is recommended that additional space in the immediate vicinity of the hospital be obtained, if possible, and that this space be used for the tuberculosis clinic. enabling the removal of all tuberculous patients from the general dispensary where


