### BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

SATURDAY, December 26, 1874,

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

G. O. 720,

being a resolution and ordinance, as follows :

Resolved, That, pursuant to the statute in such case made and provided, the Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Asylum Society of the City of New York be and are hereby permitted and authorized, at all times hereafter, to sublet or lease the whole or any part of the several lots of land situated in the City of New York heretofore conveyed to said Society by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York by conveyances recorded, respectively, in the office of Register of the City and County of New York in liber 833 of Conveyances, page 233, and in liber 916 of Conveyances, page 232, anything in any of the said several conveyances contained to the contrary notwithstanding, provided that the proceeds of the leases of such lots of land shall be applied to the uses and for the purposes specified in chapter 251, Laws of 1874, and for no other.

Alderman Ottendorfer moved to amend by adding to the resolution the following : " Further provided that such lots and the improvements thereon, if used for any other purpose than for a Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Asylum, shall not be exempted from taxation."

The Temporary Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said amendment.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The Temporary Chairman then put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution and ordinance as amended.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Temporary Chairman, Aldermen Billings, Cooper, Falconer, Gilon, Lysaght, Monheimer, Morris, Ottendorfer, Reilly, and Van Schaick—11.

Negative—Alderman Koch—1.

And the same was directed to be sent to the Board of Assistant Aldermen for concurrence.

Alderman Cooper called up

G. O. 716,

being a resolution and ordinance, as follows :

Resolved, That this Common Council, pursuant to section 1, of chapter 601, Laws of 1874, being "An act to amend an act entitled 'An act to incorporate the New York Bridge Company, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining a bridge over the East river, between the cities of New York and Brooklyn, passed April 16, 1867,'" and to provide for the speedy construction of said bridge," does hereby accept the provisions of the third section of said act; and the Comptroller of the City of New York, for and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of said city, is hereby authorized and directed to issue the bonds for the amounts, at the rate of interest and upon the other terms and conditions contained in said section 3 of the above-entitled act.

Alderman Cooper moved to amend by striking from the resolution all after the words "said act."

The Temporary Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion to amend.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote :
