The Chairman of the Committee on Street Cleaning reported that a communication had been received from the Department of Docks, relative to accumulation of refuse from unloading bricks on certain piers on the North river.

The Chairman also reported the death of Foreman Joseph P. Melville.

The Chairman also made the following report, which was approved—All voting aye.

That the Foremen had been directed to clean the crossings and the gutters of the avenues and most frequented streets, and sufficient space around culverts. That an additional force of laborers and carts had been employed to remove snow and ice on Broadway, from the Battery to Fourteenth street, and so many lateral streets, that relief may be given to the business of the City. That the Counsel to the Corporation had been requested to furnish an opinion whether the Board of Police has authority to spend a portion of the present appropriation for street-cleaning, on the removal of snow and ice from the streets of the

City. That the Counsel to the Corporation had given an oral opinion, and would furnish a written opinion in favor of proceeding with the work. In accordance with such advice, the Chairman had directed the regular street-cleaning force to begin with the work of removing snow and ice from Broadway and other important streets, and the employment of such additional force as may be necessary.

On reading the report of the Chief Clerk, that the contract for furnishing 30 sets of cart harness had not been executed by Richard Heather, one of the sureties for Moore & Manie, contractors, although said contractors had received repeated notices to complete the same, on motion of Commissioner Disbecker, it was

Resolved, That it be referred to the Committee on Street Cleaning to purchase the harness, and report what disposition should be made of the contract.

The Chairman stated the question to be on making the amount, under the head "Interest on the City Debt," \$9,300,000.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree thereto.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller submitted the Budget for 1875, and offered the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 31st day of October, 1874, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City of New York in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, viz., the year 1875, in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city which become due and payable within the said year; and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, November 20, 1874, and presented to said Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 21st day of November, 1874; therefore

Resolved, That after such considerations of said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City of New York in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, viz., the year 1875, in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year, as follows:
