BUREAU OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE CROTON AQUEDUCT.

It is a pleasure and relief to the Department to again record an abundance of rainfall in the Croton watershed and the Bronx river watershed, from which the City obtains its water supply, and which has kept the Croton Aqueduct running at its full capacity without draughts upon the storage reservoirs and lakes, and has enabled the Department to draw an average daily supply of 17,000,000 gallons of water from the Bronx river watershed, which is considerably above its estimated or average capacity. The City is to be congratulated on this fact for the reason that, with the constantly increasing demand upon the water supply, which is the natural result of increase in population, buildings, manufactures and commerce, the strain upon the available water supply is so great that if the supply were diminished in consequence of drought in the watersheds, domestic convenience, business of all kinds, as well as the public health, would be seriously endangered.

The rainfall for the past three months at the several stations where rain-gauges are kept by the Department, was as follows:

The work on the construction of the dam and Reservoir A, on the Muscoot branch of the Croton river, has progressed as rapidly as the weather permitted, and the surveys, maps, etc., for the additional lands required for this reservoir have been completed and placed in the hands of the Counsel to the Corporation for the necessary legal measures for their acquisition.

In consequence of delay in obtaining the necessary lands for diverting the waters of Byram river into the Kensico reservoir, no progress has been made on the work of constructing the storage reservoir and conduit.

The Croton Aqueduct has delivered without interruption an average daily supply of 96,000,000 gallons of water. The following are the principal quantities of work done in the maintenance and repairs of the aqueduct:

- 2,823 cubic yards earth excavated.
- 2,250 cubic yards stone quarried.
- 306 cubic yards retaining-walls built.
- 1,475 lineal feet fences built.
- 335 poles erected for telephonic service.

Contracts have been made for excavating the rock and earth on the north division of the old reservoir in Central Park, and for masonry and concrete lining to equalize its depth and improve its capacity.

In extending the distribution of water into new streets and districts, 12,439 lineal feet of water-mains were laid in 40 different streets, and in connection with these 33 new stop-cocks and 32 fire-hydrants were placed.

In consequence of the mildness of the past winter season there has been comparatively little waste of water from the practice so often complained of before of consumers allowing the water to run through their service-pipes day and night to prevent freezing. Notwithstanding this, the excess of consumption over the quantity of water received through the aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit has been such as to reduce the depth of water in the Central Park reservoirs 14 inches, causing a corresponding reduction in the pressures in the water-mains throughout the city. The increase of demand upon the water supply has been greatest in the high-service district, especially that portion which is supplied from the high-service pumping station at Ninety-eighth street and Ninth avenue, where the increase in the consumption of water is estimated by the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct at 2,000,000 gallons per day.

During the quarter 478 additional water-meters were placed, making 20,348 water-meters now in use.

BUREAU OF WATER PURVEYOR.

Street Pavements.

The necessity of improvement in the street pavements in this city has been recognized by the State authorities in the passage of the acts, chapter 346, Laws of 1889, authorizing the expenditure of \$3,000,000 within three years for the replacement of defective pavements, and chapter 449, Laws of 1889, authorizing the Common Council to provide, by ordinance, for the repavement of streets within the limits of grants of land under water, where ineffectual attempts have heretofore been made on the part of the city authorities to induce or compel the grantees or the present owners of the property within such grants to build, uphold and maintain the streets at their own expense, as required by the conditions of the grants.

In my several communications to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in relation to repavements to be made under the appropriation of \$3,000,000, I have set forth the difficulties in the way of the maintenance of proper pavements in this city, consisting of the numerous structures over and under the pavements; the innumerable excavations made in the streets by private individuals and corporations on account of such structures; the presence of objectionable rails in use by surface railroad companies, and the probability of the streets being torn up for the purpose of changing the motive power of surface railroads, under the authority of chapter 531, Laws of 1889. It has been my constant endeavor to overcome or diminish these obstacles and difficulties, and I have repeatedly notified the different companies and corporations having franchises for the use of the public streets to build and arrange their structures in such manner that there would be no subsequent necessity of tearing up and injuring the new pavements to be laid. The efforts of the department in this respect have met with but moderate success. The Broadway Railroad Company has declared its intention and readiness to reconstruct its road and change the motive power to cable-traction, with grooved rails of a pattern to be approved by the Commissioner of Public Works, and to repave at its own expense, the space in and about its rail-tracks in the same manner and simultaneously with the repavement of Broadway to be made by this Department. The Consolidated Gas-light Company expressed its readiness to do all work required for laying and repairing its gas-mains in advance of the laying of new pavements, and the Electrical Subway Construction Company promised to complete its subways in the streets which are to be repaved this year before the time for beginning the repavements arrived.

Owing to these and other obstacles, the work of repaving the streets has been kept back so as to accumulate to unusual proportions, as will be seen by the following list of streets now to be repaved:

In the repairs of pavements an average force of 63 laborers, 48 mechanics, 15 carts and 1 team was employed, and, in addition to the work done by this force, the pavements in a number of streets were relaid by contract. The total area of pavements relaid during the quarter is 28,511 square yards.

The contract for repaving New Chambers street, from Park Row to Cherry street, under the annual repavement appropriation, has been completed, the total area of new pavement being 7,267.94 square yards.

The contract for repaving Worth street, from Broadway to Hudson street, made under the provisions of chapter 346, Laws of 1889, and the authorization of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, has also been completed, the area of new pavement laid being 4,161.84 square yards.

Four contracts for laying new pavements on up-town streets, and payable by local assessments, have been completed, covering an area of 9,966.68 square yards of new pavements.

In the report of the Water Purveyor hereto annexed will be found a detailed statement of the area and mileage of the different kinds of pavements in the city, south of the Harlem river. The total length of paved streets is 356.72 miles, and the area is 8,216,300 square yards.

During the quarter 6,359 excavations were made in the public streets for the purpose of making and repairing connections with gas-mains, steam-pipes, and for other purposes; 1,174 notices were sent to private corporations and individuals to repair defects in pavements over excavations made by them, in response to which repairs have been made in 1,103 different places.

The several gas companies have laid 11,270 lineal feet of additional gas-mains in the streets, and 720 lineal feet of pipes have been laid for conveying and using salt water.

In the repairs of water-mains, stop-cocks and fire-hydrants under the charge of the Bureau of Water Purveyor, an average force of 116 mechanics and laborers and 15 carts has been employed.

OFFICE OF ENGINEER IN CHARGE OF SEWERS.

During the quarter 14 contracts for the construction of new sewers and receiving-basins have been completed, and the total length of new sewers built is 5,292 lineal feet. The sewerage system south of Harlem river now comprises 434.33 miles of sewers, with 5,213 receiving-basins.

At the close of the quarter work was in progress on 16 contracts for the construction of new sewers, and two contracts for repairs or reconstruction of sewers.

BUREAU OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

During the quarter 11 contracts for regulating and grading streets and flagging sidewalks, and two contracts for fencing vacant lots were completed, and at the close of the quarter work was in progress on 16 regulating and grading contracts.

BUREAU OF STREETS AND ROADS.

The maintenance and repairs of the macadam roadways and the unpaved streets under the charge of this Bureau have received due attention to the extent which the means at the disposal of the Department permit. Preparations have been made for resurfacing the roads which are in defective condition. In the cleaning of these roadways 1,693 truck-loads of material was removed.

In the repairs of unpaved streets 1,207 truck-loads of earth, stone, and other material were used, and 375 cubic yards of stone was broken and placed on the roadways.

BUREAU OF LAMPS AND GAS.

On January 1, 1890, there were in use in this city 28,029 gas-lamps, 145 electric-lights and 126 naphtha-lamps. At that time the interruption to electric-light service consequent on the removal of overhead wires, and placing the wires in subways, had caused the extinguishment of over 1,200 electric-lights in the public streets and places, and the relighting of gas-lamps to take the place of the electric-lights as far as possible. This difficulty in respect to electric lighting has been overcome to a considerable extent by the completion of the electric subways and the placing of the wires in them, and during the quarter 746 electric-lights on the streets have been re-established and 2,773 gas-lamps have been discontinued. There are now in use on the streets, parks, places, docks and bridges of the city 26,470 gas-lamps, 871 electric-lights and 126 naphtha-lamps.

BUREAU OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES.

In the care of the public buildings under the charge of the Department improvements have been made in the heating and ventilating apparatus in the County Court-house; the roof of the City Hall has been repaired; in the basement of the Brown-stone Court-house a portion of the space has been partitioned off for a waiting-room for females who have to attend as witnesses on the criminal courts located in the building and on the District Attorney's Office and the Grand Jury, and the room has been properly furnished; plans and specifications have been prepared for improvements in the Hall of Records and the work is now in progress; the damage done by recent fire in Washington Market building has been promptly repaired; repairs have been made to a portion of the roof of the Centre Market building and to the flooring in Clinton Market; the boilers and heating apparatus in the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory have been thoroughly overhauled and repaired. In addition to these

items, a detailed statement of other repairs and improvements made in the various public buildings and offices will be found in the report of the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, hereto annexed.

Contracts have been made for thoroughly repairing, painting and refitting the free floating baths, and 15 baths will be ready for the use of the public at the beginning of the bathing season.

BUREAU OF INCUMBRANCES.

The work of this Bureau for the quarter is summarized as follows :

Surveys, maps, etc., for lands required for Reservoir "A," on the Muscote Branch of the Croton river have been completed, and are now in the hands of the Counsel to the Corporation to have a Commission appointed to appraise the value of the balance of the lands necessary for this reservoir.

Surveys, maps, etc., are being made for the Aqueduct Commissioners for lands, etc., necessary for Reservoir "M," on Titicus river.

Work on Reservoir "A," has been continued as the weather permitted.

BRONX RIVER SUPPLY.

The Commissioners appointed to appraise damages for diversion of water on Bronx river, between Woodlawn and Williamsbridge, have not, as yet, reported.

The Commissioners appointed to appraise values and damages on Bear Gutter Creek and Byram river are taking testimony as to same.

Surveys, maps, searches and negotiations are being carried on for the Bronx river damages between Williamsbridge and West Farms, and for lands and damages on the Byram river and Byram Pond.

Have completed the road at the head of Rye Ponds Reservoir and are building the necessary drains, etc., at Williamsbridge Reservoir.

The stone-work of the house at Williamsbridge is completed and the carpenter is now at work on same.

No work has been done on the work of diverting the waters of Byram river into Kensico Reservoir awaiting the obtaining of the necessary land for same.

An uninterrupted daily supply of 17,000,000 gallons of water has been furnished from the Bronx river during the quarter.

AQUEDUCT—REPAIRS, MAINTENANCE AND STRENGTHENING.

Contracts for excavating the rock and earth from the North Division of the Old Reservoir in Central Park; for masonry and concrete lining of same; for furnishing and delivering coal at High Bridge and Ninety-eighth Street Pumping Stations; for furnishing chestnut poles and posts have been entered into.

An uninterrupted supply of water of 96,000,000 gallons per day has been furnished to the City through the Aqueduct.

The regular work on the several Divisions has been continued as usual, such as care of the surface of Aqueduct gate-houses, machinery, etc.; patrolling reservoirs, watching and attending leaks; cleaning up line of rubbish, leaves, etc.; keeping drains, culverts and gutters in repair; removing ice and snow.

The more particular work on each Division has been as follows:

First Division—Cleaning up shore of Lake; keeping culverts clear of ice; cutting brush along line of Aqueduct; attending leaks; repairing fences and general maintenance.

Second Division—Cleaning up surface of Aqueduct; rebuilding stone fence at Brier Cliff road; rebuilding a part of retaining-wall on Peterson's bank, also on Croton Dam road; building and repairing fences; attending leaks.

Third Division—Rebuilding part of retaining-wall at "Arch" bank; face of old retaining-wall at "Arch" and "Aspinwall" banks chinked and crevices filled; rebuilding culverts; manuring banks; building and repairing fences; watching and attending leaks. The Aspinwall leak has given but little trouble during the past quarter.

Fourth Division—Cleaning crosswalks, drains, culverts and surface of Aqueduct; building and repairing fences; attending leaks.

Fifth Division—Filling and grading at "Half-way House," South Yonkers, and concreting cellar floor of same; erecting telephone poles; building and repairing fences; cleaning culverts, crosswalks and surface of Aqueduct.

Sixth Division—Cleaning up service of Aqueduct; watching and attending leaks; keeping culverts and drains clear; erecting telephone poles and general maintenance.

Seventh Division—Care of High Bridge, reservoir, gate-house, engine-house and grounds; hoisting coal. The screens and screws in gate-house have had careful attention. The bridge steps and walks have been kept clean; screenings has been spread on walk around reservoir; ashes was used on walks around engine-house; culverts, drains and gutters have been kept clean and free, and general maintenance; work on the Engineer's Office Buildings is progressing slowly.

Eighth Division—Cleaning and repairs to Central Park and Forty-second Street Reservoirs and outside mains; cleaning, repairs and maintenance of High Service Works; pointing and repairs to furnace at High Service Works; painting in boiler-room at High Service Works; excavating earth and rock from Old Reservoir, Central Park; patrolling Central Park reservoirs and general maintenance.

REPAIRING AND RENEWAL OF PIPES, STOP-COCKS, ETC.

The regular force have been steadily employed tapping pipes for services to houses. A small party has been examining sewers for waste and leaks, a number of same have been found, and the repair gangs are repairing same. Contracts for furnishing and delivering stop-cocks, hydrants, etc.; for furnishing dock hydrants, hydrant nozzles, caps, etc.; for hydrant bolts, steel and iron; and for lead, lead-pipe and solder have been entered into.

WASTE AND USE OF WATER.

The reservoirs in the city have lost fourteen inches of water and the head of water throughout the city has decreased. The weather has been mild so that there has been but little waste to keep service pipes from freezing. The demands of houses on high-service supply have increased so rapidly that both of the pumping engines at Ninety-eighth Street Station have to be used and all repairs to same done at night; this increases the use of water about two million gallons per day, which entirely absorbs all possible surplus water, and has, to a small extent, depleted the reservoirs in the city. The economical use of water and the stopping of all waste is absolutely necessary, as it will be several months before an adequate and regular supply will be obtained through the New Aqueduct.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS,
BUREAU OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES,
SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE, NO. 31 CHAMBERS STREET, ROOM 15,
NEW YORK, April 1, 1890.

Hon. THOMAS F. GILROY, Commissioner of Public Works:

SIR—I have the honor to submit to you the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1890, as follows:

NEW COURT-HOUSE.

A contract was made with the Metropolitan Electric Service Company for the introduction of the Johnson system of heat regulation in that portion of the building occupied by the Superior Court and Court of Common Pleas. It has been arranged to introduce 30 thermostats, so as to control 13 direct and 22 indirect steam coils. This work will be done during the summer recess of the courts. A regulating steam valve (to reduce the pressure of steam as required) with necessary connections was set on the main steam supply pipe. This work was done in conformity with a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Mayor January 28, 1890. The second horizontal engine in the basement has been overhauled, cleaned, refitted and repaired, and is now in good working order. Several of the steam-pipes in exposed situations have been covered with asbestos hair felt and canvas.

Supreme Court—A new desk has been put up for use of the Judge in Part II. and the platform newly carpeted, and new window shades have been put up in Parts I. and II. The glass panels in the doors of Part II. have been relettered, and the doors of the several rooms renumbered, and a new swinging sign painted and hung over the Lis Penden's Room, County Clerk's office. A 15-foot table has been placed in the Lis Penden's Room, and a 10-foot table in the Docket Room, and some new chairs furnished to the several rooms.

Surrogate's Court—A new turcoman curtain has been put up behind the bench in the court.

CITY HALL.

The roof has been repaired and gutters relined where needed and 2 galvanized iron ventilating caps put up.

In the Mayor's private office the carpets have been taken up, cleaned and relaid, new window shades hung, the steam pipes covered with asbestos and canvas, and a new rotary desk chair furnished.

In the office of the CITY RECORD a new carpet has been laid and a rotary desk chair furnished. Name plates have been placed on the boxes of the new members of the Board of Aldermen.

City Court—New window shades have been hung in Rooms Nos. 19, 20 and 21, an oak turcoman satin screen put up in Judges' Room, and some law books furnished.

The contract for cleaning the marble work has been completed, and the work done satisfactorily.

BROWN STONE BUILDING.

The walls in Judge Martine's room have been newly papered, the cornice tinted, a six-light chandelier put up and a rotary chair furnished. The iron railing in the office of the Chief Clerk to District Attorney has been taken down and replaced, and speaking-tubes put up to connect the

office with the District Attorney and the Bond Clerk's offices; the safe in Clerk's office has been repaired.

Ladies' Room—A portion of the west basement has been partitioned off for a retiring room for the use of females having business with the courts and offices in the building. Three Hygeia water-closets and 2 marble top wash-basins with all necessary connections have been put in, the ceiling calcimined, walls painted, carpet laid, window shades and screens put up, a stove, wardrobes, table and chairs and clock furnished. The room has been placed in the care of an experienced matron and will supply a want long felt by persons having business with the courts.

The elevator has been repaired and new valves and packing put in where needed.
The roof has been repaired and gutters relined and painted, and the roof of the extension has been repaired and painted.

HALL OF RECORDS.

Plans and specifications were drawn up and a contract made for the alterations and improvements to this building, and the work is progressing satisfactorily. The improvements, which consist in putting up a wide iron stairway to connect with the upper floor, and enlarging the windows on the same floor, so as to secure additional light and ventilation, and also repairing the plastering; this will add to the floor space of the office about 4,275 square feet. A new carpet has been laid in the Register's private office, and some law books furnished.

NO. 31 CHAMBERS STREET.

The furnaces under the steam-boilers have been repaired and relined, and a new set of grate-bars put in. The railing in Room No. 7 has been altered and repaired, and two new black walnut cases of pigeon-holes put up.

A new roll-top desk has been furnished for the use of the Water Register, and new window-shades hung in the front office; also, new gas-fixtures put up in the Draughting Room, and the safe in Chief Engineer's office repaired and combination altered.

STAATS ZEITUNG BUILDING.

Department of Taxes and Assessments—A set of telephone instruments has been put in, and a paneled ash closet put up to inclose the same, and a new fire-proof safe furnished.

In the Corporation Counsel's office a speaking-tube has been put up to connect the Corporation Counsel's office with the office of the Chief Clerk; some new signs have been put up, and some of the old signs altered and relettered.

STEWART BUILDING.

Office for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, Room No. 41—An iron wire ash top railing has been put up, and a black walnut case of pigeon-holes furnished.

The safe has been removed from the Corporation Counsel's office to Room No. 4, and a wire railing put up, and chairs and tables furnished and carpet laid, and a new carpet laid in Room No. 10 for use of the Board of Street Opening.

Finance Department—The safes in the offices of the City Paymaster have been further protected by being inclosed with electrical coverings, and connected by wire with the office of the "Holmes Electric Protective Co.," and a set of telephone instruments put in and inclosed, and a sign-board put up in front of the office.

In the Bureau for Collections of Assessments and Arrears of Taxes the desks and railing were moved back about four feet, the wire railing altered and some new railing furnished; also a black walnut wardrobe and large rug furnished.

A roll-top desk was furnished for the use of the Deputy Comptroller, and a new carpet laid in the waiting-room of the Comptroller's office.

Office of the Commissioners of Accounts—The carpets have been taken up, cleaned, relined and relaid.

THE MARKETS.

Washington Market—The damage caused by fire in the northwest corner of the building was promptly repaired; new window-frames, sashes and casings put in; the skylights and corrugated iron roof and the slate roof over Stand No. 356 repaired, and the terra cotta coping pointed up; the doors on the second gangway on Vesey street covered with galvanized iron, and twenty-two small signs painted with stand numbers.

West Washington Market—The awnings over Stands Nos. 17, 19 and 21 Loew avenue and Nos. 34 and 38 Thompson avenue, the leader at Stand No. 17 Thompson avenue and the gutters on Thirteenth avenue, extending 20 feet back on Thompson and Grace avenues, have been repaired, the damaged tin removed and replaced with Phelps' triple-coated tin, and the new work painted two coats of metallic paint.

Fulton Market—The flooring in the gangway in front of Yates Stand, was taken up and a 4 x 12 timber, about 28 feet long, was put in under the partition, which was jacked up and secured and the floor relaid; repairs were also made to the flooring in front of and under Stands Nos. 99, 104, 201 and 203; the drain and soil-pipes on the South street side were overhauled and cleaned, and a new connection made with the street sewer, and a grease trap built with a view to keeping the pipes from being stopped with grease.

Centre Market—The roof over the Second District Civil Court has been repaired and the gutters relined and painted where needed. Repairs were also made to the roof over the middle section on Centre street.

Clinton Market—The flooring in front of Stand No. 130 has been repaired; new floors laid in Stands Nos. 58 and 60, 88 and 89, and the front of Stands 88 and 89, on Canal street, cased up, and a pair of sash doors hung. A new skylight sash was put on over Stand 127, and the doors on Spring street repaired.

ARMORIES.

The Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory—The steam-boilers have been overhauled, all the tubes taken out and replaced with new ones, a new crown sheet put in the west boiler, the furnaces relined with fire-brick and new arches built over the furnace doors and over the back return flues; the boilers are now in first-class order; new grate-bars have been put in the furnaces. The chimney on Sixth street side was cleaned and a new galvanized iron Emerson top put on. The lockers in the rooms of Companies H and D were repaired; new locks with non-interchangeable keys put on the lockers, and master keys furnished. In the rooms of Companies B, C, D, F, H, and I the walls and ceilings have been washed off, ceilings calcimined, walls painted, hardwood work cleaned and varnished and radiators bronzed.

THE COURTS—POLICE AND CIVIL.

Special Sessions—A new desk and 4 high rotary stools furnished.

First District Police Court—The bulkhead in the Record Room was painted and the cases filled and varnished.

Second District Police Court—Some new chairs were furnished for use in the Court.

Third District Police Court—The doors on the prison pens were repaired, the furnace flues cleaned, and some repairs made to the plumbing.

Fourth District Police Court—New carpets have been laid on the bench and in the Judge's Room, two new wardrobes furnished, and new holland window shades hung in the Judge's Room.

Fifth District Police Court—A new standing desk has been furnished and the carpets taken up, cleaned and relaid with new lining.

First District Civil Court—A roll-top desk, rotary bookcase, a small table, rotary chair and two dozen cane-seat chairs have been furnished.

Fifth District Civil Court—New gas-fixtures have been put up in the court and offices, new holland shades hung on the Court-room windows, new carpets laid in Judge's Room and on the bench, and linoleum laid in the Court Room. The caping on the benches, the new door in the rear, and the recess for witnesses have been painted and grained, and the skylight, sash, and iron railings painted.

Seventh District Court-house—The main staircase has been repaired, some new ash steps put in, platform rebuilt and balusters replaced where needed, and some repairs made to the plumbing in the building.

Ninth District—The carpets and linoleum have been taken up, cleaned, altered and relaid. The safe removed from One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street to the Clerk's office on Lexington avenue. New shades have been hung on the windows in the Judge's and Clerk's Rooms, and the signs altered and relettered and some new signs put up.

THE COUNTY JAIL.

A new yellow-pine floor has been laid in the office, dining-room and hallways.

PUBLIC ADMINISTRATOR.

Sales Room, No. 5 Duane street—A new stairs and platform were built in the yard, a new fence and water-closet put up, a door and jambs put in cellar entrance, iron gratings put on rear windows of store-room, the windows repaired and the yard cleaned.

A new roll-top desk was furnished for the office of the Public Administrator.

CORPORATION YARDS.

Corporation Yard, foot of East Sixteenth street—The roof was repaired, gutters relined, and the roof painted with metallic paint.

REPAIR SHOP NO. 186 MULBERRY STREET.

Shelving, racks and bins for holding tools have been put up.

CIVIL SERVICE BOARDS.

A new roll-top desk and rotary chair have been furnished.

Specifications for furnishing the Bureau with the supplies, viz.: soap, mops, brooms, brushes, pails, etc., required in the various courts and offices, were prepared and advertised, and the contract awarded. The supplies are now being distributed to the several courts and offices.

In addition to the foregoing, desks, chairs, furniture, and law books have been furnished to the several courts and offices, and repairs made to the furniture, glazing, and carpenter work in the several buildings in care of this Department.

FREE FLOATING BATHS.

Specifications have been prepared and advertised for the repairs to the pontoons, roofs and lanterns, and for painting the free floating baths. As soon as the contract is awarded the work will be pushed vigorously forward in order to have the baths ready for the bathing season at an early day.

Each estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters therein stated are true, and must be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, to the effect that if the contract is awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall refuse or neglect to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent last above mentioned must be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith, with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

No estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REJECT ALL BIDS RECEIVED FOR ANY PARTICULAR WORK IF HE DEEMS IT FOR THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CITY.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
