

REPORT of the operations and action of this Department for the three months ending March 31, 1890 : The Books of Annual Record of Assessed Valuations of Real and Personal Estate for the year 1890 were completed and opened for inspection and correction on the second Monday of January last, as required by section 817 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882. Previous to that time the opening of such books was advertised in several of the daily news-papers and in the CITY RECORD, and since that time the fact that such books were opened for inspection and correction has been continuously advertised in the CITY RECORD, as required by law. The following statement shows the assessed valuations of real estate by wards for the year 1890, as appears by the Books of Annual Record of Assessed Valuations of Real Estate, compared with the assessed valuations of real estate for 1889 :

During the time the Books of Annual Record of Assessed Valuations have been open for inspection and correction there have been received 6,247 applications for correction of personal assessments of individuals, 365 applications for correction of assessments of shareholders of banks, 1,296 statements of corporations, and 257 applications for reduction of assessed valuations of real estate. estate

'A copy of the above call and notice was matled to the residence or place of business of each of the Aqueduct Commissioners twenty-four hours before the time named for said meeting in said call and notice.

Present —The Comptroller, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker and Scott. On motion of Commissioner Scott, the reading of the minutes of April 23, 1890, was dispensed with at this meeting.

The Construction or Executive Committee presented the following : The Construction or Executive Committee presented the following : The Committee on Construction present herewith plans described as Sheets 1, 2 and 3, giving plan and cross-section of the proposed dam and reservoir to be constructed on the west branch of the Croton river, near Carmel, on the New York and Northern Railway, in Putnam County, New York, this day received from the Commissioner of Public Works, and recommend the adoption of the Collection commends and computing the commissioner of Public Works, and recommend the adoption of the following preamble and resolutions :

Tollowing preamble and resolutions: Whereas, the plans, maps, specifications and details to provide for the construction of a dam and reservoir on the west branch of the Croton river, near Carmel, on the New York and Northern Railway, in Putnam County, New York, to be known as Reservoir "D," have been open for public inspection, and a public hearing had thereon on September 25, 1889, and the public hearing respecting the construction of the aforesaid dam and reservoir having been finally closed on said day : therefore

respecting the construction of the aforesaid dath and reservoir having been many closed on said day; therefore, Resolved, That for the more efficient carrying out of the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, we, the Aqueduct Commissioners, appointed to carry out the provisions of said chapter of said Laws and the acts amendatory thereof, do hereby approve and adopt the plans, etc., submitted to us by the Commissioner of Public Works, for the construction of said dam and reservoir, subject to such changes or modifications as the said Aqueduct Commissioners may from time to time deem necessary for the more efficient carrying out of the provisions of said act; and we hereby direct that said plans be filed and designated "Final Plan Sheet No. 5, of 1889." Resolved. That the plans are desired be filed in the office of the Aqueduct Commissioners and

Resolved, That the plans so adopted be filed in the office of the Aqueduct Commissioners, and a copy of the same and each of them, with a certificate of such adoption written thereon and signed by the Aqueduct Commissioners, be transmitted to the Commissioner of Public Works for filing in his office.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the report was adopted.

The Committee also presented the following : The Construction or Executive Committee present herewith six similar property maps, this day received from the Commissioner of Public Works, showing lands required for the construction of Reservor " D," on the west branch of the Croton river, near Carmel, in Putnam County, New York, and recommend the adoption of the following resolution : Resolved, That the six similar property maps, this day submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works, showing parcels of land required for the construction of a dam and reservoir on the west branch of the Croton river, near Carmel, in Putnam County, New York, to be known as Reservor " D," be and the same are hereby approved and adopted, and directed to be certified and transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for filing and delivery to the Commissioners of Appraisal, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 ; and the Counsel to the Corporation is hereby requested to take the steps necessary to acquire for the City, under chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883; the fee in the lands described on said maps ; and the Secretary is hereby directed to furnish to the Counsel to the Corporation all maps, plans, etc., which he may require in the premises. require in the premises. On motion of Commissioner Scott, the report was adopted.
