

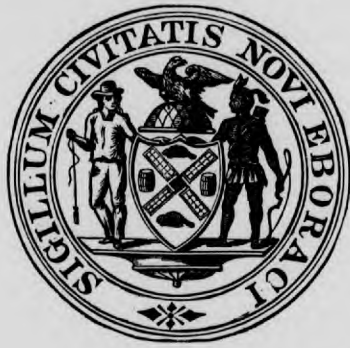

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer from the unexpended balance of the appropriation of 1877 for Small-pox Hospital, the sum of five thousand dollars, to be used in the employment of physicians to visit the tenement-houses during the extreme hot weather.

Resolved, That the services of Drs. Moreau Morris, Jas. E. M. Lordly, Edward Vanderpoel, Edmund G. R. Trimble, and Wm. J. O'Byrne be and are hereby continued for one month.

The report of the Sanitary Superintendent on the petition of certain Hebrews for permission to keep live turkeys and chickens was taken from the table, and, on motion, the application was denied.

William H. McNeil appeared before the Board, in respect to certain complaints made by Inspector Bryant, as to imperfect condition of apparatus for conducting his business of fat-melting at the foot of West Thirty-eighth street. His explanations as to defects, and excuses for the same were accepted.

The Secretary presented the quarterly report for the quarter ending March 31, 1878, which was approved and ordered forwarded to his Honor the Mayor.

Hearing.

Whereas, The party served with notice relating to premises No. 393, 395, and 397 West Twelfth street, before the execution has been commenced, has applied to this Board to have said order or its execution stayed or modified, therefore

Resolved, That the said notice be suspended until the further order of this Board, and that the party served therewith be allowed a reasonable and fair opportunity to present facts and proofs in favor of the modification of such notice, and that George S. Hastings be appointed a referee to hear and receive such facts and proofs, and to report the same in accordance with the rules of this Board, for such further action as may seem just and reasonable.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 1, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,478, as follows, viz.:

2 public buildings, 621 tenement-houses, 162 private dwellings, 25 other dwellings, 12 manufactories and workshops, 31 stores and warehouses, 38 stables, 48 slaughter-houses, 40 fat-rendering establishments, 22 lard-rendering establishments, 1 soap works, 1 stock yard, 3 manure dumps, 5 docks, 2 garbage dumps, 2 lime kilns, 1 dyeing establishment, 42 sunken and vacant lots, 49 yards, courts, and areas, 56 cellars and basements, 90 waste-pipes and drains, 140 privies and water-closets, 18 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 9 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 1 piggery, 4 public sewers, 3 fertilizing works, 18 other nuisances, together with 30 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 602.

During the past week 171 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were granted to the consignees of 68 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

114 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 38 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 38 houses, 38 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

During the week ending June 1, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 454 burial permits for city deaths, 18 for bodies in transitu, and 52 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 454 deaths, 115 marriages, 360 births, 52 still-births, 18 applications for transit permits, and 42 returns from coroners. There were 28 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage and 20 of death were issued from this Bureau.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, June 4, 1878.

SIR—454 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 1, 1878. This is an increase of 15 as compared with the preceding week, and 24 more than the number reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending May 25 was 452, which is 44.2 below the average number of deaths for the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.72 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,081,911.

The increase in the number of deaths during the past compared with that of the preceding week was from the following causes, viz.: Measles, 1; scarlatina, 18; diphtheria, 6; typhus, 1; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 5; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 6; bronchitis, 2; pneumonia, 30; suicide, 2; while measles decreased 1; croup, 2; whooping cough, 9; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 2; cancer, 8; rheumatism and gout, 1; diseases of the heart, 17; aneurism, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; diseases of the nervous system, 8; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1.

The 7 most fatal causes of death reported during the week were the following: Phthisis pulmonalis, which caused 77 deaths; pneumonia, 70; scarlatina, 33; Bright's disease and nephritis, 25; diseases of the nervous system, 24; and diphtheria and bronchitis, 22 each, making a total of 273 deaths, which is a percentage of 60.13 of the total mortality. Scarlatina and pneumonia were unusually fatal during the past week, being the highest weekly number of deaths reported from the former disease during the present year, and the highest from the latter since the week ending March 23. The total number of deaths reported during the month of May from small-pox was 1; measles, 34; scarlatina, 92; diphtheria, 80; membranous croup, 40; whooping cough, 36; cerebro-spinal fever, 9, and malarial fevers, 32.

From the 5 contagious diseases stated during the month it will be seen that 60.49 per cent. of all the deaths was in tenement houses, viz.: measles caused 22 deaths, scarlatina, 55; diphtheria, 52, and whooping cough, 18, in houses containing over 3 families, while 4 deaths from measles, 34 from scarlatina, 22 from diphtheria, and 14 from whooping cough, were in houses containing 3 families and less; and 1 death from small-pox, 8 from measles, 3 from scarlatina, 5 from diphtheria, and 3 from whooping cough in institutions; 1 death in a canal-boat from diphtheria, and 1 in a hotel or boarding-house from whooping cough were reported.

Although the deaths during the past week showed a slight increase, the death rate of New York still compares favorably with that reported from the principal foreign cities. In the week ending May 11 this bureau was favored with 37 returns, on May 18, with 37; on May 25, 33; on June 1, with 33 returns of the mortality of the principal foreign cities, and the death rate of New York was lower than 34 of those reported in the week ending the 11th of May, 33 of those for the week ending May 18, 24 of those for the week ending May 25, and 25 of those for the week ending June 1.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 80 were in institutions, 230 in tenement houses, 131 in houses containing three families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 97 were on the first floor, 113 on the second, 94 on the third, 46 on the fourth, 8 on the fifth; 453 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident; 60 were stated to be single, 111 married, 52 widowed, and the condition of 231 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 465 deaths and still-births, or 91.90 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 201; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 58; Greenwood (undenominational), 44; Lutheran (undenominational), 67; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 24; Woodlawn (undenominational), 16; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 10; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 4; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 1; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 3; Washington (undenominational), 5.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending May 25, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 10; Second, 0; Third, 4; Fourth, 9; Fifth, 2; Sixth, 6; Seventh, 17; Eighth, 12; Ninth, 18; Tenth, 22; Eleventh, 29; Twelfth, 35; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 7; Sixteenth, 12; Seventeenth, 29; Eighteenth, 19; Nineteenth, 80; Twentieth, 38; Twenty-first, 29; Twenty-second, 38; Twenty-third, 10; Twenty-fourth, 1.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 1, was 63.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.787, the mean humidity was 66, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,313, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.80 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia, was 15.64; Brooklyn, 14.11; St. Louis, 11.23; Chicago, 13; Baltimore, 18.46; Boston, 21.39; Cincinnati, 15.08; New Orleans, 26.99; Richmond, 24.82; Charleston, 37.17; Dayton, 14.05. Monthly return, Mobile, 15.99; Burlington, 3.75; Plattsburgh, 21.81. Foreign cities—weekly returns: London, 20.1; Liverpool, 29.0; Birmingham, 15.9; Manchester, 24.7; Dublin, 36.5; Belfast, 32; Cork, 11; Brussels, 18.6; Antwerp, 25.3; Ghent, 20.3; Buda-Pesth, 42.1; Paris, 26.2; Naples, 31.1; Turin, 29.2; Venice, 20.3; Berlin, 28.8; Munich, 34; Breslau, 26.29; Vienna, 37.8; Copenhagen, 22.59; Stockholm, 25.5; Christiania, 15.07; Amsterdam, 26; Rotterdam, 25.5; The Hague, 19.7; Calcutta, 42.6; Bombay, 40.7; Geneva (with suburbs), 28.1; Basel, 26.2; Bern, 36.8; Warsaw, 33.02; St. Petersburg, 65.84—monthly returns—Sydney, 33.24.

LAWS OF 1878.

CHAPTER 383.

AN ACT relating to certain indebtedness of the city of New York, and to provide for the payment and cancellation of the same.

Passed June 3, 1878, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: SECTION 1. The fund known as "the sinking fund of the city of New York, for the redemption of the city debt," shall be continued, and any excess there may be in said fund, after providing for the payment of the bonds and stocks of said city, payable therefrom, as provided by law, shall form a fund for the payment of other bonds and stocks of said city and county, as by this statute provided. All moneys and revenues of said city heretofore pledged and appropriated to and constituting and founding said sinking fund shall continue to be and the same are hereby pledged and appropriated to said fund until all of said bonds and stocks of the said city shall be fully and finally redeemed.

Sec. 2. The fund known as the "sinking fund of the city of New York, for the payment of the interest accruing and to accrue upon the stocks of said city, until the same be fully and finally redeemed," shall be continued, and after providing for the payment of the interest on the bonds and stocks of said city, now payable therefrom as provided by law, shall form a fund which shall be transferred after the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, to the "sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt," and which transferred fund is hereby, in addition to the revenues and moneys aforesaid, pledged and appropriated to said last mentioned sinking fund, until all the bonds and stocks of said city, as aforesaid, are fully redeemed and paid.

Sec. 3. All moneys now in the treasury of said city heretofore collected and received in payment or on account of assessments made and confirmed for local improvements in said city, and all moneys which shall hereafter be collected and received in payment or on account of assessments made and confirmed or which may be made and confirmed, for local improvements completed prior to the passage of this act, shall be paid into the said sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt, and the same is hereby, in addition to the revenues and moneys aforesaid, pledged and appropriated to said last mentioned sinking fund for the payment of the bonds and stocks of said city, to be paid and redeemed therefrom as hereinbefore provided.

Sec. 4. Between the city and its creditors, holders of its bonds and stocks as aforesaid, there shall be and there is hereby declared to be a contract, that the funds and revenues of the city and the funds to be collected from assessments as aforesaid, by this statute pledged to the sinking funds for the redemption of the city debt, shall be accumulated and applied only to the purposes of said sinking fund, until all of said debt is fully redeemed and paid, as herein provided.

Sec. 5. Nothing in this act contained shall be held to require or authorize the commissioners of the sinking fund to use or apply any part or portion of the accumulations in said sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt or the revenues of said fund, in any manner whatever, whereby the security of said fund, for the payment of the bonds and stocks of said city, for which said fund is now pledged by law, and which are a charge on said fund, shall be alienated or impaired, and the said bonds and stocks, so secured by law, are hereby declared to constitute a preferred charge on said sinking fund until the same are fully and finally paid and redeemed.

Sec. 6. The commissioners of the sinking fund are hereby authorized and empowered to call in, pay, and redeem any portion of the bonded debt now a charge upon the treasury of the said city, other than revenue bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes, when they may deem it to be advantageous for the interests of the city so to do, and for this purpose the said commissioners of the sinking fund are hereby empowered to authorize by a concurrent vote, and direct the Comptroller to issue and sell or exchange therefor, at not less than par, "consolidated stock" of said city, payable within a period of not less than twenty, nor more than fifty years from the date of issue thereof, and at a rate of interest not exceeding five per

cent. per annum, payable semi-annually; and upon the payment and redemption of any portion of said bonded debt the certificates thereof shall be cancelled by said commissioners. The "consolidated stock" of said city, issued as by this section authorized, after fully providing for the preferred bonds and stocks of said city, as in the preceding section specified, shall form a charge upon the said sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt, and any part of said bonded debt falling due not exchanged for or redeemed from the proceeds of consolidated stock as herein provided, may be paid from said sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt, provided such payment shall not in any way impair the preferred claims thereon, as in the preceding section specified, and provided, also, the commissioners of the sinking fund shall deem it to be for the best interests of the city that such payment should be so made.

Sec. 7. From the said sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt shall be paid and redeemed all preferred bonds and stocks of said city for the payment or redemption of which said fund is pledged, as aforesaid, and other bonds and stocks of said city as by this statute authorized, and whenever and as often as the Commissioners of said sinking fund shall certify to the board of estimate and apportionment of said city that the accumulations in said sinking fund shall not be sufficient to meet the payment of any bonds or stocks falling due in the next following calendar year, it shall be the duty of said board, and it is hereby required, to include in the annual estimate for such year, to be raised by tax on the estates, real and personal, in said city, subject to taxation, such an amount to be applied to the payment of said bonds or stocks as shall be certified by said commissioners, and the amount so included in said estimate shall be paid into said sinking fund and applied as in this section specified; provided, however, that the amount so to be raised by tax and paid into the sinking fund, as in this section provided, shall not in any one year be less than the sum of one million dollars, or more than two million dollars.

Sec. 8. For the payment of all bonds and stocks of the said city hereafter issued pursuant to the provisions of any statute authorizing the same, and which by the provisions of such statute are payable from taxation—other than revenue bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes—there shall be included in said annual estimate each year, to be raised by tax on the estates, real and personal, in said city, subject to taxation, a sum sufficient, with the accumulation of interest thereon, to meet and discharge the amount of said bonds or stocks by the time the same shall be payable as such sum shall be certified to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Comptroller, and which sum so raised by tax shall be paid annually, on the first day of November, to the commissioners of the sinking fund, and shall be invested by them in the same manner as the revenues pledged to the sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt.

Sec. 9. Assessment bonds of said city hereafter issued pursuant to law to provide for the expense of local improvements contracted for or commenced after the passage of this act, and which expense is to be assessed upon the property benefited, shall be issued by the comptroller of the city, when authorized by the board of estimate and apportionment, at not less than par, for such period as said comptroller may determine, not exceeding ten years, and bearing interest not exceeding six per cent. per annum.

Sec. 10. Whenever any bonds or stocks herein authorized to be issued, or any bonds or stocks of the city of New York, as provided by law, shall be hereafter issued, other than revenue bonds, or such bonds and stocks as may be purchased for investment by the commissioners of the sinking fund, the comptroller of said city shall invite proposals therefor by public advertisement for not less than ten days, and shall award the same to the highest bidder therefor; provided that no proposal for bond or stocks shall be accepted for less than the par value of the same; and said proposals shall be only publicly opened by the Comptroller in the presence of the commissioners of the sinking fund, or such of them as shall attend, at the time and place specified in the advertisement thereof. The Comptroller, with the approval of said commissioners, shall determine what, if any, part of said proposals shall be accepted, and upon the payment into the city treasury of the amounts due by the persons whose bids are accepted respectively, certificates therefor shall be issued to them as authorized by law.

Sec. 11. This act shall take effect immediately.
