That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed issue to be necessary. They therefore recommend that the said resolution and ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of three hundred and twenty-four thousand five hundred and fifty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$324,553.60), proceeds to be used for payment of awards and expenses in the proceeding to acquire title to lands, etc., for a public park in the Twenty-second Ward, bounded by Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, West Fifty-second, West Fifty-third and West Fifty-fourth streets, Borough of Manhattan.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Municipal Assembly hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment June 20, 1901, and hereby authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, pursuant to section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of three hundred and twenty-four thousand five hundred and fifty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$324,553.60) for the purpose of providing means for the payment in part of the awards and expenses therein mentioned and authorized.

Resolved, That, for the purpose of providing means for the payment of the awards and expenses in the proceeding instituted under the authority of chapter 320 of the Laws of 1887, to acquire title to lands, etc., in the Twenty-second Ward (in the Borough of Manhattan), bounded by Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, West Fifty-second, West Fifty-third and West Fifty-fourth streets, for a public park, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of and authorizes, subject to the concurrence herewith by the Municipal Assembly, the issue by the Comptroller of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of one million three hundred and eighteen thousand three hundred and thirty-two dollars and seventy cents, as follows:

GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to the requirements of law and of requisition duly made by the Comptroller, an estimate of the amount that will be required for the expenses of the Board of City Record during the year 1902 is herewith submitted.

The radical and numerous changes made by the amended Charter, which will necessitate almost a general change in the forms of printed matter, books and lithographing (adding largely to the cost), and which will cause expenses in the publication of the CITY RECORD that cannot be foreseen as to items, compel this estimate to be tentative. This is simply an estimate of the expenses for the year 1902, based on my calculations and experience in this office. But, of course, it is impossible to predict, with any hope of accuracy, the requirements of offices that will not come into being until the first of January next.

The sum asked for this Bureau for the year 1902 is an increase of \$1,592 over the amount allowed and appropriated last year by your Board. Last year I asked your Honorable Board for an additional appropriation, \$992, for my Law Assistant and Office Boy. This was not allowed, and I earnestly repeat the request.

The Law Assistant, Mr. Charles C. Halpine, has been connected with this office for many years; his services have been faithfully and competently rendered, and I desire his salary to be raised from \$1,200 to \$1,800. He is a member of the Bar, and his salary is much less than he should receive and quite disproportionate to the services he renders.

The present Office Boy, Henry E. Sholl, has been here since 1896, and is thoroughly competent to fill the position of Junior Clerk; he will be nineteen years old in the early part of next year. His salary, I think, should be raised from \$208 to \$600, and I so request.

In a communication to-day, addressed to you, I asked for a transfer to my salary account of \$200 to pay for the services of a Storehouse Custodian for the remainder of the year. I need not add here anything to my letter. It is necessary that my storehouse should be in the custody of a man on my regular salary roll and paid by the City, and I regard the sum of \$600 as a reasonable compensation for the services of such a person.

At the end of the year 1901, there will not remain any unexpended balance of the appropriation made for this Bureau.

GENTLEMEN—As provided by section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, I submit herewith in writing the Departmental Estimate of the amount of expenditures required for conducting

the public business in the Department of Finance for the year 1902, stating in detail the objects and purposes of such expenditures and including a statement of the salaries of each of the officers, clerks and subordinates employed in the Department.

Wherever vacancies are shown in these tables the names of the former officers or employees are given, together with the date and cause of their having ceased to hold office or employment.

The increases aggregate \$58,555 and the decreases \$13,290, so that the total amount asked for is \$45,265 more than the amount allowed to the Department of Finance for the current year. These estimates are based upon the present pay-roll of the Department and the vacancies existing, on the assumption that the vacancies will be filled by officers or employees drawing the same salaries or wages as those last paid.

Of this amount \$5,000 is due to the increase of the salary of the Comptroller, as provided by the amended Charter, and it is to be noted that, in addition to the duty of paying the employees of the Police Department imposed upon the Department of Finance by the Legislature of 1901, the Department will next year have to resume its jurisdiction over the disbursing of funds of the Department of Education.

In addition to these facts, the powers and duties of the Department of Finance have been considerably enlarged under the provisions of the revised Charter, and the total appropriation asked for, viz., \$887,570, is, in my judgment, the least amount with which the business of the Department can be dispatched promptly and efficaciously.

Following the precedent established during the last three years, and for the reasons set forth in my Departmental Estimate for the year 1899, I will submit on or before the 20th of October statements showing the amounts required to be appropriated for the Redemption of the Interest on the City Debt, for State taxes and for rents.

STATEMENT SUBMITTED TO THE BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT BY THE STATE CHARITIES AID ASSOCIATION IN REGARD TO THE APPROPRIATION FOR 1902 FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.

September 30, 1901.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—The New York, Kings and Richmond County Visiting Committees of the State Charities Aid Association, having visited the various institutions in the Department of Public Charities at frequent intervals during the past year, and having examined with care the estimate of the expenses of the Department for the year 1902, as published in the CITY RECORD of September 12, beg respectfully to submit the following suggestions in regard thereto.

MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

The New York County Visiting Committee desires at the outset to indorse in detail the statements made by the Commissioner of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx in explanation of the various items of his budget as given in his letter of transmittal of September 3. The Committee is able to state from its own observation that these statements of the needs of the various institutions are true and correct, and that the appropriations asked for are imperatively needed for the comfort and well-being of the inmates of these institutions during the year 1902.

Salaries.

An increase of \$26,066 or 5.7 per cent. is asked for in the item of salaries. Among the additional salaries which are proposed are the following:

For a General Bookkeeper and four Clerks for Bellevue Hospital, made necessary by the plan of placing Bellevue and its dependencies under a Board of Trustees, \$5,200.

For the Superintendent of the Metropolitan Hospital Training School for Nurses, \$1,200. The creation of this position is due to the fact that the former Superintendent, a physician, was also Superintendent of the Training School. The Training Schools for Nurses, both in this Department and elsewhere, are under the control of superintendents who are trained nurses, and this new position is eminently necessary and proper.

For additional help to conduct hospital service in the buildings on Blackwell's Island soon to be vacated by the Manhattan State Hospital, \$12,040. The plan proposed by the Commissioner of using two of these buildings for phthisis patients, withdrawing them from the wards of the general hospitals of the Department, is highly to be commended. The phthisis patients are certainly a source of great discomfort and possibly also of danger to the other patients in the same ward. The vacancies in the wards of the general hospitals will undoubtedly be filled by patients who otherwise would be supported by the City in private hospitals.

For providing paid service in place of Workhouse helpers in the bakery, \$5,616. Two years ago your Honorable Body appropriated a sum sufficient to abolish Workhouse help throughout

the Department. At that time the bakery was under the Department of Correction. The building then occupied has since been burned and the bakery is now under the direct control of the Charities Department. We are confident that the substitution of paid service for prison help in the bakery will be productive of as good results here as it has been elsewhere in the Department, and we strongly recommend this appropriation.

For increasing the salaries of the Superintendent and the Deputy Superintendent of the New York City Training School for Nurses, \$800. The increase proposed simply restores one of these salaries to what it has been until very recently, leaving the other still below the former rate, and is one to which the incumbents of these positions are justly entitled.

In the opinion of this Committee, it is highly desirable that larger salaries should be paid in the lower grades of service of Bellevue Hospital. The female helpers now receive \$10 to \$12 per month. The corresponding grades of service in other hospitals command \$14 to \$16 per month. Add to the low wages the dismal and forbidding quarters provided, and it is easy to understand the fact that the female helpers in Bellevue Hospital are largely of an inefficient and undesirable type, and that after every pay-day there are many vacancies. There is every reason to believe that, with adequate wages and comfortable quarters, the City would be able to secure as good a grade of employees as private hospitals.

SUPPLIES.

Last year your Honorable Board made a considerable reduction from the amount asked for by the Department for supplies, the amount asked for being \$873,072.74, and the amount granted being \$784,133.97. This amount has proved to be wholly inadequate to clothe, feed and care for the wards of this Department, even on a most economical basis. The amount granted for 1901 was \$90,876.03 less than that granted for 1899, and \$15,876.03 less than that granted for 1898.

The expenses for the first six months of the year 1901, as shown by the tables submitted by the Commissioner, were at the rate of \$892,696.56 for the year, and even at this rate there was constant lack of bed-clothing, trousers, shirts, towels, etc. The important items of food supplies, meats, milk, butter and vegetables, have, as a rule, been of good quality so far as we could ascertain, and while the quantity has certainly been very moderate, we would not say that it had been insufficient. It would certainly have been insufficient had the expenditure been limited to the amount appropriated last year for this item by your Honorable Board. Necessary repairs and alterations and additions to buildings have been postponed in order that there might not be a lack in the still more necessary matters of food and clothing. We understand that the appropriation for the present year was fixed upon the basis of allowing no balance on hand at the close of the year. We believe this to be impossible in practice. The request of the Commissioner for \$920,655.93 is based, as is shown by the tables, on the actual expenditure for the first half of 1901, and on the presumption that the year 1902 will be closed with no balance of supplies on hand. We believe that this is not practicable, and that the amount asked for should be increased by at least \$40,000, if the Department is to be conducted without discomfort or suffering on the part of its wards during the coming year.

ALTERATIONS AND REPAIRS.

Total Appropriation Needed.

The amount asked by the Commissioner for this purpose for 1902 is \$105,900. The amounts actually allowed for this purpose during the past three years have been as follows: for 1899, \$200,000; for 1900, \$133,000; for 1901, \$70,000. It must be borne in mind that the buildings of this Department shelter some 7,000 people, that nearly all of them are old, many of them very old, and that simply to keep them habitable and to prevent excessive deterioration (which would be both wasteful and inhumane) a very considerable annual appropriation for repairs is necessary. But little has been done during the past year except in the line of painting and minor repairs.

Plumbing and Engineers' Supplies.

As to the items of the proposed appropriation of \$105,900, the Committee has no special information in regard to the plumbing and engineers' supplies and repairs to steamboats.

City Hospital.

The Committee strongly indorses the items for a new steam-heating apparatus at the City Hospital, having found during its visits last winter that the present system is antiquated and entirely insufficient, and that the temperature of some of the wards is at times far below the minimum necessary for safety and comfort. The new plumbing for the men's wards at the City Hospital is also urgently needed.

Almshouse.

The new roofs and metal ceilings for six buildings in the Almshouse are urgently needed. Although the buildings have been in use only some five years, the roofs have proven to be defective and as a consequence the plaster ceilings have been seriously damaged.

Randall's Island.

The new new roads, the repairs to the Male Helpers' Dormitory, the new ice-house and the new roofs to two buildings, all on Randall's Island, we know to be needed, as is also the steam launch for the ferry. At present all the women and children going to Randall's Island by the One Hundred and Twentieth street ferry are carried over in an open rowboat. Steam launches are provided at the two Blackwell's Island ferries, and the need is even more urgent at Randall's Island.

Bellevue and Fordham Hospitals.

The desired appropriations for minor affairs at Bellevue and Fordham Hospitals are very moderate and will cover only the most urgent needs.

Manhattan State Hospital Buildings.

The repairs to the buildings at present occupied by the Manhattan State Hospital are needed to fit them for use as hospitals for phthisis patients and a Nurses' Home for the Almshouse. The necessity for the Nurses' Home and the Phthisis Hospital is such that we have repeatedly urged in the past that new buildings be erected for these purposes. If these existing buildings are to be available, it is certainly desirable that the moderate amounts required for fitting them for these uses be granted this year.

New Buildings.

As to new buildings, the most urgent needs are undoubtedly the annex and water-towers at the Nurses' Home at the City Hospital and the two bathing pavilions at the Almshouse. The Nurses' Home at the City Hospital has long been seriously overcrowded. The bathing pavilions at the Almshouse are very old and are much too small.

An entirely new building at Bellevue is undoubtedly the only effectual remedy for the manifold deficiencies of the existing structure.

New Ambulances at Bellevue.

We desire also strongly to indorse the proposed increased appropriation for new ambulances. The experience of Bellevue Hospital during the excessive heat of the past summer showed the necessity of an increased number of ambulances and the danger of relying entirely on horses for ambulance service. Bellevue Hospital should have at least two automobile ambulances.

BROOKLYN AND QUEENS.

Concerning the items relating to the support of public charities in Brooklyn and Queens during 1902, the Kings County Visiting Committee desires to submit the following recommendations to your Honorable Board:

Great improvements have been made during the past year in the institutions at Flatbush, especially in the Hospital Department, which show efficiency of administration and careful outlay of funds allowed.

The most pressing need to which attention is again called is for a central heating and lighting plant.

Heating and Lighting.

The need for a central plant to provide proper heat and light for all the buildings is urgent. Estimates for the construction of such a plant have been embodied in the Budget for the past two years, but not allowed. The Commissioner of the State Board of Charities resident in Kings County has gone over the matter most carefully and filed a report as to cost and saving to the City after original outlay. The Kings County Visiting Committee, feeling the need to be grave and the present method both inadequate and extravagant, has several times addressed your Honorable Board on the subject. Reports of the Grand Jury for Kings County, as the result of inspection during the winter months, have called attention to the lack of proper heat in the buildings and commented upon the obtaining of light from an electric lighting company. In view of the extreme need and the length of time required to meet it by the construction of a new plant, the matter is here urgently presented.

Almshouse.

The male and female almshouse departments are at times greatly overcrowded and proper care and isolation of the sick or more feeble inmates is impossible under present conditions.

The need of pavilions or additions to the present structures is therefore urged. Elevators, practicable for the use of inmates, many of whom are too feeble to use the staircase, as well as for general service in carrying food, linen and clothing, are among the needs of the almshouse to which attention is again directed.

Pavilion for Idiots.

Among the needed structural improvements may be cited an addition to the Idiots' Pavilion. At present only dormitories are provided for the one hundred and twenty (120) or more inmates. Day rooms, a place to eat apart from the sleeping quarters, workshops—for many can be improved in mind and body by such effort—and especially school-rooms should be added.

That many of the children are teachable has been demonstrated, but the only place they now have for teacher and pupils is the corridor of the building. The defectives are properly State charges, but the State institutions are at present overcrowded, and it may be years before they have facilities sufficient to meet the need. Many must remain in the City's care, and they should be properly and humanely provided for.

Storehouse.

A general storehouse is greatly needed for the care and custody of supplies.

Morgue and Clinical Laboratory.

The present Morgue is insufficient in size. Larger scientific opportunities would result from a large and well-equipped clinical laboratory.

Heating of Male Almshouse.

This is made a separate item in the Budget presented, but ought to be covered by a new plant; the emergency, however, is great and ought to be met speedily.

Salaries.

The increase in the number of employees, especially Nurses, Orderlies and Hospital Helpers, is warranted by the increase in the number of patients, and by the general needs at Hospital and Almshouse, and the estimate for salaries in these departments is not excessive and should be allowed.

Supplies.

These, being on a per capita basis, need no comment, except that a decided improvement has of late been noted in the quality and the preparation of food as well as economy in the care of the same.

Reception Hospital at Coney Island.

This Hospital has already demonstrated the humanity and need of its establishment by a season of usefulness and should be continued and improved.

Brooklyn Homeopathic Hospital.

The equipment and maintenance of this Hospital, which is now City property and is undergoing alterations and repairs, would bring needed relief to that part of the city in which it is situated and under municipal care would be of distinct advantage.

Twenty-sixth Ward Hospital (new).

This is a small outlay, due to the needs of the section for which it is asked, where special hospital facilities are required. The building is City property.

Ambulance Service.

This must be increased to meet the needs of the new stations, as well as to be of full service at the Kings County Hospital.

This statement is closed with an expression of appreciation on the part of the Kings County Visiting Committee of the courtesy and confidence with which your Honorable Board has always received its communications.

RICHMOND.

The Richmond County Committee is pleased to report the erection during the past year of a pavilion for the reception of insane patients, and the provision of fire-escapes for the Women's Building.

The Committee would strongly indorse the application of the Commissioner for salaries for male and Female Nurses, a paid Cook and a paid Driver. The Committee is fully convinced by its observation that this work cannot be done satisfactorily by pauper labor.

Last year a request was made for the erection of a small cottage hospital for chronic patients. The appropriation was not granted and is not asked for this year, but the need still exists, and the Committee would strongly favor an appropriation for this purpose.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 150 of the Building Code, relating to penalties for violations of said Code.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 150 of the Building Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 150. Violations and Penalties—The owner or owners of any building, structure or part thereof, or wall, or any platform, staging or flooring to be used for standing or seating purposes, where any violation of this Code shall be committed, placed, or shall exist, and any architect or builder, who may be employed or assist in the commission of any such violation, and any and all persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this Code or fail to comply therewith, or any requirement thereof, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order or regula-

tion made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans, submitted and approved thereunder, or of any certificate or permit issued thereunder, shall severally, for each and every such violation and noncompliance, respectively, forfeit and pay a penalty in the sum of fifty dollars. Except that any such person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Code as to the construction of chimneys, fireplaces, flues, hot-air pipes and furnaces, or who shall violate any of the provisions of this Code, with reference to the framing or trimming of timbers, girders, beams, or other woodwork in proximity to chimney flues or fireplaces, shall forfeit and pay a penalty in the sum of one hundred dollars. But if any said violation shall be removed or be in process of removal within ten days after the service of a notice as hereinafter prescribed, the liability of such a penalty shall cease, and the Corporation Counsel, on request of the Commissioner of Buildings having jurisdiction, shall discontinue any action pending to recover the same, upon such removal or the completion thereof within a reasonable time. Any and all of the aforementioned persons who having been served with a notice as hereinafter prescribed, to remove any violation, or comply with any requirement of this Code, or with any order or regulation made thereunder, shall fail to comply with said notice within ten days after such service or shall continue to violate any requirement of this Code in the respect named in said notice, shall pay a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars. For the recovery of any said penalty or penalties an action may be brought in any municipal court, or court of record, in said city in the name of The City of New York; and whenever any judgment shall be rendered therefor, the same shall be collected and enforced, as prescribed and directed by the Code of Civil Procedure of the State of New York. The Commissioner of Buildings having jurisdiction, through the Corporation Counsel, is hereby authorized, in his discretion, good and sufficient cause being shown therefor, to remit any fine or fines, penalty or penalties, which any person or persons may have incurred, or may hereafter incur, under any of the provisions of this Code; but no fine or penalty shall be remitted for any such violation until the violation shall have been removed. Said remission shall also operate as to the remission of the costs obtained in such action.

In addition to the other penalties in this Code prescribed, the owner or owners of any building, structure or part thereof, or wall, bill-board, sign or device in the nature of an advertisement, announcement or direction, or any platform, staging or flooring to be used for standing or seating purposes, where any violation of this Code shall be committed, placed, or shall exist, and any architect, builder, plumber, carpenter or mason, who may be employed or assist in the commission of any such violation, and any and all persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this Code or fail to comply therewith, or any requirement thereof, or who shall violate or fail to comply with, any notice, order or regulation made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans, submitted and approved thereunder, or of any certificate or permit issued thereunder, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than two hundred and fifty dollars for each offense, or by imprisonment for not more than three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 150 of the Building Code, relating to penalties for violations of said Code.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 150 of the Building Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 150. Violations of Penalties—The owner or owners of any building, structure or part thereof, or wall or any platform, staging or flooring, to be used for standing or seating purposes, where any violation of this code shall be committed, placed, or shall exist, and any architect, builder, plumber, carpenter or mason, who may be employed or assist in the commission of any such violation, and any and all persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this code, or fail to comply therewith or any requirement thereof, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order or regulation made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans, submitted and approved thereunder, or of any certificate or permit issued thereunder, shall severally, for each and every such violation and non-compliance, respectively, forfeit and pay a penalty in the sum of fifty dollars. Except that any such person who shall violate any of the provisions of this code as to the construction of chimneys, fire-places, flues, hot-air pipes and furnaces, or who shall violate any of the provisions of this code with reference to the framing or trimming of timbers, girders, beams, or other woodwork in proximity to chimney flues or fire-places, shall forfeit and pay a penalty in the sum of one hundred dollars. But if any said violation shall be removed or be in process of removal within ten days after the service of a notice as hereinafter prescribed, the liability of such a penalty shall cease and the corporation counsel, on request of the commissioner of buildings having jurisdiction, shall discontinue any action pending to recover the same, upon such removal or the completion thereof within a reasonable time. Any and all of the aforementioned persons who having been served with a notice as hereinafter prescribed, to remove any violation, or comply with any requirement of this code, or with any order or regulation made thereunder, shall fail to comply with said notice within ten days after such service or shall continue to violate any requirement of this code in the respect named in said notice shall pay a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars. For the recovery of any said penalty or penalties an action may be brought in any municipal court, or court of record, in said city in the name of the city of New York; and whenever any judgment shall be rendered therefor, the same shall be collected and enforced, as prescribed and directed by the code of civil procedure of the state of New York. The commissioner of buildings having jurisdiction, through the corporation counsel, is hereby authorized, in his discretion, good and sufficient cause being shown therefor, to remit any fine or fines, penalty or penalties, which any person or persons may have incurred, or may hereafter incur, under any of the provisions of this code; but no fine or penalty shall be remitted for any such violation until the violation shall have been removed. Said remission shall also operate as to the remission of the costs obtained in such action.

In addition to the other penalties in this code prescribed the owner or owners of any building, structure or part thereof, or wall, billboard, sign or device in the nature of an advertisement, announcement or direction, or any platform, staging or flooring to be used for standing or seating purposes, where any violation of this code shall be committed, placed, or shall exist, and any architect, builder, plumber, carpenter or mason, who may be employed or assist in the commission of any such violation, and any and all persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this code or fail to comply therewith, or any requirement thereof, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any notice, order or regulation made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or of any certificate or permit issued thereunder, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than two hundred and fifty dollars for each offense, or by imprisonment for not more than three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 11.30 o'clock A. M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Deputy Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The minutes of the meeting held September 11, 1901, were read and adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Deputy Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary reported that, in response to the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, as authorized at the meeting of the Board on July 19, 1901, a map or survey with technical description had been received for the proposed site for an armory for Troop "C," in the Borough of Brooklyn, and offered the following:

Whereas, This Board, at a meeting held July 10, 1901, selected as a site for the erection of an armory for Troop "C," N. G., N. Y., the plot of ground situated on the easterly side of Bedford avenue, extending from President to Union street; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be, and is hereby directed in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 314 of the Laws of 1901, to submit to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for their approval or disapproval, the survey, map or plan, with field notes and explanatory remarks, prepared by the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, at the request of this Board, showing and describing the site selected by this Board for armory purposes, described as follows:

Beginning at a point the southeasterly corner of Union street and Bedford avenue; thence easterly and along the southerly side of Union street, distance 278 feet 6½ inches to the land formerly owned by the County of Kings; thence southeasterly along said land of County of Kings, distance 260 feet 11 inches to the northerly side of President street; thence westerly along the northerly side of President street, distance 382 feet 1½ inches to the easterly side of Bedford avenue; thence northerly along the easterly side of Bedford avenue, distance 260 feet 7½ inches to the point or place of beginning, located in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Block 10, Lot No. 1, in the Borough of Brooklyn, heretofore selected by this Board, with the request that the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve or disapprove the same, as provided in chapter 314 of the Laws of 1901; and if the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall approve said site so selected, and consent to the acquisition thereof for the purposes of an armory, that they indicate such approval and consent by a certificate to that effect indorsed upon or attached to said survey, map or plan, so as aforesaid submitted to the said Commissioners.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Deputy Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A report was received from the committee in relation to the former headquarters for the First Brigade, stating that all State property was turned over to the State, and property of the City, consisting of furniture, etc., disposed of by the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies; that the rooms are now vacant, and not required for further use by the National Guard, etc., which was ordered filed, and the Secretary requested to notify the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the fact. In the matter of compensation for services rendered as armorer, the Board decided that it had no jurisdiction.

A report was received from the Committee in relation to the site and armory for the accommodation of the Second Naval Battalion. The Secretary presented a copy of a communication from the Corporation Counsel, notifying the Comptroller that the title is now vested in The City of New York to the proposed site for this armory, in the Eighth Ward, in the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by First avenue and New York bay, and Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, together with the right, title and interest of owner of the upland in and to the lands and front of said block under the waters of the New York bay, extending to the bulkhead and pier lines. The Clerk of the works made a report as to the availability of this site for building an armory.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Whereas, The Corporation Counsel has, by communication dated September 13, 1901, advised the Comptroller that the title is now vested in The City of New York of a plot of land located in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, "bounded by First avenue and New York Bay and Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, together with the right, title and interest of owner of the upland in and to the lands and front of said block under the waters of the New York bay extending to the bulkhead and pier lines."

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of section 134, chapter 314 of the Laws of 1901, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to appropriate said plot as a location for an armory and quarters for the Second Naval Battalion, N. G., N. Y.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Deputy Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The committee appointed at the meeting of September 11, 1901, to consider requisitions for supplies and repairs to the different armories of the National Guard in the city reported in detail the amounts recommended for the various armories, amounting to \$63,986.18, in the Borough of Manhattan, and \$32,491.80 in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of \$96,477.98, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does now revise the itemized estimates of the commanding officers of active militia quartered in The City of New York, submitted to this Board prior to September 20, for necessary expenditures to be made during the ensuing year for repairs to and furnishing of armories and utensils, materials, supplies and other expenditures to be furnished by the City, and does hereby determine and certify to the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies the amount necessary to be expended for such purpose to be in detail as follows:
