Such Rapid Transit Railroad as contemplated by the draft of such contract may briefly be described as follows:

A part beginning at a point under Battery Park, near the water-front, in the Borough of Manhattan, and extending thence under Greenwich Street, Church Street, Vesey Street, Broadway, private property, Irving Place and Lexington Avenue to the Harlem River; thence under the Harlem River and private property to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street and Park Avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, where the line divides. The east side branch extending under Park Avenue and private property to One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street; thence under One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, Southern Boulevard and Whitlock Avenue to a point in private property south of Westchester Avenue, where the line emerges and becomes an elevated railroad; thence continuing along Whitlock Avenue and Westchester Avenue to Pelham Bay Park. The west side branch, beginning at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street and Park Avenue, and extending thence under private property, Mott Avenue, Franz Sigel Park and private property to a point in private property near River Avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh Street, where the line emerges and becomes an elevated railroad; thence continuing along River Avenue and Jerome Avenue to Wood-

Another part in the Borough of Manhattan, commencing at a point under Canal Street, near Chrystie Street, and extending westerly under Canal Street to a point near West Street.

Another part in the Borough of Brooklyn, beginning in Fourth Avenue, near Forty-third Street, and extending thence under Fourth Avenue to Fort Hamilton; and another portion beginning at Fourth Avenue, near Fortieth Street, and extending lines to reach the center of the city. For these reasons I vote against putting it out as thence under Forticth Street, New Utrecht Avenue and Eighty-sixth Street to a point between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Avenues, where it emerges from the ground and becomes an elevated railroad; thence continuing over Eighty-sixth Street and Stillwell Avenue to Coney Island,

The cost of the system to him and the prospects of earning are therefore all important. If the city hopes to get bidders the plan proposed must be attractive.

The form of contract proposed will require the contractor to build the Broadway-Lexington, Broadway-Lafayette and Canal Street trunk lines, and also two long branches in The Bronx, one leading to Pelham Bay and the other to a point near near the intersection of Fulton Street and Ashland Place, and extending thence the Westchester County line, and in Brooklyn to build two suburban branches of the under Fulton Street, Flatbush Avenue extension and over the Manhattan Bridge; Fourth Avenue Subway, one to Fort Hamilton and the other to Coney Island. They must not only earn enough the Borough of Manhattan; thence under Delancey Street and Centre Street to a to pay operating expenses and interest on themselves, but must earn enough more to connection with the branch last above described under Centre Street, near Howard make good the losses that will accrue from the operation of the four suburban Street. branches. If this system is to be operated as contemplated at a flat rate fare of five cents, then the long distance riders will be carried at a loss, which loss must be made up at least for many years by the short distance riders. Bion J. Arnold, an expert engineer in rapid transit operation, reported to the Commission about a year and a half ago that riders on the Interborough subway who travel more than five and onehalf miles were carried at a loss, which loss was made up by the short riders.

Whether the four suburban branches would ever earn enough at a five-cent fare to (713) carry themselves without the help of the profitable short distance traffic of the trunk lines is doubtful. Increase of traffic on the branches means more loss instead of more profit if each long distance passenger is carried at a loss.

The present addition of these four suburban branches renders the proposition much less attractive to bidders than it would be if they were left off.

The assessment provisions of the Rapid Transit Act provide a method of building which was thereupon moved and duly seconded: suburban branches that is fair to all suburban districts and attractive to the operator of a subway system. partly or wholly relieved from earning interest and sinking fund on that branch. The assessment method is fair to all suburban localities alike because those outlying localities that need transit the most will be the most willing to be assessed, and the benefits of the low fare and of the city's trunk subways will be conferred on the deserving localities rather than upon those localities that have sufficient influence to obtain free extensions.

The assessment plan affords a method of projecting the radius of the five-cent fare further than otherwise.

There are districts other than those penetrated by the four suburban branches above referred to that are equally populous and some of them are nearer to the center

of the city. The proposed form of contract should not compel the contractor to build the two suburban branches in The Bronx and the two suburban branches in South Brooklyn, but in lieu thereof the contractor should be compelled to operate without additional fare such branches as the city may build. The city can then employ the assessment plan to any extent that it wishes. It is my opinion that in the proportion that localities are distant from the center of the city and are sparsely built up the assessment plan should be applied.

The city confers a special privilege on an outlying district if it donates the benefit of its short haul trunk line traffic upon that district under compulsion of an operating contract quite as much as if it uses its own money to build the outlying subway. The proposed form of contract donates the entire benefit of the short haul traffic of this system to two special suburban localities, South Brooklyn and The Bronx. Not only operator of the system will allow their passengers to travel through the trunk lines at a single fare. There is an attempt made in the form of contract to provide that the contractor shall operate future proper branches or connections. This is the pro-

Article CXXX. The Contractor further agrees (which agreement is one of the principal moving considerations to the City in making this contract) to equip and operate or to provide rolling stock and operate the same through any railroad or railroads constructed by or on behalf of the City which, in the opinion of the Commission, are proper extensions of the Railroad. Provided, however, that if the Contractor's share (provided for in Paragraph 10 of Article LXXXIV) from the Railroad including the extension shall by reason of the operation of such extension or extensions be reduced to less than six (6) per centum the City shall make up such deficiency to the Contractor.

As I have shown above, suburban subways are operated at a loss, which loss needs to be made good by the short distance riders. There will be no short distance traffic to help out the new branches. It has all been donated to the four favored branches referred to. On the one hand this attempted provision drives away bidders. On the other it attempts to obligate the city to make good to the contractor any deficit on the new branch lines. Under existing law the city has no power to make good a deficit incurred by an operating company, and it is doubtful whether the city will desire or the Legislature will pass an amendment to accomplish this.

To conclude, it is my opinion that the proposed form of contract is not as attractive to bidders as it should and could be made with entire safety to the city's interest, and that it is not fair to the various suburban districts that will look to these trunk the Commission's proposed form of contract.

following memorandum:

This proposed form of contract is for the building with city money the Broadway-Lexington, Broadway-Lafayette and Canal Street trunk lines, and also the two suburban branches in The Bronx and the two suburban branches in South Brooklyn Sections averaging about \$3,000,000,000 each will be put up for bidders, and presumably there will be a considerable number of successful bidders as each section will be bid upon separately.

In my opinion the two branches in The Bronx and the two branches in South Brooklyn should not, at least at this time, be put up for bids to be built with city money. The amount of money that now seems available for these purposes is not sufficient to build all of these lines, and it seems to me that the suburban branches should be taken out of this bidding on that account if for no other. If it is still insisted that these branches be built with city money, it can be done at a later time because the trunk subway sections being more difficult will take a longer time to

In addition to the foregoing reasons it seems to me that we should not ask for bids to build these four suburban branches with city money until the preliminaries provided in the Rapid Transit Act for construction in whole or part by assessment have been complied with. If bids are received now on these outlying sections it appears to me that they will all need to be held over a long while, or else thrown out. Because if these branches are built on the assessment plan there must be a joint hearing, as provided by law, before the Board of Estimate and Public Service Commission, the probable cost must be computed, the assessment laid and the bonds sold before the construction contracts can be let.

Accordingly it would appear that whether the city is to build these branches with its own money or is to have them built on the assessment plan, there is no need of

letting these contracts now.

I deprecate asking for bids for construction only until the success or failure of the plan for construction, equipment and operation has been ascertained. My reason for this is that if a contractor or contractors bid in earnest for construction, equipment and operation they will look to much the same body of men for subcontractors as the bidders for city construction with city money will be. If the two sorts of bids are received before the outcome of the letting for construction, equipment and operation is known there will be a tendency for the bidders for construction by the city not to put in as low bids as they would if the letting for construction, equipment and operation was not pending. In other words, I think bids most favorable to the city will be received if the highest degree of simplicity and concentration can be obtained upon each of the two forms.

GENTLEMEN: -On July 21, 1909, your Honorable Board appropriated the sum of \$550,000.00 to meet the expense of making contemplated changes in the Chambers Street station of the Brooklyn Loop Lines, and \$325,000.00 for strengthening the roof of the subway on land owned, or to be acquired, by the city so that large modern buildings could be erected thereon. The total extra appropriation was \$875,000.00. Part of the said amount of \$550,000.00 was needed on account of certain changes in lowering the station as originally planned, substituting mezzanine floors for the underpassageways and the construction of the so-called Duane Street off-line sewer. The balance of the said \$550,000.00 was needed for the contemplated enlargement of said 14, 1910, approving the issue of \$643,000.00 bonds, whether the terms of that Order station from a four-track to a six-track station. It was also stated to your Board in were accepted and would be obeyed.

our application of February 15, 1909, that for the purpose of enlarging the station to a six-track station it would be necessary to acquire additional real estate, estimated at \$1,000,000.00.

The contractor in charge has performed part of the work for which the extra sum of \$550,000.00 was appropriated. The Duane Street off-line sewer has been practically completed. The general work of constructing the Chambers Street station, however, was stopped at the request of Mayor McClellan, made under date of May 12, 1908, pending the insertion of the foundations for the Municipal Building. A further part of the appropriation of \$550,000.00 will be needed for the lowering of the station, including the construction of mezzanine floors, etc.

Further studies of the situation and of the questions involved in the enlargement of this station, coupled with the investigation of the amount of additional real estate to be taken and the cost of underpinning buildings, have convinced the Commission that it is possible and advisable to postpone the enlargement from a four-track to a sixtrack station. The foundations of the Municipal Building are being placed so that at some future time if it becomes desirable the station can be so enlarged, but for the present it is deemed best not to purchase or acquire the additional real estate needed if the station is enlarged, and which might cost on condemnation as much as \$1,500,000.00. It is probable that a small amount of additional land will still need to be taken, but it will be insignificant as compared with the very large amount of land covered with buildings that would need to be taken if the larger project were carried through. This action will also make it possible to save for the present at least a portion of the extra appropriation of \$875,000.00.

The Commission desires to apprise you of this situation, inasmuch as it indicates a substantial modification of plans heretofore submitted to and approved by your Board. So soon as the amount of the unused balance of the \$875,000.00 appropriation is definitely known the Commission will communicate with your Board in order that you may then take whatever action seems proper as to such appropriation.


