Minutes of Meeting Held Tuesday, February 1, 1910.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Offices of the Commission, No. 299 Broadway, on Tuesday, February 1, 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present—President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfers

were approved: James F. Lynch, from the competitive position of Clerk, at a salary of \$3,000 per

annum, in the Department of Street Cleaning, Borough of Manhattan, to the exempt position of Deputy Commissioner, at a salary of \$5,000 per annum (Rule XIV., par-

Michael Kennedy, from the position of Assistant Foreman to that of Laborer in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Henry Duffy, from Assistant Foreman to Laborer in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfer was

Edward Drennan, from the position of Foreman in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, to that of Foreman in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens, there being a preferred list for the latter position.

On the recommendation of Commissioner Keogh, the Committee on Appeals, the appeal of James H. McDonald, for a rerating of his report in the examination for Inspector of Supplies and Repairs was denied.

On motion, it was

Resolved. That the Secretary communicate with the heads of the various Bureaus in the office of the Commission and request suggestions as to any changes or modifications in the regulations that may seem necessary or desirable.

Commissioner Keogh was appointed a Committee of One to recommend such changes or modifications in the Rules as he might think necessary.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list of Morgue Keeper, resulting from the examination held on Decmber 28, 1909, be and the same hereby is established as of January 18, 1910, the date on which the rating of the papers was completed.

On the recommendation of the Chief Examiner, the following orders were issued: 1. That direct information to candidates or persons not in the employ of the Commission, other than regular official notices, should in no case be given from the Computing Office except by order of the Commission or of a Commissioner.

2. That visitors or callers should not be admitted to the rooms assigned to the Examiners, all such visitors or callers to be received in Room 1109 only.

A report was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated January 31, 1910, stating that on January 24 he had received a notice from the President of the Borough of Queens of the suspension of several hundred Laborers, among whom were some veteran volunteer firemen, and requesting instructions as to whether in preparing the preferred list the veteran volunteer firemen should be given preference. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to state that the Commission was of the opinion that the Civil Srvice Law contemplated giving no preference for appointment to veteran volunteer firemen.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated January 28, 1910, relative to the request of the Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, that Mr. Arnold J. Wisch, who had been appointed a Court Stenographer on September 24, 1908, at a salary of \$1,500 per annum, be granted a promotion examination "to qualify him to receive a salary in the grade up to \$2,400." The report stated that Mr. Wisch would not be eligible for a promotion examination until September 24, 1911. The request was denied for lack of power.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated January 31, 1910, relative to the case of Miss Anna Albert, of No. 333 Wyona street, Brooklyn, a candidate in the examination for promotion to Third Grade Stenographer and Typewriter, Law Department, held on January 25, 1910. The report stated that Miss Albert had signed her name to the letter, which was one of the subjects of the examination, and that she had been informed on the day of the examination that on that account her papers would not be rated, but that on January 28, 1910, the President of the Commission had instructed that the Commission did not find it convenient to have a representative attend the the Examiner in charge of the examination papers to erase Miss Albert's name from the paper in question in order that the Examiners would have no knowledge of her identity, which instruction had been carried out. The action of the President was approved.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated January 31, 1910, relative to a communication from Jacob Salzman, a candidate for promotion to Third Grade Clerk in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Brooklyn, who had been disqualified from taking the second part of the examination, owing to the fact that he had placed his examination number

on his papers. The matter was laid over. A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated January 10, 1910, in relation to the case of John Nicholas Cullen, of Blue Point, L. I., who had been appointed as a Temporary Clerk in the Board of Elections and in the Department of Taxes and Assessments from the eligible list of Junior Clerk. The report stated that Mr. Cullen had given the date of birth in his application as April 9, 1887, but in the delaration sheet furnished at the time of his appointment as April 9, 1888; that, upon request, the candidate had produced a baptismal certificate of St. Cecelia's Church, Brooklyn, which gave his name as Nicholas John Cullen and the date of birth as April 9, 1887, but that the date showed clearly that it had been changed; that on Decembr 24, 1909, a communication was addressed to the pastor of the church | Richard Welling.

asking whether Cullen had been born on April 9, 1888, to which an affirmative answer had been received. After consideration of the matter, it appearing that Cullen had failed to answer a communication addressed to him on January 21, 1910, requesting him to explain the discrepancy in the dates given, the Secretary was directed to place his name upon the blacklist.

Reports were presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated January 26 and 27, 1910, recommending that the following named applicants for the position of Fireman be marked qualified on the eligible list:

A letter was presented from the Comptroller, dated January 24, 1910, requesting approval of the emergency appointment of Miss Reba L. Prall, of No. 203 Hewes street, Brooklyn, as Stenographer and Typewriter in his Department, at a salary of \$15 a week, for a period of filteen days, taking effect January 25. The request was

granted in accordance with paragraph 4 of Rule XII.

The Commission then considered a letter addressed to his Honor the Mayor under date of January 31, 1910, by Mr. Francis V. S. Oliver, Jr., Chief of the Bureau of Licenses (and subsequently referred to the Commission for consideration), in which it was requested that the position of Chief of the Bureau of Licenses be placed in the exempt class. On motion, the Secretary was directed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the classification.

The appointment of Patrick Loftus, of Cornwall-on-Hudson, N. Y., as a Mining Foreman in the Board of Water Supply was approved under the provisions of para-

graph 7 of Rule XII.

A communication was presented from Edward J. McGoldrick, Esq., Assistant Corporation Counsel, Albany, N. Y., dated January 29, 1910, transmitting for con sideration by the Commission, copies of Legislative bills Nos. 180, 199, 221 and 244 The Secretary was directed to reply to the communication and state that the Commission could see no objection to the proposed legislation.

A communication was presented from G. L. Sterling, Esq., Acting Corporation Counsel, dated January 31, 1910, in reply to a letter of May 7, 1909, from the Commission requesting an official opinion as to whether the resolution adopted on February 10, 1909, extending the period during which twenty-two former employees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge might be reinstated in the City service, had been "legally adopted" in view of the question raised by the Civil Service Reform Association of New York and the State Civil Service Commission as to whether a public hearing should not have been had in accordance with Rule III., as the action of the Commission in the opinion of those bodies constituted an amendment to the Civil Service Rules. The communication stated:

"The letter states that it is the opinion of the Commission that the resolution above quoted was not an amendment within the meaning of the above quoted portion of Rule III., and therefore a public hearing was not necessary, the argument being that the rules were merely suspended in a particular case and that no general amendment was intended.

"I agree with the contention of the Municipal Commission that its action in relation to the reinstatement of the men mentioned in your letter was not by virtue of any amendment of any rule of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

"In the Century Dictionary, one of the definitions of the verb 'amend' is 'to make a change or changes in the form of, as a bill or motion, or a constitution'; and one of the definitions of the word 'amendment' is 'in deliberative assemblies, an alteration proposed to be made in the draft of a bill, or in the terms of a motion under discussion.'

"It has been held in the case of Falconer vs. Robinson, 46 Ala., 340, at page 348. that a law is 'amended' when it is in whole or in part permitted to remain and something is added to or taken from it, or it is in some way changed or altered to make it more complete or perfect or to fit it the better to accomplish the object or purpose for which it was made or some other object or purpose.

"It is very evident that where the form of the rule is untouched, no action that

is taken under it can be said to amend it.

"I am, therefore, of the opinion that there was no necessity for your advertising public hearing upon your proposed suspension of the rules under clause 4 of Rule III. of the Municipal Civil Service Rule quoted in your letter.

"In giving you this advice, however, I do not wish it to be considered as passing upon the power of the Municipal Commission to suspend the rule in regard to the reinstatement of men who have been more than a year outside of the City's service, as you have stated has been done."

The Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of the communication to the State Civil Service Commission and the Civil Service Reform Association for their information.

A letter was presented from Sergeant John T. Nilon, President of the Sergeants' Benevolent Association, dated January 28, 1910, stating that the next regular meeting of the Association would be held at Union Square Hall, Borough of Manhattan, at 4 p. m. on Wednesday, February 2, 1910, and that immediately following the transaction of routine business the Association would be glad to receive a representative from the Commission to discuss the methods of rating the examination for promotion to Lieutenant of Police. The Secretary was directed to reply to the letter and state meeting and to suggest that a committee call at the office of the Commission, where the records of the examination were on file, and where illustrations of the method of rating could be given.

On the recommendation of Commissioner Keogh, to whom the matter had been referred for consideration, the proof submitted by Leo Mahler, an applicant for Patrolman, as to the date of his birth, was accepted. The Secretary was authorized to permit the applicant to correct the date of birth given in his application in error.
