

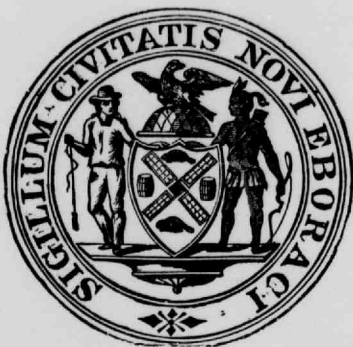

NEW YORK CITY ASYLUM FOR INSANE,  
WARD'S ISLAND, December 12, 1882.

Hon. THOMAS S. BRENNAN, President:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to submit the following report of labor performed by inmates of this institution during the three months ending September 30, 1882:

Printing Bureau—3,500 envelopes, 5,000 wash lists, 5,000 liquor orders, 2,000 daily report blanks, 200 notices on card, 1,500 circulars, 1,000 discharge blanks, 1 ream paper to cut for Dr. L. L. Seaman, 10,000 boat passes, 1,000 transfer blanks, one-half ream note-heads, Md. Board; 1 ream note-heads, Charity Hospital; 5,000 liquor orders, 5,000 extra annual report, Charity Hospital; 60 copies specifications, 4 reams note-paper, 1 ream letter (full sheets), 1 ream letter (half sheets), 2,000 prescription labels, 500 blanks for press, Magistrate; 500 death cards, 500 passes to Almshouse, 500 orders for horseshoeing, 500 business cards, 500 discharges, for Medical Superintendent, R. I.; 3,000 bundle labels, 2 reams note-heads, 2 reams letter-heads, 2,000 ward cards, 1,000 discharge passes, 500 extra copies of Ophthalmic Division, 100 copies of specifications, East Wing; 500 extra copies of report of Training School for Nurses, 5,000 employees' passes, 50 copies of specifications, 700 cards, employees' names, N. Y. City Insane Asylum; 100 notices on card, City Prisons; 5,000 cards, Superintendent Out-door Poor Department; 40,000 prescription blanks, 500 Work-house blanks, Wm. Blake; 25 pages of annual report, 500 tickets for Bellevue, 500 tickets for Lunatic Asylum, 500 tickets for Insane Asylum, 500 tickets for Charity Hospital, 500 tickets for Homeopathic Hospital, 500 tickets for Penitentiary Hospital, 100 copies specifications, 3,000 dock receipts.

Painters—Painting and varnishing the wood-work in main hall, painting and calcimining and varnishing 1 room in centre building; oiling and varnishing office floor; painting the ice and truck house, painting the engine-house outside complete, including 9,000 square feet of roof; priming new work in the new wing; painting 4 dozen spittoons, painting 1 grocer's cart, painting 1 ladder, painting 6 bath tubs; polishing 1 hand-rail in office; painting and varnishing 1 room, centre building; 7 dozen lights of glass put in; glass put in 1 dozen picture frames; 2 coats of paint on fire escapes; painting sashes and frames, new wing, west side; painting 131 window screens and guards; 260 lights of glass put in; oiling and varnishing census boards; sundry jobs in shop; oiling new work in Ward No. 2; painting 24 new iron bedsteads, 2 coats; painting 38 window guards in Ward No. 2; working on emigration fence; painting and varnishing 1 room; painting 1 hall centre building; 260 lights of glass put in Ward No. 2.

Carpenter work—16 new locks put on in different wards; 1 handle for truck in kitchen; 2 new booms for store cart; 1 towel-roller made for Ward No. 14 reception room; shelving put up in pantry, also bread board and spoon box, Ward No. 4; box made for broom shop; new bottom put in ferry-boat and 6 paddles made for same; 3 new wheelbarrows made for out-door improvement. Repairs done during the month: 1 frame for mat maker, 2 table tops for printing office, 3 horses for printing office, 19 picture frames. The balance of time was spent on general repairs in Ward No. 2. 2 walnut boards for attendants' names; 1 census board. The balance of time was spent in general repairs of Ward No. 2. 1 box for truck; 1 box for carrying Workhouse meals; 2 water-closet seats in Annex No. 2; 14 coffins made; new bottom put on swill cart; new medical box for Hospital; new cutting board for printing office; general repairs finished in Ward No. 2; 4 new chestnut doors and casings made and put up; repairs done during rest of time.

Mat shop—119 kittar and cloth mats; 22 dozen brooms. Mason—Plastered 700 yards of brick wall; 2 coats browned and finished in Ward No. 4; made mortar and screened sand for same; 8 new ventilators put in Ward No. 4; 3 registers put in Ward No. 14; hard-finished wall in one room, Ward No. 13; hard-finished wall in 1 room, Ward No. 18; commenced general repairs in Ward No. 2; repaired walls and cut doorway through to fire escape, Ward No. 11; repaired wall in cell, Ward No. 9; hard-finished wall in Ward No. 1; hard-finished wall in Ward No. 5; built areaway and cesspool south end, Ward No. 16; set coping on areaway wall; cut doorway through to fire escape, Ward No. 23; set stone step under fire escape stairs, west yard; completed general repairs and put in 12 new registers in Ward No. 2; lathed and plastered wall in Dr. Egan's room; commenced general repairs in Ward No. 8.

Plumbers—Wash basin in attendant's room, Ward No. 2, repaired, 2 new basin clamps put in; gas-pipe and faucets repaired, Ward No. 6; water-closet repaired and new gas-light put in, Ward No. 7; urinal basin repaired, Ward No. 8; all the burners cleaned out and 1 new three-eight L. burner cock on Ward No. 8; water-closet repaired, Ward No. 10; Wards No. 12 and No. 14 urinals repaired; wash sink repaired, Ward No. 18; made a new connection on main croton-water pipe for water-closet, Ward No. 19; washhouse, 2 new bibb cocks put in, and half dozen ground in, 2 feet two-inch lead pipe in the tubs; 10 feet three-eighth-inch pipe for gas in blacksmith's room; 20 feet three-eighth-inch gas-pipe put in the new office; main sewer cleaned out; Annex, water-pipes repaired and 2 new basin cocks put in; 1 two-inch iron trap put in wash sink, Ward No. 12; urinal basin repaired in Ward No. 14, also basin repaired in yard; water-closet repaired, Ward No. 11; sink repaired, and 1 new pendant cock put on, Ward No. 9; 20 feet three-eighth-inch gas-pipe put in bath-room; 1 swing bracket; gas-pipe repaired, and 1 swing pendant cock put on, Ward No. 21; water-closet repaired, 2 union one-half-inch and axle put in, Ward No. 7; urinal basin repaired, four feet two-inch lead-pipe put in; washhouse, 12 new bibb cocks put in; and in bath-room, 1 new two-inch trap; and 2 quarter bends put in kitchen; 1 new half globe valve put in on the steam boiler, Ward No. 19; Annex, 3 water-closets repaired, 2 feet three-quarter-inch pipe put in cellar, water-pipes repaired, wash basin repaired; 2 argand burners, chimneys and shades put on in Dr. Sayers' room; 4 hand-made two-inch lead traps; Ward No. 11, water-closet repaired, put in 5 feet three-quarter-inch pipe, 2 feet one and a quarter-inch; Ward No. 2, sink in pantry reset, and steam table and gas-pipe repaired; Ward No. 14, lined urinal closet with sheet lead, 6 feet, five pounds per foot; Ward No. 9, sink repaired; and 1 new strainer; Ward No. 7, faucets repaired in bath-room, and gas-pipe repaired in ward; Ward No. 6, gas-pipe repaired in ward; Ward No. 22, gas-burner repaired; Ward No. 2, gas-burner repaired; Ward No. 19, urinal basin repaired; Annex, repaired Croton water-pipes; Ward 16, yard, 20 feet three-quarter-inch pipe for steam return; water-closet in main hall repaired; 2 new basin cocks put in the Steward's office; repaired water at hog pen.

LABOR REPORT FOR QUARTER ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1882.

Engineer—Made steam connection to new mangle in washhouse and connected new Hancock inspirator to boiler; overhauled return steam trap connection in main boiler room; kept in repair all water-closets, bath-tubs, sinks, gas and water pipe, and fixtures in building and pavilions. In the penitentiary removed the six steam kettles from the old to the new kitchen, and made all the steam and water connections; connected Hancock inspirator to the boiler, put in all the steam, water and gas pipes with their necessary connections.

Tinsmith—Made 2 dozen dish pans, 2 dozen wash basins, 13 mess pans, 7 mess cans, 15 candlesticks, 6 galvanized iron garbage pails, 1 galvanized iron sink, 30 match boxes, 20 six-inch elbows, 1 three-inch elbow, 40 joints six-inch stove-pipe, 10 joints three-inch pipe, 1 stand for spirit lamp, 2 fire-pots and grates, 2 grates, 1 cocoa holder; repaired 6 tin cans, 3 dish pans, candlesticks, doctor's douche, roof on main building, tinware for kitchens and wards, 21 stoves put up; made 3 dozen covers and rings for kitchens, 1 dozen galvanized whirligigs.

Carpenters—Made 15 seats for patients, each twelve feet long, 8 benches eight and ten feet long; 14 pairs crutches, 4 foot-rests, 2 bed boxes, 2 medicine closets, 5 lattice doors for staffs' rooms, 1 refrigerator, 20 head-rests, 6 small tables for doctors and wards, grating for urinals, shelving for doctor's rooms, shelving and hat-racks for nurses, 2 bureaus for nurses' rooms; repaired head-rests, foot-rests, chairs, doors, storm doors, bed boxes, bed springs, splints, sash cord in window, stools, shelving, flooring in wards and water-closets, put up storm doors in main building and pavilion, 16 chairs for wards, 34 benches.

Painters—Calculated, grained and painted Catholic library; grained wainscoting in front hall, calculated and painted pavilion O and rooms attached thereto; set 80 lights of glass in various parts of building; painted roofs of Maternity pavilion and cook-house; painted 100 wooden posts with wires attached; painted and calcedimined 3 nurses' rooms, renovated furniture, painted and grained 3 dozen stools, 4 tables, closets, etc.; painted and calcedimined matron's apartments; painted 22 pairs of blinds, and various miscellaneous articles.

Plasterers—Repaired ceiling in main and Chief of Staff's halls, and various parts of building.

Report of Mechanical and other Labor performed by Inmates of Almshouse during the Quarter ending September 30, 1882.

Carpenters—Day work: 15 days' work for bakehouse, 2½ for bathhouse, 50 for Central Office, 21 for Chapel, 7 for Female Hospital, 37½ for General Storekeeper, 5 for House Physician, 1 for Incurable Hospital, 77 for Penitentiary, 2 for Steamboat, 5½ for Steward, 2½ for Steward's Office, 42 for Warden, 2½ for wards and 1½ for washhouse; 6 days' work making card frames, 23½ making coffins, 2 making cutting board, 1½ making foot scrapers, ½ making meat board, 16½ making refrigerators, and 3 making wheelbarrows, 9 days' work repairing bed springs, 6 repairing carts, 17 repairing furniture, 2 repairing piazza and 1 repairing wheelbarrow; filed and set 3 saws; handled 1 cleaver, 3 hammers and 2 pails; headed 29 scrubbrushes; made 2 drop boards, 1 hydrant box and 1 mason's bevel; put in 94 sash cords. Repaired 4 bed springs, 11 bedsteads, 12 chairs, 1 commode, 1 crutch, 3 doors, 1 dumb-water, 1 fence, 1 ladder and 1 refrigerator.

Machinists and Blacksmiths—Made 1 axe, 2 bars, 4 boiler covers, 4 boiler handlers, 1 boiler plate, 1 boiler stand, 139 bolts, 5 braces, 2 buckets, 514 bucket ears, 173 bucket handles, 1 chain, 4 corner irons, 2 fire shovels, 6 gutter irons, 3 grate bars, 3 hasps, 8 hinges, 4 hoes, 3 holdfasts, 58 hooks, 886 hoop nails, 758 horseshoes, 1 link, 42 nails, 14 nuts, 12 pan handles, 1 ring, 590 rivets, 5 slice bars, 28 spikes, 259 spike nails, 1 spindle, 2 squares, 23 staples, 3 straps, 8 tub handles, 2 washers and 2 wedges. Repaired 4 axes, 13 bedsteads, 1 boiler, 10 carts, 1 chain, 31 chisels, 2 cleavers, 3 clinker bars, 20 clocks, 1 cog wheel, 1 damper, 1 gang plank, 1 hand-hole cover, 38 hinges, 3 hoes, 1 hook, 35 locks, 1 poker, 7 rakes, 1 range, 1 row boat, 3 pairs scissors, 6 shovels, 2 slice bars, 24 spike nails, 3 stove wrenches, 1 pair tongs, 1 trestle bar, 14 trucks and 12 wheelbarrows; ironed 1 bridle, 3 pairs hames, 2 tubs and 1 wheelbarrow.

Tinsmiths—Made 128 bake pans, 16 boilers, 73 cans, 3 coffee pots, 960 cups, 14 dippers, 100 dish pans, 12 dust boxes, 12 lunch boxes, 1,000 mess pans, 3 pails, 200 saucers, 1 saucepan, 400 feet of stovepipe, 15 stovepipe elbows, 100 wash basins and 1 water cooler. Repaired 12 boilers, 7 cans, 11 coffee pots, 18 dippers, 4 gas shades, 119 kettles, 2 lanterns, 5 pails, 2 saucepans, 3 teapots and 2 wash basins; lined 2 refrigerators.

Coopers—Made 2 beef barrels, 17 bread barrels, 248 pails and 2 tubs. Repaired 110 beef barrels, 77 bread barrels, 67 lime barrels, 84 pails, 40 tubs and 27 vinegar barrels.

Plasterers and Painters—General repairs.

Tailors—Made 2 suits citizens' clothing, 20 men's aprons, 305 S. jackets, 153 pairs S. pants and 30 vests. Repaired 692 S. jackets, 1,035 pairs S. pants, 65 vests, 637 W. jackets and 520 W. pants.

Shoemakers—Repaired, 346 pairs shoes.  
Sewing and Knitting—Made 2 shirts, 154 shrouds and 397 pairs socks. Repaired, 149 bed-ticks, 12 blankets, 988 chemises, 1,590 dresses, 1,085 petticoats, 29 pillow-cases, 536 sheets, 1,507 shirts, 15 pairs socks, 7 spreads, 430 pairs stockings and 13 undershirts.

LABOR REPORT.

Carpenters—Made closets in pavilions, awning frame for Pavilion A, 16 coffins. Repaired stoops for Pavilions A, B, C, and 4, window blinds of Pavilions 1, 2, 3, 4, and A, bureaus, tables and benches, also keys fitted, 16 lights of glass put in, and attended to all necessary repairing.

Tinsmith—Made 10 tin cans, 8 tin pails, new leaders for pavilion and Physicians' houses. Repaired 15 tin cans, roofs of kitchen, washhouse, pavilions and Physicians' houses, also leaders of pavilions, stoves, also put up stoves, and attended to all the necessary jobbing.

Sewing and Mending—Made 20 shrouds, 50 sheets, 50 nightgowns, 12 dresses, and 20 aprons. Repaired 220 chemises, 149 dresses, 20 petticoats, 14 blankets, 113 nightgowns, 180 shirts, 277 sheets, 99 pillow cases, 28 bed-ticks, and 14 pillow ticks.

Tailor—Repaired; 22 jackets, 17 pairs pants, and kept in repair and good order all of the male clothing of the Institution.

Washhouse—Washing and laundrying done for 275 inmates and employees.

Engineer—Has cleaned out hot and cold water tanks in Pavilions III and E; repaired hot water tank, Pavilion E; put new waste-pipe in kitchen ice-box; cleaned out tank, Pavilion I; cleaned out waste and water pipes in all the pavilions and kitchen; packed pumps, Pavilions D and E; overhauled all the pumps, and put new valves in main pump; put in grate, grate-rest and lining in 90-gallon caldron for laundry; put new lead bottom in cold-water tank, Pavilion III; blowed and cleaned out steam-boiler, and put new washers on hand-hole plate, and put in new gauge glass; repaired cold-water tank Pavilion II, and put mincing machine in working order; tried salt-water connection at various times, and kept fire engine in good order; has also, as occasion required, attended to all necessary repairs of pumps, water-closets, bath tubs, pipes, etc.

Carpenters—Have relaid part of floor of Pavilion E, and boarded up the sides of Pavilions D and E underneath floor; made 23 coffins, clothes box for laundry, and closet in the vegetable room; put in 40 panes glass; repaired and fitted 27 keys; repaired and shingled roofs, overhauled sides and tops of ventilators in pavilions; repaired windows and sashes, and put in new sash cord, as required; made new saddles, refitted and repaired doors of pavilions; hung iron screens in dormitory windows and door, besides attending to all minor repairs in pavilion laundry office, etc.

## CITY PRISON, NEW YORK, October 2, 1882.

The following improvements and repairs have been made at First, Second, Third, Fourth, and Fifth District Prisons from July 1 to September 30, 1882, by prison labor and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction except the cost of the material.

## FIRST DISTRICT PRISON.

The roofs of male and female prisons have been repaired and painted; skylights have been repaired; and a number of new skylights have been built.

The boys' prison, woodwork in cells on third and fourth tiers of male prison, woodwork and bath-room in ten-day houses, the entrance at Warden's Office, and a number of iron railings, have all been painted.

The walls of ten-day house, Magdalen, and wall on Franklin street, have been pointed up with cement—(about 300 yards).

The yard for ten-day men has been paved, new flags in floor of kitchen, and flagging relaid in yard of male prison.

A number of cell doors, and locks on cell doors, have been repaired.

Water pipes in male and female prisons have been frequently repaired, water-closets have been built, and a number of wash-tubs also built.

## SECOND DISTRICT PRISON.

Built a new bin for groceries, and rebuilt fence in prison yard.

## THIRD DISTRICT PRISON.

Repaired water pipes, cell locks, furnace and roof of kitchen.

## FOURTH DISTRICT PRISON.

Repaired locks on cell doors, sashes for windows, built new wash-tubs, and plumbing work, etc.

## FIFTH DISTRICT PRISON.

Repaired water-closet, plumbing work, and repaired gas pipe.
