SIR—Herewith I submit the labor report of the Infants' Hospital ending this date.

#### Carpenters.

Ward 3—Removed and renewed 6 square feet flooring; renewed 6 sash-cords and repaired 6 blinds.

Ward 6—Repaired 8 pairs of blinds.

Wards 7 and 8—Repaired 16 pairs window blinds.

Wards 10 and 12—Removed and renewed with 42 square feet of flooring and casing up water pipes with 16 feet clear pine; put up 16 feet shelving in bath-room and repaired 4 locks and keys.

Ward 13—Removed and renewed 20 square feet flooring in ward, 26 square feet in bath-room and 10 square feet in closet, and repaired 12 pairs blinds.

Ward 14—Taken up flooring for Plumbers and renewing same with 35 square feet of 1-inch spruce; renewed 15 square feet flooring and 12 feet wainscoting in bath room; also boarded ceiling of bath-room, 60 square feet, and repaired 12 pairs blinds.

Ward 17—Renewed with spruce flooring, 300 square feet.

Ward 19—Renewed 20 square feet flooring and encased water pipe 30 feet, ¾-inch clear pine, and laid 45 square feet of 1-inch spruce flooring in bath-room; made and put up 140 feet O. G. moulding, 1½ inches at bottom base board; taken down 16 blinds and boxing water pipes, 22 feet.

Drug Store—Taken down and removed all fixtures and closets formerly used in old drug store into new one, now occupied, and rebuilt and put up same with additional lumber, 80 square feet; made and set in wash-tray, 14 inches by 36 inches, and changed entrance doors.

Removed stairway leading to basement in main hallway, and flooring over same with 40 square feet spruce flooring-boards.

Summer Pavilion—Making general alterations by removing all inclosed ceilings, sides and ends, 780 square feet, and bracing with studs, 75 feet, and putting in seats, 140 square feet, and hanging in 4 small swings for babies' use.

Nurses' Dining Room—Removed flooring in 2 small rooms of same and renewed with 194 square feet of 1-inch spruce, and altered and repaired 16 pairs blinds. In small room, formerly the pantry connected with Nurses' dining room, put up a hard wood partition with two panel doors for closets, 124 square feet, and repaired 4 blinds.

Pavilion G-H—Made and put in 2 framed doors, 3 feet by 7 feet, and also set in 2 doors in this pavilion.

Kitchen and entrance—Altered one double door and put sash in same and made saddle and put in place; made dish tray 16 inches by 36 inches.

Veranda—Renewed 50 square feet with yellow pine flooring; cutting and shaping 50 band iron hoops and 165 wooden hoops for mosquito netting on babies' cribs.

Milk Room—Put new end, 2 feet square, of 2-inch clear pine in bottom of wash-trough and made 4 leg stands for same, and built 3 tiers milk-can rack 40 feet long; repaired 2 closet doors in Store-room, 10 chairs for the several wards, and covered two large tables with oilcloth.

#### Painters.

Nurses' Dining Room—Washed down ceilings, sized and painted in 3 coats; also side walls in 2 coats; ceilings and side walls in 3 small rooms adjoining painted in 3 coats; wainscoting painted in color; varnished and shellacked all woodwork and painted a 6-inch frieze around ceiling and centre piece.

Wards 13 and 14—Washed down side walls and ceilings, and painted same in 3 coats; also 2 bath-rooms; painted sashes and varnished all woodwork in kitchen and hallway leading to same; cleaned and oiled window shutters and frames, and shellacked main stairway leading from first to third floors.

Ward 19—Cleaned, sized and painted ceiling in 3 coats; painted side walls in 2 coats, and ceiling and side walls in pantry; varnished all woodwork in connection with same.

Ward 21—Washed down ceiling and all side walls in this ward and bath-room; sized and painted same in 3 coats and varnished all woodwork; painted 20 bedsteads; shellacked 2 ice-boxes for milk room and kitchen, and painted in 2 coats storm doors, north side entrance; painted 10 window sashes and frames in rear hallway; stained and varnished floor in room on third floor.

#### Plasterers.

Nurses' Dining Room—Pointing up all cracks for Painters and in the three small rooms adjoining.

Ward 13—Pointing up all cracks in ceilings and side walls and around steam table for Painters.

Ward 19—Cutting out cracks and patching for Painters all ceilings and side walls.

Ward 21—Cutting out cracks and patching ceilings and sidewalls for Painters.

Pointing up and patching ceilings of balcony, west end of building; patching and pointing up cracks in small room, formerly used as milk room.

Engineer, Fireman and assistants have been employed in the manufacture of gas consumed on the island; made repairs to the machinery in use at the boiler-house and laundry, and have kept work running in order.

Workhouse men have been employed as helpers in fire-rooms at the boiler-house and gas-works, as laborers on the farm and as drivers at the stables; also as boatmen on the ferry.

Workhouse women have been employed in the Laundry.

SIR—Hereby I submit the labor report for this institution ending this date.

#### North Hospital.

Carpentry—Dressed and put up one girder 6 by 8 inches, 33 feet long, where plaster partition had been removed, and encased it with 105 square feet  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch pine, also encased four iron uprights with 120 square feet  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch pine, and renewed 85 square feet wainscoting, 160 feet baseboards and 80 square feet yellow pine flooring.

Plastering—Removed from ground floor 3 plastered partitions, 450 square feet, converting three small rooms into one for dining-room purposes; removed all loose plaster from walls and ceiling, and renewed, where required, old laths and put in four bundles of new lath.

Plumbing—Repaired closet in Ward 7; removed old gas and water pipes on first floor formerly occupied for store purposes.

#### South Hospital.

Carpentry—Repaired two sashes on veranda of second floor, renewed five sash cords in Ward 1, holes in floor of east hallway plugged up. Repaired locks in Ward 2, and closed doors permanently on east side of building.

Plastering—Patched 12 square feet on ceiling of veranda on first floor, also 35 square feet on ceiling of second floor.

Tinsmithing—Renewed and repaired with 226 sheets tin the gutter and valley of the main roof; cleaned and repaired range and repaired roof over playroom with 8 sheets and painted the same, also the roof of the entire main building.

Plumbing—Made general repairs to water closets, cleaning out stoppages in water-pipe, etc.

#### Wards 11, 12 and Male Attendants' Dormitory.

Carpentry—Made and put in a sash 3 feet square and put up a hand-rail to inside stairway leading from Ward 11 to Ward 12, renewed 18 feet of base board, made and put in a sash frame in door 3 by 4 feet, and renewed 14 balusters on balcony. Made and put in place a wooden seat 4 feet long and 14 inches wide on school sink. Put on a Yale lock on door leading to Ward 11.

Painting—Cleaned down ceilings, sidewalls and all woodwork of Ward 12, and painted same in one coat, cleaned walls and ceilings of the four small rooms, also hallways and stairways in north end of same ward and painted them in two coats; put in 45 panes of glass and painted outside of doors in Ward 11 and Attendants' Dormitory on balconies.

Bricklaying and Masonry—Repaired 70 square feet brick sidewalk in rear of Ward 11.

Plumbing—Cleaned out and repaired main sewer leading from building, put in 2 new bibb faucets. Repaired sink in Attendants' Dormitory; put up 15 feet gas pipe  $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch, and put on brackets in hallway of Ward 12.

Tinsmithing and Roofing—Repaired gutter on roof with 68 sheets of tin, and painted entire roof, 3,000 square feet.

#### Ward 14, Main Dining Rooms and Nurses' Dormitory.

Carpentry—Made and hung gate at head of outside stairway to Ward 14; removed a 270 square feet wooden partition five feet in main dining room and rebuilt same. Removed 8 square feet flooring in each dining room to admit steam-pipes and connections for two steam tables, and replaced same.

Painting—Painted both sides of 270 square feet partition in dining-rooms, also ceilings of balconies on east side of second and third floors.

Masonry and Bricklaying—Repaired 35 square feet of sidewalk on west side of building.

Plastering—Repaired around girders and partition ceiling 8 square feet.

Plumbing—Renewed 30 feet  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch supply pipe, and general repairs to closet in Chaplain's apartments.

Tinsmithing and Roofing—Took down stove and 60 feet pipe, cleaned and put same in good order.

#### Ward 15.

Carpentry—Repaired three locks and two small tables.

Plumbing—Put in four new bibb faucets.

Roofing and Tinsmithing—Put up a 35 feet four-inch leader in rear of building.

#### Quarantines—Wards 17, 18, 19.

Tinsmithing and Roofing—Renewed portion of roof with 148 sheets of tin and painted entire roof, 540 square feet.

Laboring—Grading of grounds around the three.

#### Wards 21, 22, 23, 24 Building.

Carpentry—Repaired 31 ventilators, 4 shades and 2 sash cords in Wards 21, 23 and 24; made 3 small commode chairs for Ward 24; inclosed for plasterer's use, in the basement of Ward 23, 2 archways, 80 square feet.

Plastering—Renewed 15 square feet, also 18 square feet, and 13 square feet of plaster in the bathrooms of Wards 22, 23, 24.

Plumbing—Renewed 15 feet of  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch pipe to tank in basement, and put in 30 feet  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch pipe for blow-off; repairing leak in waste-pipe in Ward 22; repaired closet and waste-pipe in Ward 23.

Laboring—Cleaning out cellar of Ward 22.

#### Wards 25, 26, 27, 28 Building.

Carpentry—Repaired 17 ventilators in Wards 26, 27, 28, and put up 85 hat and coat hooks in same wards; removed 615 square feet of flooring for plumbers to repair and clean gas-pipes, and replaced same.

Plastering—Repaired 9 square feet of plastering in Ward 27.

Bricklaying—Relining for box of horizontal boiler in basement of Ward 28 with fire brick.

Plumbing—Cleaned out and overhauled horizontal tubular boiler, also valves and pipe belonging to same in basement of Ward 28, and general repairs to closets, cleaning out stoppages of waste-pipes, etc.

#### Pavilion A, B, C Building.

Carpentry—Removed 3 broken posts, also 40 feet of hand rail and 30 square feet of flooring of south balcony, and replaced same with 3 new posts 6 x 8 inches, 25 feet long, 16 feet headers 4 x 8 inches long, also with new hand rails, balusters and flooring; repaired 8 chairs, 3 doors and 6 locks.

Painting—Painted 118 feet wainscoting, 3 feet 6 inches high, in closets, also the hand rails, balusters and posts of the three balconies, 6 doors and 45 double sashes.

Plastering—Renewed 8 square feet of plaster in Pavilion B.

Plumbing—Repaired and cleaned 110 feet  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch pipe of closets in Pavilions A and B; put in 2 new bibb faucets in Pavilion A.

Tinsmithing and Roofing—Removed and cleaned 40 feet 6-inch stove-pipe; repaired roof with 62 sheets of tin, and painted same; removed 2 old 4-inch leaders and replaced same with new ones of same size on front of building.

#### Pavilion F Building.

Carpentry—Built a 240 square feet partition in rear end of playroom to make a separate apartment for chair patients, and removed a 180 square feet partition which formerly inclosed a pantry; renewed 22 sash cords, and made 1 dish tray 3 feet square.

Painting—Washed down side walls and ceiling of playroom, 40 x 90 feet, and whitewashed same; painted the wainscoting of same 4 feet high, and painted 152 panes of glass in green, also 25 double sashes and window frames.

Plastering—Repaired 18 square feet of plastered wall.

Plumbing—Put in 6 new bibb faucets; removed sink and all connections from former pantry, and put up same in the adjoining room and made all proper connections for same; cleaned out stoppages in waste-pipes on second and third floors.

Tinsmithing and Roofing—Renewed south end of playroom extension roof with 102 sheets of tin, and painted entire roof, 90 x 40 feet; repaired roof of main building with 118 sheets of tin and painted same; and removed stove from first to third floor in place of old "Rotunda" stove, and removed the latter.

#### Pavilion G Building.

Carpentry—Erected a 9 square feet partition to enlarge Nurses' room; put in 2 new steps at entrance; removed and replaced for Plumber 10 square feet of flooring; repaired 5 sashes and renewed 10 sash cords and 4 door locks.

Painting—Painted 170 square feet of partition, one coat, also a 150 square feet partition in Nurses' room, and entire outside of the building, 27 x 180 feet, in two coats, including 28 sashes and 4 doors; painted in two coats 950 square feet of shelving and 17 bins in storeroom.

Plumbing—Put in one new bibb faucet; removed and disconnected wash sink and bath tub, and cleaned out main earthen sewer-pipe.

#### Dormitory 2 Building.

Carpentry—Made one wardrobe, 2 x 6 feet, 1 foot deep, for Attendant's room.

Plumbing—Put in 2 new bibb faucets; cleaned out waste-pipe and made general repairs to closet.

#### Feeble Minded School Building.

Carpentry—Made and put in two window frames, 3 x 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  feet, and 8 inches deep in basement wall; removed and rebuilt 165 feet of picket fence; put in new board 12 square feet over bath tub

on second floor; renewed 18 square feet of flooring; put up wall strip 4 inches wide, 11 feet long; renewed 90 feet of board fence, 75 feet of picket fence, and 38 sash cords.

Painting—Painted summer house, 16 x 24 feet, two coats, and 320 running feet of picket fence. Masonry and Bricklaying—Cut two openings, 40 x 22 inches, in basement wall for light and ventilation; took down and rebuilt chimney leading from main boiler on roof, and relined 30 square feet of fire-box of boilers with fire brick.

Plumbing—Repaired 50 feet of 1-inch bursted water pipe in basement; laid and connected 10 feet of 2-inch lead pipe; made connection and laid 45 feet of  $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pipe from pumps through basement to furnish water for sprinkling lawns and flower beds of the surrounding grounds; put in 2 new gaskets; thoroughly overhauled 1 boiler and all valves; repacked all of the latter and overhauled steam pumps; put in 1 new gasket and steam trap to same; repaired 45 feet of 1  $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch discharge pipe leading from pumps, and 8 feet of 2-inch discharge pipe from boilers; put in a closet in basement.

Laboring—Dug 13 holes for fence posts; leveled rear grounds with screened ashes, and removed large tree stump from lawn in front of building.

#### Kitchen and Laundry Building.

Carpentry—Made and set in trench 80 feet of 2-inch spruce plank for boxing steam-pipes at main boiler-room, and boxed in with 1  $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch spruce 185 feet steam-pipe from kitchen basement to main dining rooms to supply 2 steam tables; renewed portion of roof with 64 square feet of boards; made and put up a 240 square feet partition in sewing room over Laundry; built and set up 300 clothes bins; repaired 6 door knobs and locks in Workhouse Women Dormitory.

Painting—Painted 300 clothes bins in two coats, and numbered the same; also gave all the woodwork in sewing room two coats, including a 240 square feet partition on both sides.

Bricklaying and Masonry—Renewed, repointed and reset in cement 55 feet of coping stone on top of fire wall, also 15 pavement flags at main entrance to Laundry; repaired 40 square feet pavement leading to Grammar School; put cement around 185 feet of steam-pipe in trench leading from main kitchen basement to main dining rooms.

Plastering—Renewed 30 square feet of plastering in linen room.

Plumbing—Put in a 1-inch return supply-pipe from drying coil to the hot-water tank, 50 feet, also a cold-water supply  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch pipe to tank, and connected reliefs with one trap and one check valve, and 30 feet of iron pipe; cleaned out waste-pipes from kitchen; repaired all valves; built and put in 46 feet of brass pipe with 12 return bends in hot-water tank under kitchen; repaired closet in main boiler room; made necessary repairs and thoroughly cleaned large locomotive boiler, and put in 7 new gaskets and sliding door in sheet-iron smoke-stack; put in 2 new  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch valves on blow-off pipes of washing machines; put in a new 1  $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch pipe as a main from boiler house under the kitchen, connecting same with two branches, one 45 feet long of  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch pipe, and the other 40 feet long, of  $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pipe, including one of 1  $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch, and two of 1-inch, and 2 of  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch valves, and one steam trap, to the two main dining-rooms; set up 2 steam tables in the same rooms, and made all necessary connections with the foregoing supply pipes; put in 2 new valves in supply-pipe of large boilers.

Tinsmithing and Roofing—Repaired roof over kitchen with 65 sheets new tin, and put on new roof over laundry, using 240 new sheets tin, and painted same; tinned ceiling over stove in laundry.

#### Superintendent's Cottage.

Bricklaying and Masonry—Cut hole in flag for coal chute to basement; laid 170 square feet of concrete walk, also 250 square feet of flagging and 65 feet of curbing; removed and rebuilt chimney from roof peak, 8 feet high.

Plumbing—Laid 110 feet of  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch pipe from main, to furnish water for sprinkling lawns, flower beds, etc.; overhauled and cleaned out boilers, registers, valves, fire-box, and entire steam-heating apparatus, and repaired same with 10 feet of  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch return pipe.

Labor—Made 480 feet stone and earth road leading from main road to rear of cottage for delivering fuel in basement, and assisting to lay flags around cottage.

#### Miscellaneous.

Carpentry—Built in sections a meat refrigerator 6 feet deep, 6 feet wide and 8 feet high, with 4-inch walls filled with charcoal, exterior made of yellow pine, 6 x 1  $\frac{1}{4}$  inches, with two swinging and one dropping ash paneled doors, with brass strap hinges and trimmings, interior lined with  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch yellow pine; removed same to Infants' Hospital and put it together in a room off kitchen, finished interior with ice racks, shelves and hanging hooks; also built in same manner and removed to same building, in milk room, one milk refrigerator 6  $\frac{1}{2}$  feet long, 6  $\frac{1}{2}$  feet wide and 3 feet deep, with 4-inch solid walls, exterior finished with 6 x 1  $\frac{1}{4}$  inches yellow pine; interior of same, two dropping and swinging doors with heavy brass strap hinges and trimmings, inside fitted with shelves for butter, etc., also with ice rack; built 45 feet racks for draining milk cans in same room; covered 47 small tables for wards with oil cloth; made 12 medicine boxes 14 inches long, 10 inches wide and 4 inches deep; removed three old 4 x 10 beams and uprights of platform, replaced them with new ones, and rebuilt platform at ice-house; repaired two ice runs, and braced same with 2-inch spruce planks.

Painting—Painted 4 swings at Infants' Hospital, and gave one coat of green to 1 3-5 miles of twisted wire ribbon fencing; painted 42 small and 7 large tables; cleaned ceilings and sidewalls of Pavilion H, and calcimined same.

Bricklaying and Masonry—Built 40 square feet stone foundation around extension of tailor shop; cut 2 openings, 3 x 7 feet, through brick partition for doors in Pavilion H; set 4 stone steps and 35 square feet flagging at entrance to kitchen of Infants' Hospital, and concreted with cement the floor of ice house, 60 square feet, 4 inches deep, in Infants' Hospital; took down to roof and rebuilt 1 chimney on Office Building; repaired brick wall 85 square feet, leading from Ward 15 to Pavilion A, B, C; 60 square feet north of Grammar School Building, and 40 square feet leading from kitchen and laundry to Grammar School.

Plastering—Renewed 27 square feet plaster wall in rear of first floor in Grammar School Building; jobbing and pointing up holes in walls and ceilings of several halls, wards, pavilions and dormitories, including old Pavilion G. H. I.

Plumbing—Made trough 4 feet by 2 feet in milk room of Infant's Hospital for washing milk cans, and put same in place; made new connections for two bath tubs in Infants' Hospital; made connection of 2-inch pipe 12 feet long, and 20 feet of 1  $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch, and 1 globe valve with steam-pipe from boiler room to laundry, to make a temporary steam apparatus for disinfecting and clothing from quarantined wards.

Tinsmithing and Roofing—Lined milk and meat refrigerators and troughs at Infants' Hospital with 164 square feet galvanized iron; made and put up a new 5-inch smoke stack 6 feet high, with cap, at waiting room of Boat-house; relined two mess boxes, one 18 inches by 18 inches by 3 feet, the other 14 inches by 14 inches by 2 feet with zinc; repaired 2 feet of 4-inch leader pipe at Main Office.

Laboring—Cutting and laying 250 square feet of sod at north and west sides of Infants' Hospital; spading and sowing 300 square feet of ground south of Laundry building, and making 9 flower beds; clearing off and leveling dumping grounds; covered main road on north side of island 3,000 feet long with coal ashes and cinders.

General Repairs—Leveled and graded all roads, and various other labor in removing bedsteads, filling beds, supplying coal and ice from dock to boiler-houses, wards, etc., and delivering meals and other supplies, removing ashes, garbage, etc.

#### Work Done by Engineer.

Hall 1—Repaired hot water pipe, also valve on Croton supply to cistern of water-closet.

Hall 3—Repaired valve on Croton supply to cistern on water-closet, cleaned out waste pipe and repaired leader pipe.  
Hall 4—Repaired hot water pipe and window guards, also cleaned out waste-pipe of water-closet and sink.  
Hall 5—Repaired hot water pipe and cleaned out waste-pipe of sink and water-closet, also cleaned trap of sewer pipe.  
Hall 6—Regulated ball cock in cistern over water-closet and repaired hot water faucet.  
Hall 7—Repaired hot water pipe and cleaned out waste-pipe of water-closet and sink.  
Hall 8—Regulated ball cock in cistern over water-closet, and disconnected ball cock from pipe in tank.

#### LABOR REPORT.

Of the male patients, a daily average of 160 have been engaged, as follows; 24 in kitchens, 9 in laundries, 6 driving and in stables, 1 tailoring, 1 in Attendants' dining-room, 2 in offices, 1 in drug-store, 2 in store-room, 4 in boiler-room, 1 in carpenter-shop, 1 in blacksmith-shop, 6 in bake-shop, 1 in tin-shop, 16 on farm, 1 plastering, 3 painting, 7 road-making, 2 mattress-making, 30 in pavilions, 2 as help for Medical Staff and Officers, 10 working on sea-wall, 30 unloading and drawing coal, unloading and packing ice, removing freight from dock, burying swill, removing ashes, drawing coal to engine-room, delivering bread, stores and ice to pavilions, mowing lawns, and keeping the grounds around the pavilions clean.

Of the female patients, a daily average of 676 have been engaged in the following manner: house-work, sewing and knitting, 484; in the laundry, 80; in the cutting-room, 5; in the vegetable cellar, 14; teasing hair, 60; in the general dining-room, 9; out-door scrubbing, 15; as help for Medical Staff and Officers, 9.

187,956 pieces have been laundered during the quarter.

39,107 articles of clothing and bedding have been repaired, and 4,809 articles made.

Repaired—Shirts, 1,237.

The Engineer, Plumbers, Firemen and Assistants have put new sewer pipes in Pavilions 1, 2, A and E; extended sewers of Pavilions 4, 2, C, laundry and kitchen; put new hoppers and cisterns in 4 pavilions; put new faucets in Pavilions 4, 5, A, C and E and Hitching's heaters in Pavilions 2 and 4, North Hospital; put water supply in bakery; put up engine in laundry; cleared out horizontal boilers; renewed blow-off pipe of boiler No. 2; repaired boilers in kitchen, water-pipes in Pavilion 2, radiators in Pavilion 1, suction pipe to salt-water pump, steam-pipes in kitchen and Pavilion 5; hoisted coal on dock 8 days; worked on electric lights and wires 17 days and cleared waste-pipes of sinks, water-closets and bath-tubs of all pavilions.

The Blacksmith made 12 handles for ash-cans, 48 bolts, hook for derrick and 44 wedges for Stone Mason; repaired 3 plows, 4 trucks, 2 carts, 1 wagon, fire tools for boiler-room, roofs of laundry, bakery, Pavilions C and 9, stove pipes in Pavilions C, 1, 4, 8 and 9, and 275 pointers and 90 drills for Mason; put up stoves in Pavilions 2, 4, 8 and 9, stove pipe in dining room and 2 boilers in kitchen, North Hospital; cut up old gas tank; took down 9 ventilators in Pavilions 5, stoves in Pavilions 1, 2 and 3 and cleared out stove pipes in different pavilions at North Hospital.

The Tinsmith worked 27 days on roof of laundry; made 2 ventilators, 47 feet stove pipe, 4 elbows, 1 can, 4 ash-cans, new bottoms for 32 cans and 1 large water can for kitchen; repaired 2 water coolers, 12 cans, stove pipes in Pavilion 2 and stoves in Pavilion 6; put up stove pipe for range in kitchen; repaired ice-box in kitchen and kept all tinware in repair.

The Stone Mason and Assistants built 4,340 cubic feet of sea wall; built 200 cubic feet of stone-work for 2 flights of steps and put up same; laid 300 cubic feet concrete and cement floor for ice-house and cut a door 5 x 8 feet for same; put down 80 cubic feet foundation for engine in laundry and laid 60 feet 6-inch pipe for dining room of Pavilion 5 through sea wall.

The Carpenter and Assistants laid 2,800 square feet yellow pine flooring in Pavilion 2; made and put up 13 yellow pine steps for stoop 6 feet long 12 by 1/2 inch; made 6 walnut water closet rings, 2 pine water closet seats 4 feet long, 1 pine water closet seat 7 feet long; framed floor timbers and made ice box for ice house; made 60 feet box casing for sewer pipes, 9 sets of mosquito frames for Hospital, and 20 pine coffins; changed shelving in general store room and made new pine counter tops; made and put in place 1 door frame for mattress shop; removed partition in dining room, North Hospital; repaired 20 pairs window blinds with new slats; placed iron bars on 30 windows; replaced 20 pairs new window sashes for old ones; put handles in 3 ice picks; covered dining-room tables in all pavilions with oil cloth; cased in with pine 80 feet of steam and water pipe; laid new floor on 2 outside stoops; cased up water tank; put up Fairbank's scale in kitchen; repaired 4 doors with new panels and replaced 2 new doors for broken ones; put new sash cord in 30 pairs windows; put on 10 new pass locks and repaired 18 old ones; put on 12 wardrobe and 5 drawer locks; repaired 2 coal carts and kept all furniture, etc., in repair.

The Painter and Assistants painted a room in Physicians' quarters, Attendants' rooms in Pavilion A, new doors, bedsteads, pantries, dish closets, ceilings, walls and wainscoting of water rooms in Pavilion 4, leaders of Pavilion 1, windows and doors of kitchen, bath-tubs in Pavilions 1, 2, 3 and E, mosquito-frames for Pavilions 3 and C, hall and access hall of Pavilion E, south hall of Pavilion 5, stoop of Pavilion 2 and walls and ceilings of kitchen and rooms at North Hospital; lettered the small row boat; repaired paint in all pavilions and put in window lights where required.

The Plasterer cut brick wall in ice-house for joists; repaired the plastering of the walls and ceilings in Engineer's quarters and in all pavilions at the North and South Hospital.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT CHAPTER 697, Laws of 1894, authorizes the Commissioner of Street Cleaning to grant permits for the temporary occupancy of portions of the streets and public places in the City of New York, from 4 P. M. until 8 A. M., and on Sundays and legal holidays only, by unlicensed licensed trucks or other unlicensed licensed vehicles owned by residents of the City of New York who have the consent of the owner or lessee of the abutting property upon the condition that the owners of trucks or vehicles for which such permits are issued shall keep the street clean under and around said trucks or vehicles, and subject to such other rules and conditions as the said Commissioner may from time to time prescribe, which permits the said Commissioner may at any time revoke.

Such permits will not be granted for either side of a street contiguous to a public building of the City and County of New York, or a church, school-house, hospital, asylum or other incorporated benevolent institution, or a licensed place of amusement, or for the following named streets and public places:

Bowery, Broadway, Carmine street, Catharine street, Chambers street, Christopher street, College place, Cortlandt street, Desbrosses street, Essex street, Exchange place, Fulton street, Hester street, Hudson street, Liberty street, Nassau street, New street, Park Row, Varick street, Wall street, West Broadway.  
Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street), Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).

Or for any streets under the control of the Department of Parks, Docks and Public Works, except upon the consent of the heads of those Departments.

All existing permits for the occupancy by unlicensed vehicles of any of the streets or portions of streets or places enumerated above are hereby revoked.

All unlicensed wagons, trucks or other vehicles standing in the streets or public places, other than those for which permits have been issued and which are in compliance with the conditions of the same will be seized and removed to the Corporation Yards of the Department of Street Cleaning, in pursuance of the provisions of the law.

Each bid or estimate shall contain and state the name and place of residence of each of the persons making the same; the names of all persons interested with him or them therein; and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. *Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.*
