

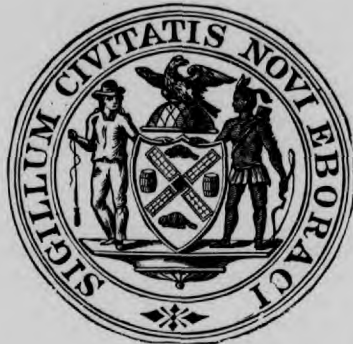

That the use of said premises as a stable and dwelling be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filthy saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom.

13th. Certificates for the vacating of certain premises:

Whereas, the Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot north side Seventy-second street, second house west of East river, has become dangerous to life, and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing thereof;

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot north side Seventy-second street, second house west of East river, be required to vacate said building on or before September 20, 1894, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing thereof; and further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building and be served as the law requires, under the direction of Dr. Charles F. Roberts, the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot No. 53 West One Hundred and Fourteenth street has become dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the drainage thereof;

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 53 West One Hundred and Fourteenth street be required to vacate said building on or before September 25, 1894, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the drainage thereof; and further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building and be served as the law requires, under the direction of Dr. Charles F. Roberts, the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Roberts, the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot north side of One Hundred and Sixteenth street, beginning three hundred and twenty-five feet west of Lenox avenue and extending fifty feet west, has become dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the drainage thereof;
