The books containing the assessment roll of real and personal estate for 1900, daly certified, were delivered to the Municipal Assembly on the 2d day of July, as required by section 907 of the Greater New York Charter.

Upon delivery of said looks in the Municipal Assembly advertisements were inserted in newspapers and in the City Record, as required by law, for a period of fifteen days, that said assessment rolls were open for inspection at the office of the City Clerk, and during that period and up to the present time we have been served with two bundred and sixty write of certificari to review our action in the matter of the assessment of property of various corporations and individuals. These are one hundred and ten less than last year, and this decrease would be greater but for the ambiguity of the Franchise Tax Law, to which many of the proceedings are dustriantly of the franchise Tax Law, to which many of the proceedings are dustriantly of the assessment rolls to the Municipal Assembly a request was made and communicated to us, as follows:

Whereas, The tax and assessment rolls having been finally submitted to the Municipal Assembly, and as cets, and by virtue of law, anthorizes and requests the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, by themselves, and such clerical assistance as may be at their disposal, but without expense to the City, to cause to be properly estimated and computed the taxes to be imposed under and by virtue of said rolls, and to cause the said estimation and computation to be properly set down and extended in the said tax or assessment rolls or books, to cause the item of said taxes to be carefully added, and set down the amount of the same in the said rolls or books, and to perform such other duties connected with the said tax or assessment rolls or books as the unde

In compliance with such request the Commissioners caused the work of the extension of said tax to be performed by the clerical force of the Department, and without additional expense to

the City.

For such purpose the books containing the assessment roll were received from the Municipal Assembly on the 25th day of August and returned to said Board, with the computation and extension of the tax completed, on September 25.

A synopsis of the following tables shows that of the total tax payable, \$82,539,197,59, real estate paya \$71,758,392,39 and personal estate pays \$10,780,805.09. The real estate includes the franchise tax, amounting to \$4,969,748.58, of which one-third is on property assessable by this Department prior to the passage of the Franchise Tax Law.

The matter is now pending before the Municipal Assembly, having been presented at a meeting of the Council on November 20, 1900, and referred to the Committee on Water Supply.

The other halves of the piers, together with the bulkhead between and the intervening Pier 13, belong to the City and are lessed to the Central Railroad of New Jersey. When the department acquires the private interests, the property is to be improved in accordance with the new plan by building two new modern piers and 346 feet of stone bulkhead-wall, with a marginal street 180 feet wide. When the improvement is completed it can be leased to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey at an advance over the present rental large enough to amortise the bonds issued to pay for the improvements.

"The bulkhead-wall on West street has been built as far south as Cortlandt street and the street widened. An agreement has been made with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for the improvement of us property at the foot of Curtlandt street, in accordance with the plan for the permanent improvement of West street. The Pennsylvania Railroad's property is immediately north of the property which it is proposed to take in the above condemnation proceedings, and when improved, the improvement of West street must be stopped until this property is acquired. These half piers on the East river have been acquired by the department, or are in process of condemnation, except one at Jackson street, an agreement for the purchase of which is now being prepared by the Corporation Counsel."

The assessed valuation, as given in the stement above, refers to more property than that proposed to be condemned, and an apportionment of the same would be as follows:

I am of the opinion, however, that the market value of these two half piers will greatly exceed the assessed valuation as given.

It appears to me that, to carry on the general improvement of the water front, it is necessary that these two half piers should be acquired, and that it would be to the advantage of the City to commence condomnation praceedings at an early date, and I would therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the initiation of such proceedings by the Corporation Counsel, as required pursuant to chapter 284 of the Laws of 1900.

PUBLIC SCHOOL 136, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

This new school building is to be created on the north side of Fourth avenue, between Fortieth and Forty first streets, on a plot having a frontage of 200 aret on Fourth avenue, 150 feet on Fortieth and Forty first streets.

The building is planned to front on each of the three streets, setting about 25 feet back from Fourth avenue, and will be 171 feet long by 61 feet deep, with entrances from each street.

The rear of the lot, extending back 75 feet, will be divided into playgrounds for boys and wirks

girls The structure will be four stories high, and of firerproof construction throughout. The exterior parties, as far as the first story window-sills, will be limestone, and above this line, of red brick with buil terra-cotta triumings. A hipped root, covered with state, will start from a line somewhat helow the ceiling of the fourth story, and the dormer windows will project above

I'me somewhat below the ceiling of the fourth story, and the dormer windows will project above the caves line of same.

The basement is arranged for the accommodation of a boiler and coal room, and for boys' and girls playrooms, which are wainscoted with glazed brick and floored with sephalt.

The first story will provide for a reception-room, Frincipal's room, teachers' room and eight class-rooms. The front vestibule and reception-room will have a paneled wainscot and tile floors, and the floors of corridors and stair halls will be asphalted.

The second story will be given up entirely to class-rooms and rooms for the teathers.

On the third floor, along the Fourth avenue front, is a gymnasium occupying a space about 22 feet wide and 70 feet long. The balance of this floor is arranged for class-rooms.

On the fourth floor the assembly room occupies the central part of the building, leaving space for four class-rooms, making, in all, a total of twenty-six class-rooms.

The wardrubes are placed between the class-rooms, easily accessible and well ventilated. Sanitary accommodations are provided for children of both series on each floor, and abundant facilities for obtaining drinking water are supplied.

The building will be heated by means of the Plenum system, which provides for each child 30 cubic feet of warm, fresh air per ninute; also providing for the removal of the foul air.

The furnitare will be of the most modern, adjustable type, while the sanitary appliances will also be of the most approved and modern style.

Bonds for the exection of the Girl's High School have already been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and I see no reason why the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may not be given.

On the westerly side of the basement has been provided a natatoring with a plunge bath, 42 text long by 21 feet wide, shower baths, dreming-rooms, tollet accommodations, etc. On the northesity side of the basement there has been provided a locchroom sufficiently large to afford ample accommodations for the sudents, while the heating and ventilating apparatus has been so placed beneath the auditorium that the operation thereof will not in any way roudlet with the use of the balance of the basement.

The auditorium in the first story is 65 feet with by 100 feet long, exclusive of the stage, which is 16 feet by 40 feet. Additional scating accommodations are provided in the gallery, which bring the total number of sittings up to 1,200.

In extedividing the various cories it has not been possible to accurately proportion the sizes of the several rooms, owing to the fact that the principal for the school has not yet been effected. The spaces have therefore been planned to provide twenty-three (23) section-rooms of slightly more than the regulation size, and fifteen (15) rooms capable of subdivision into two or more section rooms or for fitting up as laboratories, include rooms, banking-offices, etc., these being exclusive of the large library, principal's and secretary's offices, etc., on the first story and the ward-role, laboratory-teoms, etc., which are distributed throughout the entire structure.

I think the location selected by the President is suitable for the object to be attained, being central to the region from which patients may come, and easily accessible by trolley cars.

In my opinion, however, the President, in saking for a space of 199 fast 10 inches on Leone avenue extending easterly 400 fact on One Hundred and Thirty-saxin and One Hundred and Thirty-saxint streets is in excess of the present requirements, and those of the many years in the interes.

Gouverneur Hospital, lately constructed, capable of providing for 100 patients, is L shaped, side of the L being 120.33 feet and the other 140.78 feet, giving a room area on each flour

one Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets he 85 feet, there will be a room area on each floor of about 9.500 square feet.

A building of this size, it appears to me, would be sufficient for the accommodation of 150 patients, the number mentioned by the President.

In the Gouverneur Hospital there are administration quarters, besides 16 rooms for physi-

clams and corses.

Besides the hospital proper, certain outhouses will be necessary, enumerated by the President as "administration quarters, ambulance stable, laundry and lodging for help." For all these items I would add 125 test on each street in the space above given, 85 fees for the wings of the bospital, making, in all, 210 feet on the streets, the total assessed valuation of which is \$94,000.

This is extensive property, the less on Launx avenue, 85 feet in depth, being assessed on the tax books at \$0,000 each for the corner loss, and \$50,000 each for the inferior lots, and the lots on One Hundred and Thurty-sixth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets at \$4,000 per lot.

Under condemnation proceedings past experience has proven that for property acquired by the City awards are frequently made as high as twice the assessed valuation. Upon this basis the cust would be \$188,000.

If it should be considered necessary to provide for the acquisition of the full plot of 400 feet in depth asked for by the President, I would state that the probable rost of the 190 feet additional to what I have before recommended, and which is assessed at \$60,800, which, on the same basis of calculation as above, amounts to \$122,000, making the cost of the entire plot—199 feet to lackes by 400 feet—approximately \$310,000. feet to inches by 400 feet-approximately \$310,000.

That the entire cost and expense of said proceedings and of the land taken thereunder should be borne and paid by The City of New York, and that the title shall vest four mouths after the follows of the caths of the Commissioners of Estimate who may be appointed by the Supreme Court.

The valuation of such real estate, as assessed for purposes of taxation, amounts to \$125,000. The object of these resolutions, as stated, is to arquire title to all of the land on the block bounded by Southern Boulevard, Brown place, East One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Willis avenue, and to construct thereon an inclined approach from a point in the Southern Boulevard, about goo feet assertly from Willia avenue to the Willia Avenue Bridge, on the north side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street.

From the plans for this approach, as prepared by the Department of Bridges, it appears that such approach will not require a strip of land more than 75 feet in width, extending along the northerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, from Willia avenue to a point 334 feet easterly therefrom, and then curving to the left on the arc of a circle to connect with the Southern Boulevard at grade.

The block which it is proposed to condema, contains 65.6 city law, or almost four acres, and the land necessary for the physical construction of the approach would be but one-quarter of this amount, leaving the remaining land for park or plans purposes.

A rough estimate of the cost of the structure and land would be not less than \$550,000.

In my opinion, it is desirable to have a second approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge on the Break side of the river, for the reason that the Port Morris Datrict is now occupied by extensive manufacturers, and a rapid and steady increase will, in all probability, follow the completion of

this approach.

I do not, however, see the necessity of acquiring title to the catire block, but only so much of the same as is necessary for the physical construction of this approach.
