PARTY WALLS AND FENCES, WHEN EXISTING AGAINST ADJACENT PROPERTY NOT SOLD, SHALL NOT BE TAKEN DOWN. ALL FURRINGS, PLASTER, CHIMNEYS, PROJECTING BRICK, ETC., ON THE FACES OF SUCH PARTY WALLS ARE TO BE TAKEN DOWN AND REMOVED. THE WALLS SHALL BE MADE PERMANENTLY SELF-SUPPORTING, BEAM HOLES, ETC., BRICKED UP, AND THE WALL POINTED AND MADE TO EXCLUDE WIND AND RAIN AND PRESENT A CLEAN EXTERIOR. THE ROOFS AND ADJACENT BUILDINGS SHALL BE PROPERLY FLASHED AND PAINTED AND MADE WATERPROOF WHERE THEY HAVE BEEN DISTURBED BY THE OPERATIONS OF THE CONTRACTOR.
