DEPARTMENT OF PLANT AND STRUCTURES.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED MARCH 31, 1918.

During the quarter the bridges under the jurisdiction of the Department were maintained in effective condition, including the prompt removal of snow.

BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

Work was continued on the reconstruction of south roadway. Parts of steel work under roadway floor which are not to be retained were removed and 310 new steel I beam stringers were erected. At close of quarter there remained only 52 panels in which new stringers are to be erected.

Four cable posts on Brooklyn end span and four counterbars on main span were repaired. The upper chord pins and pin plates were renewed at the four points where counterbars were repaired. Repairs were made to suspender at panel point 87, cable C on Brooklyn end span, and a new suspender rod was put in place at panel point 104, cable D, on easterly half of main span.

In the Manhattan and Brooklyn stations column bases were removed, cleaned, the bottoms of the columns painted and bases replaced and filled with concrete.

The work of snow removal was all done by the regular department employees, on account of lack of emergency labor.

MANHATTAN BRIDGE.

Work on contract for improvement of southerly portion of Manhattan plaza was completed. Amount of contract was \$113,168.42. There are three surface car loops at this portion of the plaza, of which the most westerly loop is being used by Manhattan Bridge Three Cent Line as its Manhattan terminal. Space is also provided for additional loops, and it would add to facilities of the traveling public if arrangements were made for operation over the bridge and into this terminal of surface railway cars of Brooklyn Rapid Transit System.

Repairs were made to roadway railings at various places; an electric light lamp-post at Nassau st.; to fire pipe line on east side of structure; and to water connections to park spaces on easterly side of Brooklyn plaza.

The steel stairway in east side of Manhattan arch was removed to provide space for Division Office, which will be transferred the latter part of April from leased quarters at 121 Canal st., Manhattan, to quarters in the arch. This will effect a saving in rental of \$420 per annum.

WILLIAMSBURG BRIDGE.

Work was continued by departmental labor on removing old cable covering and rewrapping cables with new steel wire. On main span fourteen panels of most northerly cable and two panels of cable adjacent thereto were wrapped. Total amount of cable wrapped at end of quarter is approximately 2,300 feet, all on the two northerly cables, main span. About 900 feet of scaffold were removed from parts of these two cables where wrapping had been completed. About 370 feet of scaffold were erected under other parts, from which to continue wrapping work.

On March 25 work was commenced on removing old standstone block pavement on north roadway on Brooklyn approach. This will be replaced with granite block pavement by departmental labor.

Steel columns, floor beams and braces were fabricated and erected in building located on northerly side of Kent Avenue Yard, in preparation for use of building as a department shop. The building has been erected by private parties, at no cost to the City, for use in connection with sewage disposal, but its use for that purpose was abandoned and the building is now the property of the City.

On Jan. 9 the New York Consolidated Railroad Company commenced operation on the elevated tracks of the bridge of its new type of cars, which are ten feet wide, sixty-seven feet four inches long and have a capacity, fully loaded, of 270 persons. The company constructed safety platforms on north and south sides of the elevated tracks along the Brooklyn approach for protection of trackmen working on the structure. These platforms are placed 100 feet apart on each side and staggered so that opposite platforms are about 50 feet apart.

The New York Railways Company completed on March 22 the renewal of turnout from southerly surface car track on north side of the structure to track on Clinton st., at Manhattan end of bridge, with exception of renewing manhole and conduit underneath track.

A War Savings Stamp sign, consisting of letters "W. S. S.," was placed on south end of Manhattan tower. These letters are each 20 feet high, are painted white and at night are illuminated. The work of putting up sign was finished March 23.

A stand about 13 feet long by 5 feet wide was erected on bridge property on easterly side of Bedford ave., near entrance to Bedford ave. trolley car station on Brooklyn approach. Bids were received on March 28 for privilege of selling various specified articles from the stand. The highest bid received amounted to \$157.50 a month.

QUEENSBORO BRIDGE.

The curb on north side of roadway was reconstructed from Manhattan anchor pier to panel point No. 100, on east channel span, which makes a length of 3,010½ feet.

Conduits were installed for street lighting system, under rapid transit superstructure at the Queens approach. Steel work of this superstructure was painted by the contractor who is constructing the two rapid transit tunnels under East River and the connection between tunnels and station on Queens plaza.

Work was continued on cleaning and painting of under-deck of bridge, the painters working on Queens anchor span and Queens approach. Approximately 75 per cent. of steel work over Guastavino arches at Manhattan approach was painted.

The elevators at Queens anchor pier carried 477,274 passengers during the quarter, an increase of 1,738 compared with last quarter of 1917, and a decrease of 229,848 compared with first quarter of 1917. After elevated railway trains commenced operating over bridge on July 23, 1917, the number of people using these elevators decreased. The surface railway cars stop at Queens anchor pier, whereas, elevated trains do not, and many people who formerly used surface cars now travel on elevated line.

Arrangements were made for Division Office of the Queensboro Bridge to move on or before April 20, from floors leased in building at 305 E. 60th st. to quarters adjacent to storeroom and work shops under Manhattan approach. This will effect a saving of \$1,300 per annum.

HARLEM RIVER, MANHATTAN AND BRONX DIVISION.

Willis Avenue Bridge—Repairs were made to operating machinery and centre latch and to lighting circuits on centre pier fender. Work was commenced on installing conduit on swing span to enclose electric wires, which previously were not enclosed.

Third Avenue Bridge—A new stand for supporting one of the flood lights on centre pier fender was built to replace stand destroyed by fire. A new flood light was put on the stand. The flood lights on fender are used in connection with guarding bridge at night.

Repairs were made to centre pier fender, to bridge tenders' houses and to drains on approaches.

Madison Avenue Bridge—The electric power cable which supplies current from Manhattan side to centre pier was repaired, power being taken temporarily from Bronx side. The Union Railway Company installed permanent ground connections to its tracks on swing span of bridge to obviate leakage of current from swing span to approach spans.

145th Street Bridge—Repairs were made to stairs on south side of Manhattan approach, to operating machinery of swing span and to water pipe line on Bronx approach.

New York and Putnam Bridge—Work was commenced on reconstruction of floor of foot walk between span over railroad tracks and Sedgwick ave., The Bronx.

Washington Bridge—In latter part of March the Union Railway Company resumed work on reconstruction of its tracks over bridge. Some work had been done in December, 1917, on south track for a distance of 400 feet from Amsterdam ave. east.

Unionport Bridge—Work on contract for construction of new permanent bridge was continued. Amount of contract is \$195,660.60. The work during the quarter consisted of installation of machinery, electrical work and counterweights. The work remaining to be done consisted of completing counterweights, machinery and electrical work, laying of roadway floor and sidewalks and filling in approaches.

Pelham Bridge—Repairs were made to operating machinery and to under-deck and wearing surface flooring on roadway on lift span.

Eastchester Bridge—Widening roadway on swing span to minimum of 16 feet was contemplated in January. Repairs were made to under-deck and wearing surface on roadway.

BRIDGES IN BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, QUEENS AND RICHMOND.

Vernon Avenue Bridge—Repairs were made to shoe plates on rolling segments of bridge. Two new cast steel track plates, each 10 feet long, 2½ feet wide and 2 inches thick, were purchased and were drilled and planed to shape in Department's shop, ready for installation at bridge.

Bridge Tenders' house on east side of bridge, south of lift span, was rebuilt. It had been nearly destroyed by fire.

Greenpoint Avenue Bridge—Repairs were made to operating machinery and to end lift wedges. New extra heavy latch bolts were placed on roadway gates, to hold gates firmly in position when closed.

Meeker Avenue Bridge—The steel plates on roadway at ends of swing span and at ends of approaches were reset. Repairs were made to under-deck and wearing surface planking on approach spans.

Ocean Avenue Bridge—On Feb. 13 large pieces of ice gathered under the bracing of northerly portion of bridge trestle and it was necessary to cut away ice to prevent lifting of structure.

NEW YORK AND NEW JERSEY VEHICULAR TUNNEL.

The New York State Bridge and Tunnel Commission, of which the Commissioner of Plant and Structures is a member ex-officio, submitted a report to the Legislature on March 12, 1918, recommending construction of a tunnel for vehicles under the Hudson River, between the foot of Canal st., Manhattan, and 12th st., Jersey City, one-half of the cost to be paid by the State of New York and one-half by the State of New Jersey. It is estimated that cost of construction would be approximately \$13,000,000, and the tunnel could be put through in about three years.

The following extracts from the report to the Legislature are submitted for your especial attention:

"By chapter 260 of the Laws of 1906, the Legislature created a commission of three members, to be known as the New York Interstate Bridge Commission, and to be appointed by the Governor. The purpose was to make possible co-operation with a similar commission of the State of New Jersey in a serious consideration of the practicability of constructing an interstate bridge over the Hudson River and between the States of New York and New Jersey.

"The Legislature of the State of New Jersey took similar action in a joint resolution, which recited the need for a more modern, rapid and economical system of transit than that provided by the slow, antiquated and dangerous system of ferryboats.

"In 1913 there was submitted to the Commission by Messrs. Jacob & Davies, Inc., engineers of the Hudson tunnel, a comprehensive statement relative to the practicability of tunnel construction, and answering particularly the objections which had theretofore been made in discussions of the tunnel project in the matter of ventilation, drainage, and of the grade of ascent and descent. * * *. The method of construction proposed by this firm called for a pair of tunnels, one for eastbound movement and the other for westbound movement, and suggested that such a pair of tunnels would have a capacity for 5,000,000 vehicles per annum, equalling approximately the entire vehicular traffic then crossing the Hudson River by ferries. The cost of such a pair of tunnels, including approaches to the surface, easements or rights of way, carrying charges, engineering and other contingencies, was estimated to be about \$11,000,000. The site proposed was from Canal street, in New York City, to the shore line of Jersey City at approximately the extended line of 12th street, Jersey City. * * *. It further stated that the great density of traffic for vehicles was in the downtown district and that, of some 19,660 vehicles crossing the river daily in both directions at that time, not more than 2,000 a day used the ferries for the uptown districts north of 23d street, and that these were mostly pleasure vehicles. It was further stated that the physical conditions in the downtown district were also favorable to a tunnel, while in the uptown district the reverse obtained.

"Since that time the Commission has worked with the New Jersey Commission, and plans for the construction of the tunnel have rapidly matured to a point where the actual work of construction can be undertaken in the near future if the requisite legislation is enacted. The joint Commissions have had the benefit of the judgment and advice of General George W. Goethals, and, under his direction, plans, profiles and specifications have been prepared as hereinafter indicated. General Goethals agrees with the suggestions of Messrs. Jacobs & Davies as to the site for the construction of this tunnel, but recommends a single tube with an upper and lower level and a concrete instead of a steel sheath.

"Conservatively estimated, the capacity of this tunnel in both directions is approximately 100,000 vehicles daily, exceeding that which could be carried by over 75 ferryboats running continuously 24 hours each day and filled to their maximum capacity, or about double the uttermost possible carrying capacity of the 14 ferry lines as at present scheduled and in operation between the Manhattan and New Jersey shores.

"In view of the fact that the improvement would be a public highway of general value to the nation, and inasmuch as the tunnel could be used for the transportation of mails and could be employed as well for carrying troops and supplies for the army and navy, the project is one in which the Federal government would naturally take an interest. This would be in line with the policy followed by it in recent years to aid in the construction of highways.

"The remainder of the expense of the improvement should then be divided equally between the two States immediately concerned.

"The project is similar to other highway improvements outside the city which it has been the policy of the State to undertake and pay for. The benefits of this improvement will not be limited to the city, but will extend directly to the neighboring counties of Nassau and Suffolk, connecting them with the mainland, and also providing an opportunity for Rockland, Orange and neighboring counties to transport by motor vehicles their produce to the city markets in a quick and convenient way. The improvement will also indirectly affect the interests of the entire State. The cost of construction can be refunded in a very short time by means of tolls to be collected at the entrance of the tunnel. The tolls to be collected for vehicles using the tunnel need not be any greater than the present rate of transportation over the ferries, averaging about thirty-five cents per vehicle.

"A toll of thirty cents per vehicle, which is somewhat under the present ferry rates, will provide a revenue sufficient to retire a bond issue of \$6,300,000 in twenty years.

"After the bonds have been redeemed, tolls can be made merely nominal or entirely dispensed with, as the cost of maintenance and operation will be met by the annual revenue resulting from the investment of the accrued net surplus."

STATE INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION—DEPARTMENT OF LABOR.

Resolutions Adopted.

Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has submitted to this Commission appeals filed by the appellants noted herein from orders issued by the said Division against the premises given, the granting of which appeals would necessitate a variation of law; and

Whereas, the said Division of Inspection has had a reinspection made in each case, and upon the reports submitted gives the conditions existing and recommends as follows: 632-633 High st.; appellant, Associated Manufacturers' and Merchants' Ass'n, for J. M. Brecker & Co. 4—Properly enclosed stairway with fire-resisting partitions. Nov. 1, 1917. 4-story building, erected before Oct. 1, 1913, of brick construction, with wood-covered concrete floors; 1st, 2nd and 3d floors used for mercantile purposes; 4th floor for manufacture of women's house dresses. Occupancy, 44, 34 of whom are factory; above 1st floor, 34; above 2d floor, 34; no sprinkler; no fire alarm signal system; goods manufactured are highly inflammable; exits, two interior stairways, one of which is properly enclosed with fireproof partitions and equipped with fireproof self-closing doors opening outwardly; the other enclosed fireproof on 4th floor only. Order issued to cover the other floors; no safe egress from roof. The fireproof enclosed stairway permits of an occupancy of 48 persons.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as the 4th floor is the only floor used for manufacturing purposes, permit an occupancy of not to exceed 48 persons without enclosing the stairway below the 4th floor, said occupancy not to be exceeded and no factory work to be done on 2d or 3d floors unless a fire escape as per Rule 4-a is erected at southeasterly end of building.

2. Premises affected, Buffalo, 327 Main st.; appellant, Desbocker, Fisk & Newcomb. 1—Additional exit. 2—Prohibit occupancy. 3—Handrail on stairs. 3 and 1-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; with open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy 12, 6 of whom are employed at factory work; above 1st floor, 12; above 2d floor, 6; building reached through theatre, same being located in rear thereof; ground floor is theatre lobby; 2d and 3d floors mercantile; also repairing films; one stairway from 1st to 3d floors, also one stairway from 2d floor to theatre in rear.

Recommendation: Accept the existing exits from 2d floor and present interior stairway as one means of exit from 3d floor, and a bridge connecting 3d floor of Main st. end and Washington st. end as additional exit from 3d floor; bridge to be enclosed on bottom and sides with

asbestos board or sheet metal; opening to said bridge to be nonfireproof door 2 by 6 feet. Order No. 3 to be complied with.

3. Premises affected, Buffalo, 703 Washington st.; appellant, Phoenix Brewery. Install an approved fire alarm signal system. Feb. 28, 1917. 3-story tenant factory building, erected before Oct. 1, 1913; no combustibles; no sprinkler; occupancy 44, 41 of whom are factory employees; above 1st floor, 41; above 2d floor, 8. Building is fireproof, with one enclosed fireproof stairway: 1st floor, restaurant; 2d floor, waist and apron factory; 3d floor, mercantile lithographing company. Order pending for fire escape to be erected on front of building, which will make two means of exit.

Recommendation: Accept a Class "B" fire alarm signal system on condition that work on additional exit be started at once and pushed to completion without delay.

4. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd.; appellant, Associated Manufacturers' and Merchants' Ass'n, for National Aniline & Chemical Co. Building 12. File 9648. 2—Enclose stairways to 3 feet above roof and provide skylight. 3—Exit stairs 44 inches wide and incombustible. 4—Treads on stairs not less than 10 inches wide. 5—Prohibit occupancy. Appeal from decision rendered March 13, requiring the two northerly stairways to be enclosed fireproof and the runways in southerly section to be enclosed fireproof. 3-story nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; divided lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy 32; above 1st floor, 20; above 2d floor, 3. Exits, four unenclosed interior stairways; exits remote; no egress from roof. Building used for manufacture of sulphur colors; about midway in building is concrete partition 1 1/2 inches wide; southerly section consists of two working platforms, one above the other, stairs leading thereto and runways over the northerly section; two exit stairs in northerly section 44-inches wide, in southerly section 30 inches wide, treads 9-inch; stairway constructed of wood. At times there are apt to be suffocating fumes in building.

Recommendation: Accept the two northerly stairways, with stairs of incombustible material when same have been enclosed with fire-resisting partitions as per Rule 504-c, doors to same to be fireproof self-closing, opening outwardly and equipped with fusible link, with safe passageway from foot of enclosures to outer air; if window provided to outer air no skylight need be provided; two stairways at southerly end and runways to remain as at present constructed; order No. 4 to make treads of stairs 10 inches wide to be waived; No. 5 automatically waived when work done as called for.

5. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd.; appellant, Associated Manufacturers' and Merchants' Ass'n, for National Aniline & Chemical Co. Buildings 42, 43, 44, 46. Building 42: 5—Prohibit occupancy. 6—Additional exit. 7—Skylight in stairway enclosure. 8—Exit stairs to roof. Buildings 43, 44: One story connecting 42 and 46. Building 46: 4—Stairway enclosures to be provided with skylight. 5—Additional exit. 6—Prohibit occupancy. This is an appeal from the decision rendered by the Commission on March 13, 1918, requiring a fire escape to be erected on each of the buildings 42 and 46 as additional exit. Building 42: 3-story building erected since Oct. 1, 1913, for use principally as bath house more than for manufacturing; on 1st floor are water filters; 2d floor bath house, sinks, waterclosets; 3d floor, portion of this floor used for baths, the remainder as plant laundry; divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy 7; above 1st floor, 6; exits, one interior fireproof enclosed stairway equipped with fireproof self-closing doors opening outwardly; no egress from roof; stairway outside of building and of straight-run type. Building 46: 3-story, erected since Oct. 1, 1913; divided lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 27; above 1st floor, 24; exits, one interior fireproof enclosed stairway equipped with fireproof self-closing doors opening outwardly; 1st floor used as garage and for lime slacking; 2d floor, electrical repairs; 3d floor, plumbing repairs; electrical and plumbing stock room in building; lofts on 2d and 3d floors divided by partitioning off rooms; building used as headquarters for men working throughout the plant and the occupancy therefore varies; one side of building is alongside of river.

Recommendation: Building 42—Plain glass window accepted in lieu of skylight, as per variation of March 13, 1918; order No. 8 covered by chapter 627, Laws 1918; accept as additional exit the following: One window on south wall of building to be changed to nonfireproof door, at least 2 by 6 feet, opening onto roof of one-story building No. 43; stairway from roof of Building 43 (said stairway to have proper handrails) to roof of Building 44, and stairway from roof of Building 44 to 3d floor of Building 46, leading to door to be constructed in north wall in lieu of window as called for Building 42. From 2d floor of Building 42 provide opening in south wall giving access to Building 43, and erect a 30-inch interior stairway, properly hand-railed, from 2d to ground floors. Building 46—Order No. 4 covered by chapter 627, Laws 1918. As means of exit from 3d floor accept window in north wall changed to nonfireproof door 2 by 6 feet, opening outwardly, and connecting with stairway to roof of Building 44, giving access over Building 43 to Building 42, as called for in exit to be provided from Building 42. As additional exit from 2d floor provide a 30-inch unenclosed interior stairway, equipped with proper handrails, at northerly end of building from 2d to 1st floor. When these exits have been provided, orders for exits against each building will be deemed complied with, while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged, and order to prohibit occupancy will be automatically waived.

6. Premises affected, Clayton; appellant, Otis Brooks Lumber Co. 3—Suitable and convenient sanitary flush watercloset inside of building. April 30, 1918. Flush watercloset is installed in store house about 65 feet from factory building; street sewer is above ground surrounding factory building and makes it impossible to connect from building; 6 men employed in factory, 4 in yards; flush watercloset of hopper type and not an approved installation.

Recommendation: Acceptance of a chemical closet of an approved type in power room of factory.

7. Premises affected, Clayton; appellant, L. E. Fry & Co., Inc. 4—Suitable and convenient flush watercloset. 5—Proper sanitary washing facilities. May 1, 1918. Two closets provided of privy type, one on 1st and one on 2d floor, for 25 male employees; no washing facilities. Tenant may not occupy building for a much longer period as work is now being done for the U. S. Government. More persons are now employed than at time of inspection.

Recommendation: Accept the installation of two chemical closets of an approved type. No. 5 to be complied with.

8. Premises affected, Clayton; appellant, Clayton Ship & Boat Building Corp. 1—2 suitable inside waterclosets. 2—2 suitable sinks with running water. May 3, 1918. Four closets now installed for 70 to 78 men in summer and 40 in winter. Closets of flush type, located in machine shop; men employed in this building and in yard alongside of building. The shed building, to which orders apply, is an open shed where men work at intervals on repairs to boats; no work done in building during winter; waterclosets are within 50 feet of any working

point; no wash sinks except in office for use of office employees.

Recommendation: Accept the conditions as relating to waterclosets until the next regular inspection; order for wash sinks to be complied with.

9. Premises affected, Clayville; appellant, Clayville Knitting Co. 14—Provide proper means of exit from south end of No. 1 mill, 2d floor, June 20, 1917. 2 and 5-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; divided lofts; sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 65; above 2d floor, 40; exits, two interior stairways, one from 1st to 3d floors and one from 1st to 5th floors, one of which is properly enclosed in fireproof partitions; doors open out and slide; two perfect fire escapes, one on the side and one on the end, openings to which are fireproof. Exits remote; no safe egress from roof; one south end of 5-story building is a rope-drive tower which formerly covered the entire end of building and does now at 1st and 2d floors of old building; at west end of this tower is a fireproof enclosed stairway with egress from 3d, 4th and 5th floors of old building in the form of horizontal exits; at this end of building, on 1st floor, safe egress may be had through engine room; at 2d floor, to which order applies, stairway in rope-drive tower reached through horizontal exit is available; this stairway leads through 1st floor of old building, and then it is necessary to ascend a few steps to reach 1st floor of new fireproof building; 15 males employed on 2d floor.

Recommendation: While conditions and occupancy remain unchanged, waive order.

10. Premises affected, Depew, Sawyer ave.; appellant, Gould Coupler Co. Prohibit use of 3d floor until two legal means of exit have been provided therefrom. Additional exit. 3-story building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; sprinkler installed with two sources of water supply; no fire alarm; combustibles carried; occupancy 83; above 1st floor, 16; above 2d floor, none permanently; 3d floor being used for storage purposes; exits, one interior unenclosed stairway from 1st to 3d floors; no safe egress from roof.

Recommendation: Accept as means of exit from 3d floor a stationary iron ladder accessible from a window on 3d floor leading to runway over roof of "Clock House," said runway to be provided with proper handrails. At 2d floor provide steps from floor to window leading to runway over roof, and from runway provide a stationary iron stairway properly hand-railed, which stairway shall extend the distance from roof where runway terminated to ground.

11. Premises affected, Depew; appellant, Associated Manufacturers' and Merchants' Ass'n, for Andover Silk Co. 1—Grating under sheaves. 2—Enclose elevator shaft; provide proper fire doors. 4—Guard projecting ledges. May 31, 1918. 1-story brick building with low basement under small portion thereof; business is silk winding and weaving; building sprinklered; elevator of hand-power type, running from basement to 1st floor; lift trapdoor at 1st floor level when car is at lowest terminal; elevator gate in basement and bar at 1st floor, 12 inches from hoistway. Orders issued as per criticism on plans filed, as per letter of Dec. 19, 1917. Lift trapdoor is tin clad.

Recommendation: Present conditions comply with Code Rules 439-440. Waive orders Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4.

12. Premises affected, New York City, 119-125 W. 25th st.; appellant, Chas. F. Noyes & Co. 1—1 additional wash basin for females, 6th floor. 2—2 additional wash basins for males, 6th floor. 3—2 additional waterclosets for males, 5th and 6th floors. 4—3 additional waterclosets for females, 5th and 6th floors. On June 10 the inspector found 166 males and 52 females on 6th floor; 10 males and 36 females on 5th floor; total on 5th and 6th floors of 176 males and 88 females. At time of inspection one wash basin for males and one for females was provided on the 5th floor, and 5 wash basins for males and one for females provided on 6th floor; 1 watercloset on 5th floor for 5th and 6th floor female employees, and one on the 5th, and five on the 6th floor for males on the 5th and 6th floors. On May 17, 1918, there were 200 males and 133 females employed on these floors; accommodation stairway between 5th and 6th floors. (Rule 102 requires sufficient number of waterclosets to accommodate maximum number of employees.) Since issuance of order, watercloset assignments have been changed: 6th floor 5 wash basins outside of toilet room; 5th floor males have 2 waterclosets, 2 urinals, 2 wash basins; 6th floor, males have 2 waterclosets; 5th floor, females have 1 watercloset; 6th floor, females have 1 watercloset. Entrances to closets for sexes less than 10 feet apart and no "T" or "L" shaped screens provided.

Recommendation: If all waterclosets and toilets are properly screened, wood partition between male and female waterclosets on 5th floor, metal covered, permit the following: 5th floor outside or easterly watercloset with urinal and sink outside of same assigned and designated "For Males," urinals to be removed from center closet and this watercloset with remaining westerly watercloset with 2 wash basins therein to be assigned and designated "For Females." 6th floor, remove partition in present toilet room; one door leading into same to be closed and additional watercloset to be provided therein, thus providing four waterclosets. This toilet room, with four wash basins outside of same to be assigned to females and so designated. (There are five wash basins and if desired one may be removed.) A new toilet room to be provided containing at least seven waterclosets or five waterclosets and two urinals and at least seven wash basins and assigned to and designated "For Males."

13. Premises affected, Oswego; appellant, Oswego Candy Works. 2—Extend fireproof enclosure of elevator shaft to 3 feet above the roof. (May 11, 1917.) The elevator shaft is now fireproof to roof; wood pent house covered outside with fire-resisting material to 3 feet above roof; building erected after Oct. 1, 1913. To change top of elevator shaft would necessitate changing the elevator machinery.

Recommendation: Accept present pent house covered with fire resisting material if pent house is sealed on inside with metal lathe and 3/4-inch Portland cement and metal frames and wired glass provided in openings in pent house.

14. Premises affected, Gouverneur, 29-31 Clinton st.; appellant, Spooner-Campbell Co. 3—Additional means of exit. 5—Fireproof doors leading to and from hall at side of present stairs. (March 11, 1918.) 2-story and basement fireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy 12, 8 of whom are factory employees; above the 1st floor, 3. There is one interior stairway, 42 inches, properly enclosed with partitions of fireproof material, doors to which open in and are not self-closing. Building is of fireproof material with concrete floors reinforced by bars of iron crossing each other.

Recommendation: Accept as a required means of exit a fire escape to be located on the rear of the building at a point remote from present interior stairway. Present interior stairway 42 inches wide to be accepted when order No. 3 has been complied with.

15. Premises affected, Syracuse, 332 South West st.; appellant, Chase Motor Truck Co. 3—Additional exit from Machine Shop building. Nov. 30, 1917. 3-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy

3 at present, not likely to exceed 10; above 1st floor, 2; above 2d floor, 2 occasionally; exits, two interior stairways, one extending from 1st to 2d floors and one from 1st to 3d floors; doors to same open out but are not self-closing; exits remote; no safe egress from roof; an imperfect horizontal exit on 2d floor, consisting of bridge leading to adjoining building.

Recommendation: Accept while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged a straight iron ladder from 3d floor at westerly side of building to roof of 1-story building, with ladder from roof to ground.

16. Premises affected, Silver Creek; appellant, Fredonia Preserving Co. 5—Prohibit occupancy. 6—Additional exit. July 26, 1917. 3- and 2-story nonfireproof frame building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy 40; above 1st floor, 2; above 2d floor, none regularly; 3d floor somewhat smaller in area than remainder of building; exits, three interior stairways, two from 1st to 2d floors and one from 3d to 2d floors; stairways from 1st to 2d floors are remote, one of which is wood enclosed but no door; stairway from 3d to 2d floors enclosed in wood lattice work and has self-closing gate opening outwardly; this stairway is remote from each stairway on 2d floor, but not on 3d floor. Since filing appeal company has provided outside wooden stairway from 3d floor to ground on side of building; doorway to same is directly at head of interior stairway on 3d floor; no other openings on course of stairway; on 3d floor is door to roof of adjoining building; roof pitched and unsafe to walk on; doors to roof and stairway fastened on inside by hooks in eye bolts, two on each floor; door opening on outside stairs has three removable bars of wood set in wooden sockets. At present no employees above the 2d floor, but during corn season, which lasts about 4 weeks, there are five employees on 3d floor; occupancy of 3d floor unchanged.

Recommendation: On account of small occupancy of 3d floor and small area, accept outside wooden stairway on condition that bars are removed and hooks removed from doors and a lock that will permit opening of door by a quarter-turn of knob, and door to roof be permanently closed or a runway properly railed on one side be provided to extend from doorway to sidewalk on Central ave.

17. Premises affected, Wolcott (near station); appellant, Henry Harrison Co., Inc. Provide exits in accordance with section 79-a of the Labor Law. 1- and 3-story building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; nonfireproof; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; occupancy, 18; above 1st floor, none regularly; one man occasionally goes above 1st floor to attend to cleaning "bean" machinery; a section of 3d floor used for storage bin space without floorings; remainder 3d floor measures 15 by 24 feet. There is one interior unenclosed stairway constructed of wood and measuring 4 1/2 inches wide; extends from 1st to 3d floors, with 9 1/2-inch treads and 7 1/2-inch rise; no safe egress from roof.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as building is not used above the 1st floor except for an occasional occupancy when a workman goes to clean and oil machinery, accept present unenclosed stairway without providing additional means of exit on condition that occupants of ground floor have two remote means of exit.

18. Premises affected, Utica, 18 Hoyt st.; appellant, Jacob Mettelman Sons. 2—Prohibit occupancy above 2d floor. 3-story building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; no sprinkler; combustibles carried; no fire alarm signal system; exits, one interior stairway 30 inches wide, constructed of wood and unenclosed, extending from 1st to 3d floors; a fire escape on side of building with 18-inch stairs, 5-inch tread, 7-inch rise, 50 degrees pitch, extending to ground by means of counterweighted stairway; balconies 10 feet long, 3 feet wide; openings at level of windows 3 feet high with steps provided at some floors; 2d floor balcony not sufficiently long to permit of opening of door onto balcony. Occupancy, 2d floor no one permanently, 3d floor, 9 females.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as no one is employed on 2d floor and but 9 employees on 3d floor, accept present fire escape while 2d floor not used for factory purposes if balcony at 2d floor be extended so that doorway will open onto same; provide steps at 3d floor and fireproof self-closing door 2 by 6 feet opening outwardly onto 2d floor balcony.

And it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardships in complying with the strict provisions of law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code on the premises stated, and that in granting the variations herein set forth the spirit of the law and of the rules of the Industrial Code will be observed and public safety secured; and

It appearing that each of the appellants herein has been advised that he would be given an opportunity to appear and be heard at this time and place if he so desired, and such of the appellants who appeared having been heard by the Commission, therefore

Be it resolved by the State Industrial Commission, That each appellant noted be and he hereby is granted the variations applicable in each case to the premises specified, during the period that conditions remain as of this date.

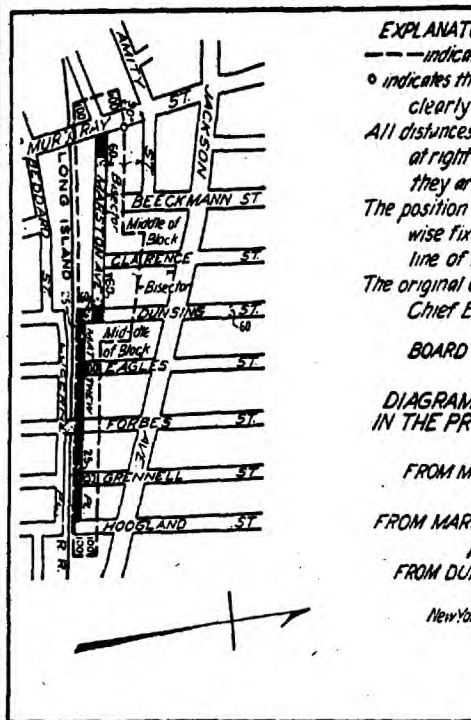

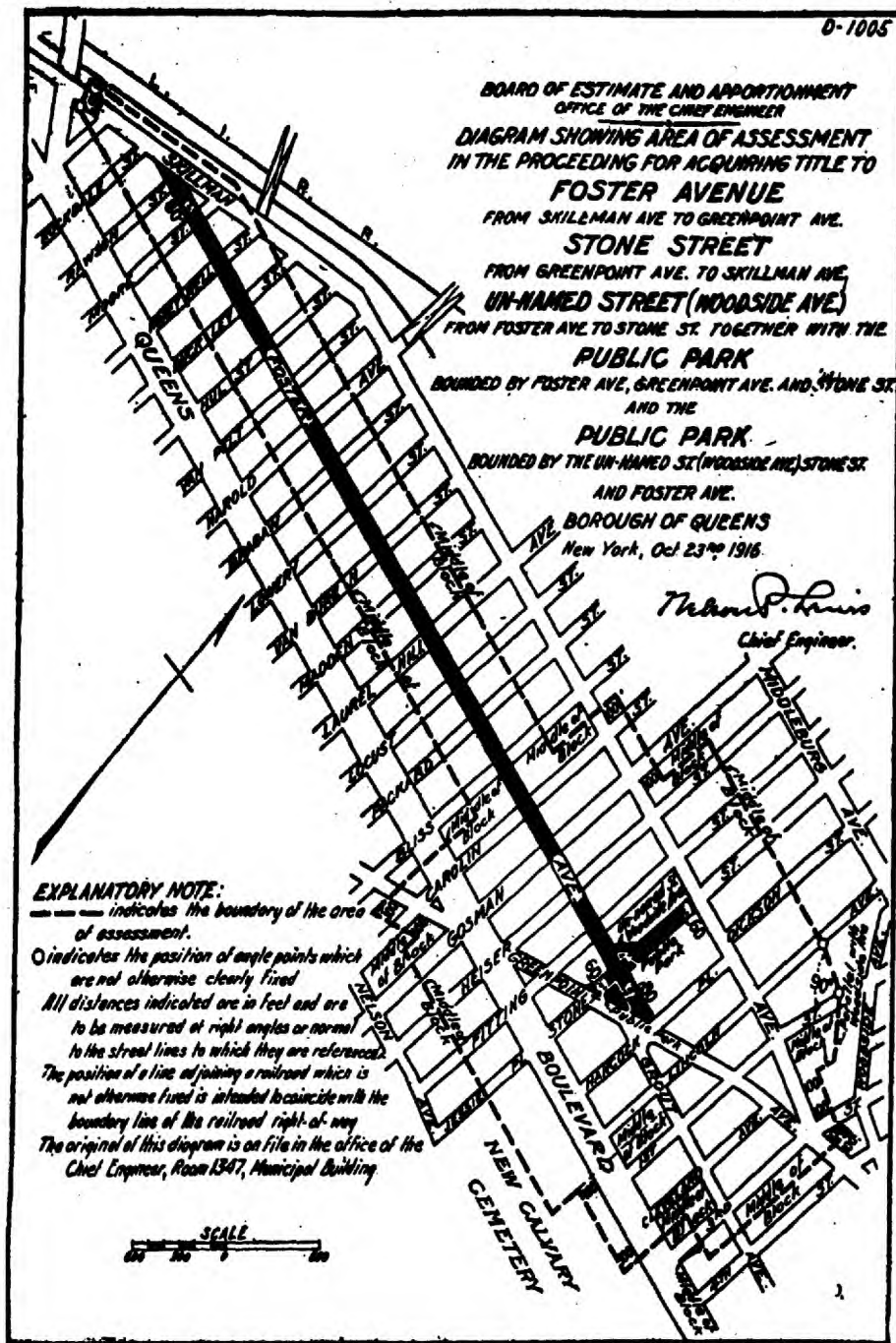

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon.
