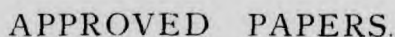

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending November 11, 1882, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending November 4, 1882.

SIR—There were 563 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 11, 1882, which is a decrease of 16, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 54 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending November 4, 1882, was 562, which is 31.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.61 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,292,334.

The testing candle shall be of spe m of six to the pound, and consuming, as near as possible, one hundred and twenty grains of sperm per hour, and no candle shall be used for testing which consumes less than one hundred and fourteen or more than one hundred and twenty-six grains of sperm per hour. And, as regards purity, the gas shall be free, within limits not injurious to the public health, from ammonia, sulphuretted hydrogen, and other sulphurous and noxious compounds.
