

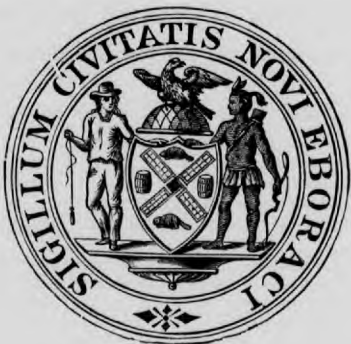

COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS.

Hon. W. R. GRACE, Mayor :

SIR—We have the honor to submit the following report of an examination of the accounts of the Police Department of the City of New York, extending from October 10, 1882—the date to which a former examination by the Commissioners of Accounts had reached—up to March 13, 1885.

In the Treasurer's office all vouchers were carefully examined and found to be properly certified and entered on the cash book, and the cash book entries have been correctly posted in the ledger.

In the Uniform and Equipment Bureau we find that all goods are received on consignment by Mr. J. L. Moe, the clerk in charge, and are issued by him to the officers of the force for cash at the invoice price. Monthly returns of these cash receipts are made to the consignors; therefore, the business of this office is separate and apart from the accounts of the Police Department, the clerk merely acting as the agent of the merchants, who, through him, sell their goods to the Police force.

The records of the Property Clerk were carefully examined. No delivery of goods had been made except on court orders or orders from the District Attorney, accompanied with affidavits of identification of the property and also with affidavits of officers or other responsible citizens as to the identity of the claimants.

All property thus delivered and all auction sales of property were checked, and an inventory of the property remaining in the possession of this official was taken, which when compared with the record of property received showed a debit of one knife and a credit of one pocket-book.

There is, however, a lot of property on hand, consisting of gamblers', policy-dealers', counterfeiters' and burglars' implements, of which no account appears on the records. It is stated by the Property Clerk that when he assumed charge of his office he found this property there, but was unable to trace it, as no record of it seemed to have been kept by his predecessor. He was deterred from destroying it as he could not tell whether it might not at some time be required in evidence.

When examining into the methods of this Department, which for the present we have postponed, we will take testimony relating to the existence of this unrecorded property, an inventory of which we have on file in this office.

 During the past week 450 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 59 permits.
 There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds) 6 permits.
 There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 26 miscellaneous permits.
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 336 permits.
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported 61 visits were made, and 43 disinfections, and 8 fumigations were performed.
 The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 7.
 The number of vaccinations performed was 1,073, of which 507 were primary and 566 re-vaccinations.
 There were seized and condemned 6,123 pounds of meat, and 5,220 pounds of fish.
 The number of specimens of milk examined was 342; the number of analyses of same made was 6, and the amount of fines imposed was \$125.

The certificates of 517 births, 48 still-births, 283 marriages, and 593 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 13, 1885. This shows a decrease of 83 births, 2 still-births, and 28 deaths, and an increase of 29 marriages when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was a decrease of 64 births, 7 still-births, and 28 deaths, and an increase of 20 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 3; scarlatina, 7; diphtheria 6; puerperal diseases, 8; rheumatism and gout, 2; pneumonia, 24; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; apoplexy, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 6; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 9; premature and preterm births, 7; surgical operations, 4; while the deaths from small-pox increased 3; croup, 5; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 1; diarrheal diseases, 4; alcoholism, 3; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; bronchitis, 2; heart diseases, 9; convulsions, 2; direct effect of solar heat, 1; suicide, 1; and drowning, 4. The number of deaths from inanition, marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, and cyanosis and atelectasis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 121 were in institutions, 325 in tenement-houses, 122 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 16 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 2 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 144 on the second, 114 on the third, 62 on the fourth, 17 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 593 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 43 were stated to be single, 152 married, 65 widowed, and the condition of 333 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 593; still-births, 48; bodies in transitu, 10; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 77 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 517 births, 283 marriages, 48 still-births, 593 deaths; 10 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 89 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 47 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 13, 1885, was 68.0 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.915, the mean humidity was 61, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,431, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.44 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment.
