

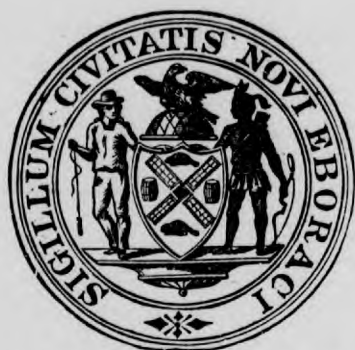

Resolved, That the Committee on Repairs and Supplies be directed to furnish for the use of this Department one copy of each daily and Sunday morning and evening newspaper published in this city, and also the necessary files for the same.

Resolved, That from and after the 10th day of September instant, the boundaries of the Twelfth, Thirtieth, and Thirty-second Precincts, shall be as follows:

The Twelfth Precinct is bounded north, by the centre line of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street; east, by low water-line of East and Harlem rivers; south, by the centre line of One Hundred and Tenth street, from East river to the west line of Fifth avenue, and the south line of One Hundred and Tenth street, from the west line of Fifth avenue to the centre line of Seventh avenue, and west, by the centre line of Seventh avenue; and Randall's Island, Ward's Island, and all the small islands, rocks above water, and sunken meadows adjacent, shall form a part of the territory of said Twelfth Precinct.

The Thirtieth Precinct is bounded north, by the centre line of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street; east, by the centre line of Seventh avenue; south, by the south line of One Hundred and Tenth street, to the east line of Eighth avenue, and from thence to the line of low water of Hudson river by the centre line of One Hundred and Tenth street; west, by the line of low water along the shore of Hudson river.

The Thirty-second Precinct is bounded south, by the centre-line of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street; west, by the line of low water on the east bank of Hudson river; north and east, by the line of low water on the northerly and easterly banks of the Spuyten Duyvil creek and Harlem river.

Resolved, That the Department of Docks be and is hereby respectfully requested to drive spring piles at the pier foot of Third street, East river, for the berth occupied by the Police Steamboat "Seneca," so located as to secure the safety and convenience of the steamer.

Resolved, That the Superintendent cause ballot boxes, properly labelled, to be placed in each Station-house and Central Office, in which shall be deposited all contributions from members of the force and other charitably disposed citizens, for the benefit and relief of such of the members of the Police Force, and their families, in New Orleans and other cities, as are suffering from yellow fever.

Resolved, That the Board call the attention of the members of the police force to the above contribution as a most worthy and pressing charity, being an interest identical with that of the New York police force, calling for a liberal and prompt response.

Commissioner Nichols moved that they be laid over, owing to the absence of the President.
Commissioner Wheeler moved to amend, that they lie over until the next meeting of the Board.
Carried—Commissioners Wheeler and Nichols voting aye; Commissioner Erhardt voting no.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held August 21, 1878.

Present—President Westervelt and Commissioner Dimock.

Absent—Commissioner Vanderpoel.

The minutes of the meeting held August 14 were read and approved.

A petition was received from W. L. Cutting, executor, for permission to repair bulkhead between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, East river; and, being read

On motion, it was

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to W. L. Cutting, executor, to make repairs, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, to the bulkhead on the East river, extending from the south side of Forty-first street to south side of Forty-second street.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief as to repairs needed to the bulkhead between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East river; and, being read, and the Secretary reporting, that by direction of the Commissioners the Engineer-in-Chief had been directed to repair said bulkhead in accordance with his report, at a cost of about \$600,

On motion, the action of the Commissioners was approved.

A petition was received from J. C. Wandell & Co. for permission to erect a sign at Twenty-ninth street, North river; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That J. C. Wandell & Co. be and are hereby informed that this Department has no objection to their erecting, at the foot of Twenty-ninth street, North river, a sign about twenty feet long and six feet wide; provided it shall be so placed as not to interfere with travel thereat, but this Department reserves the right to cause its removal at any time it may so elect.

On motion, the communication from Department of Public Charities and Correction, to have repairs made to Pier at Twenty-fifth street, East river, was taken from the table and placed on file, said repairs having been ordered on the 14th instant.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table, to await action, where taken, as stated, to wit:

From Scott & Co., lessees—To have repairs made to pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river, Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report nature of repairs required to the surface of 150 feet of the outer end of the pier, and an estimate of cost of doing the work.

From Philip Scully—For position as Watchman.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Rowe & Demarest—To lease bulkhead between Leroy and Clarkson streets, North river, for landing of building materials. Applicants informed that this Department is not at present prepared to lease the premises referred to.

From Commissioners of Sinking Fund—Approving of lines of Pier, new 40, North river.

From Central Railroad Co. of New Jersey—In reference to lumber in slip at Clarkson street, North river.

From New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Co.—Enclosing amount of rent of water front between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets, East river.

From Engineer-in-Chief—As to work performed during week ending August 17, 1878.

From Alfred W. Gee—For position on tug Manhattan.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to make an examination as to the title to the bulkhead foot of Twenty-ninth street, North river.

Henry Lewis Morris appeared and presented copies of letters patent, issued by the State for the land under water, etc., on the Harlem river, in the vicinity of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, etc., and was heard in reference to his petition for the building of a pile pier at that point.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending August 31, 1878, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending August 24, 1878.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 553 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 31, 1878, which is an increase of 34, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 91 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending August 24, 1878, was 514, which is 131.8 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.62 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,085,469.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH AN ORDINANCE OF the Common Council, "In relation to the burial of strangers or unknown persons who may die in any of the public institutions of the City of New York," the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction report as follows:
