

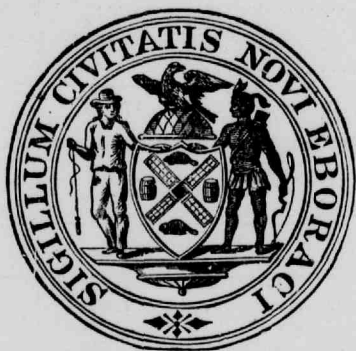

To the Honorable SMITH ELY, Jr., Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 27 of chapter 335, of the Laws of 1873, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department, for the three months ending December 31, 1877:
