

#### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

Report for the Quarter ending December 31, 1875.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS, 117 AND 119 DUANE STREET, 1 NEW YORK, December 31, 1875.

To the Honorable WILLIAM H. WICKHAM,

Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—In conformity with section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, we have the honor to submit the following report of the operations and actions of the Department of Docks during the quarter ending December 31, 1875.

#### ORGANIZATION, APPOINTMENTS, ETC.

Salary of William W. Burnham, Bookkeeper, reduced from \$5,000 to \$3,000 per annum, to take effect October 15.—October 13.

Salary of Otho H. Klemm, Clerk to Auditing Committee, increased from \$1,500 to \$2,000 per annum, to take effect October 15.—October 13. Resignation of W. O. Stoddard, Clerk to Engineer-in-Chief, accepted, to take effect October 20 .-

Salary of John K. Murphy, Copyist, increased from \$6 to \$10 per week, to take effect December 1.—

December 1. Resignation of W. N. Radenhurst, Clerk to Engineer-in-Chief, accepted, to take effect January I, 1876—December 22.

#### RULES AND ORDERS ADOPTED.

Engineer-in-Chief to prepare proper forms for the use of each division of the daily work of the Department, and to cause returns to be made every morning by each Superintendent in Charge, of the number of men employed, hours of service, and nature of the service rendered, and each Superintendent to be held to a rigid accountability for the manner in which the work is performed.—October 13.

#### SECOND.—IMPROVEMENT OF THE WATER-FRONT.

For details of the work of improving the water-front under the new plans adopted, together with the work of repairing the wooden piers and bulkheads, performed by the Department during the quarter ending December 31, 1875, you are respectfully referred to the following report from the Engineer-in-Chief:

Secretary of the Board of Docks:

SIR-I have the honor to submit, for the consideration of the Board governing this Department, the following condensed report of the work under my supervision for the months of October, November, and December, 1875:

Battery, Pier No. 1, North river—During the quarter the cribs for Piers 15, 16, 17, 18, and 19 were built and placed in position; the pier blocks laid for Sub-piers 15, 16, 17, and for a part of 18 and 19; Arches 15, 16, and 17 were concreted and decked. This gives a total length of pier completed 422 feet, which will be made ready for occupation in a very short time. The three sub-piers remaining unfinished, for two of which the foundations are already laid, will make an additional 78 feet, or a total length for the entire pier, when completed, of 500 feet. The accompanying plan and sketch shows the pier in its present state, with the depth of water alongside. Beside the above, 25 concrete blocks were made for the Christopher street section.

Christopher street section—Received orders, October 8, to continue the bulkhead wall foundation. The surveyors took soundings from south end of the wall a distance of 110 feet—50 feet inside and 20

feet outside of the bulkhead line.

Drove on the foundation 1,001 piles, from 9 to 10 feet below low water (including 7 test piles and 61 for braces). Constructing a platform over the foundation for "J. E. White's" pile cutter, to

saw off piles; 54 round and 18 square piles driven.

Received from Harrington & Bouker 342 cubic yards of rip-rap, and from the Battery 24 cubic yards—total, 366. Put down outside of the first row of piles on the foundation for a distance of 165 feet by 24 feet, and outside of the twelfth row, for a distance of 160 feet by 2 feet. Put down on the foundation 217 cubic yards 4-inch stone (received from Harrington & Bouker). Received from Phelps & Kimpland 1,006 spruce piles.

Contractor McIntyre commenced, December 16, to drive piles for new Pier No. 42. Total driven to date, 81 piles. Foreman White, for the same work, fished and spliced 38 piles. The piles used in the construction of this pier are piles (Department) from "Fitch's Basin." Total received, 168. In consequence of the bottom on the site of this pier being found so found so the property of the piles and an agreement been made to pay him and the pay him contractor has been directed to use longer piles, and an agreement been made to pay him an additional \$2 for each pile driven 80 feet or over in length.

Assistant Superintendent Guthrie repairing damage done to Pier No. 45, by the Atlas Company's Steamship "Claribel." Finished painting the piles with dead oil on Piers Nos. 43 and 44, and the Ferry platform.

Finished the alterations of sheds on Piers Nos. 43 and 46.

Built a new store-house and fence, also made alterations of office. Extended the Ferry roadway towards the street for a distance of 11 feet. Contractors painted the tin-work, interior of sheds, on Piers Nos. 43 and 46.

Masons pointing the wall until the cold weather set in (December 18). On the southwest corner of old Pier No. 50, inside the bulkhead line, sunk an iron tube, also one on the northwest corner, and one near the south end of the wall, for experimental purposes Clarkson street section—Sunk an iron tube south side Pier No. 47, near the bulkhead line, for

experimental purposes. King street section-Finished drilling hole in the wall; attained a depth of 14 feet 8 inches.

Sunk box for coffer dam front of wall.

Canal street section—Sunk a test pit in the bulkhead wall to a distance of 18 feet below the top of the "E" course, for the purpose of allowing the Board of Engineers to examine condition of concrete; also, built a small trial section of the wall in a wet caisson for the purpose of being able to raise it with "Large Derrick" and examine concrete.

General Repairs—Pier foot of Twenty-eighth street, North river: patching deck. Bath-house foot of Fifth street, East river: taking off stay laths and pulled up 20 piles around bath. Pier No. 12, East river: drove 26 piles, chocking, and shoreing cross caps and rangers. Pier at Randall's Island: drove 6 piles, chocking them and fastening backing logs, and putting on cleats, sheathing deck, and refacing gangway. Pier at Twenty-third street, East river: patching deck. Pier at Ward's Island: drove 5 spring piles and put in chocks. Charity Hospital Pier, Blackwell's Island: drove 2 fender piles and put in 4 chocks. Pier foot of Twenty-sixth street, North river: drove 4 spring piles and put in chocks. Laight street dumping board, North river: drove 8 spring piles,

laying and patching deck. Pier foot of Twenty-fourth street, North river: drove 4 spring piles and put in chocks. Department Pier, Gansevoort street: drove 11 piles, put on oak fenders and corner bands. Pier at Seventy-ninth street, East river: sheathing, put on new fenders, and repairing backing logs. Entrance to Pier No. 42, Canal street: sheathed deck. Pier foot of One Hundred and Seventeenth street, East river: put on cleats and relayed backing logs. Pier at Twenty-fifth street, East river: sheathed, drove 5 piles, and put on fenders. Dumping board at Seventeenth street, East river: sheathed roadway, repaired backing logs and rail. Dumping board at Forty-sixth street, East river: sheathed the deck and runway. Dumping board at Market street: sheathed runway and put in braces.

Surveying Party—Soundings have been taken in the slips adjoining Piers 6, 7, 8, 11, 12, 52, and 53, and at the foot of Fifty-third street, East river; at the foot of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river, together with the soundings necessary, from time to time, for the construction of the wall at Christopher street. The wall at Canal street has been frequently tested for "line and level," and results recorded. level," and results recorded.

Iron test tubes were put down near the line of the new wall at Christopher and Clarkson streets, for the purpose of determining the nature of the substratum, and many soundings were taken in these, and the results obtained carefully recorded.

The necessary "lines and levels" for the construction of new Pier 42 and the wall at Christopher street have been given as often as required. A traverse survey has been made of West street, extending from Barrow to Canal street, and a plot of same prepared; all of the soundings taken have been plotted and considerable office detail executed, of which no notice has been taken.

Gansevoort street Yard—This yard has been used principally as a storage yard, and, for that purpose, a large quantity of stores have been received and issued. The blacksmith work required along the North river water front, at the different sections, by the floating property of the Department.

along the North river water front, at the different sections, by the floating property of the Department, and in repairing piers, has been done at this yard; all the cement received by the Department has been tested here, and numerous experiments made for the purpose of ascertaining the tensile strength

of different kinds of English and American cements.

East Seventeenth street Yard—At this yard the stone-cutters have been cutting stone for bulkhead wall up to the end of quarter, when all the rough stock having been cut up, all the employees in the yard, except the foreman and the day and night watchman, were suspended, and the yard closed for the winter months. For all the stone cut during the quarter, the stone-cutters have been paid by the piece instead of by the day, and the result has been that the cost of cutting the masonry facing for bulkhead wall, per running foot, has been reduced from \$49.59 to \$29.01; this would make the amount saved per mile, \$108,662.40.

Permission granted to C. L. Wright & Co. to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, new Pier 46, North river, at a rent of \$60 per day, and said pier set apart for the special kind of business engaged in by Transatlantic Steamships—November 3d.

Permission granted Thomas Patten and E. D. Brown to erect a pile platform in front of the bulkhead foot of Forty-sixth street, East river, and also a similar platform, extending eastwardly from the dock, at foot of said street, at a rent of \$50 per annum, for use of land, under water, covered by said structures—November 3d.

W. Custame, granted permission to occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, small house on the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Sixth street, East river, at a rent of \$10 per month—Novem-

#### CANCELLATIONS AND REDUCTIONS.

Edwin M. Brown, notified that the Department will accept the surrender by him of Piers at foot of Fifth and Twenty-eighth streets, and Nos. 46 and 60, and upper half of Pier 62, East river, and relieve him from all liability for rent thereof, if terms and conditions are complied with—November 3d.

Resolution adopted May 11, 1875, fixing the annual rent to be paid by the New Haven Steamboat Company, for the continued occupancy of Pier 25, East river, and half of bulkhead between Piers 24 and 25, at \$7,000, amended by making said rent \$5,500 per annum—November 3d.

Treasurer of the Department authorized to deduct the sum of \$731 from the rent due November 1st, from Alex. Mason and Robert Foster, lessees, consequent upon the Department having occupied the premises leased to them subsequent to May 1st, last, at which time said leases commenced—

John H. Starin granted a reduction of rent for land under water, between Piers 18 and 20, North river, now fixed at \$2,500 per annum, by resolution May 15, 1875, consequent upon his having occupied only a portion of the premises leased, and said rent fixed at \$1,200 per annum from and after November 1, 1875—December 15th.

Consent given to the substitution of Thomas E. Broadway as surety on lease of the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, in place of John E. Walsh-November 3d.
