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### AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

*Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at their Office, No. 207 Stewart Building, on Friday, November 14, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m.*

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis.

On motion, Frank H. Warder, Stenographer and Typewriter, was elected Secretary pro tem.

The Commissioners thereupon took a recess for the purpose of attending the joint public hearing with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in relation to the application of the contractors for the New Croton Dam for the modification of their contract for building said dam under the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Aqueduct Commissioners met in the former Council Chamber, City Hall, on Friday, November 7, 1902, at 2:30 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of holding a joint public hearing in relation to the application of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, contractors for the New Croton Dam, for a modification of their contract for building said dam under the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902.

David McClure, Esq., counsel for said contractors, addressed the meeting in support of the proposition submitted by Messrs. Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman under date of October 4, 1902.

The Mayor and the Comptroller asked a number of questions and expressed themselves in opposition to granting the application on the terms proposed by the contractors.

No one else appeared.

Whereupon the matter was referred back to the Aqueduct Commissioners for their consideration.

#### AFTER RECESS.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis.  
Also Chief Engineer Hill.

The minutes of meetings of November 5, 6, 7 and 11, 1902, were read and approved.

The Secretary announced that Messrs. James S. Coleman, Jules Breuchaud and B. F. Coleman, composing the firm of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, contractors for the New Croton Dam, with their counsel, David McClure, desired to be heard by the Commissioners, and they were admitted to the meeting.

Mr. McClure addressed the Commissioners in relation to the application of said contractors for the modification of their contract under the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902, and requested to be furnished with copies of the reports of the Engineer in relation to said matter.

The Commissioners stated that the contractors had had an opportunity to modify the proposition originally submitted by them, but that they had adhered to the proposition submitted October 4, 1902; that if the contractors would submit a statement of the actual out-of-pocket expenses that would be incurred by them on account of the amendment of the contract as proposed by them, the Commissioners would give the matter serious consideration.

A discussion of several items in the contract then followed.

Mr. McClure thereupon stated that the contractors would confer in reference to the matter and then communicate with the Commissioners.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of estimates contained in Vouchers Nos. 14767 and 14769 inclusive, amounting to \$38,011.24; and of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 14770 to 14786 inclusive, amounting to \$619.61.

Which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The President stated that, in accordance with the directions of the Commissioners on November 5, 1902, he had transmitted the following letter:

NEW YORK, November 6, 1902.

Messrs. COLEMAN, BREUCHAUD & COLEMAN, Contractors, New Croton Dam:

GENTLEMEN—It appearing by the report of our Engineer that the work which you are now engaged on under your contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam is not progressing as rapidly as it should, we desire to call your attention to the fact that in view of the early date fixed for the completion of the contract every effort must be made by you to expedite the work, using all the necessary means therefor. Your attention is particularly called to clauses M. and P. of said contract.

Which action was approved.

The President presented the following communication of the Chief Engineer in regard to the work on the New Croton Dam:

NEW YORK, November 10, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, November 7, 1902, I would report as follows:

Rock excavation continued for widening the spillway channel at the north end of the dam, near its junction with the river channel. The amount of rock excavation at this point was 320 cubic yards for the week. (See Photo. No. 36, previously submitted.)

Work on the removal of the core wall was also in progress to the south, above elevation 110, and the steam shovel continued the work of excavation, both day and night, in the side hill at the south end of the dam, both above and below the core wall, the face of the work at the core wall being at about Station 1+50.

Work of excavation with the shovel gangs continued on both sides of the wing wall and also below elevation 100, on the downstream side of the dam, but the three gangs have been merged into two.

The amount of earth excavation by steam shovel was about 4,900 cubic yards for the week. The amount of earth excavation by hand gangs was about 2,550 cubic yards for the week. The amount of excavation from core wall is included in the hand gang yardage. The total amount of material removed was about 7,450 cubic yards.

(The location of the above-mentioned work is shown in photos Nos. 38 and 39, submitted with last report.)

The laying of masonry on the dam progressed, with three gangs of masons working, distributed as follows:

1 gang between Stations 7+75 and 8+15.  
1 gang between Stations 8+50 and 9+00.  
1 gang on Gatehouse No. 2.

The total amount of masonry laid on the dam during the week approximated 430 cubic yards.

The number of men employed on the dam and at the quarries averaged about 437 for the week, distributed as follows:

On excavation at south end.....	146
On excavation at spillway.....	16
On masonry on main dam.....	77
At quarry.....	143
Miscellaneous (including office force).....	55

The above-mentioned force is about 90 per cent. of that on the work previous to the strike, and the contractors claim that they are employing men as quickly as they can procure them. Even previous to the strike, however, the force employed on excavation and removal of core and wing wall appeared to be insufficient and more men could have been worked to advantage.

The Chief Engineer verbally explained the above report.

Whereupon the Secretary was directed to transmit the same to the Mayor, and also copy of letter addressed to the contractors for the New Croton Dam, by the President, on November 6, 1902.

The Chief Engineer submitted progress report for the week ending November 7, 1902.

Which was referred to the Construction or Executive Committee with the recommendation that the same be filed.

Report No. 439 was received from the Chief Engineer, dated November 3, 1902, being a detailed report reciting certain facts relating to the subject matter of Report No. 397, concerning claims of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, respecting a change of route and reconstruction and also to his report on communications addressed to the Aqueduct Commissioners on July 14, September 6 and October 23, 1902, by Robert L. Luce, counsel for said railroad company.

In connection therewith a communication was received from Robert L. Luce, of counsel for the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, dated November 10, 1902, accompanied by a blue print, giving a description of two farms to be purchased by the Railroad Company and through which the line of the New York and Mahopac Railroad is to run, owned by the estate of Staats E. Mead and by Aaron B. Whitlock, respectively, and stating that from each of said farms there was to be reserved a strip of land 150 feet in width, being 75 feet each side of the centre line of the said new line of the New York and Mahopac Railroad, and the balance of the property described therein was to be deeded to The City of New York.

The Secretary was directed to attach a copy of said letter to Report No. 439.

The Commissioners thereupon discussed the subject matter of said report and communications, which were verbally explained by the Chief Engineer.

Whereupon the Secretary was directed to transmit copies of the various papers and documents relating to the matter to the Corporation Counsel, with request for his opinion as to whether or not the Aqueduct Commissioners are empowered under chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, especially as amended by chapter 196 of the Laws of 1887, to contract with the railroad companies affected, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for a change of route and reconstruction of the lines of the railroads mentioned therein upon the terms indicated in said papers and documents.

Report No. 440 was received from the Chief Engineer, dated November 10, 1902, stating that in his opinion the rate of progress of the work of constructing the Muscote Dam by Williams & Gerstle, contractors, was not such as would insure its completion on or before November 1, 1903, and in accordance with clause P of the contract certifying that the work of building the Muscote Dam was unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed.

Which was referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

The following report was also received from the Chief Engineer:

Report No. 442 was received from the Chief Engineer, dated November 11, 1902, recommending the appointment of Gerald S. Griffin as Assistant Engineer at a salary of \$1,800 per annum.

The report was ordered filed, and the following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, Gerald S. Griffin, of No. 326 East One Hundred and Twentieth street, be and hereby is appointed Assistant Engineer in the Engineer Corps of the Aqueduct Commissioners, at a salary of \$1,800 per annum, his compensation to begin when he is assigned to duty by the Chief Engineer.

Adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

Report No. 443 was received from the Chief Engineer, dated November 13, 1902, relating to an eligible list of Axemen, and recommending the appointment of Mahlon D. Coe.



The report was ordered filed, and the following resolution was offered:  
Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, Mahlon D. Coe, of No. 333 West Twenty-ninth street, be and hereby is appointed as Axeman in the Engineer Corps of the Aqueduct Commissioners at a salary of \$60 per month, he having been certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for such appointment; his salary to commence when he is assigned to duty by the Chief Engineer.

Adopted by the following vote:  
Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

A communication was received from the Comptroller dated November 8, 1902, in relation to telephone service.  
Which was considered and ordered filed.

The Comptroller, under date of November 7, 1902, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners during the month ending October 31, 1902, amounting to \$1,652, leaving a balance to the credit of the Additional Water Fund on November 7 of \$127,064.62.  
Which was ordered entered on the books of the Commissioners and filed.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated November 7, 1902, acknowledging receipt of a letter of this Commission of November 5, 1902, in reply to his communication of October 10, 1902, with which he transmitted a map entitled "Section Map E" and recommended that certain lands marked with a blue pencil be acquired by The City of New York, and stating that, in his opinion, based on the report of Mr. George W. Birdsall, Consulting and Hydraulic Engineer and former Chief Engineer of his Department, he recommended that the tract of land on the northerly side of the highway leading from the Old Croton Dam to Kitchawan, as well as that on the southerly side of said highway, be acquired by the City, as requested in his communication of October 10, 1902.

Assistant Superintendent, Michael J. Rickard, submitted a report showing the expenditures of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for nine months ending October 31, 1902, and making the following recommendations:

First—That the drivers' sitting room in the stable be furnished with a gas radiator, and that the horses' stall room be not heated.

Second—That a portable building be placed at the easterly end of the gate house for the purpose of receiving visitors to the hospital at their first entrance.

Third—That the Assistant Superintendent be authorized to secure the services of sixteen painters and six carpenters to do the necessary painting and repairing in the wards of Bellevue Hospital.

Fourth—That storm-doors be erected outside the hallways at a cost of \$250.

Moved, seconded and carried, that a sum not exceeding \$20 be appropriated for the purpose of putting a gas radiator in the men's room in the stable.

Moved, seconded and carried, that an appropriation of \$250 be and is hereby made for the purpose of erecting storm-doors as requested in the report of the Assistant Superintendent.

Moved, seconded and carried, that the Superintendent be authorized and instructed to secure a house, or such portion of one as may be necessary, for the accommodation of the help now quartered in the Medical College Building.

Moved, seconded and carried, that the Superintendent be authorized to secure the services of a Bookkeeper from the Civil Service list at an annual salary of \$1,500.

The following motion was passed after having been duly seconded:

Resolved, That Mr. M. J. Rickard, Assistant Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, be authorized to secure the services of sixteen painters and six carpenters to do the necessary painting and repairing in the wards of Bellevue Hospital, provided there is no legal obstacle to the carrying out of this work; and

Resolved further, That he be authorized to purchase white lead, turpentine, enamel, lumber, etc., required to do the above work.

#### Communications.

A letter was received from the Hon. Herbert Parsons, member of the Board of Aldermen, announcing that the Board of Aldermen at its last session had failed to pass the resolution making an additional issue of fourteen thousand dollars Corporate Stock to be expended upon the conversion of the Medical College Building into dormitories, and suggesting that, in view of the additional sum required for this work, it would be wise to advertise again for bids.

Moved, seconded and carried, that the Secretary write to Messrs. Williams & Gerstle, Contractors, announcing to them that, in consequence of the Board of Aldermen having declined to approve of the issue of stock (upon which approval the acceptance of their bid was made "conditional" by this Board) the same is consequently rejected.

A letter was received from Mr. William Paul Gerhard, Sanitary Engineer, stating that his fee for preparing plans and specifications and for superintending the work of renewing the plumbing in Bellevue Hospital would be 10 per cent. of the entire cost, and stating terms for a preliminary examination of the repairs needed.

Moved, seconded and carried, that Mr. Gerhard be authorized to proceed with his examination and the preparation of specifications for the work.

Dr. Brannan announced the receipt of a letter from Messrs. Renwick, Aspinwall & Owen, No. 365 Fifth avenue, protesting against the action of the Board in holding them responsible for the condition of the stairway in Bellevue Hospital.

Moved, seconded and carried, that the Secretary write to Messrs. Renwick, Aspinwall & Owen, stating that in the opinion of this Board the stairs should have been turned before the erection of the wall in front of them.

A communication from Miss Carrie Gray, Supervising Nurse of Fordham Hospital, asking that the salary of a Helper be increased from \$144 to \$180, and the salary of a Waitress from \$216 to \$240, was received and referred to the President with power.

A letter was received from the Rev. Father E. K. Stone, acknowledging his appointment to the position of Catholic Chaplain and expressing his thanks therefor.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, inclosing copy of an ordinance necessary for the acquisition of additional lands as a site for the new Harlem Hospital, said ordinance to be submitted to the Board of Aldermen for passage and approval.

The following resolution, after having been duly moved and seconded, was unanimously carried:

Whereas, The City of New York, under authority of chapter 723 of the Laws of 1897 did heretofore acquire title to certain premises in the Borough of Manhattan as a site for the new Harlem Hospital, bounded and described as follows:

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which with the proper envelope in which to enclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
