Hon. LAWRENCE GRESSER, President of the Borough of Queens:

Dear Sir—Recently you referred to me a communication from the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the Board, in which he recommends that a resolution of the Local Board of the Jamaica District, initiating proceedings for the construction of a disposal plant in connection with the Richmond Hill drainage area, be returned to the President of the Borough without approval, requesting that your attention be called to the fact that owing to an opinion of the Corporation Counsel the approved drainage maps of Sections 40 and 41, including Woodhaven and Richmond Hill, showing a sanitary system of sewers, must be considered as tentative only, and that you be requested to consider the advisability of designing a more comprehensive system of combined sewers of a capacity suited to the reasonable requirements of the section, and with provision for securing an outlet at the Jamaica disposal plant.

In my report of March 17, 1909, on this matter I have outlined a general scheme indicating a percentage of runoff to be taken care of in a system of combined sewers, a temporary method of disposal at the Jamaica plant, a plan for final disposal and the general lines for trunk sewers. This scheme calls for provision to carry off a considerable percentage of storm water, which was not provided for in the sanitary system.

The designing, developing and mapping of this drainage area alone requires a large amount of work, and in view of the fact that this work should be done as quickly as possible, so as to afford much needed relief to this rapidly developing territory, and in further view of the fact that the drainage maps for Newtown Heights, Maspeth and Corona should be developed without delay, and on account of the urgent and earnest petitions for these improvements by the people of Richmond Hill and, further, in view of the fact that the ponds and lakes that form during each storm make many streets impassable, and in the case of Johnson Avenue prevent children from entering or leaving the school until the water subsides, on account of the urgency in the matter and the fact that an entire new set of plans must be drawn up and approved before any construction can take place, I would recommend that you increase the force in designing of drainage and sewer maps by detailing a number of men who shall put their entire time on this work.

At the present time the office men of the Sewer Bureau are so few in number, and the routine work and designing for construction takes so much of their time, that there is no one to work continuously on the design of drainage maps.

The Budget appropriation does not provide for the expenses of this much needed work; therefore I would recommend that you apply for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the extent of \$15,000, to be applied to the above purposes.

Sir—In the matter of a communication from the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, requesting the establishment of the position of Book Typewriter at \$750, \$900, \$1,050 and \$1,200 per annum, respectively, referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration, and by you to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments states that a considerable portion of the records of the Department could be better and more economically kept if use could be made of book typewriting machines, a number of which have been bought for the purpose, but which cannot be used for want of authority to employ persons who can operate them. Sir—In regard to a communication presented from the Commissioner of Public Charities to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated June 2, 1908, requesting the establishment of positions and grades of Chief Examiner of Charitable Institutions, Telephone Switchboard Operator, and Pathologist, which matter was referred to the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration and report, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

Provision was made in the Budget for 1909 (No. 258) for a Chief Examiner of Charitable Institutions, at \$1,500 per annum. In the departmental salary schedules, as modified on January 21, 1909, the allowance of \$1,500 for Chief Examiner was stricken out, and \$1,200 granted for an additional Examiner of Charitable Institutions, for the reason that the position of Chief Examiner had not been established by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and Board of Aldermen. The Commissioner stated that he desired to place one of the Examiners in charge of the other fifteen, who might be recognized as Chief and exercise supervision; to issue instructions, pass upon Examiners' reports, and see that proper examination was made in cases of persons sought to be made public charges.

It is unnecessary to take into consideration the application for establishment of the position and grades of Telephone Switchboard Operator, as the Board of Aldermen, on February 10, 1909, adopted a resolution approving of the establishment of grades of Telephone Operator, at \$600, \$720, \$750 and \$1,050 a year, which applies to all the City Departments.

In regard to the establishment of the position of Pathologist, at \$1,800 a year, the Commissioner stated that while the services of Pathologists have been given free, it was difficult at times to obtain a physician who would give the time required for such work without remuneration.

It appears that Pathologists are provided for in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals at \$1,500 a year. Provision should also be made for compensation of professional men of this class in the Department of Public Charities, and at the same rate, the duties being similar.

The Commissioner assured your Examiner that the granting of his application for the various positions and grades requested would not entail an increase over the amount allowed the Department in the Budget for 1909.

The Commissioner stated that when the above positions have been established he would present an application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a revision of the salary schedules for 1909, in order to conform to the proposed changes.

I recommend that the application of the Commissioner of Public Charities for the establishment of the positions of Chief Examiner of Charitable Institutions, at \$1,500, and Pathologist, at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, be granted.

Mr. M. J. Rickard, the Acting Superintendent, reported as follows:
From January 24 to January 30, inclusive, fifty-six operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, fifteen at Gouverneur Hospital, thirty-one at Harlem Hospital and twenty-five at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

A full attendance of the visiting physicians and surgeons is reported during the month of January.

A fire drill was held at Gouverneur Hospital on January 25, at Harlem Hospital on January 29 and at Bellevue and Fordham Hospitals on January 30.

A communication has been received from Dr. M. S. Gregory regarding the transfer of a patient from ward 30 and also a report from Dr. McLean.

The Supervising Apothecary recommends the appointment of an additional Apothecary at Bellevue Hospital; the General Superintendent of Training Schools requests permission to appoint sufficient help in place the new building in proper condition and to care for the property; the managers of the laundry request additional help and the Acting Dictator recommends increases in salaries of three employees. It is recommended that these matters be referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees.

A requisition has been received from Gouverneur Hospital for X-ray diaphragms at a cost of \$170 and the Manager of the Laundry asks for two new extractors. It is recommended that these matters be referred to the Committee on Supplies.

Dr. Robert C. James asks for a special Nurse for a few days to care for a case of erysipelas; Dr. Herman Biggs asks for a special Nurse for a patient suffering from pneumonia, and Dr. Hartwell asks for a special Nurse for one or two days to care for a patient where transfusion was necessary during operation. It is recommended that these Nurses be granted.

It is reported that the work of painting the balconies at Harlem Hospital has not yet been completed.

Two communications have been received from the Kny-Scheerer Company in reference to the continuous baths in pavilions 38 and 39, and it is recommended that they be referred to the Building Committee.

A communication has been received from Dr. M. S. Gregory regarding the transfer of a patient from the New York City Home, and it is recommended that the matter be referred to the Commissioner of Public Charities, Mr. Hebbard.

It is recommended that, instead of employing a Junior Draughtsman as requested by Mr. Jones, an Assistant Architect be engaged as in the Department of Public Charities, and that all requests for alterations in buildings and important changes be referred to him to prepare plans, specifications, etc., where necessary, such employee to be directly under the General Medical Superintendent, or in his absence under the Assistant Superintendent.

A communication was received from Miss Stowers, Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital, regarding the book for the attending staff of the Out Patient Department, and it is recommended that it be referred to the Committee of Gouverneur Hospital.

It is recommended that telephones be placed in the workshops of the Carpenter, Painter, Plumber and Electrician, so that the Supervising Engineer may communicate with the persons in charge; also that a telephone extension be placed on the fifth floor of the hospital for the use of the doctors.

Mr. Morris J. Levi, of No. 147 Water street, states that the lease of the property at No. 113 West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, occupied by Nurses of Harlem Hospital, expires on April 1. He is anxious to know at the earliest possible moment whether the Trustees wish to avail themselves of the option they have of renewing the lease for a year or more.

Two communications from Miss Frost, the Acting Housekeeper, in reference to the keys for the doctors' rooms are submitted.

It is recommended that four steel stamps, one for each hospital in the Department, be purchased, and that all surgical instruments now on hand be stamped with the name of the respective hospitals. They will cost about four dollars each.

By direction of the President it is reported that the Supervising Engineer has the plans for the passageway leading to pavilions A and B and is now working on the specifications and the probable cost of the work.

Resolved, To refer to the Committee on the Reception and Care of Persons Alleged to be Insane the letter from Dr. Gregory regarding a patient transferred from the alcoholic ward and also the report from Dr. McLean.

Reports of Committees.

Dr. Brannan reported upon the proposed lease of the property at Nos. 6, 8 and 10 Water street as an annex to the Gouverneur Hospital Dispensary and on motion, duly seconded, the matter was referred to the Building Committee to prepare plans and specifications of the changes which will become necessary in the interior of the building, it being essential to know this before a proposal can be made to the present owners.

Dr. Brannan reported that the house at No. 115 West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, next to the house at present occupied by nurses of Harlem Hospital, is vacant and may be rented for a sum of \$1,200 a year, the building accommodating thirteen nurses. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the President for further investigation and with power to act.

Dr. Brannan reported upon the premises at No. 210 West Fifth street as a suitable place for the establishment of a relief station in connection with taking over the ambulance work of Roosevelt Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the President with power.

Mr. Robbins of the Building Committee reported receipt of bids on the work of erecting a partition in the office of the General Medical Superintendent, and on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To accept the lowest bid and to have the work begun immediately.

Communications.

Communications were received from the Studebaker Company and the White Company with bids on automobile ambulances. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the President was empowered to buy a White Steam ambulance at a cost of three thousand dollars.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to establish the grade of Chauffeur in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals at a salary of \$1,200 a year each for four incumbents. Awaiting the establishment of this grade, it is understood that the Company from which the automobile is bought is to render bills for the services of the Chauffeur.

A communication dated February 2 was received from Messrs. Parish & Schroeder in the matter of lighting fixtures for the new training school building. Upon the recommendation of the architect it was

Resolved, To reject all bids received on the lighting fixtures and to advertise anew for bids.

Unfinished Business.

Resolved, To reconsider the vote by which the bill making six months' experience compulsory in the case of Ambulance Surgeons was approved by the Board, and instead of the action taken it was

Duties of the Committee on Supplies.

(2) The Committee on Supplies shall have charge of all matters relating to the purchase of supplies of all character. All supplies, as far as possible, shall be obtained by contract made by public bids in the manner provided by law. These bids shall be examined by the Committee and referred with recommendation to the Board, the General Medical Superintendent co-operating with the Committee.

Duties of the Committee on Officers and Employees.

(3) It shall be the duty of the Committee on Officers and Employees to pass upon all appointments (except those referred to the Conference Committees), dismissals, resignations, transfers, etc. It shall also have supervision of all questions involving changes in salaries and shall report with recommendation to the Board of Trustees, the General Medical Superintendent co-operating with the Committee.

Duties of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

(4) The Committee on Buildings and Grounds shall have charge of all matters relating to the erection, enlargement, alteration or repairing of all hospital buildings and premises, the fitting up and equipping thereof with all necessary sanitary, electric, heating and ventilating work, furniture, etc., and shall determine the amount to be expended therefor, subject to financial ability and the approval of the Board of Trustees.

Whenever it shall be necessary to advertise for proposals to do any of the work of which said Committee has charge, it shall so report to the Board recommending that authority be given for advertising for proposals.

Duties of the Finance Committee.

(5) It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to pass upon the departmental estimate each year. It shall be the duty of said Committee to see that the expenditures on the authorized appropriations are not exceeded, and to receive monthly reports of the balances on hand of each appropriation. It shall also have charge of all matters relating to the accounts and the auditing of the same.

It is suggested that stated meetings of the Board be held on the first and third Tuesdays of each month, at four o'clock in the afternoon, and that meetings of the standing committees be held on the alternate weeks whenever necessary.

It is also recommended that the services of a special Stenographer (to be present and take down the proceedings in shorthand) be engaged, such Stenographer to attend also all meetings of special committees and prepare stenographic reports of their proceedings for submission to the Board and incorporation in the minutes of the same.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To refer these changes in the rules back to the Committee on Rules for incorporation in the rules adopted on May 8, 1906.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the bid or estimate, and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the content, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a verified check upon one of the State or National Banks of The City of New York, drawn in the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The verified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from a contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the contract envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form annexed by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be sent there.
