REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING JANUARY 17, 1914.

CAMPAIGN AGAINST MEDICAL QUACKERY.

Appropos of the resolution introduced by Hon. William H. Chorosh in the Board of Aldermen last week, making it a misdemeanor to insert in newspapers, circulars or handbills any advertisement of any sort whatever concerning merchandise, the sale of securities, personal service, or commodities, which contain a misstatement of fact or are misleading or deceptive in any way, we should like to call attention to the work which the Department of Health is doing in order to combat the methods of the advertising medical quacks.

In most of the foreign newspapers published in this city, in many of the sporting papers, and even in some of the high class daily newspapers, there appear advertisements of various "doctors" and "institutes" calling themselves "specialists in treating the diseases of men." In these advertisements are found statements like the following: "I treat 'blood poison' until cured for \$10"; "Not a dollar need be paid until cured"; "I was the first physician to announce for public benefit the wonderful new serum—606"; "Wasserman blood tests made in every instance"; "Cure guaranteed."

The Department of Health has on file statements from men who have been to these quacks. After reading these authentic histories, it can be seen how these "doctors" stand by the promises made by them in the papers.

A patient went to Dr. A (who advertises in the daily papers), and was treated for two months for gonorrhea. He paid Dr. A. \$10 down and \$2 a week. He left Dr. A for Dr. B, who stated that gonorrhea was in his blood and he needed an injection of vaccine, and that this would cost \$125. As Dr. B advertises "not a cent need be paid until cured," the patient reminded him of this statement. Dr. B thereupon said that if the patient did not wish to pay him while being treated, he should put the \$125 in a bank (of which Dr. B. claimed to be a director) in a joint account under Dr. B's and the patient's name, the money to go to Dr. B when the patient was cured. When the patient demurred at this also, Dr. B offered to treat him for \$5 a week. At the Department of Health, examination of his blood showed that he had absolutely no gonorrheal infection.

Another patient had syphilis for seven years. For two years he was treated by an advertising quack in Hartford, to whom he paid between two and three hundred dollars. He then came to a "medical institute" in New York, and paid fifty dollars more for treatment. Then he went back to the Hartford quack for more treatment, and thence to Waterbury, to another advertising quack. Finally he came to Dr. A in New York, who advertises that he gives 606. This patient says that Dr. A stuck a needle into his arm, and, while pretending to inject a solution of 606, allowed the solution (undoubtedly simply colored water) to run into a pail. For this performance Dr. A charged \$15. Despite the fact that practically each of these quacks claimed to have effected a cure, a large hospital in this city subsequently reported his blood as still showing syphilis.

Every one should know that it takes at least three years to cure syphilis. Is it reasonable to suppose that the physician who advertises "not a dollar need be paid until cured" waits three years until the patient pays him? Certainly not, and our histories emphatically prove this. One of these "physicians" who so advertises pays between seven and eight thousand dollars a year for his advertisement in one daily paper. Is it possible for the quacks who advertise to "treat until cured" for \$8 or \$10 to give efficient, adequate treatment for three or four years for this sum of money?

Persons having either gonorrhea or syphilis, or who believe they have a disease of the sex organs, and who have no private physician, should call at the Department of Health, 149 Centre st., room 801, any Monday, Wednesday, or Friday, between 2 and 4 P. M., or any Tuesday, Thursday or Saturday between 9 and 11 A. M., for free and confidential advice. Residents of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens are referred to the Department of Health Clinic, 20 3d ave., Brooklyn; hours, daily from 9 to 11 A. M.; Tuesday and Friday nights, from 8 to 9.

In this connection, it is interesting to learn that in Chicago, following the recent exposure of quack doctors, the City Council has passed an ordinance to prevent false and misleading advertising in Chicago. According to a note in a recent number of the Journal of the American Medical Association, the ordinance follows closely the Printer's Ink bill, which, with modifications, has already been enacted into law in sixteen States. As adopted in Chicago, it forbids the publication of any "advertising which contains assertion, representation or statement which is untrue, deceptive or misleading."

THE PROLONGATION OF LIFE.

We commented recently on the increase which has taken place in the mortality at the higher age groups. A consideration of the problem thus presented led Dr. Hermann M. Biggs, more than five years ago, to advocate the regular medical examination of persons over forty-five years of age. Dr. Biggs suggested that when that age was reached an individual should place himself entirely in the hands of a competent medical adviser, consult him at regular intervals, and so learn how to prevent many of the degenerative changes which give rise to this increased mortality. It is gratifying to observe that his suggestion has borne fruit. Under date of December 30 there is announced the formation of a unique corporation, namely, "A Life Extension Institute," the express purpose of which is to perform the services just mentioned and so to lengthen human life by the application of modern science. The method to be used is very simple, and is similar to that which is applied to ordinary machinery, namely, inspection and repairs. After the human machine has been carefully inspected, the individual will be advised to see his family physician, who will be furnished a full statement of the results of the examination, both physical and laboratory. The institute is fashioned somewhat after the Model Homes Association; that is, it is a philanthropy conducted on a self-supporting basis. It is to charge a small fee for its work, and any

receipts above cost, including a reasonable return on capital, will be devoted to extending its public usefulness.

BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATIONS OF MILK.

The following summary of recent bacteriological examinations of milk is interesting, as showing the excellent character of the supply at the present time:

On January 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9, there were 268 samples of Grade B pasteurized milk taken from 64 different dealers. These samples showed an average bacterial content of 2,595 per cubic centimeter.

On the same dates there were 255 samples of Grade B raw milk taken from 53 different creameries. These samples showed an average bacterial content of 11,145 per cubic centimeter.

All of the above samples were taken as offered for sale to the consumers.

At the present time approximately 1,250,000 quarts of Grade B pasteurized milk are being sold daily.

DISINFECTION OF TYPHOID STOOLS.

At the Fifteenth International Congress on Hygiene and Demography, held in Washington in September, 1912, Prof. Prausnitz, of Austria, described a simple and effective method of disinfecting typhoid stools devised by Dr. Kaiser in the Hygienic Institute of Gratz University. It consists in the addition of enough hot water to cover the stool in the receptacle and then adding about one-quarter of the entire bulk of quick lime (calcium oxide), covering the receptacle and allowing it to stand for two hours. The hydration of the lime generates enough heat to destroy the typhoid organism.

In the Boston Medical and Surgical Journal of January 8, Linenthal and Jones of the Massachusetts State Board of Health published the results of experiments made to test the efficiency of this method. They found that when hot water was used, as just stated, the temperature invariably rose to 75 degrees C. or over in ten minutes, and in twenty minutes it reached 85 degrees and often 90 degrees, and a temperature was maintained over 60 degrees for an hour and a half or longer. They next tested the effect of this method on the destruction of typhoid bacilli, and in all their experiments found that the typhoid bacilli were killed. Their conclusions are as follows:

"The addition of about a cupful of commercial unslaked lime and water to a typhoid stool will generate enough heat to kill the typhoid organism. While cold water may often suffice, it cannot be depended upon owing to the variable quality of the lime. Hot water from 50 degrees to 60 degrees C. will always give the desired results. The lime used should be in lumps, broken up in small pieces and distributed over the stool."

"We believe that this is a simple, efficacious method and should take the place of the various methods now recommended by local Boards of Health."

DEATH RATE FOR WEEK ENDING JANUARY 17, 1914.

There were 1,591 deaths and a death rate of 14.86 per 1,000 of the population reported during the past week, against 1,546 deaths and a rate of 15.01 for the corresponding week of 1913, an apparent increase of 45 deaths and a decrease in the rate of .15 of a point, which is equivalent to a relative decrease of 16 deaths.

The following causes showed a decreased mortality, diphtheria and croup, whooping cough, diarrhoeal diseases under five years of age, influenza, acute respiratory diseases, including acute bronchitis, lobar and broncho-pneumonia. The causes showing increased mortality were measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, organic heart diseases, pulmonary tuberculosis, Bright's disease and nephritis and deaths from violence.

Viewed from the point of age grouping, there were 46 less deaths of children under one year of age, 55 less deaths of children under five years of age, between five and sixty-five years there was an increase of 69 deaths, and sixty-five years and over, an increase of 31 deaths, so that the increased mortality for the week was chiefly among those causes which affect adult life or old age, as organic heart and kidney disease and pulmonary tuberculosis.

The death rate for the first three weeks of the year was 14.62 per 1,000 of the population as against 14.82 for the corresponding period of 1913, a decrease of .20 of a point.

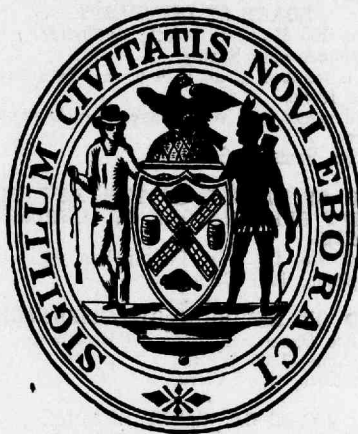

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in

the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President, or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally, upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
