City of New York, President of the Borough of The Bronx, Third Avenue and 177th Street, March 14, 1916.

The Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, New York City, New York:

Gentlemen—Request is hereby respectfully made, in accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, for authority to purchase asphalt sand in the open market, without public letting, to an amount not to exceed five thousand (5,000) cubic yards, for use at the asphalt plant, Borough of The Bronx.

The reasons for this request are as follows: The grading of the sand required for use in the preparation of material for asphalt pavement is such that there are but few points of production from which a suitable sand can be obtained, and therefore the number of bidders on advertised contracts is limited.

A public letting for asphalt sand was held, but all bids were rejected as the prices submitted were deemed excessive.

In view of the fact that the active season for repairs to asphalt pavements is at hand, I would urge that prompt consideration be given this request.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment-Resolution for Corporate Stock, \$144,-000, to Provide Means for the Reconstruction of the Present Wood Block Pavement on the Roadway of the Queensboro Bridge, Etc.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen-I transmit herewith certified copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 17, 1916, authorizing the issue of \$144,000 corporate stock, to provide means for the reconstruction of the present wood block pavement on the roadway of the Queensboro Bridge, and work incidental thereto, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges.

I also enclose copy of report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget relative thereto. Respectfully, JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding one hundred and forty-four thousand dollars (\$144,000), to provide means for the reconstruction of the present wood block pavement on the roadway of the Queensboro Bridge and work incidental thereto, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes aforesaid; provided, however, that no encumbrance or expenditure by contract shall be made against the proceeds of corporate stock herein authorized, nor shall bids upon such contracts be advertised for until after approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plans, specifications, estimates of cost and forms of such contracts which shall be submitted to said Board by the Commissioner of Bridges, nor shall any architect, engineer, expert or departmental employee be engaged or employed as a charge against such proceeds, except after approval by said Board of such employment and of the fee or wage to be paid by prliminary and final contract, voucher or budget schedule, which are to be similarly submitted, unless in the case of departmental employees, such employment is in accordance with schedules approved by said Board.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen-On October 25, 1915, the Commissioner of Bridges requested an issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$144,000 for the purpose of reconstructing the present wood block pavement on the roadway of the Queensboro Bridge.

On October 25, 1915, this request was referred to the Bureau of Contract Super-

vision, which reports thereon as follows: "Acting upon the request has been delayed pending a determination of the ques-

tion of track removal. "The contemplated work consists of relaying a wood block pavement upon a

specially constructed foundation, the removal of the present street railway tracks from the bridge roadway and the transfer of that service of the tracks on the outer brackets of the structure.

"The present wood block pavement extends from Second avenue, Manhattan, to Crescent street, Queens. From the Manhattan anchor pier to Ely avenue in Oueens, the pavement rests upon a concrete foundation of varying thickness, which in turn, is supported by buckle plates riveted to the floor beams and stringers. This section has presented the greatest difficulty in the matter of proper repair, practically all of the expenditures for upkeep having been confined to this portion. A report of the Engineer in charge of this bridge contained the following:

'The Department's experience in maintaining bridge pavements under modern metropolitan roadway traffic indicates that the main defects and causes of failure lay in the bridge floors and not in the pavement itself. On the main spans and on the steel supported sections of the Queensboro Bridge the under floor is strong enough to carry any reasonable loads, but it is elastic in spots. The concrete in the buckles and over the fillets is distorted more than that over the rigid confined edges of the plates. It is crushed and ground under repeated wheel passings and the mortar component leaches with the rain through the drain holes in the bottom of each buckle. The pavement over the buckle then sinks while that over the floor beams and stringers remains in place until the blocks are splintered and go to pieces under traffic or are "blown up" by rain and frost.'

"In order to overcome these conditions, the Bridge Department has experimented with different types of foundations and pavement during the past two years, As a result of this investigation, the proposed work will embrace the corrective features of stiffening the buckle plates to prevent distortion under heavy loads; the insertion of expansion dams at frequent intervals, and the installation of new 11/2-inch pipe drains through the concrete at the center of each buckle plate to pre-

vent any lodgment of water between the blocks and foundation.

"Since the proposed repaying requires the reconstruction of the floor system, the existing tracks between the trusses must be removed during such operation. in order to obviate the expense of relaying new rails, it is proposed to transfer the street railway service now operating over these tracks to the tracks supported on the outer brackets of the bridge over which two other companies now operate. The Bridge Department states that the greatest density of travel so far reached on the Queensboro Bridge is 140 cars per hour in one direction over two tracks. At the peak of the rush hour on the Brooklyn Bridge, 360 cars per hour per single tracks were operated in one direction. Further, the operation of the Second avenue elevated trains over the Queensboro Bridge, the newly constructed elevated lines to Queens, and the proposed tunnel connection between Manhattan and Queens will all tend to relieve any future possibility of surface car congestion. In addition to these facts, the rapidly increasing amount of vehicular traffic on the bridge demands as wide a roadway as can be provided.

"The contemplated work will involve the repaving of approximately 33,000 square yards of roadway with the incidental work, as outlined above. The Bridge Department proposes to do the work by departmental labor. The estimated cost is

Whereas, By the opinion of the Corporation Counsel as of June 28 and July 30, 1910, the Comptroller was advised that the payment of salaries of Janitors in the Department of Education was illegal unless such salary shall have been established under the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter; and

Whereas, The special Committee on Janitorial Compensation and the Committee on School Inquiry, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, submitted a joint report on March 27, 1913, which contained detailed suggestions and recommendations for the reorganization of the Janitorial force of the Board of Education; therefore, be it

For the care of Public School 19 (Annex), Manhattan, located in Grace Chapel, it is proposed to increase the janitorial compensation from \$5 to \$10 per month on account of two additional rooms being used.

For the care of the new addition to Public Schools 18, Brooklyn, and 20, Richmond, temporary rates of \$75 and \$100 per month, respectively, are proposed, to compensate the janitors assigned to these buildings to prepare them for occupancy. The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond:

Commissioner of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond-Request for Permission to Purchase Metal Storage Cabinets for American Museum of Natural History, Without Public Letting.

City of New York, Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond,

Municipal Building, 10th Floor, March 21st, 1916.

Hon. FRANK L. Dowling, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City: Sir-Request is hereby made, on behalf of the American Museum of Natural History, for exemption from public letting, under the provisions of Section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, of the purchase of metal storage cabinets at an estimate of cost of approximately \$15,000.

The Museum officials state to me that the reason for this request is that advantage may be taken of an offer of the Van Dorn Iron Works Company, which will be withdrawn on March 25th unless we close before that date. In event, however, of reasonable assurances that you will act favorably upon this request the time may be extended for a period sufficiently long to carry through the formalities incidental thereto. The offer of the Van Dorn Company is in total \$13,488 for a certain quantity of work, but they will perform additional quantity necessary and incidental thereto for the estimated difference in the amount at the same rate of cost, which will bring the total amount required up to \$15,000.

The Van Dorn Iron Works Company states in a communication to the American Museum of Natural History that in the advance purchases of steel used in this work they have covered the required amount and will thus be able to fill at the proposed price, but that if the matter is delayed they expect an additional increase in the contract prices of sheet metal and that before the end of April it will again be increased, which will make it practically impossible for them to permit their bid to stand.

It would appear to me that the request is made in good faith and that it is absolutely in the interests of economy that they be permitted to make this purchase under

the exemption provided for this purpose.

In connection with this, your attention is called to the fact that under the provisions of the authorization scheduled as C.D.P. 3-E, American Museum of Natural History, Equipment, the Museum officials cannot go forward with any purchases against the authorization, be they through public letting, open market order or by exemption, except with the approval of specifications by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This is provided for explicitly in the authorization. The city will thereby be safeguarded to the fullest extent. Respectfully yours,

The President laid before the Board the following communication from Hon. Edward Polak, Register, Borough of The Bronx, as Chairman of the Elected County Officials of the several counties embraced in The City of New York:

Communication from Edward Polak, as Chairman of the Elected County Officials of the City of New York, in Relation to Senate Bill No. 622 Providing for Referendum to the People of the City in 1917 in the Matter of Power to Fix Salaries of County Officials.

County Clerk's Office, County of New York, New County Court House, New

York, March 20, 1916.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York: Gentlemen—There is now before the Legislature of the State of New York, a measure known as "Senate Bill No. 622," introduced by Senator Elon R. Brown, providing for a referendum to be voted upon at the general election in 1917, and transferring to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York the power to fix salaries, of County officials, other than Judicial and elected ones, within the Counties embraced in the Greater City.

On March 8, the elected County officials of The City of New York, of which I am the Chairman, opposed the present form of the Bill at the hearing before the Joint Cities Committee, and suggested an alternative proposition, viz., that the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as successors to the various County Boards of Supervisors, should have equal power and concurrent jurisdiction with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to initiate, review, and fix salaries and establish positions of employees in the various Counties at the annual Budget hearings held

in October of each year.

The County officials respectfully submitted, at that hearing, that experience had demonstrated the extreme danger of concentrating government in the hands of a few men, and removing the power from local representative groups. It was pointed out that there had been a gradual breaking down of the system of autonomous government since the power of the Board of Aldermen had been exercised by the Board of Estimate, and this latest attempt to control the government of the remaining County offices was the last link in such a chain of destruction of local autonomy in the Counties.

We call your attention to the fact that, at present, County officials, in the administration of their offices, stand between two disturbing and embarrassing extremes interference on the part of the Board of Estimate in purely internal matters of office discipline, and mandatory regulation by the State Legislature. The present Bill, Senate No. 622, offers no relief, without the alternative proposition which we propose, in the shape of a resolution asking that concurrent powers be given to the Board of Aldermen.

The local boards of Aldermen are closer to the people, closer to the localities they represent, and will much better understand the local conditions governing the

offices now administered by the present harrassed County officials.

Subsequent to the hearing before the Joint Committees, at Albany, a Sub-committee of the County officials held a conference with Senator Brown, and laid the alternative proposition before him giving the Aldermen concurrent power. He stated to them that if the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York desired such power they should make their sentiments known in the form of a Resolution to that effect, and if said resolution was adopted by the Board of Aldermen and forwarded to the Legislature serious consideration would be accorded the measure before the Senate Cities Committee.

In view of the above, and acting in behalf of the Association of elected County Officials, I am calling to the attention of your honorable body the resolution which will be offered by one of your members, upon which we ask favorable action, and ask to have same forwarded to Senator Elon R. Brown, and the members of the Senate Cities Committee.

In view of the fact that this Bill, Senate Bill No. 622, will in all probability be reported out of Committee this week, it becomes imperative that action by your honorable body be not deferred. Copies of this resolution have been forwarded to the majority and minority leaders of your honorable board. Representing the Association of Elected County Officials, I earnestly bespeak your careful and immediate con sideration in the matter.

Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the city, abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall, within 4 hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow and ice, dirt or other material from the sidewalk and gutter, the time between 9 P. M. and 7 A. M. not being included in the above period of 4 hours; provided, however, that such removal shall in all cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the commissioner of street cleaning, or by the borough president of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said commissioner of street cleaning, or of said borough president of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow and ice, dirt or other material; except that in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant, or other person who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street or public place, for a linear distance of 500 feet or more, shall be considered to have complied with this section, if such person shall have begun to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said 4 hours, and shall continue and complete such removal within a reasonable

[Whenever] Any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved who shall [fail] have failed to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the city for the removal of snow and ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lot abuts, shall, upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine of not more than \$3.

Whenever any such owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person cannot be found, the president of the borough in which such building or vacant lot is located may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said borough president to the comptroller, and the board of estimate and apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such snow and ice [and snow], dirt or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds which shall be sold by the comptroller, as provided by law.

The said borough president shall, as soon as possible, after the work is done, certify to the corporation counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each

piece of property.

The corporation counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of this expense, together with [\$3] \$15 dollars penalty for each offense, and when so recovered the amount shall be turned over to the city chamberlain to be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the city of New York for the reduction of taxation.

Upon complaint being made to the borough president having jurisdiction thereof that any sidewalk[, curb or gutter] is not paved [or repaired] and curbed according to this article, he may cause a notice to be served upon the owner[, lessee or occupant,] of any house[,] or other building or vacant lot of ground fronting thereon to pave [repair or relay, as the case may require,] such sidewalk[, curb or gutter,] and curb same, within ten days after the service of such notice.

3. Construction by city; reimbursement by assessment. The records of the machine will then be turned over to a Typewriting Copyist, Dictaphone Operator, who will transcribe them, making three copies, one tor the office file, one to accompany the court papers, and one to be furnished to the Parole Commission, in case the person charged with crime is found guilty and sentenced to some institution. At present it is necessary for the Parole Commission to send an assistant to the court to copy the required data from the Probation Officer's reports.

The proposed method, in addition to saving considerable time now occupied on copying reports, will also allow more time to the Probation Officers for investigation. It is necessary to have one set of machines in the Manhattan office and one in Brooklyn.

That a public hearing was held on this matter in the Aldermanic Chamber, which was largely attended by representatives of the various real estate and taxpayers' associations and several members of the Board of Aldermen. They all agreed that some ordinance should be adopted compelling the negligent property owners to clear their sidewalks, but do not approve of the severe punishment in the proposed ordinance. Section 21. Property owners. 1. Must clear sidewalks. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the City, abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall, within four hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow and ice, dirt or other material from the sidewalk and gutter, the time between 9 P. M. and 7 A. M. not being included in the above period of four hours; provided, however, that such removal shall in all cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the [c] Commissioner of [s] Street [c] Cleaning, or by the [b] Borough [p] President of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said [c] Commissioner of [s] Street [c] Cleaning, or of said [b] Borough [p] President of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow and ice, dirt and other material; except that in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant, or other person who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street or public place, for a linear distance of 500 feet or more, shall be considered to have complied with this section, if such person shall have begun to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said 4 hours, and shall continue and complete such removal within a reasonable time.

[Whenever] Any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any street or public place where the

sidewalk is paved who shall have failed to comply with the provisions of any ordinance or any part thereof, purchased, received or sold in the course of business of the of the City for the removal of snow and ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lot abuts, shall, upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine of not more than five (5) dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding two days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Whenever any such owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person cannot be found, the President of the Borough in which such building or vacant lot is located may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said Borough President to the Comptroller, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such snow and ice [and snow], dirt or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds which shall be sold by the Comptroller, as provided by law.

The said Borough President shall, as soon as possible, after the work is done, certify to the Corporation Counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against

each piece of property.

The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of this expense, together with [three] (3) five (5) dollars penalty for each offense, and when so recovered the amount shall be turned over to the City Chamberlain to be deposited to the credit of the general fund of The City of New York for the reduction of taxation.

That a public hearing was held on this matter in the Aldermanic Chamber, which was largely attended by representatives of the various trades and callings affected: also representatives of the Police Department. The matter as a whole met with the approval of these representatives; some objections were voiced, which objections met with the approval of the Committee, and in order to meet them it was agreed that the ordinance in order to make it clearer to those affected thereby, be further amended by adding, after the word "rugs," in the italicized matter of section 40, the words "tapestries," "burlaps," and in subdivision 3, section 44, after the words "provisions of" in the italicized matter, the words "law or." It, therefore, recommends that the ordinance, as so further amended, be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Article 4 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 40. Definition; Exceptions. Any person, co-partnership, or corporation dealing in the purchase or sale of second-hand articles of whatever nature, or [engaged] dealing in the purchase or sale of any second-hand manufactured article composed wholly or in part of gold, silver, platinum or other metals, or in the purchase or sale of old gold, silver or platinum, or any person, co-partnership or corporation dealing in the purchase of articles or things comprised of gold, silver or platinum for the purpose of melting or refining, or engaged in melting precious metals for the purpose of selling, or in the purchase or sale of pawnbroker tickets or other evidence of pledged articles, or, not being a pawnbroker, who deals in the redemption or sale of pledged articles, is hereby defined to be a dealer in second-hand articles. Nothing contained in this ordinance shall be construed to apply to pianos, books, magazines, rugs, paintings, drawings, etchings and engravings; nor to exchanges of, returns of, or credits on merchandise where the article or articles exchanged, returned, or credited are accepted in full or part payment for new merchandise; nor to the first purchase or sale in the City of New York of any imported second-hand article.

Sec. 41. License; Term; Fee and Bond. The annual license fee for each dealer in second-hand articles shall be [\$20] \$15. and every such dealer shall give a bond to the City, with sufficient surety, to be approved by the commissioner of licenses, in the penal sum of \$100, conditioned for the due observance of the provisions of law, or ordinance relating to such dealers.

All licenses for dealers in second-hand articles shall be issued as of February 1 in each year and shall expire on the 31st day of January next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

Sec. 42. Record of Purchases and Sales.

Every dealer in second-hand articles shall keep a book in which shall be legibly written in English, at the time of every purchase or sale, a description of every article so purchased or sold, the number or numbers and any monogram, inscription or other marks of identification that may appear on the article, a description of the articles or pieces comprising old gold, silver, platinum or other metals, and any monogram, inscription or marks of identification thereon, the name residence and general description of the person from whom such purchase was made or to whom sold and the day and hour of the purchase or sale, except articles or things purchased or received for the purpose of refining or smelting by persons, firms or corporations principally engaged in such business.

In the case of a purchase or sale of a pawnbroker ticket or other evidence of a pledged article or a redemption or sale of a pledged article, there shall be written in said book at the time of such purchase, sale or redemption.

1. The name and address of the person, co-partnership, or corporation who issued

the said ticket or other evidence;

2. The pledge number of said pawn ticket or other evidence; 3. The name and address of the pledger as it appears upon said pawn ticket or other evidence;

4. The amount loaned or advanced as it appears on said pawn ticket or other evidence; 5. The day and hour of such purchase, sale or redemption, as the case may be:

6. The name, residence and general description of the person from whom or to whom the redeemed article is purchased or sold, as the case may be; 7. The sum paid or received for such pawn ticket or other evidence, or the sum

8. Such description of a pledged article as appears on said pawn ticket or other evidence and an accurate description of every redeemed pledged article.

Said book shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of any police officer, to the commissioner of licenses or any inspector of licenses, or any magistrate of the City, or any person duly authorized in writing for such purpose by the commissioner of licenses, or by any magistrate, who shall exhibit such written authority to the dealer.

3. Sales by dealers. No articles or things except household furniture, curtains, carpets, stoves, kitchen utensils, office furniture [books and magazines], automobiles, motor and other vehicles, machinery, belting, building materials and barrels, or other articles or things that have already been kept by a dealer or pawnbroker for a period of time, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, or have been received from persons, firms or corporations known to be jewelers, dealers, banking institutions, executors or administrators, shall be sold or disposed of by any dealer in second-hand articles until the expiration of one [month] week after such purchase or redemption, except that all second-hand articles or things purchased for the purpose of melting or refining by persons, firms or corporations principally engaged in such business, from persons, firms or corporations not jewelers or dealers, shall not be sold refined, melted or disposed of until the expiration of 48 hours after said purchase; and no such dealer shall receive any article by way of pledge or pawn, or employ any subterfuge for receiving goods as security for the advancement of money.

4. Not to be pawnbroker or junk dealer, not to use pawnbroker signs, etc. No dealer in second-hand articles, while licensed as such, shall be licensed as pawnbroker or junk dealer; nor shall any sign or other device or subterfuge be displayed, used or employed by any dealer in second-hand articles in or about the premises where such business is conducted, which in any wise resembles the emblem or sign commonly used by pawnbrokers, or which is intended to give the appearance that the business conducted on such premises is, or is connected with, the business of a pawnbroker and calculated to so mislead; nor shall there [by] be any sign displayed which is calculated to deceive.

Dear Sir-As requested, the writer has given some time and thought, and made some study of the accoustic properties of the Board of Aldermen Chamber in the City Hall, with the point in mind of determining whether improvements can be made at reasonable cost so as to make it possible for the members of the Board who occupy seats near the rear of the room better to hear the speakers who address the Chair from near the front of the Chamber.

Without making use of scientific measuring instruments, which for first cost and operation would be rather expensive, an absolute final determination is not possible, but careful personal observation upon the floor of the Chamber during three meetings of the Board has convinced the writer that very little improvement could be accomplished, at best, and such improvements as are possible would be of a relatively costly nature. Little echo was observable. The principal difficulty in hearing lay in the fact that there is usually a considerable amount of conversation in the rear of the room and on the part of the members of the Board who occupy the two or three rear rows of seats. When the room was normally quiet it was found possible to hear distinctly practically every speaker who used a proper tone of voice and spoke from practically any point in the Chamber. One member of the Board whose voice is not naturally strong or high pitched may experience some difficulty in making his colleagues understand all that he says, but if he speaks slowly and enunciates with care, even his voice will carry throughout the Aldermanic Chamber without great difficulty.

After the observations described above, it is the opinion of the writer that a reflecting or sounding board behind the Speaker's desk would not improve matters. On the other hand, it would be likely to introduce echoes, which would make conditions much worse than they are at present. On or about April 1, 1916, it is expected that the new County Jail of Bronx County, situated in the Bergen Building at 177th Street and Arthur Avenue, will be ready for occupancy. It appears that this jail will be inadequate, according to the present census, to house even criminal prisoners. For that reason, it is proposed to operate the two jails, the old one now situated in the County Court House at 161st Street and 3d Avenue, as well as the new. At the present time all the prisoners in that county are kept in the old jail by means of overcrowding and in total disregard of the provisions of the Prison Law, which provides that separate segregation shall be made for male and female and civil and criminal prisoners. The State Prison Whereas, Such an industry may soon be started in the city; now, therefore, Commission has urged the advisability of establishing a separate House of Detention, and has also been insistent that only one prisoner shall be kept in a cell. The force requested by the Sheriff to operate the two jails is reasonable, but inasmuch as the \$7,140 represents the year's allowance, this amount may be reduced to \$5,355, apportioned as follows:

The decrease in the amounts for new steel furniture and for remodeling and moving old steel furniture is due to the elimination, from the request, of doors for all of the cases, and, to the substitution of new cases of modern construction for proposed cases rather than duplicating the old cases at present in the building. The Register had requested the Borough President to have all the old cases equipped with doors as well as to provide them on the new cases. The doors were supposed to protect the records from dust and dirt and the possibility of anyone tampering with them. This advantage would be almost entirely offset by the necessity of keeping the cases open all day so that the public may have access to the records.

The only object to be attained by purchasing new cases of the same design as the old ones is uniform appearance. This may be accomplished by grouping the new ones in rooms by themselves.

The item of \$1,225 for new wood furniture is to provide better desk accommodations for the employees of the office and low tables and chairs in place of the present standing desks for the use of the public in examining records.

Dear Sirs-The Budget appropriations for 1916 for this department contemplate the purchase of several hundred tons of coal for use in the public buildings, and also about four hundred tons of coal for use in the crematories and disposal plants 550 00 in the borough.

In accordance with the usual procedure, specifications were drawn and approved by the Bureau of Standards of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and advertisements inserted calling for bids and specifying delivery at different points in the borough.

Bids were opened on February 16, 1916, at which time the fact was disclosed that the prices for delivery for about 220 tons was \$8.16 per ton from the lowest bidder and that other prices for delivery at different points were as low as \$6.48 and up to \$6.83 per ton.

In my judgment, the prices are excessive and more than the City is now paying for delivery for small quantities for the same quality of coal, and I do not feel justified, therefore, in awarding a contract at these prices.

In explanation of the high bids, I was informed that it is expected that the price of coal will rise some time or another during the coming year, but at the present time the price is not as high as the price submitted by the lowest bidder.

In the case of the bids received for coal for the crematories and disposal plants, the bids received show an advance of about \$1.00 a ton over the price paid last year, for which I can see no justification at this time for the reason that the prices submitted are in excess of the market price at this time, and the reason given for this excessive charge is the same as in the case of the coal for the public buildings.

In view of these facts, I request your approval, in accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Charter, of a resolution authorizing me to purchase coal on open market order for the use of the public buildings to the extent of \$6,000, and for the Bureaus of Street Cleaning and Sewers, \$5,500. I request authority for the purchase of the blower equipment on the ferryboat "Richmond" from the Parson Manufacturing Company at \$2,000. The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on January 18, 1916 (Minutes, page 126), the annexed ordinance to amend article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to signs and show bills, respectfully REPORTS: That the proposed amendments to this ordinance are designed to include signs illuminated by "gas" with those illuminated by "electricity" and meets with the approval of the Fire Commissioner. On a suggestion of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the ordinance is further amended by adding after the word "jurisdiction" in subdivision 2 of section 215 the following words: [.]; except that in the case of a sign illuminated by gas the certification of the superintendent of buildings only shall be required. It, therefore, recommends that the said ordinance, as so further amended be adopted. AN ORDINANCE to amend article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to signs and show bills. Be It Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Subdivision 3 of section 211 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows: 3. Illuminated signs [Electric wiring and appliances]. In the case of [a] an illuminated sign [illuminated by electricity], a certificate must also be procured from the department of water supply, gas and electricity, certifying that the piping or the electric wiring and electric appliances of the proposed signs are in conformity with the rules and regulations of that department. Section 2. Section 215 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows: § 215. [Electric] Illuminated signs. 1. Application of preceding sections. Except as hereinafter specifically prescribed, all provisions of §§ 211 to 214, inclusive, of this article, shall apply to the continuance, construction, alteration, reconstruction and maintenance of [electric] illuminated signs, as hereinafter defined. 2. Issue of permits. All permits for [electric] illuminated signs shall be issued by the city clerk, upon applications therefor approved by the commissioner of water supply, gas and electricity and the superintendent of buildings having jurisdiction. A permit or renewal thereof issued hereunder, upon the expiration thereof or within 30 days thereafter, may be renewed for a further period of one year; and, upon the payment by the applicant of the fee therefor and the surrender of the old permit, accompanied by satisfactory proof in the form of an affidavit that the illuminated sign is the same as when originally licensed and that the wiring or piping of the sign is in good condition, the city clerk may issue the permit. 3. Definition. Any illuminated letter, word, model, sign, device or representation, used in the nature of an advertisement, announcement or direction [illuminated by electricity], erected on any building and extending beyond the building line, shall be deemed to be an [electric] illuminated sign. No illuminated sign shall be illuminated other than by gas or electricity. 4. Fee for permit. The applicant for a permit to construct or maintain an [electric] illuminated sign shall pay to the city clerk an annual fee of 10 cents for each square foot of sign space or part of square foot of such sign space displayed on such [electric] sign, to be computed and collected by the city clerk. The square feet of sign space on one side of an [electric] illuminated sign, however, shall be deemed to be the entire number of square feet of sign space, for the purpose of computing the license fee herein referred to and required to be paid. 5. Consent of owner of adjoining residence. No permit shall be issued for the erection of an [electric] illuminated sign on a building which adjoins another occupied exclusively as a private residence, until the applicant for the permit shall have filed the written consent of the owner of such residence to the erection of the proposed 6. Restrictions. a. No [electric] illuminated sign shall extend more than 8 feet from the building line, nor shall any such sign be less than 10 feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk beneath the same. b. All [electric] illuminated signs shall be constructed entirely of metal or other incombustible material, except the insulation thereof if such sign is to be illuminated by electricity, including the uprights, supports and braces for the same, and shall be properly and firmly attached to the building, and shall be so constructed as not to be or become dangerous. c. If such sign is to be illuminated by gas, the gas burners for same shall be located entirely inside of the sign and so arranged and protected as to prevent the flame from being extinguished by the wind. A shut-off valve shall be placed on the gas piping extending from the building to the sign, and so arranged as to permit of the shutting off of the gas to the sign from the outside of the building, in case of necessity. Such signs as to construction, arrangement and location shall be subject to the approval of, and to rules and regulations adopted by the Fire Commissioner.

Section 3. The table of section headings of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows: Article 16. Signs and Showbills. Section 210. General provisions. 211. Ground signs and roof signs. Ground signs, special provisions. 213. Roof signs, special provisions. Signs on walls. 215. Illuminated [electric] signs. 216. Unsafe signs. 217. Unlawful signs. 218. Alteration of existing signs. 219. Exemptions. 220. Retroactive effect. 221. Inspections. 222. Public signs, protection of. 223. Violations. Section 4. 

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the sale. Where the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
