Public Hearing by the Committee on Transit.

Establishing a route and general plan of construction for a new rapid transit railroad in the Borough of Brooklyn, known as "Modification of the Fourteenth Street-Eastern Line."

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT the Committee on Transit of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will hold a Public Hearing on MONDAY, MARCH 11, 1918, at 9.30 o'clock a. m., in the Office of the President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, on a resolution adopted by the Public Service Commission for the First District, determining and establishing a route and general plan of construction for a new rapid transit railroad in the Borough of Brooklyn, known as "Modification of the Fourteenth Street-Eastern Line," so as to permit a relocation of a part of the Fourteenth Street-Eastern Line between Bushwick avenue and Bogart street. The line leaves Bushwick avenue, near Meserole street, and passes under private property and the tracks of the Long Island Railroad, extends generally in a direction parallel to and south of Montrose avenue to Bogart street. As proposed to be relocated the portion of this line will leave Bushwick avenue, near Johnson avenue, and extend thence to Bogart street through private property in the blocks between Johnson avenue and Boerum street.

49 Lafayette St.—Overhauled heating system, replaced defective return valves, installed bleeder in steam line in basement. Painted south store for Bureau of Weights and Measures, 7th floor toilet and stair hall from 1st to 12th story. Made necessary changes to set up cases, cabinets, partitions, etc., in new quarters of Bureau of Weights and Measures in south store after dismantling them in old office in 49th st. Set up plumbing fixtures, slate work, etc., in south store.

Made temporary changes on blow-off line from boilers pending installation of permanent lines and sump pump. Installed new cylinder housing for 6x8 inch vacuum pump and brazed old cylinder to have on hand as an extra. Order issued and work now in progress providing for psychopathic clinic on third floor.

W. 54th St. Court—Painted Magistrates' Court room, complaint room, Magistrates' room and hall, Clerk's room, Janitor's quarters and private stairs, first to third floors. Covered about 500 linear feet of various sized pipes in cellar.

Dr. Simon Baruch Bath (Rivington St. Bath)—Repaired several dozen mixing valves of showers. Replaced about 20 defective tubes in boilers. Completed installation of automatic non-return stop valves on boilers and sections of main steam piping, in connection therewith; also new blow off cocks. Expanded leaky boiler tubes. W. 28th St. Bath—Completed cross connection between the two hot water heaters. Changed and simplified connections for alum feeders on filtration system. Repaired shower bath mixing valves. Installed about two dozen marble seats in shower rooms. Painted iron work of stairs.

W. 41st St. Bath—Repaired about two dozen mixing valves of showers. Patched boiler No. 1. Overhauled cross heads, brasses, pins, etc., on engines. Overhauled engine No. 1. Repaired ash cans. Work under way to replace old corroded shower mains with cast iron pipes.

Repaired stuffing box glands on 3 by 4 inch gate valves. Repaired various lines on hot water supply and house heating systems. Repaired cement wainscoting on Cherokee place side.

E. 109th St. Bath—Repaired several dozen mixing valves of showers. Refitted crank shaft bearings. Issued orders to overhaul engine No. 1. Installed new rings in blower engine. Repaired ash cans. Installed three floor drains in waiting rooms.

Free Floating Baths—Disconnected lighting system and removed lamps. Baths disconnected from water supply, all piping drained. Contract made and baths towed to new winter quarters at Rae's Basin, North Beach, L. I. Piles driven (by Dock Dept.) for warping in and securing eight floating baths in winter quarters.

Battery Park Comfort Station—Issued order for renewal of water supply line from street main.

Greeley Square Comfort Station—Station turned over to this office by Public Service Commission contractors after repairs caused by subway construction adjoining, but was not opened for use due to lack of coal.

Hanover Square Comfort Station—Removed old disintegrated hanging ceiling and started to plaster direct on brick arches and to repair tiling.

Sheriff and Delancey St. Comfort Station—Installed four marble floor slats.

Washington Market—Although the markets were transferred to Department of Markets arrangements were made whereby the Bureau of Public Markets and Offices would do necessary repairs until close of year. Completed incinerator contract work for burning refuse and garbage. Completed hot water piping contract for cleaning purposes in and around market operated by incinerator plant. Cleaned numerous stoppages in floor drains. Cut off defective pipe leaking under sidewalk.

West Washington and Gansevoort Market—Made numerous temporary repairs to roofs.

GENERAL.

During the quarter the following completed jobs were executed by the Bureau's various mechanical squads: Carpenter, 53; electrical, 157; plumbing, 56; steamfitting, 18; machinist, 47; painting and varnishing, 57; roofing, 38; mason, 29; awning, 24; total, 479. 237 requisitions and open market orders were issued. 291 check orders were drawn against miscellaneous monthly orders.

The patronage for the interior baths was: October, 603,721; November, 535,975; December, 436,649; total, 1,576,345.

The eight floating baths were closed Sept. 30. They remained at the piers later than usual, by reason of previous winter quarters having been recently sold; notification of same received by this department only a few days before closing of baths, thus necessitating delay in selecting available site, approval therefor, driving of piles and appropriation for same.

Bureau of Topography.

Change in lines of Riverside Drive between W. 161st st. and W. 162d st., and adjusting dimensions within territory bounded by W. 158th st., Riverside Drive, W. 165th st. and Broadway.

The purpose of the first change was to modify the lines of Riverside Drive, so that an existing six-story apartment house will fall within the new street lines, the present encroachments varying from $\frac{1}{4}$ of an inch to about $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches.

The purpose of the second change is to correct inconsistencies of dimensions indicated on a plan adopted June 23, 1905, wherein they differ from those filed by the Central Park Commissioners and which latter constitute the basic map for this section. In addition, the new plan proposes to correct certain errors in adjustment that appear on the Central Park Commissioners' map.

All the above changes have been approved by the leading surveyors and title companies and no titles will be affected.

Primary Traverse. The base line on 5th ave. from 14th to 110th sts. is now run and chained once. Every precaution has been used to get accurate measurements.

Bolts have been set every 1,000 feet, and offsets to all buildings have been taken; also points have been cut in every 50 feet, insuring preservation of the line for years to come. To complete the work, the line will be chained once more, when it can be considered a primary line of Manhattan.

This line, when completed, will tie in the middle east side, with our system south of 14th st. and north of 110th st. It will enable us to co-ordinate individual building and street surveys with the rest of the base lines, so that they will all be accurately referred to a common base. In addition, the saving in duplicate surveys will be considerable.

Interborough Rapid Transit Railroad Terminal at Harlem River, 7th ave. and 147th st. In reply to a request of the Public Service Commission, transmitted through the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the closing of certain streets in the above area in order to accommodate proposed enlargement of the yard, this office has developed a scheme which, while affording increased accommodations, will not only save to the City the streets now open and which were suggested to be closed, but will open up streets now occupied by the yard, and will also afford a continuous waterfront thoroughfare for vehicular traffic.

This plan has not as yet been submitted to the Board for approval.

Franchises—A system has been instituted, whereby petitioners who have been granted franchises by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, are required to furnish this office, after completion of their work, with a map showing the final location of structures built, and any obstructions encountered. This enables us to check up the work with plan originally submitted in accordance with the petition, and to note any changes. When such changes are discovered, we report them to the Franchise Bureau, subsequent to which the petitioners are required to submit an additional petition for the work wherever it is different from that originally permitted by the Board. In this way, a close check is kept upon this work.

Vaults: Northeast corner 5th ave. and 42d st. This case has finally been settled.

In 1912 the Sidewalk Division sent to the Law Department a list of vaults, claiming that payment should be made for vault space occupied without permit. The above location was on this list. After investigation of all records and a survey and personal inspection of premises, it was found that all existing vault space had been paid for twice, and a portion of it three times. This closed a long controversy.

Area bounded by 147th st., 7th ave., 150th st. and Harlem River, in connection with suggested closing of streets and other street changes for proposed enlargement of yard. Park at St. Nicholas ave. and 192d st.

Work Completed—Maps to Board of Estimate for certification and file. Isham Park Addition at Seaman ave.

Work in Progress: (Maps to be submitted to the Board of Estimate). Fort George Hill street layout, north of 190th st. between Amsterdam and Audubon aves. Park layout at 192d st. and St. Nicholas ave. Riverside ave. (Service st.), 124th to 129th sts., layout, preparatory to transferring jurisdiction to Borough President. Interboro Railroad Yard report and map in re suggested closing of certain streets for enlargement of yard. 173d St. Stairway layout, between Haven ave. and Riverside Drive (Service st.), map for the Board of Estimate. Queensboro Bridge Plaza, study for change in map to relieve congestion.

Monuments.

Work completed: Loose monument covers removed and space below filled with cement flush with walk, at certain locations, to avoid accidents.

Work in Progress: Fixing final theoretical position of monuments in section between 155th and 190th sts.

Bench Marks.

Work Completed: A line of benches on 3d ave. from 8th to 72d sts. was run. Twenty-eight new benches were set.

Building Line Determinations.

Work Completed. Survey and map and report. Streets in area bounded by: 46th, 50th, 6th to 7th ave.—points locating building line corners given to Public Service Commission. 68th st., West End ave. to Hudson River—on account of disagreement as to correct position. 66th, 67th, 68th, 69th, 70th sts. between Amsterdam and West End aves. In connection with curb line determinations for widened roadways, the following blocks were tied in to our borough survey: 45th st., 5th to Madison aves., 32d and 33d sts., 5th to 7th aves., 26th st., 6th to 7th aves., 41st to 46th sts., Madison ave., 59th st., Lexington to 5th aves. In addition, 15,250 linear feet of traverses, from Broome to W. Houston sts., Broadway to W. Broadway, were run to established building lines.

Work In Progress.

Work in Progress—Several streets on which new curb line is to be determined in connection with widening of roadways. The area bounded by: Houston st., Avenue D, 3d and Tompkins sts.

Work in Progress—A few remaining locations at subway stations, within 100 feet therefrom.

Vaults.

By reason of the bad weather in the latter part of this quarter we were able, by diverting the field force to measuring vaults, to survey 161 locations. Many of these vaults are under 30 hotels, theatre and office buildings; some requiring several days surveying for each vault. Plans examined, 190 (as compared with 95 for the 4th quarter for 1916); covering an area of 28,900 square feet; certificates examined, 36, covering an area of 24,000 square feet; reports on surveys, 15, covering an area of 8,000 square feet; cases of excess area, 12, covering an area of 2,900 square feet.

Information given to the Bureau of Sewers in relation to interferences with proposed construction.





Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furring, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight, where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work
