From the Commissioner

We persevered, and we won. Back in 2013, City Council passed a law that took on expanded polystyrene or EPS. This is the material in single-use foam cups, plates and food containers—and it's a bane on our environment. Each year, we collect more than 28,000 tons of EPS—not including what becomes litter and floats to our waterways and beaches. The 2013 legislation directed us to decide if these products could be recycled. If not, they would be banned. It's a simple question that triggered years of complicated court battles.

After an in-depth study, in 2015 we found that recycling foam isn't effective or economically feasible. The makers of EPS challenged the City's commonsense ban

in court. We did not back down. We launched a new study – including painting thousands of single-use foam products bright purple to track them through our recycling center. Instead of being sorted for proper recycling, they flew around the facility and contaminated other recycling streams like paper and glass. This time when we were back in court, the judge ruled in our favor, dismissing the manufacturer's case. On January 1, 2019, foam food service products will be banned in New York City.

This is an important victory—one that brings us closer to sending zero waste to landfills. It's also a show of force—a reminder of the many ways we keep New York City healthy, safe and clean.

Take Care!



Summer weather means summer insects. Our Health Care Facility is on hand to answer questions about the Zika virus, which can be passed through mosquito bites or—in rare circumstances—intimate contact and blood. While most people infected will not get sick, those who do often suffer from fever, rash, joint pain, and red eyes. The most vulnerable people are women who are pregnant or trying to become pregnant, since the virus can cause severe birth defects. The best defense against Zika is to avoid insect bites. Remember:

- Use insect repellant;
- When outdoors, wear clothing that covers exposed skin;
- Remove standing water around your workplace or home; and
- Seek medical attention if you develop symptoms.
