

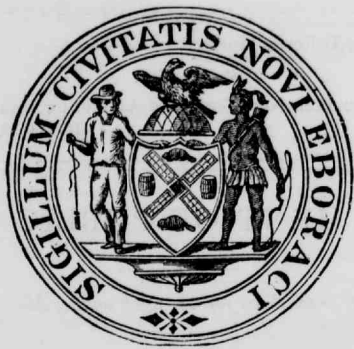

## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of proceedings for the week ending May 12, 1877.

MEETING, WEDNESDAY, MAY 9.

An estimate on account, not exceeding \$6,000, was authorized to be prepared for Mr. J. V. Donovan, contractor; also, an estimate on account, not exceeding \$4,000, in favor of the Angell & Blake Manufacturing Company, contractors.

A communication was received from Mr. William C. Bryant, Chairman of the Committee presenting the Statue of Fitz Greene Halleck, requesting that permission be given to the Seventh Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., to enter the Central Park on the 15th instant, the day determined upon for the unveiling of the statue, as an escort for the President of the United States; also requesting that the Department would erect a platform at the site of the statue.

The President then read the following communications in relation to said subject:

WM. C. BRYANT, Esq.,

President Committee of Arrangements for the Unveiling of the Statue of Fitz Greene Halleck:

DEAR SIR—Your letter of the 23d inst. was received after the meeting of this Department to-day had adjourned.

Last autumn three (3) statues were erected in the public squares and parks—those of Lafayette, Seward, and Webster—and we matured arrangements, which, in each case, proved satisfactory to the public and the parties concerned.

The complete arrangements for the unveiling of the Halleck statue invite many points besides those you mention in your note. In our view, it is desirable to have the arrangements completed in all respects, and then authorized by the Board.

Since the subject cannot now be acted on until the next meeting of the Board, on the 2d May, I invite you to a consideration of the whole subject, so that the details may be completed before the next meeting, and will be pleased to call upon or to receive you, or any of your Committee to whom you may refer the subject.

MY DEAR SIR—I am requested by Mr. Bryant to acknowledge your favor of the 24th inst., and to say that after a meeting of the Committee, which has been called for Monday next, he will have the pleasure of communicating with you on the subject of unveiling ceremonies, now fixed for May 15.

The President stated that since then, and after the meeting on the 2d day of May, 1877, Mr. Wilson had called at this office, in his absence, and intimated that he should not call again; that the Committee, on its own responsibility, and without any consultation with the Department, had prepared programmes and had issued them with invitations for the unveiling ceremonies; that they had given no part to the Department or its officers in their programme or in the invitations; that the admission of a military procession in the Central Park was a violation of the ordinances and against the settled policy of the Department; that the military display and the presence of the President of the United States would each attract an unusually large crowd in the park, which, at this season of the year, might be very destructive to the grass, plants, and foliage; that the action of this Committee, in thus endeavoring to control the whole arrangement without consultation with the Department, was assuming and unprecedented, and that, while the Board had the power to forbid any violation of its rules, the expected presence of the President of the United States and the arrangements made in his honor presents the question in an aspect in which the refusal of the Department to assent to their arrangements might be misinterpreted.

Permission was then given to the Seventh Regiment to enter the Central Park, as requested, and it was referred, with power, to the Landscape Architect and Superintendent of Parks, to make all arrangements for the occasion, which were possible under the circumstances.

The President was authorized to appoint 20 special Policemen for the 15th inst., at a pay for the day of \$2.50 each.

Contracts were awarded as follows, viz.:

To Messrs. Post and McCord, for the temporary gallery and work in the Museum of Art; to Messrs. Sackett & Miller, Agents, for police uniforms; to Mr. John A. Bouker, for trap-rock and screenings; Mr. Jeremiah Crowley, for the construction of drains in the Twenty-fourth Ward. The President was authorized to execute contracts for the above-mentioned work and materials.

The proposal of Mr. Jesse Ryder, for trap-rock and screenings was rejected, the stone proposed to be delivered not being in accordance with the specifications.

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 12, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,801, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 820 tenement houses, 160 private dwellings, 65 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 54 stables, 30 slaughter-houses, 7 manure dumps, 2 public sewers, 4 dumping grounds, 2 piers, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 64 milk inspections, 18 sunken and vacant lots, 60 yards, courts, and areas, 52 cellars and basements, 126 waste-pipes and drains, 163 privies and water-closets, 69 streets, gutters, and side-walks, 2 dangerous stairways, 2 cesspools, 7 dangerous chimneys, 14 piggeries, 2 violations of Code, 160 other nuisances, together with 26 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 634.

During the past week 124 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

88 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

161 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 62 houses, where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 50 houses, 50 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

During the week ending Saturday, May 12, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 440 burial permits for city deaths, 27 for bodies in transitu, and 48 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 440 deaths, 157 marriages, 352 births, 48 still-births, 27 applications for transit



permits, and 67 returns from coroners. There were 21 searches of the registers of births, marriage and deaths, and 3 transcripts of marriages, and 18 of deaths were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, May 12, 1877, 440 deaths were reported as having occurred in this city; this is a decrease of 32 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 108 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending May 5, was 470, which is 88.4 below the average deaths for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.73 per 1,000, the population estimated at 1,074,806.

The decrease of deaths during the past compared with the previous week was from the following causes, viz.: Small-pox, 1; measles, 4; diphtheria, 5; malarial fevers, 4; diarrhoea diseases, 11; inanition, 4; intemperance, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; bronchitis, 7; pneumonia, 24; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; while there was an increase of 2 deaths from croup, 1 from whooping-cough, 2 from erysipelas, 6 from typhoid fever, 1 from cerebro-spinal fever, 2 from puerperal diseases, diseases of the heart, 5; aneurism, 1; marasmus and scrofula, 4; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 8; deaths by suicide, 3; and deaths by drowning, 3.

The following comparative table of deaths from the most prominent causes show, with one exception, typhoid fever, a great diminution in the deaths from contagious diseases in favor of the present year:

Of the total number of deaths for the week, 83 were in institutions, 209 in tenement houses, 126 in houses containing 3 families and less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 17 in rivers, boats, streets, etc. 5 were on the basement floor, 88 on the first, 107 on the second, 89 on the third, 35 on the fourth, 13 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 436 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 4 non-residents. 41 were stated as single, 119 married, 51 widowed, and the condition of 239 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 488 deaths and still-births, or 88.52 per cent. of the total reported, were in the following 14 cemeteries: Bay-side (Jewish) 5, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 184, City (pauper burial ground, undenominational) 65, Greenwood (undenominational) 32, Lutheran (undenominational) 54, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 17, Evergreen (undenominational) 32, Woodlawn (undenominational) 18, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 6, Union (Methodist Protestant) 3, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 2, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 3, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 7, Washington (undenominational) 4.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 1 of chapter XXXII. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866.

Section 1 of chapter XXXII. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866 is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1. In all cases of blasting rock or stones within the City of New York, except as hereinafter provided, each blast, before firing it, shall be securely covered with six timbers of not less than four inches thick, ten inches wide, and ten feet long each, to be placed over each charge, and which said timbers shall be securely fastened together by an iron or steel chain, the links of which shall not be less than one-half inch in diameter. In the case of detached stones, holes of not more than one inch in diameter, and of a depth not exceeding two feet, shall be covered around and over the mouth of the hole with large stones, not less than one hundred pounds in weight.

Delmonico to place two (2) ornamental lamp-posts and lamps, the posts not to exceed twenty (20) inches in diameter, in front of his premises, one to be placed on the sidewalk at the southeast corner of Broadway and Twenty-sixth street, and one near the southwest corner of Fifth avenue and Twenty-sixth street, the gas to be supplied from his own meter, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and to remain only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the indiscriminate use of calcium or Drummond lights in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Any person who shall use or place in any street, avenue, or public place in the City of New York, any calcium, Drummond, or other light of intense brilliancy, unless a permit therefor shall be first obtained from the Mayor, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished, as provided in sections 20 and 21 of an act relative to the powers of the Common Council of the City of New York and the Criminal Courts of said city, passed January 23, 1833, and to the provisions of section 5 of art. 4 of an act in relation to the Police Department of the City and County of New York, passed April 13, 1853; nor shall any person place any such light in or upon any house or other building in said city, so that the same shall reflect, or shine upon, or into any such street, avenue, or public place, under a like penalty, to be imposed as above provided.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Adam Weber to occupy the street in front of his premises No. 633 East Fifteenth street, temporarily, and from time to time while in the receipt and delivery of goods at his manufactory; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: On and after the fifth day of May, 1877, no cattle, swine, pigs, calves, or sheep shall be driven on or between Eleventh and Second avenues south of Sixtieth street, nor on any other streets or avenues, except as hereinafter mentioned.

1st. On First avenue, and the cross streets east of First avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-eighth streets, inclusive.

2d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, between Thirty-ninth and Forty-third streets, inclusive.

3d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, between Forty-fifth and Forty-ninth streets, inclusive.

4th. From the cattle yards on Sixth street to Tenth avenue; thence through Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street; Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, Eighth avenue to Ninety-seventh street, Ninety-seventh street to Fifth avenue, Fifth avenue to One Hundred and Eighth street, One Hundred and Eighth street to Second avenue, Second avenue to One Hundred and Sixth street, One Hundred and Sixth street to the East river, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

5th. From the cattle yards by the fourth route to second avenue, on Second avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, on One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to Third avenue, across Harlem Bridge, up Third avenue to the slaughter-houses in Morrisania, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

6th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-first street, on St. Nicholas avenue and the Kingsbridge road to the slaughter-houses north of Spuyten Duyvil creek, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

7th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street down Eleventh avenue to Thirtieth street, between midnight and 6 A. M.

8th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to Sixty-fifth street, through Central Park by transverse road to Fifth avenue, on Fifth avenue to Sixty-seventh street, through Sixty-seventh street to Fourth avenue, on Fourth avenue to Sixty-eighth street, through Sixty-eighth street to First avenue and down First avenue to slaughter-houses, upon the express condition, however, that the cattle shall not leave the yards before midnight or after 5 o'clock A. M., that the drivers shall be orderly and quiet, and that the crosswalks shall be cleaned each morning before 8 o'clock. Permits under this subdivision shall be revoked by the Sanitary Superintendent on violation of any of the foregoing conditions.

9th. The Sanitary Superintendent may, in special cases, with the approval of the Board, give temporary permits to drive animals on other routes than those herein designated.
