

#### THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 25,451; the number of causes of complaint was 9,544; as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens was 2.063, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 1,367 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 2,354 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for the purpose; 158 permits to land rags (m bulk) under bonds; 13 permits to transport manure; and 13 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending June 30, 1880, eight thousand four hundred and seventy-seven (8,477) permits were granted for burials. During the same period three hundred and seventy-eight (378) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and eighty-eight (588) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; one thousand and seven (1,007) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; seven hundred and two (702) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and three hundred and seventy-four (374) transcripts of the records of deaths, seventy (70) of marriages, and one hundred and thirteen (113) of births from said records were issued. There were four thousand five hundred and fifty-six (4,556) persons registered as married during the quarter, and six thousand three hundred and thirty-four (6,334) children were born during the same period.

#### OFFICES OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending June 30, 1880, the number of notices issued by the Board was 6,423; these notices call attention of owners, lessees and agents to a violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleansing and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents, under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:
Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fity-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fity-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, to make the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, to the confirmation of the laws of eighteen hundred and fity-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-sessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as herebe for the conditions and the capter of a sessesments shall cease to be

scribed.

Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.
Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

#### ARREARS OF TAXES.

CHAPTER 123.

An Act in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the compatroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.
