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### APPROVED PAPERS

*Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending July 19, 1884.*

Whereas, Chapter No. 261 of the Laws of 1884 authorizes and directs the laying out, opening, regulating, paving, guttering, curbing and flagging the new street, provided for therein, parallel with Fourth avenue, the westerly line of which is eighty (80) feet easterly from the east line of said Fourth avenue, and between said Fourth avenue and Lexington avenue, and running from Forty-second to Forty-fifth street; therefore be it

Resolved, That the said street be regulated, graded, paved, curbed and guttered and the sidewalk on the easterly side thereof be established to the width of ten (10) feet and the same flagged; the work to be done at the expense of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company and under the direction and supervision of the Commissioner of the Department of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 30, 1884.  
Approved by the Mayor, July 14, 1884.

Resolved, That Fifth avenue, from the northerly line of the crosswalk at Thirty-third street to the southerly line of the crosswalk at Thirty-seventh street, be repaved with granite-block pavement, in accordance with the provisions of section 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and as certified to and recommended by the Commissioner of Public Works in the communication received from him at this meeting.

Resolved, That the fire-hydrant now in front of No. 144 Sullivan street be removed and placed in front of No. 145 Sullivan street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars be and is hereby set apart from the appropriation for "City Contingencies" for 1884, to pay the expenses incurred, or to be incurred, for counsel fees by the Committee on Salaries and Offices of this Board in giving effect to the resolution of May 10, 1884, instructing said Committee "to take whatever measures may be necessary to compel the Comptroller to obey and enforce the ordinance of February 11, 1876, and the resolution of March 10, 1884, which forbids the payment of any salary, or other compensation, to non-resident or illegally appointed city officials"; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to pay all claims for such services, to the extent of the sum so set apart, upon vouchers, when signed by a majority of the said Committee on Salaries and Offices.

Commissioner Laimbeer offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare and submit, as soon as practicable, to the Board for its approval, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 517, Laws of 1884, a plan or plans for the line of the water front on the westerly side of the Harlem river, from the easterly line of the Third avenue to the northerly side of Eighty-sixth street on the East river.

Commissioner Voorhis offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed at once with the construction and erection of a new pier between Pier, new No. 1, North river, and Castle Garden, as authorized and required by chapter 454, Laws of 1884, upon the plan B proposed in his communication to this Board, dated 23d June, 1884, and upon the following described lines: Beginning at a point on the bulkhead or river wall, distant 64½ feet southerly from the southerly side of Pier, new No. 1, North river, and extending southwesterly at an angle of 114½ degrees with the line of said wall a distance of 285 feet; thence deflecting to the left at an angle of 90 degrees a distance of 45 feet; thence again deflecting at an angle of 90 degrees to the left, and on a line parallel to the first described line a distance of 285 feet; thence again deflecting to the left at an angle of 90 degrees a distance of 45 feet to the point and place of beginning, making a pier 45 feet in width and 285 feet long, and connecting the same with the existing wall, and that all the work hereby ordered be performed, otherwise than by contract, as provided in section 714, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, and chapter 454, Laws of 1884, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the material and dredging necessary therefor, and not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

Commissioner Voorhis submitted the following report showing the estimates received by him for building cement shed, shops and offices on the Pier at Fifty-seventh street, North river, in accordance with the specifications furnished for doing the said work:
