Whereas, Chapter No. 261 of the Laws of 1884 authorizes and directs the laying out, opening, regulating, paving, guttering, curbing and flagging the new street, provided for therein, parallel with Fourth avenue, the westerly line of which is eighty (80) feet easterly from the east line of said Fourth avenue, and between said Fourth avenue and Lexington avenue, and running from Forty-second to Forty-fifth street; therefore be it Resolved, That the said street be regulated, graded, paved, curbed and guttered and the side-walk on the easterly side thereof be established to the width of ten (10) feet) and the same flagged; the work to be done at the expense of the New York and Harlem Rairoad Company and under the direction and supervision of the Commissioner of the Department of Public Works.
