## BOARD OF EDUCATION.

SEPTEMBER 25, 1878.

The Board of Education held a special session to consider the report of the Finance Committee submitting the Annual Estimate for 1879.

Present—Wm. Wood, Esq., L.L.D., President, and Commissioners Beardslee, Bell, Cohen, Donnelly, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Jelliffe, Katzenberg, Manierre, Traud, Vermilye, Walker, Watson, West, and Wetmore—17.

Absent—Commissioners Kelly, Place, Wheeler, and Wickham—4.

The estimate was considered by its several items, and amended and adopted, as follows:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City and County of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The Board of Education, in accordance with the act of 1873, herewith submit to your Honorable Board an estimate of the amount of money that will be required for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, for the support of the public schools of the city and for providing such sites, buildings, furniture, etc., as may be required by the increase of the city population, including an estimate of the amount to be distributed to the corporate schools as provided and directed by the several acts of the Legislature in relation thereto.

Resolved, That the foregoing estimate of the moneys that will be required by this Board for the support of the Common Schools of the City of New York and for all other purposes connected with public instruction under its control, during the year (1879) eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of three millions five hundred and eighty-four thousand (\$3,584,000) dollars, be duly authenticated by the President and Clerk of this Board, and submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and a duplicate thereof furnished to the Board of Aldermen, as required by section 112 of chapter 385 of the Laws of 1873.

The President put the question whether the Board would adopt the estimate submitted by the Committee as amended, and it was decided in the affirmative, as follows:

Ayes—The President, and Commissioners Beardslee, Bell, Cohen, Donnelly, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Jelliffe, Katzenberg, Manierre, Traud, Vermilye, Walker, West, and Wetmore—16.  
Nay—Commissioner Watson—1.

*Reports of Standing Committees.*

By unanimous consent, Commissioner West presented a report from the Committee on By-Laws, Elections and Qualifications, to whom was referred the communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, requesting the payment of the sum of \$287.88 costs, in the case of Donovan vs. Board of Education, stating that the court has ordered the payment of this sum, as condition of amending the answer on or before the 29th of July. In a subsequent communication the Counsel to the Corporation notifies the Board that he had secured an extension of the time, and the Committee recommend for adoption the following:

Resolved, That the sum of two hundred and eighty-seven dollars and eighty-eight cents (\$287.88), be paid from the sum appropriated for incidental expenses of the Board of Education, for the costs incurred by the suit of Donovan vs. Board of Education as a "condition of amending the answer" to the complaint; said payment being recommended by the Counsel to the Corporation in a communication dated July 15, 1878.
