

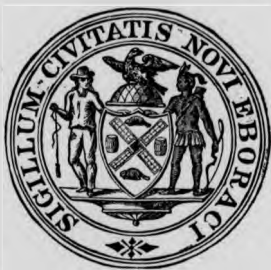

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE—CITY HALL,
NEW YORK, October 24, 1889.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 11 A. M., at the office of his Honor the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, and the Commissioner of the Public Works Department.

The minutes of the meetings of this Board, held on October 17 and 18, were read and approved.

A letter was received and read from Messrs. A. E. Barnes & Bro., relative to their bid for furniture for the Eighth Regiment Armory. It was ordered on file.

A letter was also received and read from Brigadier General Louis Fitzgerald on the same subject.

It was ordered on file.

Commissioner Coleman was requested to investigate and report at the next meeting, on the bid for furniture.

The following resolution was offered by Commissioner Coleman:

Resolved, That the sum of two thousand two hundred and ninety-two dollars and ninety-nine cents, now remaining to the credit of the Twelfth Regiment Armory Fund, being the unexpended balance of the appropriation made for that armory building, be hereby transferred to the General Armory Fund.

This resolution was adopted by the following vote:

The Mayor, aye; the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, aye; and the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, aye.

The Commissioner of the Public Works Department offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That for the purpose of testing the heating apparatus in the Eighth Regiment Armory building, the Secretary is hereby directed to purchase ten tons of coal and one load of wood of William D. Bruns, Jr., foot of East Twenty-fourth street, to be delivered at the Armory Building, Fourth avenue, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, at the same prices at which he now furnishes the City coal and wood for the Public Buildings under contract.

This resolution was adopted by the following vote:

The Mayor, aye; the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, aye; and the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, aye.

The meeting then adjourned to meet at 11 A. M. to-morrow, October 25.

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
No. 300 MULBERRY STREET,
BUREAU OF ELECTIONS, NEW YORK, October 7, 1889.

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and by virtue of the authority therein conferred upon the Board of Police, the division of the several Assembly Districts in the City and County of New York into Election Districts, and the boundaries of said Election Districts are hereby fixed by said Board as follows:

First Assembly District.

The First Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-nine election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Old Slip, East river, Broad street, and Beaver street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Broadway, Battery place, and Greenwich street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Morris street, Greenwich street, Battery place, and Washington street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Washington street, Battery place, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Greenwich street, Morris street, and Washington street.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Albany street, Greenwich street, Rector street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Greenwich street, Albany street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Broadway, Rector street, and Greenwich street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Maiden lane, East river, Old Slip, Hanover square, William street, Beaver street, and Broadway, including Franklin Market.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Maiden lane, and Gold street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spruce street, Gold street, Liberty street, Broadway, and Park row.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Dey street, Broadway, Liberty street, and Hudson or North river.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Barclay street, Broadway, Dey street, Greenwich street, Vesey street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Reade street, Broadway, Barclay street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Franklin street, Broadway, Reade street, and Hudson street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Harrison street, Hudson street, Reade street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within North Moore street, Hudson street, Harrison street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Hubert street, Hudson street, North Moore street, and Hudson or North river.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beach street, Varick street, North Moore street, West Broadway, Franklin street, and Hudson street.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Broadway, Franklin street, West Broadway, North Moore street, Varick street, Beach street, St. John's lane, and Laight street.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Laight street, St. John's lane, Beach street, Hudson street, Laight street, and Varick street.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Desbrosses street, Greenwich street, Laight street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Hudson street, Laight street, and Greenwich street.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Greenwich street, Desbrosses street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Battery place, Bowling Green, Whitehall street, East river, Hudson or North river, Governor's Island, Bedloe's Island, and Ellis Island.

The Twenty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Broad street, East river, Whitehall street, Broadway, and Beaver street.

The Twenty-seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Vesey street, Greenwich street, Dey street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Varick street, Laight street, and Hudson street.

The Twenty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Laight street, Hudson street, Hubert street, and Hudson or North river.

Second Assembly District.

The Second Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-nine election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Oak street, Catharine street, Catharine slip, East river, and Oliver street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Chatham square, Catharine street, Oak street, and Oliver street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within New Bowery, Oliver street, Oak street, and James street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Park row, New Bowery, James street, Madison street, and Roosevelt street.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Madison street, James street, Batavia street, and Roosevelt street.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Batavia street, James street, James slip, Water street, and Roosevelt street.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Oak street, Oliver street, East river, Roosevelt street, Water street, James slip, and James street.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Cherry street, Roosevelt street, East river, Peck slip, Water street, and Dover street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Oak street, Roosevelt street, Cherry street, Franklin square, and Pearl street.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rose street, Madison street, Roosevelt street, Oak street, Pearl street, and Frankfort street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Roosevelt street, Madison street, Pearl street, and Park row.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Pearl street, Rose street, Frankfort street, and William street.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Nassau street, Frankfort street, Pearl street, Dover street, Water street, Peck slip, Ferry street, Gold street, and Spruce street.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Worth street, Centre street, Pearl street, Park street, Duane street, Park row, City Hall square, and Broadway.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Pearl street, Park row, Duane street, and City Hall place.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Worth street, Baxter street, Park row, Pearl street, and Centre street.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Bayard street, Mulberry street, Park street, Worth street, Centre street, Leonard street, and Baxter street.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Bayard street, Mott street, Worth street, Park street, and Mulberry street.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Pell street, Bowery, Park row, and Mott street.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Elizabeth street, Bayard street, and Mulberry street.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Mulberry street, Bayard street, and Baxter street.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Baxter street, Leonard street, and Centre street.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Centre street, Worth street, and Broadway.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Worth street, Mulberry street, Park row, and Baxter street.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within New Chambers street, Duane street, William street, Frankfort street, and Park row.

The Twenty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Pearl street, William street, New Chambers street, and Park row.

The Twenty-seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Pearl street, City Hall place, Duane street, and Park street.

The Twenty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Bowery, Pell street, Mott street, Bayard street, and Elizabeth street.

The Twenty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Worth street, Park row, and Mulberry street.

Third Assembly District.

The Third Assembly District shall be divided into thirty-three election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Hester street, Mulberry street, Canal street, and Centre street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Hester street, Mott street, Canal street, and Mulberry street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Grand street, Elizabeth street, Canal street, and Mott street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Grand street, Mott street, Hester street, and Mulberry street.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Grand street, Baxter street, Hester street, Centre street, Canal street, and Broadway.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spring street, Marion street, Centre street, Grand street, Broadway, Broome street, and Crosby street.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spring street, Mulberry street, Grand street, Centre street, and Marion street.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spring street, Mott street, Broome street, and Mulberry street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spring street, Elizabeth street, Grand street, and Mott street.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spring street, Bowery, Canal street, and Elizabeth street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Prince street, Bowery, Spring street, and Elizabeth street.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Prince street, Elizabeth street, Spring street, and Mott street.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Houston street, Elizabeth street, Prince street, and Mott street.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Prince street, Mott street, Spring street, and Mulberry street.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Prince street, Mulberry street, Spring street, and Marion street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Houston street, Mulberry street, Prince street, Crosby street, Broome street, and Broadway.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Bleeker street, Bowery, East Houston street, and Broadway.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fourth street, Bowery, Bleeker street, and Broadway.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fourth street, Fourth avenue, Eighth street, and Broadway.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Twelfth street, Third avenue, and Fourth avenue.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fourteenth street, Third avenue, East Twelfth street, and Fourth avenue.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Sixteenth street, Third avenue, East Fourteenth street, and Fourth avenue, or Union square.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Eighteenth street, Third avenue, East Sixteenth street, and Fourth avenue, or Union square.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Twenty-first street, Third avenue, East Eighteenth street, Fourth avenue, East Twentieth street, and Gramercy Park.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Twenty-third street, Third avenue, East Twenty-first street, Gramercy Park, East Twentieth street, and Fourth avenue.

The Twenty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Twenty-first street, Fourth avenue, Union square, and Broadway.

The Twenty-seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Houston street, Bowery, Prince street, and Elizabeth street.

The Twenty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Twenty-third street, Fourth avenue, East Twenty-first street, and Broadway.

The Twenty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Houston street, Mott street, Prince street, and Mulberry street.

The Thirtieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Grand street, Mulberry street, Hester street, and Baxter street.

The Thirty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Broome street, Mott street, Grand street, and Mulberry street.

The Thirty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Prince street, Marion street, Spring street, and Crosby street.

The Thirty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Eighth street, Fourth avenue, East Fourth street, and Broadway.

Fourth Assembly District.

The Fourth Assembly District shall be divided into thirty-nine election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Division street, Market street, East Broadway, and Catharine street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Broadway, Market street, Henry street, and Catharine street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Henry street, Market street, Madison street, and Catharine street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Broadway, Pike street, Henry street, and Market street.

BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
NEW YORK, October 22, 1889.

The Hons. Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; William H. Clark, Counsel to the Corporation, and Thomas F. Gilroy, Commissioner of Public Works, the three city officers designated by section 66 of the New York City Consolidation Act, met this day in the Mayor's office.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

On motion of Commissioner Gilroy, the office of Bookkeeper of the City Record was abolished, and that of Examiner, to be filled by a practical printer competent to measure type matter, was established.

The Supervisor of the City Record called attention to the fact that the price of the Registry List supplements had been twenty-five cents, but that no appreciable income had been derived by the City from their sale. He asked instructions as to a change in the price, on the ground that the lists were printed for public advantage and not to produce a revenue to the city. After some discussion it was determined, on motion of Commissioner Gilroy, that the price of each supplement should be five cents.

The following report respecting the appropriations needed for 1890 was presented by the Supervisor of the City Record, and was ordered to be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

I estimated that \$134,000 would prove ample for the procurement of supplies up to January 1, 1890, and that there would be a surplus of \$26,000, applicable either to the payment of arrearages of past administrations, or to the procurement of supplies necessary to the departments at the opening of the approaching year. Of the arrearages about \$19,000 are now in suit. It seems, therefore, that this portion of the surplus might properly be expended at once in obtaining blank books—dockets, ledgers, etc.—and other

In addition to the amounts payable as herein prescribed for opening such streets and public places for sewer, water, steam, gas and electric wire connections and for repairing the same, there shall be deposited in the Department of Public Parks for each superficial square yard of pavement displaced for any purpose whatsoever, an amount equal to the cost of laying such pavement in the first instance.

In case such excavation does not include water, sewer, steam, gas or electric wire connections, or the repair of the same, the payment of the amounts fixed for such connections or repairs respectively, will not be required.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

From the Engineer of Construction, reporting an estimate of the cost of exterior work for the improvement of Morningside Park.

Commissioner Gallup offered the following:

Resolved, That the bays and stairways connected therewith of Morningside avenue, west of Morningside Park, be completed upon the plans heretofore adopted by this Department for said work, and in a similar manner to the bays and stairways already constructed upon that avenue, and that the entrance and stairway at the southeast corner of said park be completed upon plans prepared by the Landscape Architect, and that these plans, with the estimate for such work made by the Engineer of Construction, be sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with the request that the sum of \$75,000 be appropriated for the work, under the provisions of chapter 444, Laws of 1889.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1888), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall be bound to pay the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made therefor.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water-closets, or any other water-closets, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 AND 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

1st. Charges for water-closets, or any other water-closets, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall be collected as such, and shall be returned as arrears, which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charge aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter is not in use, or which is not supplied with water in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters.

The said Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the protection of the water supply; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit: Croton Water Rates for Buildings from 16 to 50 feet, all waters not specified subject to Special Rates.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width five feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwellings-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year, to be added to the regular rents.

Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows.

BAKES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-tub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and one dollar per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use as bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick-tens—cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred square feet.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STALLS (each) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: **HORSES, PRIVATE.**—For two horses there shall be charged five dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSES AND CARTS.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; and for each trough to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LICHTS AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER, AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-closets, stop-closets, self-closing closets, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, or stop, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For or form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the closet, or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the overflow of the cistern, if such cistern is approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cistern is provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cisterns, answering this description can be seen at the Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

Where horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in public places, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed, will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rates, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no reductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
