The 877 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.48, against 22.15 for the previous week, and 27.70 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The marked increase of 84 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 5 in the deaths from scarlet fever, of 8 from cancer, of 26 from phthisis, of 20 from heart diseases, of 10 from Bright's disease, and of 11 from violence, partially offset by a decrease of 10 in the deaths from pneumonia.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Twelfth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards.


