Gentlemen—The heavy rain of Friday, February 28, 1902, and the melting of the snow, caused the heaviest flood in the Croton river on March 1 that has occurred in a number of years. The water flowed over the crest of the Old Croton Dam at a height of 77½ inches; the greatest recorded height is 81 inches. Both openings through the New Croton Dam were entirely filled with water and it flooded the



valley above the dam, rising to a height of about 5 feet above the floor of the Wire Mill Bridge.

The extent of the damage done cannot be ascertained until the flood subsides. It has, however, washed away a timber highway bridge, on Hunter's brook. This was due to the flooding of the valley caused by the New Croton Dam. I have directed Mr. Charles S. Gowen, Division Engineer, to take the necessary steps to have the bridge replaced as soon as possible.

From actual measurements the value of the work done by them at the prices, according to the terms of the contract, amounts to \$101,937.72. In addition to this I have included in the estimate an item for laying, jointing and calking 30 feet of 12-inch cast-iron pipe, including all material and labor incidental thereto, for which there is no price set in the contract. The work is, however, a part of the contract, as it is shown on the contract drawings. The contractors have presented a bill for this at 75 cents per linear foot, but I believe 75 cents to be a fair price, hence I have estimated the laying of 30 feet of 12-inch cast-iron pipe at 75 cents per foot, amounting to \$22.50.

From actual measurements the value of the whole amount of work done by them at the prices, according to the terms of the contract and the price fixed for laying 12-inch pipe, amounts to \$101,060.22.

"All the sheet plank and timber used during the progress of the work to support the sides of the trenches shall be removed as the filling proceeds, except where otherwise ordered by the Engineer; and the cost of all such plank or timber, other than is especially provided for in Clause O items (v) and (w), will be included in the price stipulated for earth excavation, Clause O, item (a)."

The timber charged for in the bill was not ordered by the Engineer to be left in and all but about 13,000 feet, B. M., was drawn as the work progressed and was used for other purposes.

The contract provides that the cost of sheeting, other than is ordered by the Engineer to be left in, shall be included in the price stipulated for earth excavation, hence I can see no equity in the claim.
