Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

During the month of January all the divisions of Bellevue Hospital were visited daily by the Attending Physicians and Surgeons or their assistants and the Out Patient Department was regularly attended. The allied hospitals and their Out Patient Departments were visited regularly.

On the evening of February 3 there was a runaway by one of the ambulances of Gouverneur Hospital. There seemed to be extenuating circumstances as far as the Driver was concerned, the bit having broken, but as he has not been careful in his driving in the past he was suspended for a week without pay.

The Department of Finance has invited attention to the fact that other departments purchase fresh fruits and vegetables by contract, and advises that this Department make such contract. The expenditure averages \$380 a month, and various green grocers about the City have supplied this Department. To comply with the request of the Department of Finance it is necessary to advertise for bids.

In the estimate for additions, alterations and repairs at Bellevue in 1906 there was an item of \$2,200 for laundry machinery. If the old mangle become the property of the successful bidder, it is possible that a bid on a new mangle at \$2,200 may be received, which could be charged either to the appropriation for Additions, Alterations and Repairs, or to Supplies. The last mangle was purchased in June, 1902, and cost \$90.

The accompanying letter from Mr. G. Weil, offering a theatrical benefit performance in aid of Bellevue Hospital, is respectfully referred to the Board of Trustees.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

It is recommended that the matter of the petition from the Physicians to Out Patients to Gouverneur Hospital, together with the letter of Dr. J. H. Huddleston, be referred to the Executive Committee of that institution.

In the construction of the fence that is to cut off that part of the grounds of Bellevue Hospital on which the new building is to be erected, this Department will encroach on the new-made ground, and part of that ground will be within the scope of the work. Attention is invited to the fact that the Dock Department has not yet transferred control of that land to the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. A transfer will also be necessary in the event that the new-made ground may have to be used later on for temporary buildings for hospital purposes.

The contractor began work on pulling down the erysipelas ward on February 6 and the work is progressing satisfactorily.

Inspection of Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals shows them to be in good condition. At Gouverneur and at the new Harlem the work of construction seems to progress slowly. The lease of the Harlem Hospital Out Patient Department expires about April 1. If the contractor expedites the work at the new Harlem Hospital, the Out Patient Hospital there could be occupied on that date.

A direct telephone line at Harlem Hospital, with 1,500 messages a year, will cost \$74.25. There does not seem to be any unusual delay in getting that institution at the present time, and, in view of the fact that in a few months the present buildings will be abandoned, it is recommended that an additional telephone be not installed.

SIR—The Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, under date of February 28, 1906, transmits by direction of the Commissioner, for the information of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, a copy of communication of same date forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, submitting estimates of moneys required for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries, for the year 1906, amounting to \$21,800,000, and requesting that the necessary action be taken in order that Corporate Stock be issued for the above amount. I would report:

It has been the custom of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, without comment, the issuance of the amount of Corporate Stock requested by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, leaving the question of the exact amount to be appropriated with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

I see no reason why this practice should not be continued in the present case, and would suggest that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the amended Greater New York Charter, recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue from time to time, as may be required, Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to the amount of \$21,800,000, the proceeds thereof to be applied for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

SIR—I beg to advise that subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund I have this day agreed to lease to the Henry B. Turner Coal Company 265 feet of the south half of the pier at the foot of East Twenty-first street, East river, running easterly from a point 235 feet offshore from the inner end of the pier, the lease to be for a term of two years from March 22, 1906, the date of expiration of the existing lease of space on the East Twenty-second Street Pier, and the rental to be at the rate of \$950 per annum, payable quarterly in advance.

I respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve the proposed lease.

The remaining terms and conditions thereof to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by this Department.

SIR—Referring to the action taken by the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund at the meeting held February 21, 1906, in regard to the recommended lease of the pier at the foot of Twenty-second street, East river, to the New England Navigation Company, and the recommended lease of 265 feet of the south half of the pier at the foot of East Twenty-first street, East river, to the Henry B. Turner Coal Company, which were referred back to this Department with request that information be furnished as to the rentals of the adjoining piers for purposes of comparison, I beg to submit herewith a statement showing leases and permits for half a mile on each side of the property in question, and would further call your attention to the following:

After considerable time spent in negotiation I have succeeded in having the New England Navigation Company file a request for a lease of the pier at the foot of Twenty-second street, East river, at the rental proposed in the recommendation, viz., \$7,000 per annum. This pier, as previously stated, has only one side available for wharfage, the upper or northerly side being occupied by the ferry racks of the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, but the proximity of this pier to the terminal of the Metropolitan Traction Company at the foot of Twenty-third street, East river, places the pier in a superior position in so far as the business desired to be done by the New England Navigation Company for the quick distribution of its passengers is concerned.

There is nothing, to my mind, in the use of the adjoining piers which will enable a proper comparison of rentals to be made, as may be noted from the attached memoranda in regard to the use of the adjacent piers under leases and permits.

No compensation as large as the one in question has ever been received by the City for property in the locality; it is, in my opinion, the unique position of the pier at the foot of Twenty-second street, East river, which enables the City to secure so beneficial a lease as the one recommended.

In regard to the lease to the Henry B. Turner Coal Company, this compares, as regards rental to be received, favorably with privileges of like character in the vicinity. It has been recommended for a period of two years only, as I anticipate that the character of use of this section of the water front, viz., between Eighteenth and Twenty-third streets, East river, will probably be changed if the lease is made effective between the City and the New England Navigation Company; the value of piers for leasing purposes in this vicinity in that event will, in my opinion, be made considerably higher, and with this in view I have recommended a short term for the lease.

I have quoted in the attached memoranda, giving leases and permits on piers in the vicinity of the two in question, the facts in regard to the lease of the bulkhead between Twentieth and Twenty-third streets, East river, to the Consolidated Gas Company, which as a matter of fact did not hold any relation to the other privileges or leases in this locality, but were able to be fixed on these high bases in view of the fact that the company found it necessary for the protection of its property interests to secure these bulkheads for the maintenance of their oil pipes, conveyors, etc., across the marginal street in order to get at its property in the rear, and which arrangement was a part of the consideration when the City entered into the improvement of the district between Eighteenth and Twenty-third streets, East river.

Turner Coal Company 265 feet of the south half of the pier at the foot of East Twenty-first street, East river, running easterly from a point 235 feet offshore from the inner end of the pier, the lease to be for a term of two years from March 22, 1906, the date of expiration of the existing lease of space on the East Twenty-second Street Pier, and the rental to be at the rate of \$950 per annum, payable quarterly, in advance."

SIR—I beg to advise that after consideration I am of the opinion that the interests of the City would be best served by leasing the pier at the foot of East Twenty-second street, East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, and therefore would submit the following:

That a lease of the said pier be granted to the New England Navigation Company for a term of ten years from April 1, 1906, at a rental of \$7,000 per annum, the lease to provide for one renewal term of ten years at an advance of five per cent. over the rental charged for the first term; the lessee to have the privilege of erecting a shed on the pier, such shed to be erected in accordance with plans to be first approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and to revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease, the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by this Department.

The northerly side of the pier at the foot of East Twenty-second street is not available for wharfage purposes owing to the maintenance of ferry structures thereat, and the lessee should therefore be limited in the use of the pier to the entire surface, the south side and the outer end thereof by the terms of the lease.

On motion, the matter was laid over for at least three weeks, in order that General Howard Carroll may be present when the matter is taken up.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to the establishment and leasing of a ferry from and to the foot of Ocean avenue, Sheepshead Bay; thence to Plum Beach; thence to Barren Island; thence to various points on Rockaway Beach, stopping enroute when required at the various houses in Jamaica Bay, used for boating and fishing purposes.

On motion of the Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, the matter was laid over.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks requesting an expression of opinion from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as to the advisability of taking out insurance on ferry boats and terminals.

On motion of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the matter was laid over.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a sale at public auction of the steel freight shed on Pier, old 10, East river:

NEW YORK, February 15, 1906.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—This Department desires the removal of the steel freight shed now located on Pier, old 10, between Cuyler's alley and Old slip, East river, Borough of Manhattan, in connection with the progress of the work of improvement thereof.

The steel shed is in good condition and consists of two parts, the office portion at the inshore end and the shed proper. The office portion is about 60 feet long by 37 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet wide, and is built in two stories; the centre height from the deck of the pier is about 35 feet. The shed proper is a single story structure, about 384 feet long and

about 37 feet wide; its centre height from the deck of the pier is about 20 feet. The entire shed covers an area of about 16,458 square feet.

All the posts, studs, purlins, trusses and bracing composing the framing of the shed are of structural steel. The roof sheathing, window frames, partitions, walls, ceiling, office doors, etc., of the second story of the office portion are of woodwork in first-class condition. The sides of the building, not taken up by doors, are covered by galvanized corrugated steel. The roof of the office portion is covered with roofing tin laid on boards which rest on the wooden purlins. The roof of the shed proper is composed of double spruce covering and laid over with 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch tongue and grooved yellow pine flooring.

The principal parts or items composing the shed on Pier, old 10, East river, are all the trusses, columns, studs, purlins, bracing, corrugated steel folding doors, corrugated steel sheeting composing sides and end of shed, steel frames, and all material of every description comprising the shed proper and office portion, down to the decking of the pier, excepting the backing log, and any portion or portions of the pier proper which may be above the level of said decking of the pier.

The items enumerated above are believed to be approximately correct, but bidders must satisfy themselves as to the quantity, quality and condition of the material composing the shed, at the time of sale.

The purchaser of this shed will be given possession of the same on April 15, 1906, upon which date he shall begin the work of removal and shall complete all such work of removal within thirty days from that date.

I would respectfully request that the shed be sold by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and that the conditions relative to the commencement and completion of the work of removal be inserted in the terms of sale as outlined herein.

SIR—The Board of Education, at a meeting held February 5, 1906, adopted the following resolution:

“Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize a renewal of the lease of the premises known as Balzer Hall, located on Prospect and Grant streets, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of one year from April 19, 1906, at an annual rental of \$1,000, otherwise on the same terms and conditions as contained in the present lease. Owner, Elizabeth F. Balzer, No. 1003 Flatbush avenue, Brooklyn.”

The premises mentioned are located at the northwest corner of Prospect street and Snyder avenue (formerly Grant street). The plot measures about 43 by 100 feet and has on it a two-story frame building 40 by 50 feet, with a two-story frame

annex 24 by 30 feet. The assessed valuation on the property is \$5,000. The building has six class rooms in use, besides an assembly hall and a large play room, and has been occupied by the Board of Education for about five years. The rent asked, \$1,000, is an advance of \$400 a year over the rent now paid, but Mrs. Balzer refuses to accept any less for the property, claiming that she has had an offer of \$1,200 a year from May 1. She has received notice that the resolution given above was passed by the Board of Education.

The building is used as an annex to Public School 90, and is occupied by the six primary classes of that school. The annex has a seating capacity of 233, a total enrollment of 204, and an average daily attendance of about 170. Public School 90 has a seating capacity of 547 and an average attendance of 370, but it would be impossible to accommodate the children of the primary grades in Public School 90 without putting two classes in one room.

There is no other building available for the purpose of the annex in the immediate neighborhood. The rental now asked for the property is full value, but not excessive. The use of the building for school purposes as an annex to Public School 90 for another year seems to be unavoidable. Both Public School 89, six blocks south, and Public School 92, about five blocks north, are being enlarged, and will greatly relieve the pressure in Public School 90, but the new wings of these buildings will probably not be ready for occupancy before next September.

I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a renewal of the lease of the premises known as Balzer Hall, located on Prospect street and Snyder avenue (formerly Grant street), Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of one year from April 19, 1906, at an annual rental of \$1,000, payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. The Comptroller presented the following report with certificate of the Corporation Counsel relative to the petition of Emma Rockmore for a release or quit-claim of the City's interest in a portion of the old Hunterfly road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and offered the following resolution (see Minutes, 1905, page 1128):

February 27, 1906.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Under date of September 23, 1905, this office transmitted to the Corporation Counsel a verified petition of Emma Rockmore, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requesting a release of a portion of the old Hunterfly road in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with a report made thereon by this Bureau. The report, after stating the facts, recommended that the application be transmitted to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the City's interest in the old Hunterfly road crossing the petitioner's property was material or nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner. In answer thereto, in an opinion under date of November 18, 1905, the Corporation Counsel certified that whatever interest the City had in the portion of the old Hunterfly road in the Borough of Brooklyn located within the area of the property owner by the petitioner was a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, but the description of the property included in the opinion recited "Chestnut street" instead of "Chester street." It was therefore necessary, in accordance with section 205 of the Revised Charter, to have a new certification for a release of the property in question. The matter was referred back to the Corporation Counsel in a communication under date of February 1, 1906, requesting that he certify as to whether the property described in the report of the Bureau of Real Estate is of material interest to The City of New York or nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of the private owner, in order that the matter could again be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for amendment of the original resolution, and in reply thereto the Corporation Counsel in an opinion under date of February 21, 1906, states:

I hereby certify that the interest of the City in so much of the old Hunterfly road in the Borough of Brooklyn as is located within the area of the property owned by Emma Rockmore, which property is more particularly described hereinafter, is a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner. Said property is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Blake avenue with the easterly side of Bristol street, and running thence easterly along the southerly side of Blake avenue 100 feet to the centre line of the block between Bristol and Chester streets, and running thence southerly parallel with Bristol street 400 feet 5½ inches; thence westerly and parallel with Blake avenue 100 feet to the easterly side of Bristol street and thence northerly along the easterly side of Bristol street 400 feet 5½ inches to the point or place of beginning.

Excepting and reserving therefrom any portion of the above described property that may lie in the bed of either Bristol street or Blake avenue as legally opened.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund amend their resolution of November 28, 1905, by authorizing a release or quit-claim for a nominal consideration to Emma Rockmore of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to all that portion of the old Hunterfly road included within the lines of the property heretofore described, upon the condition that the petitioner shall produce evidence that all taxes, assessments and water rates now a lien upon said premises or any portion thereof, or any sale for the non-payment of taxes, assessments and water rates upon said property or any portion thereof, shall have been paid before receiving such release from the City.

I would also recommend that the amended resolution shall contain a clause making the expense of such release, examination, etc., to be fixed at \$200, to be paid by the petitioner.

SIR—I am in receipt of a letter signed by you, dated February 1, 1906, in which it is stated that under date of September 23, 1905, your predecessor transmitted to me a verified petition of Emma Rockmore, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requesting a release of a portion of the old Hunterfly road in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with a report thereon by the Bureau of Real Estate.

The report in stating the facts recommended that the application be transmitted to me for my opinion as to whether the City's interest in the old Hunterfly road crossing the petitioner's property was material or nominal, and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, and that the description of the property contained in the report is as follows:

Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Blake avenue with the easterly side of Bristol street, and running thence easterly along the southerly side of Blake avenue 100 feet to the centre line of the block between Bristol and Chester streets, and running thence southerly parallel with Bristol street 400 feet 5½ inches; thence westerly and parallel with Blake avenue 100 feet to the easterly side of Bristol street and thence northerly along the easterly side of Bristol street 400 feet 5½ inches to the point or place of beginning.

You state in your letter that in answer thereto in an opinion under date of November 18, 1905, I certified that whatever interest the City had in the portion of old Hunterfly road in the Borough of Brooklyn located within the area of the property owned by the petitioner was a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner; but the description of the property included in my opinion recites "Chestnut" street instead of "Chester" street, and that it will therefore be necessary, in accordance with section 205 of the revised Charter, to have a new certificate for a release of the property in question, and you request me to certify as to whether the property described in the report of the Real Estate Bureau is of material interest to The City of New York, or nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, in order that the matter may again be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for amendment of the original resolution.

As I stated in my opinion of November 18, 1905, referred to, the application of Emma Rockmore is similar to many others in which opinions have been rendered by the Corporation Counsel in relation to this old road.

In accordance with opinions heretofore given, I hereby certify that the interest of the City in so much of the old Hunterfly road in the Borough of Brooklyn as is located within the area of the property owned by Emma Rockmore, which property is more particularly described hereinafter, is a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner.

Said property is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Blake avenue with the easterly side of Bristol street, and running thence easterly along the southerly side of Blake avenue 100 feet to the centre line of the block between Bristol and Chester streets, and running thence southerly parallel with Bristol street 400 feet 5½ inches; thence westerly and parallel with Blake avenue 100 feet to the easterly side of Bristol street and thence northerly along the easterly side of Bristol street 400 feet 5½ inches to the point or place of beginning.

Excepting and reserving therefrom any portion of the above described property that may lie in the bed of either Bristol street or Blake avenue as legally opened.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board, at meeting held November 28, 1905, authorizing a release or quit-claim to Emma Rockmore, of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to a portion of the old Hunterfly road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, hereby authorize a release or quit-claim to Emma Rockmore, of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to all that portion of the old Hunterfly road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, included within the lines of the following described property:

Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Blake avenue with the easterly side of Bristol street, and running thence easterly along the southerly side of Blake avenue 100 feet to the centre line of the block between Bristol and Chester streets, and running thence southerly parallel with Bristol street 400 feet 5½ inches; thence westerly and parallel with Blake avenue 100 feet to the easterly side of Bristol street, and thence northerly along the easterly side of Bristol street 400 feet 5½ inches to the point or place of beginning.

"Excepting and reserving therefrom any portion of the above described property that may lie in the bed of either Bristol street or Blake avenue as legally opened,"—the Corporation Counsel having certified under date of February 21, 1906, that whatever interest the City may have in the property is a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner.

Resolved, That the interest of The City of New York in and to the same be and is hereby appraised at the nominal sum of \$1, and the expense of such release, examination, etc., be and is hereby fixed at \$200, to be paid by the petitioner, and evidence produced that all taxes, assessments and water rates now a lien upon said premises or any portion thereof, or any sale for the nonpayment of taxes, assessments and water rates upon said property or any portion thereof, have been paid before the execution and delivery of such release.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the interest of The City of New York in and to the same be and is hereby appraised at the nominal sum of \$1, and the expense of such release, examinations, etc., be and is hereby fixed at \$100, to be paid by the petitioner, and evidence produced that all taxes, assessment and water rates now a lien upon said premises or any portion thereof have been paid or redeemed before the execution and delivery of such release.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following petition was received from Leib Lurie for a release or quit claim of the City's interest in a portion of the old Bushwick lane in the Borough of Brooklyn:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, Leib Lurie, respectfully petitions your body for a quit-claim deed from The City of New York of certain premises shown on the accompanying diagram, the same being a portion or part of the old lane which formerly led from the cross roads to New Bushwick, under section 205 of the Charter of the Greater City of New York, for the reason that the title to the same in this petitioner is questioned by the Title Guarantee and Trust Company, which claims that The City of New York may have an interest in said premises by reason of the fact that the said lane may have been a Dutch road and that the title to the same might be vested in The City of New York, and for that reason there is a cloud on the title of the petitioner to the premises owned by him, part of which is shown on said diagram.

That said petitioner is the owner of the premises adjoining the same, and running up to and bordering on said strip of land on the easterly side of Bushwick avenue as now laid out on the map of the Borough of Brooklyn of The City of New York; that the adjoining property was conveyed to this petitioner by a deed made by Conrad Hasenflug and Selma, his wife, and George Hilkemeier and Julia, his wife, dated the 1st day of March, 1904, and recorded on the 2d day of March, 1904, in Liber 33, Section 11, page 3, and the premises, a quit claim of which is asked from The City of New York, was conveyed to the petitioner by Edward F. Koch and Regina, his wife, by deed dated the 2d day of June, 1904, and recorded the 14th day of June, 1904, in Liber 46 of Conveyances, Section 11, page 73.

That at the time of the obtaining of said deed from Koch this petitioner was informed that he had obtained a good title to the premises, a quit claim of which is requested from The City of New York, and that at that time the Title Guarantee and Trust Company said that they would insure the title of this petitioner to said property; but since that time, upon an application for a loan on said premises, the said Title Guarantee and Trust Company has refused to guarantee said title for the purpose of a loan thereon, and has refused to make advances under said loan to this petitioner, and this petition is made for the purpose of eliminating any question as to the title of said property and remove whatever cloud there may be thereon by reason of The City of New York having any interest therein.



Beginning at a point on the easterly line of Bushwick avenue, as formerly laid out, distant 80 feet southerly from and on a line drawn at right angles to the southerly side of Noll street (formerly Prospect street), running thence southerly along said old line of Bushwick avenue, 42 feet and 2 inches to the intersection of said old line with the present easterly line of Bushwick avenue; thence southerly along the present easterly line of Bushwick avenue to a point thereon distant 322 feet 6½ inches southerly from the southerly side of Noll street, measured along the said present easterly line of

Bushwick avenue; thence northeasterly 100 feet and 3 inches to a point distant 100 feet from and on a line drawn at right angles to the present easterly line of Bushwick avenue; thence northerly and parallel with the present easterly line of Bushwick avenue 222 feet and 3 inches to a point distant 80 feet southerly from and on a line drawn at right angles to the southerly line of Noll street, and thence westerly parallel with Noll street 99 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Reference to the diagram attached to said petition will show that this property is the property adjoining that for which a release is asked from the City. Mr. Lurie also obtained deed to the following-described property, which I believe is a release from a person who was the owner of the land in the old lane or road, if the same were found to be an English road and which is described in the petition as made by Koch to said Lurie, and is recorded in Liber 46, page 73, Section 11:

Mr. Lurie assumed and was assured at the time he obtained these two deeds by the Title Guarantee and Trust Company that he obtained the title to all of the property up to the present line of Bushwick avenue; but since then obtaining a building loan from the Title Guarantee and Trust Company they have assumed the position that these deeds are not sufficient to remove any question as to the title to the property, but require Mr. Lurie to obtain from the City a quit-claim deed to any right the City might have in the property between the old and new lines of Bushwick avenue, seeming to fear that at some time the old lane or road, part of which is included in the premises, might be found to be a Dutch road in which the City might have some interest.

It is important that this matter be expedited as much as possible, as new buildings are now being erected on this property, and the Title Guarantee and Trust Company are making payments by advances. The buildings are now in a position where the owner, Mr. Lurie, is entitled to receive an advance, but the Title Company refuses to make it until a deed is obtained from the City.

By expediting this matter as much as possible you will confer a great favor on my client, the petitioner and the present owner of the property.

SIR—Leib Lurie, in a verified petition, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of January 16, 1906, which is hereto annexed and forms part of this report, requests a release of the City's interest to all that portion of the old Bushwick lane, in the Borough of Brooklyn, which premises are in front of property owned by him on the easterly side of Bushwick avenue, 80 feet 7½ inches south of Noll street, Borough of Brooklyn. The petitioner states that the property requested to be released was a portion or part of the old lane which formerly led from the cross-roads to New Bushwick. That the Title Guarantee & Trust Company, in examination of the title, claims that The City of New York may have an interest in said premises, by reason of the fact that said lane may have been a Dutch road and that title to the same might be vested in The City of New York.

The petitioner states that the property adjoining and running up to and abutting on the strip of land requested to be released on the easterly side of Bushwick avenue as now laid out on the map of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, was conveyed to him by deed made by Conrad Hasenflug and Selma, his wife, and George Hilkemeier and Julia, his wife, dated March 1, 1904, and recorded on March 2, 1904, in Liber 33, section 11, page 3, and the premises to which a quit-claim deed is asked were conveyed to the petitioner by Edward F. Koch and Regina, his wife, by deed dated June 2, 1904, and recorded June 14, 1904, in Liber 46 of Conveyances, section 11, page 73.

In view of the fact that the property in question is part of an old Dutch road, the question is similar to many applications which are presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for releases of portions of old roads in the Borough of Brooklyn, upon which the Corporation Counsel has rendered opinions that the interest of The City of New York therein is merely nominal and a cloud upon the title of a private owner. I would respectfully recommend that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the interest of the City in the premises is material or merely nominal and a cloud upon the title of a private owner, and if he should certify that the interest of the City is merely nominal and a cloud upon the title of a private owner, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, may properly authorize a quit-claim for a nominal consideration to Lieb Lurie of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York to all that portion of old Bushwick lane within the lines of the following-described property:

Beginning at a point in the easterly line of Bushwick avenue, as said avenue was laid out and existed prior to 1865, where the line dividing Lots Nos. 25 and 38 as laid down on a map entitled "Map of 53 lots situate in the Town of Bushwick, Kings County, belonging to Thomas Green, surveyed and laid out into lots in April, 1850, by H. F. Betts, Village Surveyor, Williamsburg," and filed January 18, 1851, in the office of the Register of Kings County by the number 226, intersects said easterly line; running thence westerly along said dividing line produced to the centre line of the lane which formerly led from the cross-roads to New Bushwick; thence running southerly along said centre line of the lane about 42 feet 2 inches to a point where the line dividing Lots Nos. 39 and 40, as laid down on the map aforesaid, would, if produced westerly, intersect said centre line; thence running easterly and along said last-mentioned dividing line so produced to the easterly line of Bushwick avenue, as the same was laid out and existed prior to 1865, and thence running northerly and along said last-mentioned line 40 feet 2 inches, more or less, to the point or place of beginning.

Upon the condition that the petitioner shall produce evidence that all taxes, assessments and water rates now a lien upon said premises, or any portion thereof, or any sale for the non-payment of taxes, assessments and water rates, have been paid before receiving such release from the City.

I would further recommend that if the Corporation Counsel shall decide that the interest of the City in this property is not material and purely a cloud upon the title of a private owner that the interest of the City be appraised at the nominal sum of \$1, and that the expense of such release, examination, etc., be fixed at the sum of \$100, to be paid by the petitioner before the delivery of such release.

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held December 13, 1905, upon the presentation of a report by the then Comptroller, unanimously adopted the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That a Commission, to be composed of engineers, be appointed by the Mayor for the purpose of preparing and submitting to this Board at the earliest date possible a report:

"First—Upon the general improvement and development of Jamaica Bay, in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, along the lines indicated in the communication of the Comptroller to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund presented this day, together with plans for the physical improvement and an estimate of the cost of same; and

"Second—Upon the general condition of the water front of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, with recommendations as to the points at which the City should acquire land for the purpose of building public docks, together with such plans as may be necessary for development of the interior waterways; and be it further

"Resolved, That, for the purpose of providing the necessary means for payment of the expenses of such Commission, including the cost of preparation of plans and estimates, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to approve of an issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Charter, to an amount not exceeding \$25,000, the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid,"

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), to provide means for the necessary expenses of a Commission to be appointed by the Mayor in connection with the general improvement and development of Jamaica Bay, in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, and the general condition of the water front of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and the preparation of plans and estimates in connection therewith, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid; and be it further

Resolved, That the Mayor be requested to limit the time of the report of the Commission to be appointed by him under and pursuant to the resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to December 1, 1906; and be it further

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to send to each member of the Board of Aldermen a copy of the report, dated November 17, 1905, by the then Comptroller to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund explaining in detail the necessity for such action as is proposed, together with a copy of these resolutions.

The following communication was received from the Board of Education relative to a lease of premises in Firemen's Hall on Rockaway avenue, Canarsie, Borough of Brooklyn:

NEW YORK, March 6, 1906.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—Owing to a fire occurring on Wednesday last, which caused serious damage to the building of Public School 114, Canarsie, Borough of Brooklyn, rendering it untenable and necessitating repairs which will require several weeks, it has become necessary for the Board of Education to take immediate steps to provide temporary accommodations for the children attending said school. The matter was promptly taken up by Hon. Richard H. Adams, Chairman of the Committee on Buildings, who found that the only available building was the premises known as Firemen's Hall, situated on Rockaway avenue, Canarsie, owned by Mr. F. W. Harms. This hall adjoins a small hotel, also owned by him, but has entrances which are entirely independent and away from the hotel proper.

This building, with two adjoining rooms, will provide accommodations for six or seven classes and practically take care of the entire school, and Mr. Harms has consented to lease the same to the Board of Education at a rental of \$100 per month, the Board of Education to furnish additional stoves which may be required for heating, janitor service, etc., and to provide such additional closet accommodations as may be deemed desirable.

In the emergency which existed, it became necessary for the Board of Education to take possession of the premises above mentioned immediately, and without waiting for action by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and as the next meeting of the Board of Education will not be held until the 14th inst., it is deemed advisable to present the matter to said Commissioners in advance of formal action by the Board of Education.

I therefore respectfully request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the Board of Education to execute a lease of the premises known as Firemen's Hall, situated on Rockaway avenue, Canarsie, Borough of Brooklyn, together with two adjoining rooms, one now used as a billiard room and the other as a dining room, on a month to month basis, at a rental of \$100 per month, beginning March 5, 1906, the Board of Education to furnish additional stoves which may be required for heating and janitor service, and to provide such additional closet accommodations as may be necessary. Owner, F. W. Harms.

The matter of the lease of the premises above mentioned was considered by the Committee on Buildings at its meeting held yesterday, and the above request is submitted in accordance with the action of said committee. The matter will be submitted for approval to the Board of Education at its meeting to be held on March 14.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Education in a communication dated March 6, 1906, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests immediate consideration by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a lease of the premises known as "Firemen's Hall," situated on Rockaway avenue, Canarsie, owned by Mr. F. W. Harms. This hall adjoins a small hotel, also owned by Mr. Harms, but has entrances which are entirely independent and away from the hotel proper.

Mr. Harms has agreed to lease the entire building and two rooms in the hotel, namely, the billiard room and the dining room, at a monthly rental of \$100, the Board of Education to furnish sufficient additional stoves which may be necessary for the purpose of heating the building, to furnish janitor service and to provide such additional closet accommodations as may be deemed desirable.

The "Firemen's Hall," with the two rooms above-mentioned, will provide accommodations for six or seven classes and practically take care of the entire attendance of Public School 114, located at Canarsie, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The immediate necessity for the occupation of this hall and the two rooms in the hotel was occasioned by a fire which occurred on Wednesday last, which caused serious damage to the building of Public School 114, rendering it untenable and necessitating such repairs, which will require several weeks to make. The use of this hall and the two rooms in the hotel is simply for temporary accommodations for the children attending Public School 114. This is an emergency condition which confronts the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. The Board of Education has not had time to meet and adopt its usual resolution, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to take proper action, but I presume this will be done at a later date, in order to keep the records straight. I understand that the Board of Education has proceeded to put in the school furniture, and I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the Board of Education to enter into a monthly lease of the premises known as "Firemen's Hall," located on Rockaway avenue, Canarsie, Borough of Brooklyn, together with two rooms known as the dining-room and billiard-room in the hotel adjoining, for occupation by the pupils of Public School 114, at a monthly rental of \$100, beginning March 5, 1906, and not to extend beyond July 5, 1906; the Board of Education to furnish additional stoves, which may be required for heating and janitor service and

to provide such additional closet accommodations as may be necessary, the said rent being, in my opinion, reasonable and just. Lessor, F. W. Harms.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Board of Education, of a lease to the City from F. W. Harms, of the premises known as Firemen's Hall, located on Rockaway avenue, Canarsie, Borough of Brooklyn, together with two rooms known as the dining-room and the billiard-room in the hotel adjoining, for occupation by the pupils of Public School 114, at a monthly rental of one hundred dollars (\$100), beginning March 5, 1906, and not to extend beyond July 5, 1906; the Board of Education to furnish janitor service and such additional stoves as may be required for heating, and to provide such additional closet accommodations as may be necessary; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Union Ferry Company notifying the Board that it will discontinue the operation of its ferries after May 1, 1906:

BROOKLYN, March 5, 1906.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The Union Ferry Company respectfully calls your attention to the minutes of your proceedings on April 12 and May 10 last, referring to the controversies theretofore existing between the City and this Company.

Following those proceedings, this Company has continued and expects to continue until May 1, 1906, to operate the ferries, paying therefor 2 per cent. of the gross receipts of the ferriage. These ferries are those known as Hamilton Ferry, South Ferry, Wall Street Ferry, Fulton Street Ferry and Catharine Street Ferry, operating between the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn.

It is expected that the tunnel to Brooklyn from the Battery will be in operation by the end of this year. It seems clear from the facts set forth in your minutes of April 12 last, by the City's Auditor, that upon the beginning of the operation of such tunnel the receipts of the ferries known as Hamilton and South will be so reduced as to no longer enable the Company to meet the operating expenses upon the five ferries and also pay any return upon the capital invested. Under such circumstances it cannot be reasonably expected that a private corporation will continue such operation. Indeed, the officers of this company are advised by counsel that they would make themselves personally liable to their stockholders if they deplete the assets of the company by continuing the operation of the ferries at a loss. It will, therefore, be necessary for this Company to cease the operation of such ferries, not perhaps necessarily on May 1 next, but at some date in the near future and probably as soon as the municipal tunnel shall be completed and put in operation, which will be the latter part of the year 1906 or the early part of 1907.

We bring these facts to the notice of the City authorities at this time so that there may be ample opportunity to make some practical provision for the emergency.

If no other alternative is presented when the time for discontinuance arrives, the Company may be obliged to dispose of its property, including its real estate at the foot of Atlantic and Hamilton avenues, in Brooklyn and go into voluntary liquidation. The public interests, however, may indicate the consideration of an alternative. The accounts of this Company show a daily average of 85,930 passengers, excluding Sundays and holidays, for the year ending October 31, 1905. In addition, about 5,700 trucks and vehicles of various other kinds make daily use of these means of crossing the river—enough, if placed in a continuous line, to extend over seventeen miles. Aside from the question of public convenience, the discontinuance of these ferries would undoubtedly have a substantial and depreciating effect on the values of the water front and neighboring property of both Manhattan and Brooklyn. Tunnels will not accommodate vehicular traffic. The first bridge is already carrying all that it can, and neither it nor the new bridges under construction can accommodate the sections accommodated by the ferries.

It seems to us, therefore, that the City authorities, before facing the discontinuance of these ferries, with the inevitable consequences, must carefully consider whether or not the public interests demand, both for convenience of the passengers and vehicles and for the preservation of property values, the acquisition of the ferries and the property necessary for their operation and their operation by the City. There is no question of buying up the franchise, since the franchise or lease of the Union Ferry Company will have expired, but even to buy the tangible property used in and necessary for the operation of such ferries will require an enabling act from the Legislature, and if such is not obtained at the present session of the Legislature, there will be no alternative presented and no result possible except the closing of the ferries when their operation becomes impossible by the present corporation.

Being necessarily more familiar with the facts, the Union Ferry Company deems it a duty to call such facts briefly to your attention at this early date, so that some steps may be taken as you deem best.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution approving of the selection of this site, heretofore described, for school purposes, and authorize the acquisition of the same at private sale at a price not exceeding \$153,000, said resolution to authorize the Comptroller to enter into contracts for the acquisition of the property after said contracts are approved by the Corporation Counsel as to form.

SIR—The Board of Education, at a meeting held on December 27, 1905, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines as a site for school purposes the following-described lands and premises on Orchard avenue and Elm street, adjoining Public School 56, in Local School Board District No. 44, Borough of Queens, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$2,200:

Beginning at a point on the southerly line of Orchard avenue, where the same is intersected by the westerly line of the lands of Public School 56, which point is distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Elm street, and running thence southerly along the westerly line of the lands of Public School 56, 100 feet, thence easterly along the southerly line of the lands of said school 100 feet to the westerly line of Elm street, thence southerly along the westerly line of Elm street 56 feet, thence westerly and parallel with Orchard avenue 150 feet, thence northerly and parallel with Elm street 156 feet to the southerly line of Orchard avenue 50 feet to the westerly line of the lands of Public School 56, the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less.

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described."

Concerning the proposed addition to the school site of Public School 56, after an examination, I have the honor to report as follows:

The present school site is located at the southwest corner of Orchard avenue and Elm street, and is 100 feet by 100 feet. It is proposed to enlarge the site so as to have a frontage of 50 feet on Orchard avenue and 56.52 feet on Elm street. Both Orchard avenue and Elm street are macadamized and have flagged sidewalks, gas and water, but no sewers.

The properties to be taken are known on the tax assessment books as Lot No. 73 and parts of Lots Nos. 67 and 77a, all in the Fourth Ward of Queens, volume 1, map page 11, Block 4. Since the selection of the Brooklyn and Jamaica Plank road as a route for the proposed subway to Jamaica, property along the line has advanced very materially in value. The Elm street front of the property to be taken for the school is only 250 feet north of that thoroughfare. All of the property to be taken belongs to the A. P. Man Estate, of which William Man and Alrick H. Man, the latter a member of the Board of Education, are joint tenants, with the right to convey.

The title to the interior plot 77a, 50 by 50 feet in size, is in the name of James T. Nelson, but it is like the others, owned by the Man Estate, and title will come through the Mans.

The total assessed valuation of this L-shaped parcel to be taken is \$2,500 for the year 1906, while the owners' lowest cash price, as given in the letter from School Commissioner Man to the Comptroller, herewith, is \$6,673.80. Thus the assessment is only 37½ per cent. of what is claimed as the present fair market value.

In view of the embarrassing position of Commissioner Man, being a member of the Board of Education and selling property to the City for school purposes, he has gone over the matter at length in a communication under date of January 9, 1906, in which he states that the title to "these lots stands in the name of William Man and Alrick H. Man (myself) as joint tenants. They are part of a large tract of property which my father bought before 1870 and which have belonged to him and to the family ever since. My own interest in them, although the legal title stands as I have stated, is one-seventh, which is the share to which I am entitled in the estate"; and concludes, "I have instructed my agents to hold this property out of the market for at least two years past, knowing that these lots would ultimately be needed in connection with the school."

The price asked by the owners, \$6,673.80, is in my opinion, while full value, not excessive, in view of the recent sales in that locality, and considering the small amount of money involved and the cost of condemnation proceedings, I believe it would subserve the interests of the City if the offer were accepted. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution approving of the selection of the site heretofore described for school purposes and authorize the acquisition of the same at private sale at a price not exceeding \$6,673.80, said resolution to contain a clause authorizing the Comptroller to enter into contracts for the acquisition of the property.
