

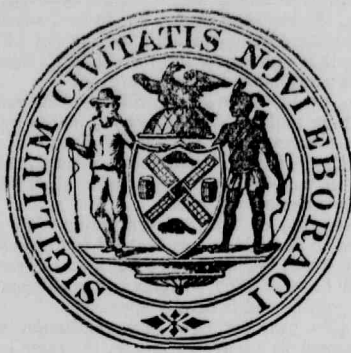

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
NEW YORK, June 18, 1880.

The Board of Health met this day.

Whereas, A corps of Sisters of Charity has resided at the Riverside Hospital during the past six years, having charge of the hospital and nursing those ill with small-pox and other contagious diseases, in a manner that has elicited the unqualified approval of the Commissioners and Officers of the Health Department, and at a time when it was impossible to secure the services of other reliable nurses for this work, the magnitude of which will be realized when it is remembered that in 1875 and 1876 there were at times between two and three hundred patients suffering from that loathsome disease, small-pox; and

Whereas, It has been found necessary by their director to transfer them to other fields of usefulness; therefore

Resolved, That this Board express to the Vicar General, and through him to the Superior and Officers of the Order to which the Sisters belong, its appreciation and gratitude for such services and its profound regret that it has been found necessary to terminate them.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Goldschmidt, upon the use made by the New York Elevated Railroad Company of Ninth avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, as a coaling and transfer station, be forwarded to the president of said company, with the request that proper measures be adopted for the abatement of the nuisance complained of.

Mahr, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that each of the four small shafts be made at least 4 feet 6 inches by 2 feet 8 inches, in the clear, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 387) for light and ventilation of the building on the southwest corner of Third avenue and Twenty-sixth street, 26 feet by 100 feet proposed to be altered to a five-story tenement-house, the lot being 26 feet by 100 feet, submitted to this Board by Thomas Stent, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Burne, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 538) for light and ventilation of the five-story tenement-house proposed to be built on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, at No. 5 Cannon street, submitted to this Board by William Jose, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that above the first story the dimensions of said house shall be not more than 25 feet by 55 feet, and that there shall be at least five feet of the lot left clear in the rear of the first story, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

P. Briggs; on condition that a light shaft of at least twelve square feet area and not less than two feet wide be constructed to light and ventilate the middle rooms of the main building, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 548) for light and ventilation of the four-story building, No. 19 State street, proposed to be altered and occupied as a tenement-house, the dimensions of said house to be 28 feet by 60 feet, with an extension 11 feet wide by 15 feet deep, the lot being 28 feet by 90 feet, submitted to this Board by William B. Mitchell, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 549) for light and ventilation of the four-story building No. 522 West Fifty-first street, as proposed to be altered and occupied as a tenement-house, the dimensions of the same to be 25 feet by 50 feet, the lot being 25 feet by 72 feet, submitted to this Board by Judson Lawson, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that each of the light shafts be so constructed as to extend to the floor of the first story, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 550) for light and ventilation of the four-story tenement-house, 19 feet 7½ inches by 65 feet, proposed to be built on a lot 19 feet 7½ inches by 100 feet 11 inches on the south side of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, 235 feet east of Fourth avenue, submitted to this Board by Margaret E. Niebuhr, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that a separate shaft be constructed to ventilate the bath rooms, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 551) for light and ventilation of the four tenement-houses, each 18 feet 9 inches by 55 feet, proposed to be built on lots each 18 feet 9 inches by 100 feet, on the south side of One Hundred and Fourth street, beginning 175 feet west of Second avenue, submitted to this Board by J. H. Valentine, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 552) for light and ventilation of No. 239 Hudson street, as provided to be altered and occupied as a tenement-house, the same to be 25 by 75, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, submitted to this Board by William H. Smith, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that a separate shaft not less than three square feet in area, be constructed to ventilate the water-closets, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 12, 1880. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,870, as follows:

1 public building, 786 tenement houses, 88 private dwellings, 133 other dwellings, 10 manufacturing and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 47 stables, 15 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 ash dump, 3 lodging houses, 34 sunken and vacant lots, 6 public drains, 1 soap factory, 1 mill, 1 dumping ground, 83 yards, courts, and areas, 101 cellars and basements, 103 waste pipes and drains, 267 privies and water-closets, 42 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 17 dangerous stairways, 10 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, 3 piggeries, 27 other nuisances, together with 69 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 843.

During the past week 208 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 136 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

230 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 60 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 55 houses, 55 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Three cases of contagious diseases were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 542 births, 51 still-births, 150 marriages, and 479 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 12, 1880; this shows an increase of 52 births and 19 still-births, and a decrease of 50 marriages, and 22 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 45 births, 23 still-births and 38 deaths, and a decrease of 10 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 5; cerebro-spinal fever 1; malarial fevers, 3; alcoholism, 7; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 20; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 11; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; direct effect of solar heat, 8; apoplexy, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 6; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; surgical operations, 2; drowning, 3; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 1; croup, 1; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 2; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 3; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 26; heart diseases, 8; convulsions, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; premature and pre-natural births, 8; and suicide, 3. The deaths from scarlatina, inanition, aneurism, meningitis, and encephalitis were the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 91 were in institutions, 285 in tenement houses, 86 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 91 on the first, 135 on the second, 91 on the third, 39 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 466 were stated to be residents of New York city, and 13 non-residents, 43 were stated to be single, 117 married, 56 widowed, and the condition of 263 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 479; still-births, 51; bodies in transit, 23; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 62 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 542 births, 150 marriages, 51 still-births, 479 deaths, 23 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 57 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 11 transcripts of the birth record, 3 of marriage, and 31 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 12, 1880, was 70.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.904, the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 960, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.01 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1880.

CHAPTER 392.

AN ACT relative to janitors in district courts in the city of New York.

Passed May 26, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The justice of each district court in the city of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint a janitor for such court, who shall hold office during the pleasure of and be subject to the direction of the justice of the court for which he is so appointed. The board of estimate and apportionment of said city is hereby authorized and directed to make provision for the compensation of said janitors, who shall be paid a yearly salary of nine hundred dollars. Nothing in this act contained shall in any manner annul, restrict or affect the powers heretofore granted the department of public works of said city, or the commissioner thereof, concerning the control or care of public buildings, except that said department or commissioner shall not have power or authority to appoint janitors for buildings or parts of buildings leased by said city in which district courts are held.

Sec. 2. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 398.

AN ACT to amend chapter one hundred and six of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to repeal chapter five hundred and fifteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, entitled 'An act in relation to courts of record in the city and county of New York,'" and to re-enact chapter six hundred and twenty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five.

Passed May 26, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Sec. 1. Section one of chapter one hundred and six of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to repeal chapter five hundred and fifteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, entitled 'An act in relation to courts of record in the city and county of New York,'" is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1. Chapter five hundred and fifteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, entitled "An act to amend chapter six hundred and twenty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled 'An act in relation to courts of record in the city and county of New York,'" is hereby repealed, and chapter five hundred and fifteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled "An act in relation to courts of record in the city and county of New York," is hereby re-enacted as follows: "All orders of arrest, warrants of attachment, executions and proceedings to recover personal property in civil actions, except when the sheriff is a necessary party thereto, made or issuing out of any court of record in the city and county of New York, whether by statute or otherwise, shall be issued to the sheriff only."

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

ARREARS OF TAXES.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such

payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per cent. per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
