

#### APPROVED PAPERS.

Approved Papers for the week ending September 8, 1888.

Resolved, That the name of Samuel B. Stiles, recently appointed Commissioner of Deeds, be corrected so as to read Summer B. Stiles.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 4, 1888.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to George See to lay a course of flagging, four feet wide, in front of his premises on the westerly side of Weeks street, commencing at a point one hundred and fifty feet north of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, and running north fifty feet, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 28, 1888. Approved by the Mayor, September 5, 1888.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Henry Spies to flag the side-walk and set the curb and gutter stones in front of his premises, on the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street, from the southeasterly corner of said street and Lincoln avenue to a point distant one hundred feet easterly therefrom; also to flag the sidewalk and set the curb and gutter stones in front of his premises on the easterly side of Lincoln avenue, from East One Hundred and Thirty-third street to East One Hundred and Thirty-second street, and also to flag the sidewalk and set the curb and gutter stones in front of his premises on the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street, from the northeasterly corner of said street and Lincoln avenue to a point one hundred feet easterly therefrom, the work done at his own expense, under the direction of the Department of Public Parks.

### Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 28, 1888. Approved by the Mayor, September 5, 1888.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the property-owners on Brown place, from the north side of the Southern Boulevard to the south side of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, to regulate, grade, curb and flag the same, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 28, 1888.

Approved by the Mayor, September 5, 1888.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the ordinance requiring the Twenty-third Street Railway Company to employ conductors as well as drivers on the cars of the company, approved August 28, 1888. The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York do ordain as follows : Section 1. Section 5 of the above-named ordinance is hereby amended by striking therefrom the word and figures "August 10," before the figures "1888," and inserting in lieu thereof the word and figure "December 1," so that said section 5, when so amended, shall read as follows : "Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect December 1, 1888." Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 4, 1888. Approved by the Mayor, September 5, 1888.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed. Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals for each offense, which will be strictly enforced. Fountams or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

saloons, contectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this depart-ment may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water. Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed. The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREEY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collect-ing water rents. ing water rents :

ing water rents: ist. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have hereto-fore been treated. 2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirma-tion of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature. 4th. A penalty of five dollars (§5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful man-ner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water. 5th.
