Grant), on the west, besides being a great convenience to residents on the line of the surface railroad through One Hundred and Tenth street, which extends from the East or Harlem river to the North river, and intersects all the lines of communication between the upper and lower portions of the City; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Manhattan Elevated Railway Company be and is hereby earnestly requested to cause a passenger depot or station, with stairways, to be erected at Third avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street, in order to afford greater accommodation to the public.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor :

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, September 19, 1887.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

I have the honor to transmit herewith a communication received from the Commissioner of Public Works, in reference to certain resolutions and ordinances to lay crosswalks in One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and St. Nicholas avenues, at the intersections of One Hundred and Sixteenth street, which I have heretofore returned to you unsigned, with my objections thereto. It will be seen that a law passed by the last Legislature, known as chapter 569 of the Laws of 1887, escaped the notice of the Commissioner in his previous report to me. The authority therefore exists for levying the assessment as provided for in the ordinance; but it is believed that the expense of the proceedings will be very considerable and that the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation should be had before your final action in reference to the resolutions. I advise, therefore, that your Honorable Body make application to the Corporation Counsel, in accordance with the recommendation of the Commissioner of Public Works.

SIR—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of yesterday in reference to reports made to me from this Department on certain resolutions of the Common Council, for the repairing and reflagging of sidewalks and for laying crosswalks. In my absence the Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Public Works reported to you, under date of 8th instant, on two resolutions and ordinances to lay crosswalks on One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, at the intersections of Fourth, Madison, Fifth and Sixth avenues, and for crosswalks on Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and St. Nicholas avenues, at the intersections of One Hundred and Sixteenth street, that these resolutions would be illegal because the streets and avenues mentioned had already been paved and assessments levied for the pavements, and reassessments for the crosswalks could not be levied. He had no knowledge at that time of the act, chapter 569, Laws of 1887, referred to by you, which is intended to authorize assessments for expense incurred for flagging, reflagging and repairing sidewalks, setting, resetting and repairing curb-stones and for laying crosswalks where none had theretofore been laid.

I am and have been aware of the fact that at the last session of the Legislature a bill was introduced to authorize this Department to repair and reflag sidewalks and set and reset curb-stones where necessary, and where the owners of the property fronting on the sidewalks failed to comply with the notice from the Department to do such necessary work, and to make the expense incurred for such work a lien upon the property. In this bill no reference was made to crosswalks. Instead of this simple method of authorizing the necessary work and repairs and imposing the expense on the property fronting thereon, the law referred to by you provides for assessments on adjacent and benefited property, which would make it necessary to employ a city surveyor on each job to make a preliminary survey, map and estimate, and a return and assessment map and list for the work done. The language of the amendment and the fact of its being embodied in the section of the Consolidation Act relating to the repavement of streets, induce me to suggest that it be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for his interpretation and for his advice as to how it shall be carried into effect before any ordinances are passed or expense incurred under it.

The statement of the equalized valuation of real and personal estate in the City and County of New York fixed by the State Board of Equalization of Assessments, and the amount of State taxes, have not yet been received from the Comptroller of the State, and will be hereafter added to the estimate, together with the amount of compensation and expenses of the Shore Inspector, to be raised by tax.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending August 27, 1887.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 24, 1887.—ADJOURNED MEETING—11 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Borden (President), Crimmins, Hutchins and Myers.

F. M. Bixby, D. H. Olmstead, O. P. Ketchum, G. W. Clark, Frank Tilford, Joseph Teets, John Sullivan and W. J. Merritt, a committee from the Morningside Park Association, appeared before the Board and were heard in relation to the improvement of Morningside Park.

W. H. McCarthy and Andrew Blessing appeared and were heard in relation to the improvement of East River, Mount Morris and Central Parks.

The President of the Board was authorized to engage Messrs. Olmstead & Vaux to revise and complete the plan heretofore prepared by them for the improvement of Morningside Park, and submitted to the Board on March 10, 1887, and with the said plan to submit a report and specifications for the completion of the work; and the President was further authorized to fix the compensation for such services.

The following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The proposed route of the New York, Connecticut and Eastern Railroad, as filed in the Register's Office, provides for its passage through Morningside Park and the contemplated High Bridge Park; and

Whereas, Complaint is justly made by the property-owners and taxpayers near said parks that, owing to apprehension that such route may prevail, the value of their property is already suffering material deterioration,

Resolved, That this Board formally expresses its unalterable opposition to the use of any portion of the parks under its control, save for the purpose for which they were designed—to be the pleasure grounds of the people—and declares that under no circumstances will it consent to the proposed or any other encroachment thereon.

The following communications were received:

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Returning forms of contract for completing the sea-wall at East River Park, with his indorsement of approval. Filed.

The Secretary was directed to insert an advertisement in the CITY RECORD inviting proposals for completing the East River Park sea-wall.

2d. Advising the Department in relation to fixing the width of the sidewalks and roadways of streets where the actual width is two feet or less under the standard width of sixty feet, as in the case of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, between Brook and St. Ann's avenues. Filed.

From the Chief Engineer of the Suburban Rapid Transit Company, reporting the opening to public travel of the footways of the bridge over the Harlem river at Second avenue. Filed.

From the Superintendent of Lamps and Gas, stating that the lighting of the lamps on the approaches to the footways of the Second Avenue Bridge over Harlem river was commenced on the 20th instant. Filed.

From the Cosmopolitan Cricket Club, asking that conveniences be provided in Central Park for cricket players similar to those provided for lawn tennis players. Laid over.

From John J. Boyle, asking permission to exhibit a group of bronze statuary in either Madison or Union Square. Denied.

From the Superintendent of Parks, reporting upon a bill of James Slattery, amounting to \$78.50 for three hundred and fourteen cubic yards of mould furnished and delivered on Riverside Park and Drive.

On motion, said bill was approved and ordered forwarded to the Finance Department for payment.

From the Topographical Engineer, in relation to the authority for fixing and establishing the grades of streets, avenues, etc., in the Twelfth, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, as given by chapter 577 of the Laws of 1877.

On motion, the matter was ordered referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion as to the powers and duties of this Department under the act cited.

From the Engineer of Construction:

1st. Reporting in relation to repairs necessary to be made to the Central Bridge. Filed.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to transfer the sum of \$1,500 from the appropriation made for the Bronx River Bridges for 1887, for which it will not be required, to the appropriation entitled "Harlem River Bridges—Repairs, Improvement and Maintenance, 1887," which is insufficient.

2d. Reporting in regard to the lighting of the approaches of the footways of the bridge over Harlem river at Second avenue. Filed.

From the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards:

1st. Reporting in relation to the payment on acceptance of the work on Section One of the Webster avenue sewer, under chapter 419, Laws of 1887, and stating that he had charged the contractor with the penalty for one hundred and eighty-six days' overtime. Approved.

2d. Submitting a time statement on the contract for constructing a sewer in East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, between Washington and Third avenues, with branch, etc. Approved.

3d. Reporting in explanation of the increase of length of sewer and other items in the contract for constructing sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, between Washington and Third avenues, with branch, etc. Filed.

From the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—Reporting upon a petition for covering a drain in Tremont avenue, from a point near One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street to Anthony avenue. Work ordered proceeded with.

From Theodore Weston, Architect—Recommending that the foundations of four of the buttresses of the south wall of the Art Museum, which, in the enlargement of the Museum, it was found necessary to uncover, be properly repaired, at a cost not to exceed \$175.

On motion, the Treasurer was authorized to have the work done as recommended by the Architect, at an expense not to exceed \$175.

From the Captain of Police—Reporting favorably upon the probationary service of Rudolph Eichler and Patrick J. Boylan, Park Policemen.

On motion, Rudolph Eichler and Patrick J. Boylan were appointed Park Policemen.

From Nelson H. Tallman, resigning his position as a Park Policeman. Accepted.

From Michael J. Duane, resigning his position as a Park Policeman. Accepted.

From Bartlett F. Jones, resigning his position as a Park Policeman. Accepted.

From Daniel Spillane, asking to be allowed pay for six days' service as a Park Policeman. Denied.

From Henry Farley, lately employed as a Park Policeman, asking that his case be reconsidered, and that he be permitted to resign. Filed.

The Board then proceeded to consider the evidence taken in the trials of certain Park Policemen, and the following fines were imposed:

William J. Dunn—Charged with violation of rules and neglect of duty; was found guilty as charged and fined three days' pay.

Henry J. McMullin—Charged with being off post; was found guilty as charged and fined ten days' pay.

Edward Gilon, Jr.—Charged with violation of rules and neglect of duty; was found guilty as charged and fined five days' pay.

Eugene A. Lehane—Charged with violation of rules and neglect of duty; was found guilty as charged and fined three days' pay.

Joseph McGowan was appointed Foreman of Stables for one month, at a compensation of \$90 per month.

The matter of the bonds of the Property Clerk was referred to the Treasurer for report. Commissioner Crimmins made a verbal report upon the specifications for heating the enlargement of the Metropolitan Museum of Art as prepared by Theodore Weston, Architect, and recommended that the same be approved and ordered printed, and that the work be advertised. Adopted. Commissioner Crimmins submitted a plan showing the proposed widening of the sidewalks of West Seventy-second street. Which, on motion, was laid over and ordered placed on exhibition. 1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled or record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
