Pursuant to the provision of section 27 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, herewith I transmit to you a statement showing a summary of the operations of the Finance Department during the three months ending December 31, 1881, and the condition of the City Treasury at that date, together with detailed statements of the receipts and expenditures in each quarter of the year 1881, under the several accounts, to wit :

The General Fund.
Taxes.
Special and Trust Accounts.
Appropriations.
The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt.
The Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt.

The following tabular statements of statistics relating to the City Debt, appropriations, etc., are also appended :

1. "Statement A"—Appropriations and expenditures for and during the year 1881, comprising expenses for the support of the City Government, including the several Departments and the branches thereof, the State taxes and the courts ; also the amount paid for interest on that portion of the City Debt and the redemption of the principal thereof which is provided for by taxation ; showing, also, transfers and unexpended balances of appropriations.

THE CITY DEBT.

The following table exhibits the amount of the several classes of stocks and bonds comprising the Funded Debt, that is to say, all bonded indebtedness of the City of New York, except revenue bonds issued in anticipation of taxes, outstanding on December 31, 1880, and on December 31, 1881, and also the amount in the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, at the same dates respectively.

The amount in the Sinking Fund is deducted from the gross debt, showing the net Funded Debt.

INCREASE AND DECREASE OF THE CITY DEBT FROM 1870 TO 1881, INCLUSIVE.

The City Debt, as is well known, had reached a large sum in 1870.

The net amount of the Bond Debt, exclusive of Revenue Bonds, at the close of that year was \$61,407,352.02.

In 1871 the Bond Debt was largely increased and it continued to increase annually until the close of 1876, when the net debt amounted to \$114,948,611.76, comprised of stocks and bonds issued for the liquidation of obligations of the city incurred in and prior to 1871, expenses of local improvements previously authorized by law, and other public purposes.

Since 1876 there has been an annual decrease of the debt, the net Funded Debt amounting on December 31, 1881, as before stated, to \$98,290,206.17.

The following table shows the gross debt, exclusive of Revenue Bonds, the amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, and the net debt in each year from 1870 to 1881, and also the yearly increase from 1870 to 1876, and the yearly decrease from 1876 to 1881, all inclusive :

The principal of the present City Debt is being gradually and rapidly reduced by redemption from the revenues of the Sinking Fund, and, as stated in the Comptroller's Report for the year ending August 1, 1881, it is estimated that they will be sufficient to extinguish the whole present City Debt within the next twenty years, without recourse to taxation.

This result is well assured so far as the existing bond debt is concerned, if the Sinking Fund is not interfered with in its operations by injudicious legislation ; but it should be observed that new debt will probably be incurred to a considerable amount in a few years, by the issue of bonds for a further supply of water, for building of bulkheads and piers along the water front, for local improvements in the upper wards of the city, and for other projected public expenditures, which will create indebtedness besides that now existing.

THE SINKING FUND FOR THE REDEMPTION OF THE CITY DEBT.

INVESTMENTS IN 1881.

All the bonds issued in 1881 on account of the Funded Debt were taken by the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund for investments in the Redemption Fund, amounting to \$3,014,000.

There is, consequently, a corresponding increase in the amount of the Sinking Fund and decrease of the net debt, although the gross debt remains about the same.

REDEMPTIONS IN 1881 AND 1882.

In the year 1881, stocks and bonds payable from taxation were paid and redeemed from the surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund, amounting to \$1,349,649.48, relieving the tax levy to that extent.

The amount of stocks and bonds payable from taxation by the laws authorizing their issue, which falls due in 1882, is \$1,757,153.94, which will be paid and redeemed from the revenues of the Sinking Fund, instead of raising the money by tax, as would otherwise be necessary.

The Comptroller's Report for the year ending August 1, 1881, contains an explanation of the nature and operation of the Sinking Fund.

It was there shown that for several years to come, no resort to taxation will be necessary for the redemption of the City Debt falling due from time to time, as such redemption will be effected by means of the Sinking Fund.

I need only here repeat the opinion expressed in the report of August last, that no change should be made in the Sinking Fund system as established by law, which for more than half a century has worked so successfully and beneficially, and without the loss of a dollar from the operation of this system.

The credit of the city is so intimately connected with the Sinking Fund, and the confidence of capitalists is so firmly based upon its maintenance unimpaired, that any attempt to change the system would operate injuriously upon the credit of the city, which was never higher than at the present time.

REVENUE BONDS.

On August 1, 1881, the amount of Revenue Bonds outstanding, as shown by the Comptroller's Report for the year ending at that date, was \$18,181,589.79.

Before the opening of the tax books, on the 24th day of October, for the collection of taxes for 1881, the amount of Revenue Bonds outstanding had been increased by further issues to meet the current expenses of the city, but after that date they were redeemed from taxes collected, leaving the amount outstanding at the end of the year, as shown above, only \$4,328,095.

As taxes in arrears are collected, the Revenue Bonds then outstanding will be finally paid off and canceled.

TAX SALES.

A sale of property for unpaid taxes was held in December last, for the years 1871, 1872, 1873, 1874, 1875, and 1876, and for unpaid Croton water rents for the years 1870, 1871, 1872, 1873, 1874, and 1875.

This was the first tax sale held since 1874, several laws having been passed since that date extending the time for the payment of arrears of taxes, which prevented sales.

A large amount of taxes and Croton water rents, which were advertised in the sale list, was paid before the sale was held, and a large amount was bought in by the city, on which no bids were received.

The total amount of taxes and Croton water rents, together with interest and expenses, received from purchasers of the property on which they were due, for terms running from five years to one thousand years, was \$396,795.67.

It is intended, now that the laws extending payment have expired, to hold tax sales annually for taxes remaining unpaid three years, as provided by the tax laws, and arrears of taxes on real estate will therefore not accumulate as they have done for a number of years past.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR 1882.

The total amount of appropriations made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the Final Estimate adopted December 29, 1881, for the year 1882, is \$29,412,831.56, from which is deducted \$2,000,000 for estimated amount of the General Fund applied to the reduction of taxes.

Of the annual appropriations the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has control over only about one-third the total sum, the remainder, including the interest on the city debt, being fixed by law.

UNEXPENDED BALANCES OF APPROPRIATIONS.

It will be seen by reference to Statement "A," appended to this report, that a large number of unexpended balances of appropriations to the City Departments, and for various purposes, have accumulated in years past, and remain credited to the several appropriations on the books of the Finance Department.

No provision of law exists under which the Comptroller has power to cancel and write off these unexpended balances of appropriations from the books of the Finance Department, to render them unavailable, and I think that power should be conferred by statute to cancel and lapse all unexpended balances now existing for years prior to 1881, and all such balances for each year after 1880 which may hereafter exist twelve months from the close of every fiscal year; providing, however, that such amounts as are required to pay liabilities on contracts or other obligations incurred during the year for which the appropriations were made, shall be continued or re-appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

UNPAID PERSONAL TAXES.

The amount of personal taxes which were levied prior to the year 1881, and remain unpaid, is nearly thirteen million eight hundred thousand dollars, a very small part of which can ever be collected.

The Comptroller's Report of last August contains a table showing the unpaid taxes for each year since 1852.

STREET IMPROVEMENTS IN THE TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

Local improvements and the opening of streets and avenues in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards are under the direction of the Department of Public Parks.

Special laws relating to street openings and assessments in this section of the city operate very unjustly upon the city at large.

By chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874 it is provided that not more than one-half of the amount awarded for damages and of the expenses attending such openings shall be assessed upon the property benefited, when the street or avenue is more than a mile in length, the amount of such damages and expenses not so assessed being made a charge upon the City of New York, to be paid from the proceeds of bonds.

Under this law the Department of Public Parks has ordered proceedings for a large number of street openings in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, on which awards and expenses will amount to more than a million dollars, one-half of which only is assessable on property benefited, and the balance on the city under the present law.

In the new and extensive territory annexed to the city, there are many streets and avenues more than a mile in length to be opened, and unless some check is put upon such proceedings, the City Debt will be largely increased by the cost attending them, to be paid from the City Treasury.

In one case of street opening proceedings under the law referred to, the city has been already assessed the sum of \$340,532.23 for one-half the expense of opening and widening streets and avenues in the Twenty-third Ward, more than a mile in length.

I refer to the opening and widening, under a single proceeding, of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and eleven other streets and avenues, some of which, for a portion of their length, had been previously opened and improved, and were only constructively subject to the law imposing one-half the expense upon the city, when streets are more than a mile in length.

Another law was passed at the last session of the Legislature relating to street openings, and also to the local improvements of regulating, grading, sewerage, etc., in the annexed district and the upper part of the Twelfth Ward, the provisions of which, if they were practicable, would certainly lead to premature and extravagant expenditure of public moneys.

The act referred to is chapter 544 of the Laws of 1881, the first section of which provides as follows:

"The assessment for benefit in all proceedings now pending or hereafter to be commenced to acquire title to lands in the Twelfth Ward, north of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York, for a street, avenue or public place, or for the opening or widening thereof, and all assessments levied for grading, regulating, paving and sewers in said territory, and all assessments heretofore levied therein for any of said purposes, shall be payable in yearly installments of five per centum of the whole amount of each of such assessments, together with seven per centum interest on the whole amount unpaid in any year, which yearly installment and interest shall be levied and collected with the annual taxes upon the property so assessed, and payment thereof enforced in the same manner as such taxes and with the same penalties."

It will be observed that this law applies to assessments for both street openings and local improvements of all kinds, and also to assessments heretofore levied as well as those to be hereafter levied, and provides for their payment in twenty years in annual five per cent. installments, which annual installments of assessments that have been already legally laid upon the property benefited by the improvements are to be levied again, to be collected with the annual taxes upon the property assessed, and payment enforced in the same manner as for taxes.

The utter impracticability of such a scheme for the collection of assessments is obvious to every one in the least familiar with the subject.

It has been shown by experience in the City of Brooklyn that payment of assessments by installments extending over a long period cannot be carried out practically, and is attended with injustice and litigation and great loss eventually to the treasury.

The immediate effect of the improvements for which assessments are levied is to enhance the value of the property, and enable the owners to sell it advantageously.

The deferred payment of assessments by small installments operates, in fact, as a premium upon extravagance in expenditure for local improvements and encouragement of speculation prejudicial to the public, for the benefit of private interests.

It is provided by the second section of the law that the cost of such street improvements shall be paid by the city from the proceeds of bonds, while it is proposed to postpone the final payment of assessments for twenty years.

This provision is more objectionable in respect to "street openings," for which the awards for damages are payable when confirmed, although assessments for benefit are made payable only within a period of twenty years.

The second section of the law, which provides for the issue of bonds to pay the cost of the improvements, is so conflicting and uncertain in language that it is quite unintelligible, and is, in fact, inoperative.

These special laws upon assessments for street openings and local improvements should be repealed immediately for the protection of the public interests, and the laws on the subject should be made applicable to the whole city alike.

After the extravagant and premature expenditures of twelve or fifteen years ago for the construction of boulevards and avenues in the upper part of Manhattan Island, a large part of which, together with many years' of interest upon the Assessment Bonds issued to carry on these works, have fallen upon the city at large, common prudence would dictate that such extravagance should not be repeated. Yet, the proposition to open streets and avenues in the annexed district, under the law above alluded to, would lead to a repetition in its worst form of the waste and extravagance of past years, and the result would inevitably be a heavy load of new debt, to be saddled upon the city at large. No plan could be devised more conducive to extravagance and speculation than that of spreading payments for assessments over a period of twenty years; and I repeat what has been stated above, that it is nothing more nor less than a premium upon a wasteful, extravagant, and useless expenditure of the public money, and should under no circumstances be sanctioned by law.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

Under the laws now governing the Dock Department, all expenditures for construction and for repairs of piers, dredging of slips, etc., including also salaries of the Commissioners and employees, and the wages of laborers and all current expenses, are paid from the proceeds of bonds issued upon the requisitions of the Commissioners of Docks.

Like those of other city departments, the salaries and current expenses of the Dock Department, and also the cost of repairs of piers and bulkheads, dredging slips, etc., should be paid from taxes provided for by annual appropriations of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on Departmental Estimates.

Only the general improvement of the water front, by building bulkheads and piers, which are works for future rather than immediate benefit to the city, should be provided for by the issue of bonds, and such expenditures should be limited to an amount to be approved and fixed in advance annually by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund upon estimates of the Commissioners of Docks.

It appears from a report recently made by the Commissioners of Accounts to the Mayor, of an examination into the affairs of the Department of Docks, that the total expenditures from May, 1870, the date of the formation of the Department, until the end of its eleventh fiscal year, the 30th of April, 1881, were \$7,879,593.41, divided as follows:

The report of the Commissioners of Accounts also states, that "the gross rents, accruing during the same period, are \$6,901,113.80, increasing from \$404,349.53, in the fiscal year ending April 30, 1871, to \$864,228.75, in the year ending April 30, 1881."

THE NEW YORK AND BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

This structure, which was commenced nearly thirteen years ago, will, according to a recent Report of the Chief Engineer, be completed and opened for use on the 31st of March, 1883, provided the Legislature at its present session shall authorize the expenditure of \$1,250,000 in addition to the amount heretofore authorized.

After a full consideration of the subject, the Trustees of the bridge have petitioned the Legislature to pass an act granting authority for the expenditure of such additional sum of \$1,250,000, one-third thereof to be provided by the City of New York and two-thirds by the City of Brooklyn, from the proceeds of bonds to be issued by the two cities.

The memorial of the Trustees to the Legislature and the Report of the Chief Engineer, giving the items of expenditure required to complete the bridge and open it for public use, are as follows:

The Trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge respectfully represent to your Honorable Body, that for the purpose of completing the bridge, and to open it for public use, there will be required, in addition to the amount heretofore authorized to be expended, the sum of one million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$1,250,000).

The items which make up this sum are set forth in an estimate of the Chief Engineer, hereto annexed.

The plan of transit for passengers over the bridge has been carefully considered by the Engineer and by a Special Committee of the Board.

The report of this Committee, together with the report of the Engineer upon the same subject, is also herewith presented.

The cost of carrying out this plan is shown in the second general item of the Chief Engineer's estimate, and amounts to the sum of \$595,974.60.

The third general item is the estimated cost of fitting up warehouses under the arches of the New York approaches, complete for occupancy, amounting to \$348,184.

It has always been contemplated that this valuable space in the business part of the city should be utilized as far as practicable, so that some revenue may be derived therefrom. It is estimated that these warehouses will yield in rents the sum of \$54,000 annually, or nearly sixteen per cent. upon the outlay required to fit them up.

The expenditure is therefore deemed advisable.

It is possible, however, that a change of plan may be made in fitting up the arches for warehouses, in which case the total sum of \$348,184 may not be found necessary.

It may be deemed more advantageous to let the spaces under the arches for a term of years to tenants who will fit them up at their own cost; or, if fitted up by the Trustees, a less expensive plan may be deemed advisable. In either case the issue of bonds to the full amount herein asked for would not be necessary.

The Trustees have intended to state the outside sum which may be required for the completion of the bridge and the warehouses under the arches.

The Trustees think it proper to state, that while the sum of \$1,250,000, as set forth in the accompanying estimate of the Chief Engineer, is considered sufficient to complete the bridge and to open it for traffic, an additional expenditure may be required in the future for suitable and ornamental façades at the portals of the bridge in the two cities, the cost of which will depend upon the style and character of the work, and will probably amount to two or three hundred thousand dollars for both termini.

The expenditure upon the bridge has already been so great, that the Trustees do not include the amount required for this purpose in the present estimate, the outlay not being essential to the opening of the bridge for use. They prefer to leave the matter for future consideration.

There are certain strips or pieces of land belonging to the Trustees, acquired during the construction of the bridge, but which are not necessary for its operation, which are valued at \$200,000.

Under existing laws the Trustees are authorized to sell these lands, and to use the avails for the construction of the bridge. No sales have yet been made, as it is believed the lands will command a higher price after the bridge is opened.

It is also considered necessary to acquire additional land at the Brooklyn terminus, in order to afford sufficient room for the traffic on that side of the river. This expenditure will be met by the City of Brooklyn and, as estimated, will amount to \$500,000.

The Trustees have also called upon the Chief Engineer to state positively the date when the bridge can be completed and opened for public use, if authority is granted by the Legislature for the expenditure of an additional sum of \$1,250,000.

He reports that in his opinion such opening may take place on the 31st of March, 1883. His report upon this important point is also submitted.

The Trustees herewith present the draft of a bill authorizing the issue of bonds by the two cities to the amount of \$1,250,000, for the completion and opening of the bridge, one-third thereof to be issued by the City of New York and two-thirds by the City of Brooklyn; such issues to be in addition to the amount of bonds heretofore authorized by chapter 399 of the Laws of 1867; chapter 300 of the Laws of 1875, and chapter 105, Laws of 1880.

The following statement exhibits an approximate estimate of the total cost of the bridge, when completed, including the amount to be expended under the authority of the act now presented to your Honorable Body, in addition to previous expenditures and the unexpended means provided by former acts of the Legislature, viz.:

By the above statement it will be seen that the cost of the bridge, as estimated, will amount to about fifteen and a half millions of dollars to complete it for public use, besides the proposed expenditure of five hundred thousand dollars by the City of Brooklyn for additional lands at the terminus in that city, and the cost of portals at the termini in both cities.

I have always been of the opinion that the undertaking was premature and unwise, and the enormous expense which it will entail upon the two cities I think fully justifies this conclusion.

In view, however, of the large outlays already made, there will doubtless be a general concurrence in the opinion that it is advisable to provide the means for completing the structure for public use at the earliest possible day, in order that some revenue may be received and applied to the payment of interest on its cost, and that such public benefit as it will afford may be secured without further delay.

Of the estimated cost of the bridge, as above stated, the proportion borne by the City of New York will be over five millions of dollars, exclusive of interest.

The interest paid on Bridge Bonds issued by the City of New York, and accrued to February 1, 1882, amounts to \$1,400,346.90.

If interest on the Bridge Bonds issued by both cities is added to the estimated cost of the work, when completed, the total actual cost will exceed \$20,000,000.

Letter from the Chief Engineer fixing the Time for Completion of the Bridge.

BROOKLYN, March 10, 1882.

Hon. HENRY C. MURPHY,

President Board of Trustees New York and Brooklyn Bridge :

DEAR SIR—In response to your letter of March 9, written at the request of Comptroller Campbell, I beg to assure you that the million and a quarter called for in my last estimate will be ample to do all the work enumerated in that estimate and open the bridge for use.

The item of liabilities under outstanding contracts is a fixed fact and cannot be changed.

The estimate of money for work required to complete the bridge is dependent upon the delivery of the steel, and we have Mr. Seller's promise that it will all be delivered this summer.

The item of materials required for the completion of the bridge and approaches not yet contracted for can all be had for the figures given in the detailed estimate.

The elevated platforms and rope machinery are simply engineering problems, and their cost is not likely to be increased in any way above the estimate.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 136 were in institutions, 442 in tenement-houses, 173 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 129 on the first, 214 on the second, 153 on the third, 90 on the fourth, 31 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 763 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 88 were stated to be single, 168 married, 87 widowed, and the condition of 420 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 763; still-births, 36; bodies in transitu, 13; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 64 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 508 births; 140 marriages; 36 still-births; 763 deaths; 13 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 96 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 13 of marriage, and 60 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending Mar. 25, 1882, was 38.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.923, the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,558, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.48 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 695 deaths and still-births, or 86.98 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 19; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 316; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 72; Greenwood (undenominational), 45; Lutheran, (undenominational), 101; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 27; Evergreen (undenominational), 39; Woodlawn (undenominational), 30; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 16; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 2; Macphelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 14.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending Mar. 18, 1882, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 1; Third, 1; Fourth, 24; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 12; Seventh, 25; Eighth, 30; Ninth, 25; Tenth, 32; Eleventh, 34; Twelfth, 85; Thirteenth, 20; Fourteenth, 25; Fifteenth, 7; Sixteenth, 24; Seventeenth, 47; Eighteenth, 38; Nineteenth, 143; Twentieth, 61; Twenty-first, 46; Twenty-second, 64; Twenty-third, 14; Twenty-fourth, 5.

The actual mortality for the week ending March 18, 1882, was 782; this is 112 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1881, and 212.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 32.05 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,268,904.

From Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting that the Piers at Thirty-seventh street, North river, and Forty-sixth street, East river, be dredged. Engineer-in-Chief to have soundings taken and to report the quantity of dredging necessary to give a proper depth of water in the slips adjoining the said piers respectively.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2296, as to amount of dredging required to give proper depth of water in the slip between the Piers at Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, North river. Secretary directed to notify the Knickerbocker Ice Company, lessees of the Pier at Twentieth street, North river, to dredge the half of the slip on the south side of their pier to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in default of their commencing to do the same within ten days after receipt of notice, that this Department will have the same done and charge the cost thereof to them.

2d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2360, as to plans for shed to be erected on Pier, new 28, North river.

From Providence and Stonington Steamship Company, lessees—In reference to the bad condition of Pier, old 33, North river, and requesting that the same be examined. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report thereon.

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation—In reference to the duties required to be performed by Joseph T. Kelly, while in the employ of the Department as Assistant Bookkeeper, and as to the duties usually performed by the Bookkeeper of the Department in March, 1877. The Secretary having stated that by direction of the Commissioners he had replied thereto, that from the best information the present Board could obtain, it was the custom for the Bookkeeper to receive and receipt for moneys due the Department in and during the time stated, and that the Board as constituted at that time were cognizant of his performing such duty, it was ordered that the action of the Secretary be approved.

From Burns Bros.—Requesting permission to erect a platform on the bulkhead north of Pier 59, East river, to be used for the purpose of dumping coal. Application denied.

From Hartford and New York Steamboat Company, lessees—Requesting copy of lease of half of Pier 24, East river, leased to said Company. The President having stated that he had replied thereto, including copy of their agreement to execute a lease therefor when prepared, his action was approved.

From S. A. Jenks & Company—In reference to estimate made by them for repairing the bulkhead between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, East river. Secretary directed to advise that the estimate made by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department being much lower than the estimate made by them, the work was therefore ordered to be done by the force of the Department, it being for the best interests of the city so to do.

From Counsel to the Corporation—Inclosing six copies of proposed contract for dredging the slips at Piers at Fifty-first street, North river, and Twenty-sixth street, East river, with his approval indorsed thereon.

From M. C. Henry and others—Requesting that the Pier at Seventy-ninth street, East river, when repaired and ready for public use, be not sold at public sale, but that it be retained and kept under the direct management and control of the Department, for the benefit of the business men in that vicinity.

From New York and Charleston Steamship Company—In reference to the sanitary condition of Pier 37, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report thereon.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report of work done during the week ending March 25, 1882.

2d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2351, as to the condition of and repairs required to Pier, old 29, North river. Secretary directed to notify the lessee thereof to repair the said pier within twenty days, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will proceed to have the same done and charge the cost thereof to them. Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Green Wright and Thomas Rae to construct and build a dock on the north side of the Harlem river, between Lincoln avenue and the Morrisania Steamboat Dock, on a line 60 feet inside of the present established bulkhead line, and extending from Lincoln avenue to within 60 feet of the said Morrisania Steamboat Dock, the said structure to be constructed under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with the plans and specifications approved by this Board.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2353, submitting specifications and form of contract for dredging the half of the slip west of Pier 19, East river, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by the President, was adopted: Resolved, That the specifications and form of contract as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief for dredging the half slip west of Pier 19, East river, be and is hereby approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have fifty blank forms of proposals printed, and proper advertisements inviting bids for doing said work, inserted in the papers designated by law.

The Secretary reported that he had transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation the papers served on Commissioner Vanderpoel on the 23d instant, in a suit commenced in the Superior Court of the City of New York, by the Cunard Steamship Company against John R. Voorhis and others, whereby the Department was enjoined and restrained from removing or interfering with the shed on the platform north of Pier, new 40, North river, and that he had requested the Counsel to the Corporation to assert the rights and protect the interests of the city in the proceedings instituted thereby.

On motion, the action of the Secretary was approved.

Commissioner Vanderpoel reported that the construction of the new bulkhead at Coenties slip was advanced sufficiently to permit filling in to be commenced thereat, and,

On motion, it was ordered that the price of tickets for filling in at Coenties slip be fixed at 25 cents for each load of clean dirt or material received thereat.
