Resolutions.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Board be and are hereby respectfully tendered to those druggists of this city who have gratuitously furnished the necessary medicines to the poor upon the order of the Sanitary Inspectors of this Department.

Resolved, That leave of absence of one week be granted to Sanitary Inspector Bryant, and of three days to Clerk Stoutenburgh.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 17, 1878 :

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,683, as follows, viz.: 6 public buildings, 692 tenement houses, 153 private dwellings, 100 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 43 stables, 15 slaughter-houses, 3 manure dumps, 1 ash dump, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 2 coal yards, 3 public sewers, 1 public urinal, 1 lime kiln, 1 mill, 18 sunken and vacant lots, 64 yards, courts, and areas, 61 cellars and basements, 92 waste pipes and drains, 234 privies and water-closets, 56 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 cesspools, 5 smoky chimneys, 26 other nuisances, together with 76 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 619.

During the past week 218 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 81 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

119 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 30 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 29 houses, 29 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of yellow fever was removed to the hospital.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,723 privies and water-closets, 113 yards, courts, and areas, 426 cellars and basements, 52 garbage boxes, and 139½ miles of street gutters.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

569 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 17, 1878. This is an increase of 9 as compared with the number of deaths reported to have occurred during the week preceding, but is an increase of 16 as compared with the number of deaths reported during the corresponding week of last year. The actual mortality for the week ending August 10, was 579, which is 109.8 below the average number of deaths of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.75 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,084,925.

The increase during the past, as compared with the preceding, week was from marasmus and phthisis ; the latter disease was also the cause of the excess over the corresponding week of last year, and the mortality for the past four weeks from this disease was 41 in excess of the corresponding four weeks of the year 1877. The deaths of children under five decreased 18, and diarrhoeal complaints, 3. The deaths from zymotic diseases were 43 less than the number reported from this class during the corresponding week of the past year. A comparison of the deaths by classes, and from the 10 principal diseases, is as follows :

—showing that the principal increase for the past week, compared with the corresponding week of last year, was in the following classes, viz.: Constitutional, 26 ; local, 16 ; developmental, 3 ; and violence, 14, while the class that is more under the control of sanitary measures decreased 43.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 102 were in institutions, 295 in tenement-houses, 156 in houses containing 3 families or less, 2 in hotels and boarding houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc. ; 8 were on the basement floor, 116 on the first, 139 on the second, 105 on the third, 69 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth. 566 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents ; 59 were stated to be single, 129 married, 54 widowed, and the condition of 327 was not stated ; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 560 deaths and still-births, or 91.80 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries : Bayside (Jewish), 14 ; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 237 ; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 84 ; Greenwood (undenominational), 46 ; Lutheran (undenominational), 82 ; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20 ; Evergreen (undenominational), 34 ; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18 ; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5 ; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2 ; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5 ; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3 ; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 2 ; Washington (undenominational), 8.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 17 was 75.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.866, the mean humidity was 80, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 515, and the amount of rain-fall was 1.11 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

During the week ending August 17, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 569 burial permits for city deaths, 31 for bodies in transit, and 41 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 569 deaths, 118 marriages, 467 births, 41 still-births, 31 applications for transit permits, and 73 returns from coroners. There were 26 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 5 transcripts of birth-record, 3 of marriage, and 18 of death were issued from this Bureau.

Report of Work Performed by the Visiting Corps of Physicians.

SANITARY BUREAU, August 20, 1878.

To W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent:

SIR—I have respectfully to report that the term of service for which the temporary Visiting Corps had been employed expired on the 9th inst., having extended over a period of five weeks, the work summing up as follows:

Tenement-houses visited, 25,217; families visited, 152,062; cases of sickness treated, 4,821; excursion tickets for the "Floating Hospital" of St. John's Guild distributed, 2,968. They also distributed a large number of circulars printed in the English and German languages, giving plain instructions in matters pertaining to the care of children, accompanying these with all necessary explanation and advice. Among the cases of sickness treated, there were 31 deaths, being 1 in about 155½.

In 2,552 of the cases treated the diseases are classified as follows: Diarrhoeal diseases, including cholera morbus and cholera infantum, 1,635; eczema, 31; otitis, 3; tonsillitis, 9; scrofula, 22; stomatitis, 6; vomiting, 9; inanition, 8; measles, 31; sunstroke, 1; bronchitis, 167; pharyngitis, 4; dyspepsia, 63; contusion, 5; whooping cough, 90; debility from heat and other causes, 115; pneumonia, 23; rachitis, 1; meningitis, 4; urticaria, 10; nephritis, 5; tape worm, 4; lichen, 5; gastritis, 1; malaria, 27; worms, 36; constipation, 5; pyrosis, 1; typhoid fever, 2; consumption, 14; rheumatism, 10; marasmus, 27; dentition, 114; dysentery, 20; diphtheria, 5; scarlatina, 17; erysipelas, 4; boils, 7; convulsions, 13; pleurisy, 2. This classification, though not complete, is a fair indication of the class of diseases now prevalent among the poor throughout the city, there being considerably more than one half of a diarrhoeal character, while there is a very small proportion of a contagious or infectious nature, an encouraging feature of the generally healthy condition of the city.

The comparatively small number of deaths is doubtless due to the fact that most of the cases were seen early enough to prevent disease making any serious inroads upon the constitution, while, on the other hand, many of those that died had been without medical treatment until found by some member of the Visiting Corps, in the last stage of diarrhoea or cholera infantum.

The liberality with which excursion tickets were supplied by the managers of the Floating Hospital of St. John's Guild resulted in great benefit to the little sufferers, who were enabled to enjoy for a brief time the fresh air as a relief to the painful monotony of their every day lives.

It is the testimony of all who had the opportunity of witnessing the effects of these excursions upon the children that they constitute an invaluable aid in preserving the health and strength of these little ones.

Although a number of druggists in different portions of the city volunteered to supply the poor with medicines, either gratuitously or at a very low charge, it was found that in some neighborhoods a good deal of difficulty was experienced in obtaining the necessary remedies. This difficulty was finally met by supplying each medical visitor with such medicines as were most likely to be needed for

the purpose of dispensing among such families as could not otherwise obtain them.
