The word street or streets, whenever used in chapter 35 of the Revised Ordinances of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, passed June 20, 1859, shall be deemed to include not only the carriageway and sidewalk, but every portion thereof, as established by law or ordinance, and also every porch, stoop, step, platform, stand, case, balustrade, post, rail, stairway, and every other structure, and every area, cellarway, and space, standing, placed, or being in or upon any portion of the ground which forms any such street or streets, as so established.

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 16, 1878 :

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,679, as follows, viz. : 8 public buildings, 667 tenement houses, 170 private dwellings, 80 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 27 stores and warehouses, 50 stables, 38 slaughter-houses, 1 market, 1 lime kiln, 1 mill, 2 piers, 3 breweries, 4 public sewers, 4 ash dumps, 6 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 39 sunken and vacant lots, 1 bridge, 44 yards, courts, and areas, 53 cellars and basements, 84 waste pipes and drains, 195 privies and water-closets, 88 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern, 2 smoky chimneys, 24 other nuisances, together with 77 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 494.

During the past week 66 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 58 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

80 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 54 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 54 houses, 54 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,631, as follows, viz. : 2 public buildings, 785 tenement-houses, 141 private dwellings, 54 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 26 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 2 breweries, 2 markets, 27 slaughter-houses, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 1 pier, 2 lime kilns, 2 mills, 2 cemeteries, 1 public sewer, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 5 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 34 sunken and vacant lots, 1 gut-cleaning establishment, 1 dyeing-establishment, 40 yards, courts, and areas, 51 cellars and basements, 104 waste-pipes and drains, 128 privies and water-closets, 60 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 2 piggeries, 17 other nuisances, together with 83 visits to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 482.

During the past week 104 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits have been issued to the consignees of 69 vessels, to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

43 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 56 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 50 houses, 50 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

## Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending Saturday, November 16, 1878, 518 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city; this is an increase of 74 when compared with the number reported for the preceding week, and 52 more than were reported during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending November 9 was 456, which is 11.6 below the average number of deaths for the corresponding weeks of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.78 to the 1,000 inhabitants, the population estimated at 1,088,461.

The deaths from phthisis pulmonalis (107) were 24 in excess of the previous week, the mortality from this disease being higher during the past week than the number reported for any week since March 23 (110); pneumonia showed an increase of 13; bronchitis, 8; diphtheria, 10; measles, 1; membranous croup, 1; typhoid fever, 6; puerperal diseases, 1; marasmus and scrofula, 1; rheumatism and gout, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; erysipelas, 2; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preterm births, 5; and Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; while scarlatina decreased 2; inanition, 3; whooping-cough, 1; malarial fevers, 4; alcoholism, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; cancers, 5; diseases of the heart, 5; aneurism, 1; cirrhosis, 5; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 1, during the past compared with the preceding week.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 97 were in institutions, 264 in tenement-houses, 151 in houses containing 3 families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 2 in rivers, streets, boats, etc. 4 were on the basement floor, 108 on the first, 151 on the second, 103 on the third, 36 on the fourth, 17 on the fifth. 518 were stated to be residents of New York City, no deaths of non-residents having been reported during the week. 63 were stated to be single, 148 married, 64 widowed, and the condition of 243 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 503 deaths and still-births, or 89.98 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 10; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 222; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 62; Greenwood (undenominational), 47; Lutheran (undenominational), 57; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 41; Woodlawn (undenominational), 13; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 2; Machpelah, L. During the week ending November 23, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 461 burial permits for city deaths, 15 for bodies in transit, and 42 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 461 deaths, 166 marriages, 426 births, 42 still-births, 15 applications for transit permits, and 65 returns from coroners. There were 25 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 1 of marriage, and 21 of death were issued from this Bureau.

461 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 23, 1878; this is a decrease of 57 as compared with the preceding week, but is an increase of 37 when compared with the number reported during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending November 16, 1878, was 526, which is 39.4 above the average for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.12 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,088,733.

The decrease of the mortality compared with the previous week was principally due to phthisis pulmonalis, the number reported to have died from this disease during the past was 67, against 107 for preceding week, the other diseases which also showed a decrease are as follows, viz.: Croup, 2; typhoid fever, 5; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 13; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 4; cancer, 1; marasmus and scrofula, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; diseases of the nervous system, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preterm births, 2; while an increase of 1 took place from measles, 13 from scarlatina, 3 from diphtheria, 1 from whooping-cough, 2 from erysipelas, 3 from malarial fevers, 1 from bronchitis, 3 from pneumonia, 6 from diseases of the heart, 4 from cirrhosis and hepatitis, and 4 from suicide. The deaths from scarlatina were 30, which is the highest weekly mortality reported from this disease since June 1, and the deaths from diphtheria were 26, which is the highest weekly mortality from this disease since March 23. The deaths from the 8 highest causes, compared with the same causes of the corresponding week of the year 1877, are as follows:
