





The 845 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.20, against 24.48 for the previous week and 24.8 for the corresponding week of 1891. Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively g6, 747, 183, 16, 0 and 13, against 131, 807, 233, 13, 2 and 9 for the previous week, a total of 1,055 against 1,105. Diphtheria decreased pretty generally all over the city, the decrease being most marked between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, West, and above Eighty-sixth street, from river to river. Measles increased between Rivington and Fortieth streets, and between Twenty-sixth and Eighty sixth streets, West, decreasing, as a rule, elsewhere, the decrease being greatest in the lower part of the annexed district. Scarlet fever increased markedly between Rivington and Twenty-sixth streets, decreasing or varying little elsewhere; 12 of the 18 cases of typhoid fever were above Fourteenth street, and 6 of the 13 cases of small-pox were between Canal and West Houston street.
