The Honorable THOMAS F. GILROY, Mayor, etc.: SIR—Pursuant to the requirements of section 49 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, we beg to report that the "operations and action" of this Department for the three months ending December 31, 1892, have been mainly confined to the work of assessing real and personal property for purposes of taxation for the year 1893, which was begun by the Deputy Tax Commissioners, under our direction, on the first Monday of September last, as required by section 814 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882. This work is nearly completed, and the preparation of the Books of Annual Record of Assessed Valuations of Real and Personal Estate for the year 1893 is in a state of progress sufficient to warrant their completion within the time specified by law. Since the assessment rolls for the year 1892 were delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, we have remitted taxes for said year in eight instances, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one thousand and fifty-four dollars and fifty cents (\$1,054.50). The 942 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.26, against 24.05 for the previous week and 27.94 for the corresponding week of 1892. Contagious and infectious diseases increased somewhat, the number of cases reported of diph-theria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 91, 119, 184, 20, 17 and 14 against 104, 109, 183, 12, 13 and 8 for the previous week, a total of 445 against 429. Diphtheria increased in the Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Thirteenth and Twenty-third Wards, but decrease in the Twelfth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twenteeth and Twenty-first Wards, and the decrease of measles was most marked in the Ninth, Thirteenth and Twenty-first Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth, Eleventh and Nineteenth Wards. There was a noticeable increase of scarlet fever in the Seventh, Twelfth, Fifteenth and Sixteenth Wards, and decrease in the Eleventh, Sev-enteenth, Eighteenth, Twentieth, and Twenty-first Wards, and the adverse above Eighty-sixth street; 12 of the 17 cases of typhus fever were below Fourteenth street, and 3 of these were west of Broadway. 3 of the 14 cases of small-pox were below Fourteenth street, and 6 of the remaining 11 were between Fourteenth and Fortieth streets. SIR—It is with profound surprise that I learn that the Board of City Record should have questioned the advisableness of printing the annual and monthly meteorological reports of this observatory. I beg to state that these printed reports are sent to the great libraries of this country and abroad, and that they are asked for by leading engineers and architects, so that the data may be used in the construction of all kinds of work. The reason of this demand is that they are the only printed reports in this country which contain hourly readings of atmospheric fluctuations. Even the United States Weather Bureau has had occasion to request them on account of their hourly mediane.
