Whereas, There has passed away from among us, in ripeness of years, energetic to the last, a great American citizen,

CARL SCHURZ,

Resolved, That this Board of Aldermen deem it their duty to record their appreciation of our fellow citizen, whose devotion to liberty and the highest ideals of human happiness for sixty years, rendered him distinguished far beyond the confines of the land he made his own and loved.

A revolutionist as a boy, he was forced to fly from the Fatherland in 1848 and, after a sojourn in England, came to this country and early became prominent as an earnest advocate of everything tending to the betterment of men, measures and materialities. As Meagher was an inspiration to the Irish, so was Carl Schurz to our citizens of German descent. When the Civil War broke out he largely helped to fill our armies and, as a Division General, earned a reputation for steady, steel-like, soldierly virtue. At Gettysburg he gloriously commanded the Eleventh Corps of the Army of the Potomac, which had been grievously shattered at Chancellorsville under another commander. As Cabinet Officer, Minister to Spain, United States Senator, editor, orator, it may truly be said that "whatever he touched he adorned."

Resolved, That our heartfelt sympathy is extended to the family of the deceased warrior and statesman, who may be consoled by the memory of this well spent, stainless, illustrious and esteemed life; be it further

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Your Committee on Apportionment of Assembly Districts appointed by the Board to prepare and report to it a plan of division into Assembly Districts of the counties comprised within The City of New York hereby report and recommend for adoption by the Board the appended description of Assembly Districts in the several counties.

The work of division has been done in the counties, individual members of the Committee participating in the labor. The Committee as a whole has examined, considered and approved the county plans. The plans have not been prepared in a spirit of partisanship, but with due consideration to all important political interests, and after inviting and receiving suggestions from many sources. No suggestion has been accepted that interfered with strict compliance with the law, and your Committee believes that while the plans submitted cannot be satisfactory to everyone, nor entirely satisfactory to anyone, yet that they will be generally satisfactory to the members of the Board, to the political parties and to citizens generally. The work has been fraught with many difficulties. Your Committee does not believe that any future study of the matter will produce any better or more satisfactory results.

The Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the plan of division into Assembly Districts herewith submitted.

THIRD DISTRICT—That portion of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and Clarkson street, and running thence along Clarkson street to Varick street, to Carmine street, to Bleecker street, to Macdougall street, to West Third street, to Broadway, to East Fourteenth street, to Second avenue, to Chrystie street, to Hester street, to Bowery, to Broome street, to Elizabeth street, to Spring street, to Macdougall street, to Charlton street, to Hudson street, to Spring street, to Greenwich street, to Canal street, to the Hudson or North river, and thence along the Hudson or North river to the place of beginning; 49,323 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

FOURTH DISTRICT—That portion of the Eleventh Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and Jefferson street, running thence along Jefferson street to Monroe street, to Montgomery street, to Ridge street, to Stanton street, to Goerck street, to East Houston street, to the East river, and thence along the East river to the place of beginning; 49,839 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

FIFTH DISTRICT—That portion of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Eighteenth street, and running thence along West Eighteenth street to Tenth avenue, to West Nineteenth street, to Seventh avenue, to West Thirtieth street, to Sixth avenue, to West Twelfth street, to Greenwich avenue, to Jane street, to Eighth avenue, to Bleecker street, to Carmine street, to Clarkson street, to the Hudson or North river, and thence along the Hudson or North river to the place of beginning; 50,235 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

SIXTH DISTRICT—That portion of the Twelfth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and East Houston street, and running thence along East Houston street to Goerck street, to Stanton street, to Norfolk street, to East Houston street, to Avenue A, to Second street, to Avenue B, to East Tenth street, to Avenue D, to East Ninth street, to the East river, and thence along the East river to the place of beginning; 49,507 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

SEVENTH DISTRICT—That portion of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Thirtieth street, running thence along West Thirtieth street to Tenth avenue, to West Thirty-second street, to Ninth avenue, to West Thirty-first street, to Seventh avenue, to West Nineteenth street, to Tenth avenue, to West Eighteenth street, to the Hudson or North river, and thence along the Hudson or North river to the place of beginning; 49,427 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

EIGHTH DISTRICT—That portion of the Twelfth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of Catharine and Henry streets, and running thence along Catharine street to Division street, to Chrystie street, to Stanton street, to Clinton street, to Henry street, and thence along Henry street to the place of beginning; 50,215 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

NINTH DISTRICT—That portion of the Fifteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Forty-fourth street, and running thence along West Forty-fourth street to Eleventh avenue, to West Forty-third street, to Eighth avenue, to West Thirty-eighth street, to Seventh avenue, to West Thirty-first street, to Ninth avenue, to West Thirty-second street, to Tenth avenue, to West Thirtieth street, to the Hudson or North river, and thence along the Hudson river to the place of beginning; 49,408 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

TENTH DISTRICT—That portion of the Twelfth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of Stanton and Chrystie streets, and running thence along Chrystie street to Second avenue, to East Fourteenth street, to Avenue A, to East Tenth street, to Avenue B, to Second street, to Avenue A, to East Houston street, to Norfolk street, to Stanton street, and thence along Stanton street to the place of beginning; 49,681 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

ELEVENTH DISTRICT—That portion of the Fifteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Fifty-second street, and running thence along West Fifty-second street to Eleventh avenue, to West Fifty-first street, to Tenth avenue, to West Fifty-second street, to Eighth avenue, to West Forty-third street, to Eleventh avenue, to West Forty-fourth street, to the Hudson or North river, and thence along the Hudson or North river to the place of beginning; 49,537 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

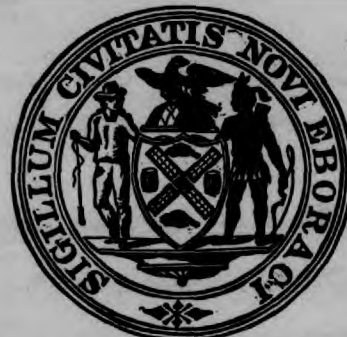

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.
