The drawings and specifications and estimate of cost for strengthening the end spans were approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 2. Invitation for bids to do this work under contract will be advertised in a short time.

The lighting of the bridge was satisfactorily maintained during the past quarter. Two additional arc lights were installed under the elevated structure, one at

the Manhattan anchorage and one at the Brooklyn anchorage.

The painting of the drip pans under the Manhattan approach over Market, the inside of the Manhattan and Brooklyn main tower legs, the oil pans at Manhattan intermediate towers, and the elevated connection on Brooklyn plaza, has been com-

pleted during the quarter. The painting of the roadway floor system from panel point 61, to panel point 20, Brooklyn approach; the Brooklyn Heights R. R. floor system from panel point 61 to panel point 49; the Metropolitan Street Railway floor system from panel point 61 to panel point 53; the longitudinal girders from panel point 61 to panel point 42; the footwalk floor system, panel point 25 to panel point 64, Brooklyn approach; the electric arc lamp poles on plaza; and iron ladders in the Brooklyn anchorage well

holes, has also been completed. Repairs to Medina sandstone pavement on south roadway, Brooklyn approach, at panel points 10 to 16, inclusive; from panel points 18 to 20, inclusive, and panel points 22, 26, 27, 38, 64, 69, 70, 71, 72, 75, completed; on the north roadway, Manhattan approach, at panel points 12, 15, 18, and south roadway, Manhattan approach,

General-Erecting pipe conduit in subway station, completed.

Resetting footwalk railing and installation of electric heaters in Emergency Hospital, Manhattan front, progressing.

Erecting oil pans around cable saddles, top of Manhattan main tower, 25 per cent. completed.

Erection of railing on top stairway platform in main towers, completed. Pumping out centre well holes, Brooklyn anchorage, and erecting iron ladders in main well holes, Brooklyn anchorage, completed.

Dedriving rivets in yokes under the Metropolitan tracks has progressed from panel point 44 to panel point 65, Brooklyn end, main span.

On January 10, new bids for the construction of elevators, stairs, etc., for the anchor piers were opened, those received on November 25, 1910, having been rejected because of irregularities in the lowest bid. The bids opened January 10 were as follows: Chas. Meads & Co., \$57,300; Snare & Triest Co., \$67,890; Chas. Wille, \$69,724; Louis Wechsler, \$70,000.

The contract was awarded to Chas. Meads & Co. Date of contract, January 25, 1911. Certified by Comptroller, February 1, 1911. Plans have been submitted covering stairs, trolley platforms, door and window frames, and general arrangement of elevator machinery. A portion of the cast iron stairs for the Queens anchor pier has been delivered ready for erection.

Plans have been submitted covering conductor bar insulators, platform and

yoke spacing on the plaza.

Plans have been completed for changes in feeder system to provide separate service for the two companies operating on the bridge, and the material for this purpose has been ordered by requisition. Plans for shelter house on the plaza are partly completed, and several studies for elevated railroad and subway constructions have been made. Other office work has consisted in checking contractors' plans and computing weights.

The work under the contract for construction of painting platforms is nearing

The construction of toll houses, police shelters and installation of certain electrical work provided for in the contract with Chas. Wille, was about sixty-five per cent. completed at the end of the quarter.

The work of painting the superstructure with Department employees was continued during the quarter with an average force of about forty men.

Manhattan Bridge.

The principal features of progress on construction of the Manhattan Bridge dur-

ing the quarter are as follows: The completion of the contract for replacing floor beams, stringers, etc., on the steel superstructure; the practical completion of the contract for constructing the

railings, roadways, track and electrical equipment; the demolition of all buildings on the terminal property and practical completion of filling sites of razed build The following gives a detailed description of the additional work accomplished

during the quarter:

Terminals-Manhattan: The razing of buildings on the terminal property is now complete. There still remains a small corner of 26-28 Market street, and part of rear building 30 Market street, on approach property, within Bridge Department prop-

The filing of sites of razed buildings on Manhattan terminal is now practically complete. There still remains about 400 cubic yards to complete this work, which will be accomplished within a week or ten days.

Railings—The part of the railings damaged by fire on the Brooklyn side span has now been restored; this completes all railings on the structure.

Track Work-Completed railroad footwalk planking along the entire structure. Completed spiking running rails and bolting guard rails. The track work is now

completed: Sidewalks-Completed the laying of rock asphalt mastic wearing surface on the area in the vicinity of where the fire occurred on the west side of Brooklyn side span. This entirely completes the footwalks on the structure.

Electrical Work-Finished bonding of contact rails. Placing contact rail supports and mounting contact rails on Manhattan approach and on Brooklyn side span; this work practically completed.

The electric lighting system is all complete, with the exception of one threelight wall fixture in each rear pavilion, and one four-light ceiling fixture in each rear

and front pavilion on anchorages. Replacing Floor Beams, Stringers, etc., on the Steel Superstructure—The contract for replacing floor beams, stringers, etc., on the steel superstructure was com-

pleted on January 20, 1911. Painting Platforms and Runways-Cutting out rivets, reaming and drilling holes in bottom chord along structure. The four runways on the Brooklyn side span have

been erected, which completes about 25 per cent. of this work. The contract drawings and estimate of quantities for the fire protection system

and compressed air line were completed in the early part of the quarter. Plans for the Manhattan terminal are progressing.

The grading plans for Canal street, details of westerly subway, the manholes for conduits are practically completed.

The Architects have completed their small-scale studies of the masonry arch, and have furnished the Department with prints of the arch and elevation of Bayard street retaining wall. The designs of foundations for arch and plans for Bayard street retaining wall are now under way.

Specifications for the westerly subway and Bayard street retaining wall were ompleted, ready for the printer.

During the quarter, in addition to routine maintenance care work was continued on the chipping, cleaning and painting of the steel structure of the bridge. The exterior and interior of the towers; the cable and anchorages; and three lines of trusses and railings; and a portion of the main floor of bridge, have been completed.

The open land each side of Brooklyn approach, between Sands and Nassau streets, Brooklyn, has been leveled and cleared of stones, to permit the small boys in the neighborhood to utilize it, temporarily, as ball grounds.

Municipal Building.

The frame and shell of the building is about one-third completed. The progress for the quarter was about ten per cent. of the entire superstructure. Of the material required for construction, fifty per cent. of the granite has been cut and thirty per cent. of the entire granite has been shipped from the quarries and stored in New

York, and is available for setting as the work progresses. Ninety-eight per cent. of the steel has been fabricated, and ninety-six per cent. has been shipped and stored = in the City. Thirty-four per cent. of the steel has been erected and paintd at the site, and thirty per cent. of the steel was erected during the quarter. Twenty-six per cent. of all the concrete floor arches and twelve per cent. of all the terra cotta arches were placed during the quarter. The contract for the elevators and a contract for the partitions and interior finish of the building were advanced in preparation during the quarter.


